LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Setting the record straight on recall

The recall of members of the governing board of the community college centers on their fiscal irresponsibility and their violation of the Open Meeting Law. The recall has nothing to do with the Aravaipa campus nor any intent to close the campus.

Pinal County has not recovered from the recession, people are still being laid off, and tax payers have already been burden by high tax rates. Oblivious to these economic conditions the CAC governing board voted on May 19 to increase taxes by 45% on that portion directed to the college. Immediately a committee, Citizens for Fair Taxation (CFFT), filed recall petitions. The filing of the recall petition and community backlash to this exorbitant, unnecessary tax increase of 45% resulted in the CAC Board holding a special meeting on June 9 during which they rescinded the 45% increase and literally pulled the number 20% out of a hat. The signs, with the crossed out 45% increase and a 20% percent figure added, is a reminder to all taxpayers of what occurred and what will happen in the future if recall is not successful.

The initial 45% increase was the largest increase ever passed by a community college in Arizona.

The Vice President of the College admitted that the college did not need this large increase for 2015-2016. He stated that not knowing what the future would bring the administration wanted the money in case. The CFFT has a different philosophy regarding taxes. The worker keeps his money in the event he needs it in the future.

Pinal County supported CAC in 2008 by passing a \$99 million bond for the repair of the Signal Peak Campus and to expand.



The board was fiscally irresponsible with this \$99 million. During the recession CAC purchased 203 acres in San Tan Valley from a party who 10 months previously had paid \$23,000 an acre for the land. CAC paid \$43.000 an acre. An appraisal was not done. According to the Vice President of the College an appraisal was not required. This fiscally irresponsible purchase for \$8.3 million made headlines in the Wall Street Journal.

When the San Tan Valley Campus was ready to open, CAC requested a 35% increase in taxes because "they forgot to

budget for the maintenance and operation of the new STV campus." Because of community backlash CAC settled for 16% increase. The taxpayers suffered as the result of their incompetence

Consequently in a 3 year period your taxes directed to the college have increased by 36% and you are still paying and will pay until 2034 for the \$99 million you gave then in 2008

Their rational for the increase. They need \$45 million Continued on page 4

to repair the Signal Peak Campus. Interestingly the same reason for the \$99 million bond. The administration complained about lack of state funding. CAC received \$2,023,900 in state funding in 2014 and \$1,903,500 in 2015.

Please note that 15 administrators earn a salary between \$110,000 to \$200,000 plus the benefit of a cadillac health coverage. The CAC Board voted these administrators

Recall is about fiscal irresponsibility and the violation of the Open Meeting Law. All campuses, including Aravaipa, will benefit by having a fiscally responsible CAC board.


Oracle Firewise Awards 2015







Miners finish third at Marana Invitational swim meet

The Miner Swimmers attended the Marana Tiger Invitational on Saturday, Oct. 17. It was a good chance to see how good the Miners are and since it was a qualifying meet, swimmers could qualify events for the State Championship Meet on Nov. 6-7.

Seventeen teams from throughout Arizona attended the meet. Even though the Miner Swim Team is small by High School standards, they packed a powerful punch finishing in 3rd place in the overall combined (Boys and Girls) standings with 360 points. Only Deer Valley High School (Glendale) and Cienega High School (Vail) finished ahead of the Miners. The Miners finished ahead of the following high schools: Marana, Ironwood Ridge, Pusch Ridge Christian Academy, Walden Grove (Sahuarita), Mountain View, Kellis (Glendale), Florence, The Gregory School (Tucson), Goldwater, Sahuarita, Odyssey Institute, Palo Verde, Green Fields Country Day, and St Augustine.

The Miners started things off with a 2nd place finish in the Girls Medley Relay. The team of Rebekah Head, Gianna Sweeney, Darien Apuron, and Raya Woods showed

that they were among the best at the meet and matched the State Qualifying time they had achieved the previous week.

In the Boys Medley Relay, the Miners beat all teams in what turned out to be an exciting race with Ironwood Ridge High School that had several lead changes. The team of Will Newman, Taylor Woods, Colbey Stratton and Jacob Christian each swam a personal best leg of the relay to better the School Record by over 2 seconds with a time of 1:50.53 on the way to victory and a State Qualifying time.

Jacob Christian finished 4th in the 200 Freestyle with a time of 2:01.88, dropping several seconds from his personal best, but narrowly missing the provisional State Qualifying time.

In the 200 Individual Medley (IM) Gianna Sweeney (2:25.67) and Darien Apuron (2:30.74) both swam faster than the school record (2:31.61) and both qualified for State. Sweeney and Apuron finished 2nd and 3rd in the all-around event in high school swimming. Will Newman swam a time of 2:08.76 in the 200 IM to win with a several second lead.

Will has already qualified the in 200 IM for the State Meet.

The 50 Freestyle is the sprint event in swimming and the Miners had two Swimmers in the top 4. Colbey Stratton (24.17) finished in 2nd place, 0.01 second behind the winner while Taylor Woods (24.31) finished in 4th place 0.15 seconds behind the winner. Both swimmers had personal best times and since the provisional State Qualifying Time is 24.25, Stratton found himself qualifying and Woods found himself less than a tenth of a second away.

Stratton and Woods were in a similar situation in the 100 Freestyle finishing in 4th and 5th place. With the qualifying time of 54.39 Stratton's time of 54.23 was good enough to make the cut and Wood's time of 54.45 (a personal best) was painstakingly close.

Jacob Christian swam an outstanding 500 Freestyle with a time of 5:40.39, again dropping several seconds, but this time finished ahead of the qualifying mark (5:41.83) to qualify for State on his way to a 4th place finish.

It was the 200 Girls Freestyle Relay that had coaches excited. The team of

The Miner Boys 400 Freestyle Relay team of Stratton, Taylor Woods, Christian, and Newman won with a time of 3:33.93.

After two qualifying meets, the Miners have qualified 5 relay teams (2 Girls, 3 Boys), and 5 individuals in 13 events for the State Championship Meet. With several swimmers on the bubble, Miners hope to qualify for even more as the season progresses.
