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# Pinal Board of Supervisors to vote on food permit increases

This summer many restaurant and other food establishments received a notification from Pinal County Environmental Health Department that the fees for the annual health and safety permits to operate their establishments would go up. In some cases the proposed fees were almost a 600 percent increase from the current fees. One area of concern to many organizations in Pinal County was an increased fee for non profits and temporary events. Currently temporary event vendors pay \$25 for each event. The proposed plan would have increased the fees to \$196 if the event permit was submitted two weeks in advance and \$246 for permits submitted less than two weeks in advance of the event.

Restaurant owners and event planners throughout the county attended the work session with the Board of Supervisors in August to express their concerns about the increases. If the proposed fees were to be approved, the new pricing would be the equivalent of increasing a cup of coffee from one dollar to six dollars.

The County Health Department staff reported that the permit prices were determined after analyzing the cost of processing the permits and conducting the necessary inspections. The department's original plan would have increased the permit fees to allow the process to become self sustaining and not require funding from the County's general fund. After much discussion and comments from the public, staff returned to the drawing board to come up with other permit fees. The proposed plans will be presented to the board of supervisors for approval on Wednesday, October 30, 2013.

The health department staff has proposed three other fee schedules – all three fee schedules eliminate the permit fee for temporary events and food banks. The temporary event fees will be waived for both non profit and for profit organizations. One plan would allow for \$200,000 from the general fund to be allocated to the department, the second plan would allow for \$300,000 from the general fund to subsidize the department and the third plan would subsidize the department with 50 percent of the funds needed, which would amount to \$400,000.

The County Health Department plans on meeting with temporary event organizers to discuss how the county can improve the event permitting process. Under the original plan presented a level three eating and drinking establishment would be \$813 a year for their permit. If one of the other plans are accepted by the board that proposed fee will be reduced to \$609 in option B, \$506 in Option C and \$406 in Option D.

# Superior School Board meeting: policies, 301 funding discussed

At what turned out to be a marathon Superior School Board meeting, running just over five hours, the governing board tackled many items on its agenda including handling a complaint by a teacher, who is currently on leave, about 301 funds.

The Classroom Site Fund Shortfall 301 Plan that was approved at the September meeting was a significant discussion. At the last meeting it was decided by the Superior School Board to delegate the monies to the

current teachers; teachers who have seniority of five years received a little more than a teacher that has only been teaching for a year. This shows appreciation for the loyalty of the teachers that have been employed longer, the board was told. Superintendent Patrick O'Donnell and the School Board felt that was the best decision.

A teacher who is currently on leave through the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and is unable to return to work who felt that she was being discriminated against for not receiv-

ing her 301 Shortfall monies. This teacher attended the meeting and voiced her opinion about the unfairness. The School Board discussed the situation with the teacher and directed O'Donnell to work with her to solve the situation.

The Junior High Student of the Month, Matthew Hernandez, attended the School Board Meeting. Matthew is 13 years old, has perfect attendance, the highest AIMS grades, belongs to the National Junior Honor Society and participates in many community events. He

enjoyed talking with and meeting the Superior School Board. Other students of the month did not attend the meeting.

There were many policies discussed including Board Powers and Responsibilities, Board Member Authority and Responsibilities, Board Member Ethics, Board-Superintendent Relationship, Public Participation at Board Meetings, Policy Communication/Feedback, Board Communications with Staff Members, Board Communications with the Public, Qualifications

and Duties of the Superintendent, Delegated Authority, Staff Conduct and Staff Grievances. The remaining policies were tabled to the next meeting. There was great depth and time spent reviewing these policies. The School Board has many issues to go over and truly want to do what is best for the students, school and the staff it does take time to work through all the issues.

The Declaration of Curriculum Alignment for the 2013-2014 school year was discussed and approved.

enjoy walking daily in His holy presence.

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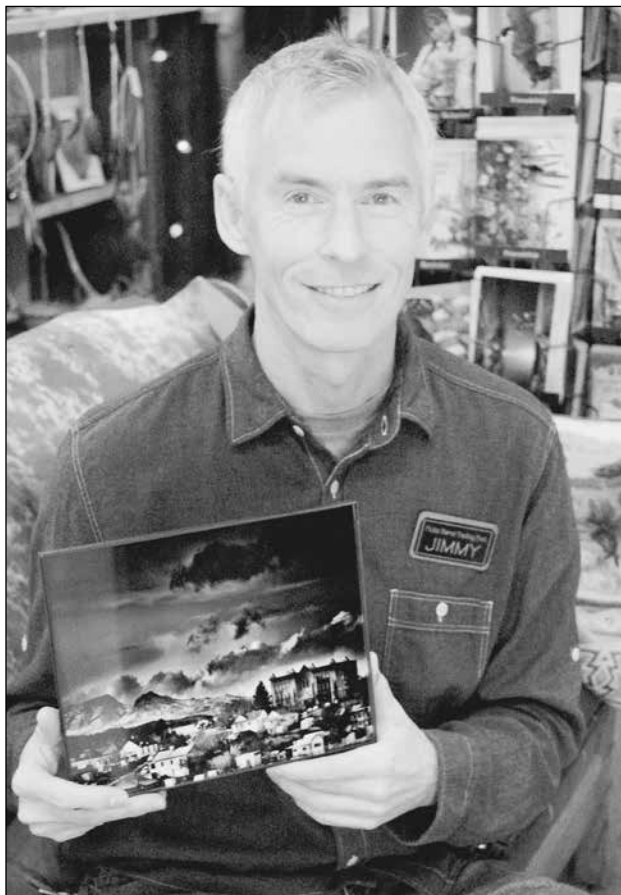

