

Copper Area News is committed to providing our readers with as much information as possible. We post a daily update on our Facebook page with the total positive COVID-19 Data. This graph shows the daily counts of positive cases for the past week as of press time on Oct. 13, 2020.

There are a few points we would like our readers to consider when following this data.

 This will continue to be a rolling total of positive cases. It does not reflect recoveries or deaths. The Arizona Department of Health Services does not break out this data.
If you see a reduction in numbers from day to day it is most likely due to a data entry error or mis-coding of a zip code (at the state level).
This is all zip code based data; most of our zip codes include unincorporated areas. There is no way to track exactly which areas each of the positive cases are. Example, Kearny and Winkelman each have small communities in their zip code that are not in the Town's incorporated boundaries.

4. If you live in Gila County, please follow the Gila County Health and Emergency Management, Facebook. They have maintained their data on recoveries and current positive cases.

Cruz throws four touchdowns in Panthers'

Superior junior quarterback Matthew Cruz threw for 241 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Panthers in last Friday's home-opening 44 – 6 victory against visiting Lincoln Prep.

Cruz, who completed 7-of-13 passes, including a pair of 59-yard touchdown passes to senior receivers Joshua Marquez and Nathan Duarte, exited the game with five minutes left in the first half and his team leading, 44 - 0. So far, in two games this season, Cruz has played a total of one half of a game, during which he's passed for more than 300 yards and five touchdowns.

"(Matthew) has an excellent arm and he made some good throws," Superior head coach Ryan Palmer told the *Superior Sun* after the game. "He has only played two quarters of football so far this year because of lopsided scores. He continues to improve and grow as a leader." Senior Adam Navarrette scored a pair of touchdowns, one receiving and the other on a 75-yard punt return, which was his second in as many games. He also had four tackles, an interception, and a fumble recovery on defense.

"Adam is the fastest and most explosive player on the field," Palmer said. "He has the will and experience. He is a threat to score every time he touches the ball." The Panthers' defense allowed in first points of the season in Friday's game, bringing their total points allowed to six in two games. They also forced four turnovers in Friday's win to go along with three sacks. Marquez, who had a sack and a fumble recovery in the game, and Matthew Diaz-Gonzalez each finished with three tackles. Senior Marc Mendoza had a team-high 11 tackles, including two sacks. "It's all about team discipline," answered

Palmer, when asked to what he attributes the defensive unit's success. "When each player does their job, and trusts their teammates to do the same, we are very efficient."

"They have some talented athletes, particularly receiver Jon Belci," Palmer said. "The team is also coached by two former NFL players, Abdul Noah and Jerry Porter." Friday's kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

COVID-19 has changed so much for Americans. It's most apparent in our schools. In person learning has been suspended since last year's spring break. Superior Unified School District, like many other school districts, has begun the transition back to the classroom. It won't look quite the same.

What will SUSD Hybrid learning look like? The information following is from the school district. 1. We will create two groups of students. Group A/Group B. 4. On-site learning continues 5 days per week. On-site students will attend classes with both groups. 5. Transportation remains the same and will follow the SUSD mitigation plan. 6. Lunches continue to be served the same as on-site learning. Students eat in classrooms or designated area. Lunches will also continue to be delivered at bus stops for remotelearning students. 7. Hallways and classrooms


