Francisco Jimenez Jauregui

Hayden native Francisco Jimenez "Frank" Jauregui, 97, passed away Sept. 18, 2016, in San Fernando, Calif. He was born June 6, 1919, the son of Francisco S. and Nieves (Jimenez) Jauregui.

He was a diligent worker for the Asarco Mines here in Arizona, as well as brief work in Peru in the 1950s. Frank also enlisted in the U.S. Army during World War II, serving in the Pacific arena. After 35 years of work for the mines, he retired and moved to San Fernando, California, where he lived out the rest of his 97 years. In later years, he enjoyed music and karaoke at the senior center, playing guitar, meeting new people, and making them laugh. He died at home after a brief illness, and he will be missed by his family.

He was preceded in death by his parents, sister Armida Monroy of Mammoth, brother Roberto Jauregui, first wife Mary (Ayala), their infant son Rudolph, and his second wife Juanita (Enriquez).

Left to mourn are his sister Maria (Rudy) Govea and brother Joe Jauregui, both of San Fernando; his daughters: Cecelia Barragan, also of San Fernando, Cristina (William) Lem of Tucson, Frances (Lorenzo) Bufanda of Winkelman, and Margaret (Randolph) Renteria of Tucson; his sons Frank (Dolores) and David (Selina) Jauregui, both of San Fernando; 16 grandchildren; and 32 great-grandchildren.

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Superior defeats tough Hayden team

The No. 2-ranked Superior football team overcame its first real adversity this season to defeat a game Hayden team last Friday night, 42 – 12.

Don't let the score fool you, the No. 8-ranked Lobos gave the Panthers all they could handle for more than a quarter and even held a 6 – 0 lead at the end of the first quarter. It was the first time all season that Superior trailed in a game.

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"Hayden had a good game plan against us," Superior head coach Ryan Palmer said after the game. "They did a good job of coming at us and they were able to go down

the field on a long scoring drive."

The Panthers finally starting rolling with about nine minutes remaining in the second quarter and went on to outscore the Lobos 42 – 6 from that point on.

Senior quarterback Nicolaus Cruz threw for 330 yards and six touchdowns in the win. He also rushed for a team-high 65 yards. Senior receiver Austin Navarrette hauled in three of Cruz' scoring passes. Marcos Bueno (two) and Jesus Catellanos (one) caught the other three.

The Panthers' 42 points scored were a season low.

"Give Hayden credit because they came to play," Palmer said. "I didn't like how we came out and fell behind, but I was proud of the way our kids fought back and regained control of the game.

Experiencing that type of adversity will bode well for the Panthers in the playoffs. This game also should benefit Hayden, which proved it can compete with the best teams in the state.

Superior closes out its regular season this Friday on Senior Night versus Ray.

Hayden will host San Manuel in its regular season finale. Kickoff for both games is scheduled for 7 p.m.

Hayden, San Manuel to renew rivalry

When 1A-Conference member North Phoenix Prep cancelled its football program just before the start of the season, several area teams, including Superior, Ray and Hayden, lost a game on their schedule.

Unlike Ray and Superior, which couldn't find opponents with an open date to match up with the cancelled North Phoenix Prep game, Hayden decided to look outside the box and outside its conference to find an opponent with a common open date.

They found a familiar face, er team, and rival in 2A-Conference San Manuel.

"It's a pretty big rivalry for the schools because Hayden used to play 11-man (football)," San Manuel head coach Daniel Williams told the *Copper Area News*. "It's a big thing for the town, the kids, and I look forward to seeing the kind of energy it can bring on sides."

That's right, the Lobos, which used to play 11-man football, will return to its heyday this Friday when they host the Miners in a most unique game.

"I'm looking forward to the kids playing 11-man, just to give them a taste of what it was like in the old days, I guess," said Hayden head coach John Estrada.

A team like No. 8 Hayden can potentially improve its ranking and playoff seeding by replacing the missed game. The Lobos were fortunate to find San Manuel to match up with.