# Manny Ruiz celebrated as Cowboy of the Year

When I was a child, my heroes were cowboys. Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, and Hopalong Cassidy. All of them were soft spoken, self effacing, hard working, and always striving to do the right thing. When someone was in trouble, an animal or a person, they were there to make things better. Then I grew up and I began to think that maybe the cowboy legend was too good to be true until I met Manny Ruiz.

Manny does not describe himself as a cowboy; he describes himself as a rancher. According to Manny, that means he spends a lot of time fixing fence, checking on his cattle, and making sure there is a good water supply. It takes a lot of land to support cattle in an arid state like Arizona so that means it takes a lot of fence, and when the ranch is located near a community the way Manny's is, you'd better be fixing that fence. Cows are not good neighbors if they are allowed to roam. They have a way of eating anything and everything green and leaving many steaming piles of evidence of their presence. Oddly enough this does not make them popular with homeowners and they are certainly not welcome on a golf course. Fortunately for Manny he enjoys what he does, he likes

riding horses, he likes fixing fence and he likes checking up on his cattle. To him, it's been a lot of hard work, but a good life.

Both his father and grandfather were cowboys and their history of how this job was done reflects the history of cowboying in Arizona. Manny started his own cowboy career in the 1930s when he began to spend every weekend on his grandfather's ranch. Later on he and his father became partners. Manny has been ranching now for about 50 years. Currently he has around 100 head of cattle that he runs on 20 sections of land. Although most of the time he operates the ranch by himself, he tells me he would not be able to brand those cattle if he didn't have the help of the Martinez family. The Martinez brothers have been working with Manny so long they can read each others' minds. Tony started working on the ranch when he was in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade and George began when he was in high school. According to Manny they and their brother, Carlos are all first rate cowboys and they have trained their children to be excellent cowboys as well.

Manny is the first one of his family to actually own the land where he runs the cattle. In the early 60s, Manny and his father were running cows in the Queen Valley area. At the

time, they were able to use the land based upon an oral agreement and a handshake which was how most cattle ranching was done in the old days. Then, Arizona Title Company bought up the land where Manny's family ran cows for development of the community of Queen Valley and the cattle were no longer welcome on that land. Manny just happened to be in the right place at the right time when he met a realtor in Apache Junction who had grazing leases to sell and all he had to do was in his own words, "move those cattle right next door." From then on, when ever he had the money, he bought land.

A Cowboy history would not be complete unless the horses are mentioned. A good cow horse is only productive for about 10 to fifteen years, although their life span is usually much longer. That is because cattle work is extremely hard on the horses physically. They need to be at least four or five to begin with and then the constant hard work on the range results in forced retirement at a relatively early age. Manny has had several horses over the years, all of which he enjoyed, but he mentioned two favorites. When he was a young boy his father gave him a horse named Coyote. He liked that horse so much he quit visiting his beloved grandfather in the summer months because he wanted to stay home and ride. As an adult his favorite horse was called Chet. Chet was named after the man that sold him the horse to begin with, a common way for a cowboy to name a horse. When asked why he liked Chet so much, Manny replied, "I liked him and he liked me and he liked cows just as much as I do". He went on to say that they were partners. They understood each other which made it easier and more fun to do the cattle work. At first Manny said he owned enough horses to make sure that the cowboys

who rode for him would have good mounts, but as the years went by the cowboys preferred to own their own horses. This suited and continues to suit Manny just fine. Currently, he just owns two horses which he uses to ride fence.

Manny's ranch is in Queen Valley, but his home is in Superior. His family has lived here since 1909. He still lives in the old homestead. The house sits on about 14 acres of some of the prettiest land in the Superior area. Although the house is original, it is not located on its original foundation. The original homestead was 16 acres and the house was located in the middle of what is now highway 60. When the highway was built, the house was moved to its present location.

