### In response to Edward Aguirre's letter on CAC property taxes

There were several statements in Mr. Aguirre's opinion piece that are misleading concerning the signs, closure of the Aravaipa campus, and state funding to Central Arizona College (CAC).

First, let me address the signs. The signs that Citizens for Fair Taxation (CFFT) used were purchased shortly after the May 19, 2015 meeting thus the 45% was used. On June 9, the CAC Board of Governors (BOG) voted to change the outrageous tax increase to 20%. Due to the expense of these signs we crossed out the 45%, and wrote in 20%. There is a clearer picture of this sign on Twitter, go to search, type in 'sign recall petition', then scroll down to Sept. 18. In addition, flyers were distributed to Oracle

residents describing CAC's meetings for the tax increase. While in Oracle gathering signatures, there was one woman who did complain that the 20% was not obvious. She was informed that if she would bring a magic marker her concerns would be accommodated. She refused. Further, this particular woman stated that CFFT wanted to close the Aravaipa campus. Even after it was explained to her that her statement was patently untrue, she persisted in this accusation until she was instructed to leave. Concerning state funding, I'm reminded of an infamous quote from Mark Twain, "There are three kinds of lies: lies, damned lies, and statistics." By using information from 2006 it appears that the state has fiscally

abandoned CAC. Further, one of CAC's contentions to justify their most recent tax increase has been to place the blame on the lack of state funding. Interestingly the facts don't substantiate CAC's accusation. In 2014 CAC received \$2,023,900 (http://1. usa.gov/1VOHMuY) while in 2015 they received \$1,903,500 from the state (http://1. usa.gov/1LJ6Tu7) The difference in state aid from 2014 to 2015 was \$120,400. For example, this amount could have been replaced by using one less administrative position (salary = \$100,000 to \$200,000/ year). CAC could also have replaced these monies with the 6% increase on our property tax assessments this year, which CAC automatically receives.

There's additional information that many may not know. In 2008 Pinal County voters agreed to let CAC obtain 98 million dollars in bond money which the taxpayers would ultimately have to repay. Personally my share of this bond money has increased 203% in 5 years, from 2010 to 2015. Of this bond money CAC irresponsibly spent \$8.3 million for the 203 acre San Tan Valley campus. According to an October 12, 2011 article in the Wall Street Journal, Group Manages to Pull Off Desert Flip in Arizona, CAC spent \$43K/ac for much more land than needed for this campus. In January

2011 this land had been purchased for \$23K/ acre. So in 9 months the original purchaser made \$20K/Ac. Further, CAC didn't even bother to have an appraisal performed. In addition one would have to question why a community college satellite campus needed so much acreage. Then there's the issue of recent tax increases. In 2013, the CAC BOG voted to increase property taxes by 35%. There was such an outcry from voters that three weeks later this particular increase was changed to 16%. As there isn't any oversight of CAC's tax increases, they continue to increase taxes, burdening Pinal County taxpayers. In 5 years, from 2010 to 2015, my taxes for CAC have increased 57%. These are just a few of the fiscal issues that I had concerning CAC.

As many of us know there are always two or more sides to every story. The language on the sign was due to economic factors; we did cross out the 45% increase, changing it to 20%. CFFT does not advocate closing any campuses; however it does advocate that the CAC BOG be fiscally responsible to Pinal County taxpayers. CAC BOGs current tax increase is not due to a decrease in state funding.

The San Manuel girls' volleyball team may not have had the success it wanted as far as results, but there is no denying the young and experienced Lady Miners have improved even if the wins and losses don't.

The Lady Miners returned only one senior – Ashley Vargas – and two juniors – Daniela Guerrero and Jade Willard-Barcelo – this season. The rest of the roster is made up of mostly first-year players.

"(We) are young with many new talented players," head coach Cindy Navarro told the *Miner* in an email. "(We) continue to play hard and play with heart to improve our game. (We) came into the season facing new teams in their division, but our hard work and dedication has helped us to stay in the game and compete."

In their most recent game versus Combs, a 3-0 (5-25, 9-25, 14-25) loss, the Lady Miners were led by Eneida Quintero and Willard-Barcelo who finished with five and four kills, respectively.

Nicole Encinas (20) and Cassandra Guerrero (13) combined for 33 of the Lady Miners 76 digs in the match. Daniela Guerrero had a team-high 15 assists.

The Lady Miners have three home games remaining: Oct. 20 vs. Pima, Oct. 23 vs. Rancho Solano Prep, and Oct. 29 (Senior Night) vs. American Leadership Academy.

All home matches are scheduled for 7 p.m.

### Miner swimmers take on bigger schools in Tucson

On Thursday, Oct. 8, the Miner Swimmers traveled to the Udall Pool in Tucson to compete against Sahuaro High School, Tucson High School, and Flowing Wells High School. The final scores for the Girls teams were: Tucson 198, Sahuaro 115, San Manuel 105, and Flowing Wells 64. The Boys scores were: Sahuaro 166, San Manuel 164, Flowing Wells 96, and Tucson 74.

The Miner Girls has some great swims including three new school records from the Freshman. Gianna Sweeney bettered the 200 Freestyle record with a time of 2:13.99, breaking the record held by Amara Apuron set in 2012. Moments later Darien Apuron improved her 200 IM record by a second with a time of 2:31.61. Later in the meet, Apuron went on to shatter the 500 Freestyle record set by her older sister in 2012 by over 18 seconds with a time of 5:55.21. Against some of the best swimmers in Tucson, wins were very tough. It was not until the final event, the 400 Freestyle Relay, that the Miner Girls won a race. The relay team of Apuron, Sweeney, Rebekah Head, and Raya Woods won the race and ended the meet on a positive note for the Miners.

