Navarrette scores four TDs in Panthers' HC romp

Superior junior Adam Navarrette scored four touchdowns on Homecoming to lead the defending state champions to a 50 – 8 victory last Friday night against winless Lincoln Prep.

"We took care of business on what could have been a distracting week," Superior head coach Ryan Palmer said afterwards. "I was proud of our focus."

Navarrette had a game-high 123 receiving yards on just four receptions with a pair of touchdowns. He also rushed for 60 yards – averaging 15 yards per carry – and a touchdown. His fourth score came when he returned one of three interceptions for a pick-six.

Since his arrival at Superior as a freshman, Navarrette has been a playmaker. Throughout his two year-plus varsity career, he has scored touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams.

"Adam is a great student and athlete," Palmer said. "He is a model citizen and a natural leader. He is not only athletic, but he also has a high football IQ.

"He has been an x-factor for us over the last two years," he continued. "He is a focal point of our offense. We try to get the ball in his hands as much as possible. Defensively, he is also one of our best players."

The Panthers scored 50 points or more for the third-

straight game and the fourth time in five games this season. Sophomore quarterback Matthew Cruz attempted 11 passes, completing eight, including three for touchdowns. Gabe Otero rushed for a game-high 94 yards and a couple of touchdowns on six carries. Senior Sammy Lopez contributed to the scoring barrage with a touchdown reception.

Defensively, Superior recorded four sacks and four interceptions. Juniors Andrew Martinez and Matthew Diaz-Gonzales shared the team-lead with eight tackles each. The former also had an interception, the latter a sack. Junior Matthew Perez had one-and-a-half sacks in the win.

The 1A East Region title is likely on the line this week, as Superior visits 2018 1A State Runner-up and undefeated Hayden in a rematch of last year's State Championship game.

"Coach Estrada and his staff have done a great job restoring (Hayden's) program," Palmer said. "We are going to prepare with a championship focus and expecting a tough game. "Small-town football doesn't get much better than two rival

Fire Prevention Week 2019 is Oct. 6-12

id you know that October is known as Fire Prevention Month? Do you know that Fire Prevention Week has been observed since 1922 and is sponsored by the NFPA – National Fire Protection Association. And did you know that in 1925 President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance making it the longest-running public health observance in the country? But where and when did the event happen that started this observance?

Many of us have heard about the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The fire started on Oct. 8, 1871 and burned until Oct. 10, 1871 in a neighborhood in the southwest section of the city after a long period of hot, dry, windy conditions and the predominantly wooden building construction of the time helped lead to the conflagration. The fire leapt the south branch of the Chicago River and destroyed much of central Chicago. It then leapt the main branch of the river consuming the near north side.

It has been told through the years that Mrs. O'Leary's cow started the fire by kicking over a lit oil lamp in the barn causing dry hay to ignite. While there is no dispute that the fire started on the O'Leary property, it has never been proven that the cow was the cause.

During the three days of the fire, approximately 300 people were killed, roughly 3.3 square miles of the city was destroyed approximately 100,000 people were left homeless and it is estimated that 17,400 structures were destroyed. This tragedy started the movement to the fire codes we use today.

The theme of Fire Prevention Week 2019 is "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape Plan." So, how can you be the "hero" in your family? It's easy just start with sitting down with all family members and doing these simple things together:

- ${\tt 1.}$ Plan an escape route. You need to know 2-ways out of every room.
- 2. Draw a floor plan of your home marking both escape routes as well as where the smoke alarms are in each room.

 3. Practice your fire drill escape plan at least twice a year. While it is sometimes OK to announce "this is a drill" you should never always declare it as being a drill. By doing that, if a real fire were to happen and your smoke alarm went off during a real fire, your family might not take the warning seriously and delay their escape. When a real fire is occurring you only have one to two minutes in which to escape! It's NOT like in the movies or on TV where people take a long time to get out.
- 4. Make sure your "Family Meeting Place", the place where your loved ones will gather after they escape, is a stationary object, not something that moves like a neighbor's car or a bike in the front yard. A tree or fence post make good Family Meeting places. Reinforce the rule: "Once you are out STAY OUT!" DO NOT go back in the burning building for anything!!
- 5. Test Smoke alarms monthly both day and night. Replace batteries in alarms that use a standard 9-volt battery at least twice a year. It is NOT recommended/required to replace the battery in an alarm that has a 10-year lithium battery.

