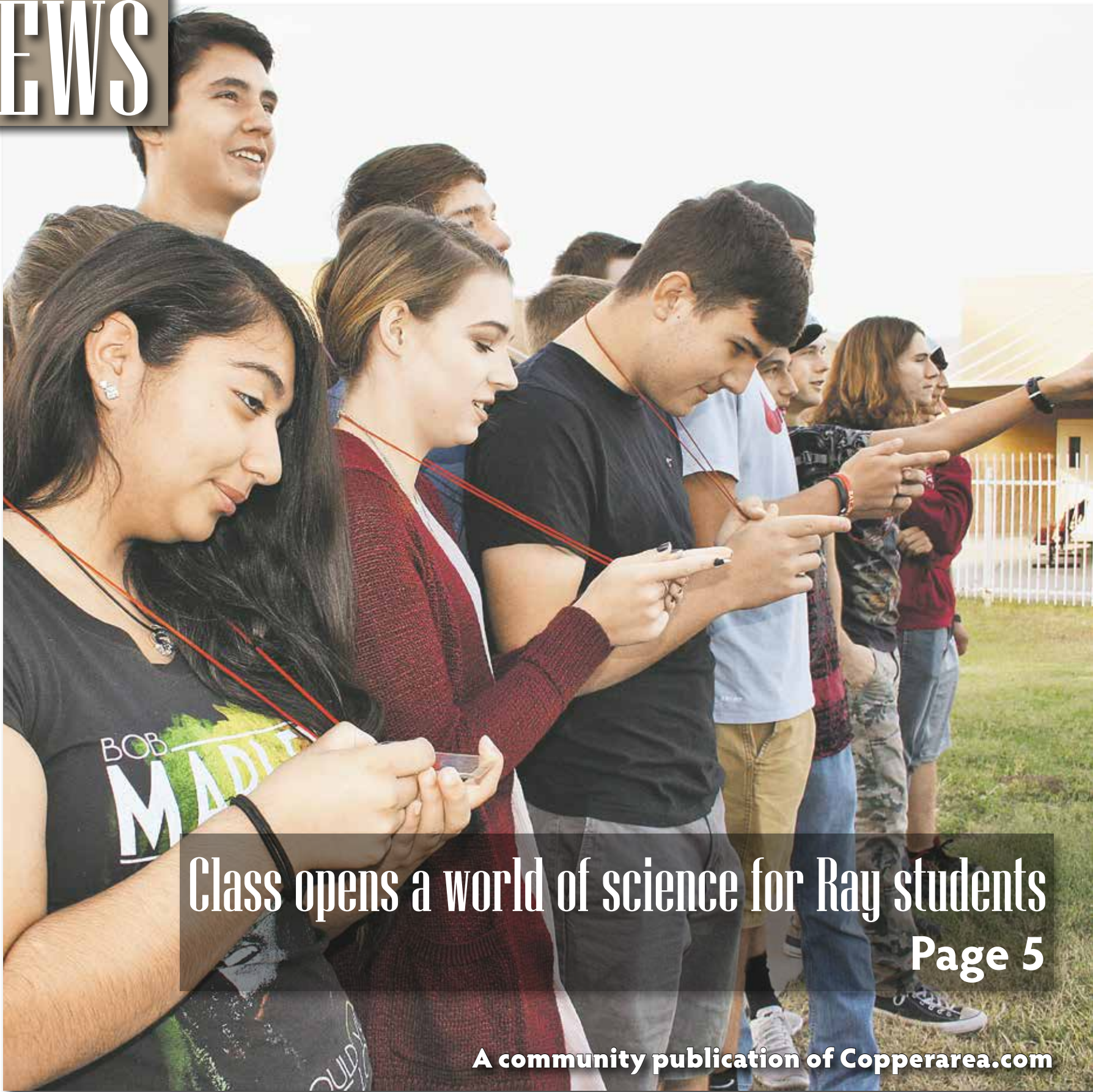

Voters to decide RUSD's future with CVIT

The upcoming November election will decide important leadership decisions for our nation, state and community. Besides voting for leadership candidates and propositions on the elections ballot, voters who live in the Ray Unified School District will also have the opportunity

District's participation in a joint educational district or JTED.

There are currently 14 JTEDs in the state that operate independently and assist members school districts in improving CTE/Vocational programs in their schools. If voters approve the decision to join, Ray students will have an opportunity to join the Cobre Valley Institute of Technology JTED, known as CVIT. CVIT is comprised of five other area schools, Superior, Miami, Globe, San Carlos and Hayden-Winkelman. These schools have been members of CVIT for a number of years and have provided students in their district's with the opportunity to participate in a variety of technical programs such as Construction Technology, Culinary Arts, Welding, Cosmetology, Fire Science, Nursing and Medical Assistant, Information Technology and Graphic Design to name a few. Programs are taught at various CVIT learning sites in the Copper Corridor and are supported by community partnerships and Gila Community College in Globe Districts are also permitted to have Career and

Technical Courses (CTE) on their own Campus during the year and operate them as satellite programs. These programs are approved by the Arizona Department of Education and are open to all high school students. Students who attend vocational classes can become certified in technical courses over a two - three year period. Currently, the Ray School District offers CTE courses in Cabinet Making, Welding and Webpage Design.