Ranching is hard work and long hours but it isn't always self sustaining. Manny has worn many hats along side that of a rancher. He has made his living as teacher and a coach and spent 17 summers as a contract miner. He says his most honorable profession has been that of Coach. He spent 31 years as Coach, at first in San Manual and then here in Superior. To be a coach had been his dream, ever since the 6<sup>th</sup> grade and he says he has felt so privileged to be in the right place to help develop the character of the young men who played sports under his direction.

Ranching, teaching and coaching, three professions that are open ended, time consuming and never done, but Manny has somehow found time to serve his town and his community as well. He was on the committee that originally incorporated Superior, he served 27 years on the Town Council and he was elected Mayor three times. He started the Superior High School Hall of Fame and he spent several years on the Pinal County Advisory Board which sponsors student participation in mock

trials and he is family man, the father of five children. He says he was able to do all of this only because of the help of his wife Aurora. They have been married 61 years despite the fact that he was gone so much and he says it's because of her patience, strength and good will that their marriage has lasted. Anybody else would have left him years ago.

Although Manny is retired now from politics and from coaching, he has not yet retired from ranching. He is beginning to think though that maybe it's time to hire some part time help and he might do that next year. When asked when does a cowboy retire, Manny answered a cowboy retires when they can't get on a horse anymore. Manny is not there yet.

Traditionally, the American cowboy has been revered in this country which of course is why we celebrate the Night of the Cowboy, but it takes more than the ability to ride a horse and to chase cows to be the kind of cowboy that is worth honoring. It takes honesty, hard work, integrity, kindness and a willingness to give back to his community to be that type of cowboy. Lucky for Superior, Manny Ruiz fits the bill.

I had Manny read this over to make sure that I had all my facts straight and he just

asked me to add two things. First of all he wants people to know he is a faithful man. By that he means that he goes to church regularly and that he prays every day. The second thing he wants you all to know is that he is only half the man his father was. The last thing he said, he probably doesn't want included, he told me he was hoping that this party was going to be rained out. Typical cowboy, he doesn't want all this fuss to be about him.

**Footnote:** This tribute to Manny Ruiz was written by me, Merry Darr, so that I could read it to him and to the audience at the Night of the Cowboy Ceremony that the Superior Chamber of Commerce put on the night of October 19, 2013. Just before it was time for us to go on stage, Manny asked me to add one more thing. He is involved with the Superior Food Bank and he wanted me to ask for donations. Typical Manny, nothing about blowing his own horn, instead just thinking of another way to give. This is what I wrote and consequently what I said.

"PS Manny is still helping our community. He is a Board Member of our local Food Bank. The next time they are asking for donations, dig deep in your pockets! Make like Manny and give! give! give!"

# Panthers fall in last seconds to the Apaches

The Superior Panthers celebrated their homecoming last Friday night and appeared to have closed out their season with a dramatic victory.



Unfortunately, the Fort Thomas Apaches scored a touchdown with less than 30 seconds left in the game to defeat the Panthers, 42 – 38.

Matthew Zavala, a starting receiver for the Panthers, was moved to quarterback to fill in for the injured Nicolaus Cruz. Zavala connected with Marcus Hiracheta on a touchdown pass and reception with about a minute left to give the Panthers a short-lived lead. The Apaches were able to capitalize after a 68-yard pass play by scoring the winning touchdown with 16 seconds left.

“We played a sloppy game,” head coach Ryan Palmer said about the Panthers’ performance.



“But our kids didn’t back down and they go after it. One big play was the difference in the end.”

The Panthers jumped to an early lead and had a defensive score as well. But as has happened many times during the season, injuries began to take their toll. Elias Olmos and Austin Navarette left the game and did not return. In total, three Panthers’ players were carted off the field and taken to the local hospital. According to Coach Palmer, each of the injured players will have a complete recovery.

With the injured players sidelined, the remaining players were forced to play out of position where they may not have been familiar with their responsibilities. Their inexperience at those positions led to mistakes, including on the key pass play on the Apaches’ winning drive.

“We were doing a lot of things right,” Palmer said of his teams’ play before the injuries. “But we would continue to shoot ourselves



in the foot.”

The Panthers’ record is not indicative of the talent on the team. They are far better than their record indicates. They are a very young team that was competing against juniors and seniors on other teams. Despite the losing record, Coach Palmer saw many positives during the season and is extremely optimistic going forward with this group of players.

“Our kids fought every game and never gave up all season,” he said. “(We) gained some valuable experience that will be

rewarded with more hard work. The kids have a lot of potential and

understand they have to work at getting bigger and stronger.”

someone locally offering the same service, including equestrian trail rides. The unique beauty of the desert mountains, the sunsets, and the peace and quiet keeps the tourists here. It has been determined that these tourists spend approximately 14 days at a destination and spend \$1,000 to \$1,500 per visit.