Apache Jii is Saturday in Globe

The downtown corridor of historic Globe will be a pageant of color and sound on Saturday, Oct. 15, 2016 as the 33rd annual Apache Jii (Day) celebration gets under way.

A full day of entertainment, arts and crafts booths and savory foods is planned for the event, which will be held in front of the historic courthouse in downtown Globe. Tribal royalty in full traditional dress and native entertainers from flute players to hoop dancers will be on hand for a day packed with activities.

The day begins in the courthouse square at the corner of Broad and Oak, one block east of the US 60 highway. Opening ceremonies begin at 9 and then it's on to a full day of entertainment, shopping and native foods.

Booths featuring jewelry, painting, beading, wood and stone carving and more are planned for the street fair. Several demonstration booths are planned with artists showing the intricacies of beading, rock work and weaving. Entertainment, including crown dancers, b dancers and native flute players, is planned throughout the day and no one will go hungry if they stop by the food booths which will feature everything from delicious Apache fry bread and Indian tacos to more traditional

dishes like acorn stew.

Live art demonstrations by three young artists will be under way at 10 am; these large scale works will take form throughout the day in a special demonstration area.

There is no admission charge for Apache Jii; the festival has grown every year and offers a unique chance for visitors to talk one-on-one with Native Americans from throughout the Southwest. There is nothing like choosing a piece of jewelry or artwork after visiting with the artist who designed it.

The Fernando Cellicion dance troupe from the Zuni Tribe is one of the featured dance groups. They were named top group for the recent White Mountain Apache Tribal Fair. Also joining us are two crown dance groups from White Mountain. Basket Dancers from Gila River, flute players Robert Wilson and Nobert Allen will also be performing.

One of the featured demonstration artists this year is Petroglyph Expert David Morris, a member of the Choctaw nation and an ethno-botanist; a skilled storyteller - with a penchant for puns. He's a featured exhibitor this year for the Apache Jii event sharing his knowledge of ancient rock art; David volunteers as an Arizona Site Steward to help protect and preserve the ancient petroglyphs of the Hieroglyphic Trail in the Superstitions. He's a modern-day rock artist too, painstakingly

chiseling his own spirals, whorls, and animate designs into rock. His collectible works have been showcased with solo exhibitions at the Amerind Foundation, at the Prescott Indian Art Show, and can be seen here in Globe during Apache Jii - when he'll work on new pieces, and have others available for purchase.

Apache Jii is hosted by the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with Apache Gold Casino and Resort, Hensley Beverage Distributors, APS, city of Globe, KRDE and McSpadden Ford.

Winkelman to celebrate bridge's 100th birthday

In 1916, Pinal County decided to build a 419 foot long bridge over the Gila River at Winkelman. Since the bridge would be in both Pinal and Gila counties, an agreement was reached that each County would pay for half of the bridge cost. Topeka Bridge and Iron Company was the low bidder and built both the Winkelman and the Kelvin multi-span

reinforced concrete arch bridges which were designed by Daniel Luten, a nationally known bridge designer. Daniel Luten's structure type with its unique and distinctive horseshoe arch profile, was patented in 1900.

The design of the 419-foot long bridge included long-span reinforced concrete arches. The structure is unique as it is

founded on timber piles. Despite many delays caused by flooding of the Gila River during construction, the bridge was completed in November, 1916.

Because of the relatively high cost of multi-span Luten arches they were infrequently constructed. There were 13 Luten arch bridges built in Arizona, from 1913- 1923, of which three are multi-span bridges. Only two remain in Winkelman and Clifton.

The Winkelman Bridge was listed on the National Register of Historic Places on September 30, 1988. This magnificent bridge was restored by the Town with grant funding from Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) through an (ISTEA) grant. The restoration took 10 years to complete, from 1989 through 1999, with additional funding, support and assistance from Pinal and Gila Counties.