Arizona JTED programs, including CVIT, are funded from two sources: state appropriations and secondary property taxes from voters residing in the local school district. The approval of the measure would mean a small tax rate increase of \$5.00 per year for a single family home with a full cash value of one hundred thousand dollars. By joining, the CVIT JTED, the state would also allow RUSD to receive significant additional funding to purchase equipment and supplies for existing programs and to finance new programs.

Through JTED programs, students will learn valuable skills required to compete in today's job market. CTE courses can be the catalyst for immediate employment after high school and can also be a "stepping stone" to other college or university programs.

New option for Ray High School students who love science

Ray High School has a fairly new biology-based elective class.

The Wildlife Sciences class started in the 2015-2016 school year and is now in its second year. Ramon Rubalcaba started the class by himself and wrote the entire curriculum.

“We were looking to give students some additional options for electives,” he said. “I introduced the idea of wildlife science.”

Rubalcaba said it was a concept that he came up with on his own, and had the entire curriculum and class mission all written out before the class was introduced. But, there are some schools around the state that could be teaching the same general class/ideas that he is teaching the students, according to Rubalcaba.

“Other schools are probably teaching this (subject); not under the same concept or the same name,” he explained.

The class has a main emphasis on Biology/Zoology animal science.

“I base my entire curriculum on conservation and wildlife which was started by President Roosevelt,” he said.

He said the class started with 14 students, but this year gained 15 students. Seven students from the previous year were allowed to return however, Rubalcaba said.

“I did allow seven students to come back, in advance status,” he said. “They all have special projects they are working on. I had 15 new students come on for a total of 22.”

According to Rubalcaba, the class’s curriculum isn’t harder or easier than the other elective based classes and it is open to any students who want to join.

“It’s available to all (high school) students who have an interest in wildlife science,” he said.

“It (the curriculum) is very ‘pro student,’” Rubalcaba added.

Students who come and join the class usually have an appreciation for wildlife such as: fishing, hiking and getting an outdoor sense for wildlife such as finding eagles, wolves, etc.

The class has had many projects that they worked in during class, Rubalcaba said. They have made their own flies for fishing, which a couple students took with them fishing and even caught some fish, he said.

For a special day trip, on Oct. 5, 2015, the class took a trip to Woods Canyon Lake to learn more about the wildlife there.

Other future projects the class is trying to do, Rubalcaba said, include: putting up eagle roosts, a student is trying introduce the Arizona pup fish back into Kearny Lake and he said he wants to do a bat workshop with the Arizona Game and Fish.

Rubalcaba said this is a class where the skills they learn can be used outside of

class and even when they’re done with school.

“For the rest of their lives, they are going to be involved with the wilderness and outdoor things,” he said.

Rubalcaba said the class has turned out as successful as expected.

Rubalcaba said that students who take the class have learned a lot especially those that went to woods canyon.

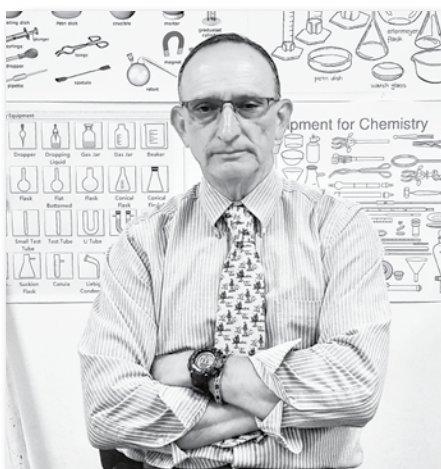
“I had a student who told me ‘I have never done anything like this in my entire life. Thanks for showing me a whole other world,’” he said.



Students designed and built ‘sight tubes’ used to help onlookers look at a designated object of observation without any guess work...these tubes are similar to the ones found in places like the Grand Canyon to locate points of interest. For example, one wildlife observer locates a bird of prey, and instead of indicating about where it is, the onlooker can look in the attached sight tube and locate the object of observation.

“I was in the Arizona National Guard for 15 years,” he said, “and then the Army Reserve for 10 years.”

Rubalcaba said someone read that he was an educator and so he went on to apply to trainer positions.

Hayden advances in 1A Playoffs; No. 1 Bagdad is next

Senior running back Brandon Cruz ran for a touchdown and caught another to help No. 9 Hayden pull off the mild 36 – 14 upset at No. 8 Mayer last Saturday night in the first-round of the 1A State Playoffs.