At a recent forum sponsored by the Copper

Corridor Economic Development Coalition guests from as far away as Sierra Vista, to the south, and Cottonwood, to the northwest, discussed the opportunities available for those that want to keep our rural communities alive. Buildings are falling apart in Hayden and Winkelman, some could be considered historical. There is so much potential for those willing to take a risk. Bisbee, Tombstone, Jerome and Cottonwood have

turned their communities around by those willing to take a challenge. It did not happen over night but within five years of their re-starts they are what are called "Destination" towns and their businesses are thriving.

We have to do something. It was a shock to all of the communities in the Copper Corridor from Oracle, San Manuel, Mammoth, Hayden, Winkelman and Kearny to learn of the closure of Bank of the West. That closure affects our local businesses in many ways. We all saw what happened to Hayden and Winkelman when they closed the bank in Hayden. It is simple to put on paper that there are branches in Superior and Globe that can be used but without public transit not everyone can get there. Of course there are credit unions in Kearny and San Manuel that will take our business and are making plans to do so.

Our communities are being treated as if we do not exist. We are rural but not remote. Necessary services provided by DES are being taken away. The Pinal County nurses have to work out of Florence. The families who need these services find it hard to travel so many of them just go without the necessary care offered. Chastain use to say, "it is as far from Casa Grande to Kearny as it is from Kearny to Casa Grande," when we had to make trips to the other end of the county for meetings. One Sheriff deputy, during our recent fire, described Kearny to Channel 10 News saying that Kearny had a population of 300 and was on the San Pedro. That is how we are perceived on the other side of the mountain.

Our local businesses are struggling to stay alive and having much needed

service taken away doesn't help our local economy. The Mine Van Pools are hurting our communities except for the snacks purchased before leaving town.

We enjoy our Winter Residents who come here for the weather, to play golf, and quiet from the big city's hustle and bustle. If all of our amenities and services are taken away from us they will part their ways from our communities.

Our schools offer a good education, sporting events, concerts, and other activities in the best way possible but declining enrollment has limited them. They now have to travel long distances in order to play schools in their division (based on enrollment). Our students are just as good even better than division two and three schools.

We cannot just sit back and say, "Oh no, now what do we do." People in San Manuel, Mammoth, Duddyville, Hayden, Winkelman, Kearny need to take action. Many of us are getting up there in years so it is time for the young families to take action. Use your imagination, take a leap of faith and follow that dream you once had but implement it here in our area.

The town of Cottonwood had a downtown area with old buildings boarded up, some falling down. Our keynote speaker at the Tourism Forum was Casey Rooney who saw possibilities, centering in on the attractions around that area. They made Cottonwood the destination point for the Verde Valley with 17 new restaurants now on Main Street. The original local businesses are doing better than ever.

Bullion Plaza in Miami, originally a school for

Mexican and Native American children, is on the historical register. With a bit of imagination and a grant it is now a museum featuring local legends and history. Downtown Globe, especially in front of the historical courthouse, has brought life back to the

area.

Don't let Colorado tour groups make money off our area, someone locally could and should do it.

Quoting Rooney, "Take the assets you have in your community and build upon them. Who is ready to take the challenge?"

The Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year 2012-2013 was presented, discussed and approved. There was a brief discussion of the M&O Override recommending the 15% funds to meet the Arizona State Law this was tabled until the next meeting.

The second reading of the following polices was discussed and approved: Student Violence/Harassment/Intimidation/Bullying; Professional Staff Probationary and Continuing Status; Professional Staff Assignments and Transfers and Evaluation of Professional Staff Members.

There was an in-depth discussion about the Superintendent's job description and the JFK Elementary Principal's job description. O'Donnell is acting as both currently. During the discussion the School Board thought it might be wise to look at hiring a JFK Elementary School Principal in the future, but in the meantime, O'Donnell is still responsible for both positions. The school simply does not have the funding for an Elementary School Principal at

this time.

The recommendation and approval of a Hearing Officer was approved on an as needed basis by the Board. The Hearing Officer will have a certificate and the appropriate training needed for this type of position.

The School Board approved the Inter-governmental Agreement with Paradise Valley Unified School District #69 for the Distance Learning Science Program at JFK Elementary 2013-2014.

The School Board discussed and approved the participation in the ASBA/ASA Fall Conference December 11, 2013 in Phoenix. The Board will allow in-state meetings, trainings and conferences within the state to be attended within a reasonable amount for all Board members wishing to attend.

The Superior School Board decided not to go into Executive Session at this time. They have many items to discuss in Executive Session including but not limited to Personnel Issues, Club Sponsorships, Substitute Teachers and other items. These will be discussed by the board soon.