Anyone watching the Miner boys would have been confident that San Manuel won the meet. In the four-way meet, the Miners won 6 out of 11 events including two out of the three relays. In the opening event, the Medley Relay, Miner Relays finished 1st and 3rd showing great strength in all the strokes. The team of Will Newman, Taylor Woods, Mikey Garcia and

Robert Sweeney edged out Sahuaro in a tight race, while the team of Michael Primero-Predgo, Alec Newman, Colbey Stratton and Jacob Christian beat the rest of the field for a third place finish. The Miners then grabbed a 1-2 finish by Newman (in School Record time of 1:56.39) and Stratton in the 200 free. Sweeney won the 50 Freestyle, and Christian finished 3rd in the 100 Fly. Stratton won the 100 Freestyle in School Record time of 52.40. Newman and Sweeney combined for a 1-2 Finish in the 500 Freestyle. A second place finish in the 200 Free Relay was followed by two top 3 finishes in the 100 Backstroke and 100 Breaststroke. Despite the all the wins, the meet came down to the final event. The Miners won the 400 Freestyle Relay (Stratton, Newman, Christian, Woods) and earned 18 points, but Sahuaro finished in 2nd and 4th place earning 24 points, and ended up 2 points ahead of the Miners.

The 5 School Records, many personal best times, and Girls and Boys 400 Freestyle Relay victories had Miner Coaches smiling at the end of the meet.

Coach Alex Gort put things in perspective.

"The schools we faced were more than 5 times the size of San Manuel High School with some of the best swimmers in the Tucson area and we gave them a great meet," he said. On Saturday, Oct. 17, the Miners will travel to Marana for the Tiger Invitational Swim Meet to compete against many teams from Southern Arizona. The meet begins at 9:30 a.m.



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
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


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

The loss was the Miners' fourth in-a-row.


The Bobcats steamrolled the Miners from the start, leading 27 - 0 after the first quarter and 47 - 0 at

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# Miner swimmers qualify for State

During August and September, Miner Swimmers could be seen practicing after school daily and several mornings a week including Saturday mornings in San Manuel. On Saturday, Oct. 10, the Miner Swimmers were able to sleep in, as later that evening they attended the Saturday Night Fever Swim Meet at Chandler High School. This was the Miner's first chance to qualify for the State Championship Meet to be held on Nov. 6-7.

In swimming, the San Manuel HS competes in Division II which contains over 100 schools ranging in size from a few hundred students to over 2000 students. Individual swimmers must achieve a provisional qualifying time and be among the fastest 32 swimmers in the event to participate at the State Championship Meet. Relay teams must achieve the provisional qualifying times and be among the fastest 24 Relay teams.

The Miners did not waste any time achieving qualifying times. In the first event of the meet, the Girls Medley Relay Team of Senior Rebekah Head, Freshman Gianna Sweeney, Freshman Darien Apuron, and Sophomore Raya Woods swam a time of 2:13.15, beating the provisional qualifying standard of 2:13.93.

It was not long before Sophomore Will Newman swam the 200 Individual Medley in a time of 2:04.98, which is a new school record and an Automatic Qualifying Time. Next, Gianna Sweeney swam a time of 27.44 in the 50 Freestyle to make the provisional qualifying cut.

Miners continued to swim qualifying times as the meet

Darien Apuron swam a new School Record time of 1:05.64 in the 100 Butterfly to notch a spot for her at the State Championship Meet.

Will Newman swam an incredible School Record time of 54.38 in the 100 Butterfly to put his name near the top of the list of State Qualifiers. In the same event, Junior Colbey Stratton swam a 59.21 to join Newman on the list of Butterfly State Qualifiers.

The 200 Freestyle Boys Relay team of Senior Taylor Woods, Junior Robert Sweeney, Colbey Stratton and Will Newman looked spectacular in the school record breaking swim of 1:36.85 and earned a return visit to the State Championship Meet. Colbey Stratton had a leadoff leg time of 24.25 that was good enough to earn him a provisional qualification in the 50 Freestyle. Darien Apuron's hard work in practice paid off as she grabbed yet another School Record and qualifying time with her sizzling swim of 1:07.44 in the 100 Backstroke.

Gianna Sweeney's time of 1:16.71 in the 100 Breaststroke qualified her for the State Meet as a serious contender. Sweeney set a new school record in the 100 Freestyle during her leadoff leg swim in the 400 Freestyle Relay, beating the record set by Cierra Austin in 2012 by one tenth of a second.

The Boys 400 Freestyle Relay team of Stratton, Woods, Newman, and Freshman Michael Primero-Predgo swam a time of 3:37.83 to earn a return trip to the State Meet. Stratton also qualified for the 100 Freestyle with his leadoff leg time of 53.47.

At their first opportunity of the year, the Min-

ers qualified 3 relay teams (1 Girls, 2 Boys), and 4 individuals in 9 events for the State Championship Meet. The Miners were in top form breaking 6 School Records. With more qualifying meets to come, the Miners look to increase the number of qualifiers and are ready to see how they stack up against the best high school swimmers in Arizona.

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
