Encouraging pretend play in young children builds their brains

San Manuel (October 7, 2016) – This time of year, stores are filled with seasonal costumes and children excitedly transforming into their

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favorite superhero or cartoon character.

For young children, the type of play associated with dressing up and pretending to be someone else is an integral part of learning.

"Did you ever stop to watch toddlers or preschoolers imagining themselves as princesses and pirates?" said Ginger Sandweg, First Things First Senior Director for Early Learning. "When children play, they draw on all their past experiences – things they have done, seen others do, or heard stories about – and use those to develop their own situations, stories and scenarios. And they are learning in the process."

According to the LEGO Foundation, whose mission is to make children's lives better and communities stronger by making sure the fundamental value of play is understood, embraced and acted upon, there are different types of play. All which support an aspect of physical, intellectual and social-emotional growth.

Socio-dramatic play is easy to spot. Watch a child dress up and pretend he is someone or something else, for example, pretending to be a firefighter or a dog. Researchers say this is the basis of children's developing social understanding.

In fact, research has shown that play impacts everything from physical abilities and vocabulary to problem solving, creativity, teamwork and empathy.

In Pinal County, Easter Seals Blake Foundation offers Parents as Teachers, a voluntary home visitation program, where families of young children receive in-home parent coaching from a parent educator. First Things First funds the program.

"All of the parent-child activities in the curriculum are play-based, and there are many activities that emphasize pretend play," said PAT program manager Kelly Purcell. For example, reading a book, then asking your child to act out the book helps the child understand the concept of a main character, that stories follow an order and retelling a story helps sequence events in the order they occur.

First Things First encourages families to stay active through play, since it is one of the most important ways that young kids learn. So, how do parents recognize play and encourage it in our children? Here are a few guidelines:

• Play is FUN. Play doesn't start out with a

specific goal – like learning letters or numbers.

- Play is spontaneous and voluntary.
- In play, everyone is actively involved.
- And, finally, play includes an element of make believe.
 To encourage play, caregiv-

Just about 51 weeks ago, the Superior football team's dreams of winning a State Championship ended at Maricopa High School following a 36 – 30 loss to Valley Union in the semifinals. On Saturday night, the undefeated and No. 2-ranked Panthers will host No. 7 Joseph City in the quarterfinals of the 1A State Playoffs, not hoping or looking but expecting to win two more games than they did a year ago.

"It is the second round of the playoffs and there are no easy games," Panthers' head coach Ryan Palmer wrote in an email to the Superior Sun. "Every team left in the tournament is a solid team that has earned their place in the top eight."

"It is win or done, and we are nowhere close to being finished."

Joseph City finished the regular season with a record of 6-2 and defeated No. 10 Mogollon in a high-scoring first-round game last week, 63-46. The Wildcats enter Saturday's playoff game averaging more than 350 yards of total offense and nearly 40 points per game.

"They play disciplined and with high effort," Palmer said about his team's opponent this week. "They execute well in their power run game and have some good play action passes that provides balance to their offense."

Palmer acknowledged the Panthers' defense is in for

Jr. Panther football team aims to be back-to-back champs

Last year, the Superior Jr. High football team capped off an undefeated season by winning the Central Junior High League Championship. The Jr. Panthers finished last season a perfect 9 – o to claim the championship. On Tuesday, still undefeated Superior, which had won its last 16 games in-a-row dating back to last season, took on Ray in the 8-man CJHL Championship.

"I can't say enough about the young men we have on the team this year," Superior head coach Martin Navarrette told the Superior Sun. "They really stepped up this year and filled the shoes of some talented outgoing eighthgraders, not to mention we have five sixth-graders on the team this year."

Ray, which is 5-3 on the season, entered Tuesday's championship game coming off a playoff win against Hayden. Superior defeated Ray twice during the regular season, which figures to make a third victory the toughest

a challenge and will need to display sound tackling fundamentals.

"We have to play tough and be physical from start to finish," the reigning Coach of the Year said. "We have to play assignment football on defense, and offensively, we need to get the ball to our playmakers and try to take advantage of some potential mismatches."

Playmakers – too many for most teams to deal with – are what set the Panthers apart from just about every other 1A team across the state.

It starts with quarterback and Player of the Year candidate Nicolaus Cruz, one of a number of four-year senior starters on the team. Running back Edgar Galindo, receivers Austin Navarrette, Marcos Bueno, and Jalon Murray make the Panthers difficult to defend for opposing teams.

Palmer said he wants to see his team play with maximum effort, adding that focus and discipline will be emphasized during practice this week.

"Games are often won or lost in practice throughout

the week," he said. "If we come out complacent and not ready to play, this very well could be our last game." Indeed, it could be.

But, the Panthers "are nowhere close to being finished."

Saturday's kickoff is scheduled for 6 p.m. at Superior High School.

The Lady Bucks were in Carson this past Monday to play Eagle Valley Golf Course in a tournament hosted by Truckee High School.

Lowry shot it's best score of the year at

361 and finished second to Elko, who fired a 351. Spring Creek was a distant third at 404 and Fernley (435) and Truckee (461) rounded out the top five.

Elko's Chalee Mullin was the low medalist with a round of 84 and Lowry's Brooklyn Backus shot her best score of the year at 85 to finish second overall. Elko's Annika Criss (86) was third.

Senior's Hannah Havens and Kaity Sample shot career best rounds at 88 and 95 and sophomore Tatyana Carlson shot a 93. Elise Rose (101) and Savanna Cox (104) rounded out the scores for Lowry.

The Northern 3A closed out the regular season on Tuesday in Fernley. Elko won the tournament at 359 and Lowry was second at 370. Spring Creek (432) was third

Carlson finished the season out on a high note as the low medalist with a round of 82. Criss (84) and Mullin (86) both from Elko were second and third, respectively.

Backus shot a 94 for the Lady Bucks, while Rose shot a season best 95 and Sample finished with a 99. Cox carded a 101 and Havens 102 for the Lady Bucks.

All six Lowry players were named to either the first or second all-league teams.

Criss was named the Player of the Year and was joined by teammates Ciara Peters, Shelby Mullin and Chalee Mullin on the first team. Carlson, Backus and Sample were named to the all-league, first team as well.

Havens, Cox and Rose were named to the second team as were Spring Creek's Aintzane Alt and Elise Thiessen and Elko's Sarah Sarbacker.