When it comes to maintaining your smoke alarm, get your kids involved!! Helping you help maintain your alarms is a great way to get them used to the idea of fire safety and being prepared. Want a fun family activity that your kids will enjoy as you maintain your smoke alarms? As a family sit down and choose a single date for all your smoke alarms as their "birthday". Mark that date on your calendar each year. Plan a birthday party for your



alarms. Take the kids shopping for the smoke alarm(s) birthday present – a new battery for each alarm. On the alarm(s) birthday sing "Happy Birthday" to the alarms, have an adult help the kids give the alarm(s) their new battery birthday present. Then the whole family can enjoy having a birthday party for the alarm(s). And speaking of maintaining your alarms, when you change the batteries, take the brush attachment of your vacuum and dust out the alarm while you have it open. Dust and cobwebs can accumulate in the alarm possibly making it sound off a false alarm.

You are home and your smoke alarm sounds off with its warning "Beep! Beep!" What do you do? 1. Be sure to sleep with your bedroom door CLOSED! When a fire happens it's the smoke that will get you long

before the flames will. A closed bedroom door helps protect you from the toxic smoke produced by a fire. This is a hard concept for parents with small children. If you are worried about not hearing your kids at night, invest in a baby monitor and keep their bedroom door CLOSED! 2. If you hear the smoke alarm, get down low and crawl low under smoke! The freshest, cleanest air is closer to the

floor than the ceiling. 3. First test the bedroom door to see if it hot by using the back of your hand, NOT your palm, before attempting to open the door to escape. If the door is hot, go to your

second way of escape, usually the window. DO NOT break the glass in the window (like they do in the movies or on TV) as this can cause glass shards that can cut you badly as you try to escape. Sit to the side of the window and signal

first responders from that position. Let them come to you! 4. Teach kids NOT to hide (under the bed or in a closet). Yes, they will be scared but let them know that is OK. The firemen need to find them and they may not be able to if a child hides.

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy involves breathing pure oxygen in a pressurized room or tube. Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is a well-established treatment for decompression sickness, a hazard of scuba diving. Other conditions treated with hyperbaric oxygen therapy include serious infections, bubbles of air in your blood vessels, and wounds that won't heal.



In a hyperbaric oxygen therapy chamber, the air pressure is increased to three times higher than normal air pressure. Under these conditions, your lungs can gather more oxygen than would be possible breathing pure oxygen at normal air pressure.

Your blood carries this oxygen throughout your body. This helps fight bacteria and stimulate the

release of substances called growth factors and stem cells, which promote healing.

Conditions for Treatment

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is used to treat several medical conditions. And medical institutions use it in different ways. Your doctor may suggest hyperbaric oxygen therapy if you have one of the following conditions:

- Anemia, severe
- Brain abscess
- Bubbles of air in your blood vessels (arterial gas embolism)
- Burn
- Decompression sickness
- Carbon monoxide poisoning
- Crushing injury
- Deafness, sudden
- Gangrene
- Infection of skin or bone that causes tissue death
- Non-healing wounds, such as a diabetic foot ulcer
- Radiation injury
- Vascular wounds
- Skin graft or skin flap at risk of tissue death
- Wounds that won't heal

During Hyperbaric Therapy

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy typically is performed as an outpatient procedure and doesn't require hospitalization. If you're already hospitalized and require hyperbaric oxygen therapy, you'll remain in the hospital for therapy. During hyperbaric oxygen therapy, the air pressure in the room is about two to three times normal air pressure. The increased air pressure will create a temporary feeling of fullness in your ears — similar to what you might feel in an airplane or at a high elevation. You can relieve

that feeling by yawning or swallowing. For most conditions, therapy lasts approximately two hours. Members of our health care team will monitor you and the therapy unit throughout your treatment.

You may feel somewhat tired or hungry following your treatment. This doesn't limit normal activities.