With the win, the Lobos advance to the quarterfinals, where they will meet top-seeded Bagdad on Saturday night.

“Our team played well,” Hayden head coach John Estrada said after the victory against Mayer. “We hit, executed and played tough.”

“Our line controlled the line of scrimmage and our backs ran hard,” he added. “The line gave (quarterback Mario) Mariscal time to throw the ball.”

Mariscal, a junior, threw for 160 yards three touchdown passes in the win, connecting with Ryan Donovan and Joel Rodriguez, in addition to the one to Cruz.

Cruz (127 yards) and Donovan (86) combined to rush for 213 yards against the Wildcats. Omar Lopez scored on defense for the Lobos, recording a pick-six after returning an interception 40 yards for a touchdown.

The Lobos have won seven of their last eight games with the only loss against No. 2-ranked

Superior. No. 1 Bagdad presents similar challenges as the Panthers, but that experience should bode well for the Lobos.

“It’ll be a challenge,” Estrada said of this week’s quarterfinal game. “We must have no mistakes,

and we have to hit, execute and have fun.”

“We need to play our best game of the season and leave it all on the field.”

Saturday’s kickoff is scheduled for 6 p.m. at Bagdad.

"I didn't need to be taught how to teach for the Army, I just needed to teach the Army," he said.

He said he didn't teach full-time, he would just ask for missions and they would send him where they needed him. He said he taught all over the U.S. including places like Fort Gordon.

During his first 30 years as a teacher at Ray, he wasn't even a science teacher.

"I was an industrial arts teacher," he said. "I taught woodshop."

He decided to pursue this path after going around the U.S. with the Army, because in 1974, his family heard that Ray was looking for an industrial arts/woodshop teacher. He decided to go back and get an industrial arts degree which he previously minored in. He also explained that his father was also a small homes contractor, so that helped him even more.

He also said that while he was in college, way before industrial arts, he was in pre-med.

Around early 2000, one of Ray's biology teachers left during a semester, which gave him the chance to apply for the position which was a college prep class. Before applying to the biology position, he was also working in computer sciences. He said when he was hired as the biology teacher, "the science thing kind of took off."

After that semester of teaching biology and a couple years after, Rubalcaba was hired as a science teacher at the junior high school which he taught for 11 years.

Then, just two years ago, he was offered the position at the high school where he currently works.

During his 42 years in Ray, he said he has had other job offers. However, because of the location and the fact that the school system has been good to him, he stays at the school.

Rubalcaba said one of the high points of his 42 years have been when students come back after many years to thank him.

"I have had students who I had 30 years ago, come back and go out of their way to thank me for everything that I was able to impart on them," he said.

As for any low points at Ray High School, Rubalcaba said he doesn't really know if he had any low points.

"This school system has been really good to me and I've been able to give back to the school," he said.

Rubalcaba said that during his time at Ray, he said that the attitude towards education has changed. He said that in the past, teachers were looked at as a positive force, and that today, "that's not so much anymore."

"Whenever I have to discipline a kid, it's not the kid's fault, it's my fault now," he said.

He said it's not a lack of respect, but a change in the idea of

respect.

"I've got government agencies telling me how to do my job, and they've never even walked into my classroom," he said.

Rubalcaba also said that, during his past teaching, it was easier to before technology entered the schools. He said his teaching methods more resemble the teaching methods of the 70s.

"I make the kids get dirty. I make the kids use their think tank," he said. "They can't use Google or Yahoo. I teach science like I taught shop; you've got to engineer through the problem. They've got to learn the process."

He says he sees technology as more of a toy during class time. If a student is bored, some teachers just say play on your device, he said.

Rubalcaba said that even from the first day of teaching, he had a plan. He said if he could tell his past self anything, he wouldn't. He said he was prepared for the job thanks to his time in the Army and that that helped the interactions with his students.

"I've been successful since day one," he said. "Ever since day one in woodshop, with the first kid, I already had a plan. When

the kid walked past me, I had my hand out and he walked past it, I said 'No, you come back here. I am the teacher. Shake my hand. We're going to do this every day.'"

"I would do it all the same," he added.

He said on the first day of class, he tells all his students, "this will be your favorite class of the day, bar none."

Rubalcaba contributes his want of becoming a teacher to his freshmen year science teacher and especially his sophomore biology teacher.

"It wasn't until I had a dynamic biology teacher my sophomore year that just blew the doors off my education," he said. "And that's when I got turned on to biology."

He was retained in first grade due to him knowing hardly any English as a Mexican-American kid, but he attributes that retention to meeting the teacher that helped him become a teacher.

Rubalcaba would like to thank Ray school and the community.

"In my 42nd year, I would just like to thank the community and the school district for accepting me and my family, to be part of the community and part of the school," he said.
