

## Respecting our San Carlos Apache Tribal **Elders: Leading from Truth**

Since it has been stated and made clear by myself and other tribal members of the San Carlos Apache Tribe that Oak Flat has no religious or cultural significance to our tribe, nor does it threaten our livelihood, it's now the time to continue on with what will ultimately happen with Resolution Copper. In the past couple of months, rather than listening to hearsay, I decided to seek out the answers to the questions many of us had. In taking initiative, I found that the answers were right at my fingertips - it was as simple as attending public

meetings, taking advantage of the tours being offered and communicating my concerns. Through this, it was made clear that there are strict laws and detailed regulations that the NEPA process requires and that special mining permits must be obtained. It was also made clear that as members of our community, we have a voice and an opportunity to engage with the company and the federal government who oversees the process of NEPA. We should also be aware that above all, the safety and well-being of all involved (workers and communities) is the most important. It is only after these things are considered that this mining project could begin.

I have to share with my community and neighbor friends that in my home it was brought up for discussion how block cave mining sounded scary and what the result of that environment might look like. I had to reassure my son and daughters that yes, with the most intelligent and sophisticated mining techniques that will be implemented it will be up to mother earth how the outcome will be. That's why it is very important that we all come together

I remind my family and also encourage all that fear tactics that are used to prevent any project is a form of manipulating for one's own gain. As tribal members with a strong cultural traditional core of prayer, we must stay informed and involved with Resolution Copper. Coming to the table of discussion and concerns, all based on facts promotes a unity of strength. So that all involved in the mining work force and families at home are safe.

When I mention safe at home, which in itself is a handful as our communities are faced with many sensitive issues. I encourage all tribal members not to fear our Tribal Government Leaders, as they must remember that the oath they took was to serve their people, serve with facts, fairness and honesty. I continue to applaud the tribal council members who have weighed out the facts, and lead with fairness and honesty. Though a special interest group with several of our leaders and tribal members decided to travel to Washington D.C. to speak out against the project, I commend the leaders and tribal members who made the decision to stay home and continue to address the more important issues facing our community today.

I extend my apologies to the mother/daughter from Washington State - who walked to support what they believed was the truth. I only wish that they were introduced to our elders who have provided truth to us. Our healings continue and our concerns and issues are still in need of being addressed. There is so much we have to deal with as a tribal community that we need to come together to combat the social ills and come together to make decisions that benefit the greater good of our community. I humble my little mind so that I along with many who gracefully accept change do not allow fear to cripple us as a community but rather allow truth to lead and guide us.

## CFFT, CAC Board recall and closure of Aravaipa campus

In the past few weeks, have you seen or heard of petitioners hanging around the copper corridor with a sign reading, "45% PROPERTY TAX INCREASE FOR ALL OF PINAL COUNTY BY CENTRAL ARIZONA COLLEGE," I am writing this editorial to inform you, from a student's perspective, what this means to me and why it happened.

On May 19, 2015, the Pinal County Community College District Governing Board voted to accept the CAC budget for fiscal year 2015-2016.

This vote followed a truth in taxation hearing where board members voted to increase the current tax rate from \$1.91 to \$2.76 per \$100 of net assessed valuation. In response to concerns expressed by local citizens, the CAC Governing Board voted on June 9 to change the tax rate to \$2.30 per \$100 of net assessed valuation.

A response to this tax rate included a committee called Citizens for Fair Taxation and chairman Garland Shreves to take action to recall and re-elect CAC's governing board to make cost saving measures. With great sadness, I am writing because the committee received enough petitions to recall two of the four targeted board members. Petition signatures are currently undergoing verification.

I feel that most of the signatures from our side of the county were acquired through misinforming the public. From Mammoth's La Casita to Kearny's Norm's Grocery, petitioners purposely advertised their sign in a way that was interpreted for all of Pinal County property taxes to increase by 45%, and that if you sign their petition, it won't happen. Note CAC's share of the property tax is only 14%, and CAC's board voted their rate to 20%. Yet, petitioners advertised otherwise.

The initial rate increase was made from a 2-year period of careful consideration to Pinal County residents and CAC's future. Before this, many cost containment measures were instituted. Please understand that CAC's state funding was nearly lost this fiscal year. Also, since the year of 2006, state funding for CAC has decreased 80% and tuition has increased 64%.

What the people advertising for the recall in eastern Pinal county DID NOT tell you is that one of the so-called cost saving measures to keep from increasing taxes is to close the Aravaipa Campus.

To the recall supporters, the Aravaipa campus is seen as unnecessary and that its services could be given completely online.

As a student of the Aravaipa campus, I feel targeted. I am furious.

Aravaipa's location is rural, serves the copper corridor, and aids students like me who cannot afford to attend the Signal Peak campus, or initially transfer to university.

Know this, the Aravaipa campus has yielded the best foundation of my academic career, an ultimate collegiate experience. This is true for many others and myself

as students of the Copper Corridor. Advancement of my extremely rural area DEPENDS on Aravaipa as our ONLY access to higher education.

This facility offers vital services such as a learning center and library that teaches research methods, counseling services that assist students far beyond classrooms, financial aid, and many outreach programs. All of these services could never be substituted by online methods.

Closing the Aravaipa campus will terminate access to higher education, leaving my community of Pinal County behind to compete economically.

Why would anyone sign a petition to take away success from future Aravaipa attendees and myself? It's vindictive. What saddens me is that signers of the petition did not know this. For the supporters of the recall, the message I receive is that highered seeking students in eastern Pinal County are not worth the investment.

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# Panthers extend winning streak

The Superior football team extended its winning streak to six games after defeating Chandler Prep last Friday at home, 60-6. The game marked the fifth time this season that the sixth-ranked Panthers scored at least 54 points while holding their opponents to only one touchdown.

The Panthers scored early and often, scoring 30 unanswered points before Chandler Prep put up its first and only points of the game. The Panthers led at halftime, 30 - 6.

Superior's domination continued in the second half as it outscored Chandler Prep 30-0 to notch its sixth-straight lopsided win this season.

Quarterback Nicolaus Cruz threw for three touchdowns and backup Steven Ybarra, a freshman, threw for another. The duo combined to go 19-of-24 for 274 yards and four touchdown passes.

Junior running back Edgar Galindo rushed for 72 yards on only seven carries and scored two touchdowns.

Elias Olmos (2), Marcos Bueno, and Austin Navarrette each had at least one touchdown reception in the victory. Olmos finished with seven receptions for 137 yards, both game highs.

Galindo led the Panthers' defensive attack with 11 tackles, a sack, a blocked punt, and an interception. Jalon Murray had a season-high three sacks against the Titans. And senior Michael Salazar picked off two passes. The

## Jr. Panthers finish regular season undefeated

The Superior Jr. High football team finished its regular season without a loss, going a perfect 6 - 0 to lock up the No. 1-seed in the upcoming playoffs that begin on Oct. 13.

The Jr. Panthers' head coach believes the experience and familiarity between he and players has helped the team achieve the level of success it has this year.

The Jr. Panthers will host the No. 4-seed on Oct. 13 and can advance to the championship game on Oct. 20 with a win.

What will it take for the Jr. Panthers to bring home the championship?

"As long as we can outlast our opponent, our players remain aggressive, and they play smart, I think we'll be fine," Navarrette responded.



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## Reclamation continues at Resolution Copper

Well over 100 years ago, miners and entrepreneurs settled in Superior and the surrounding area. It was a booming time, immigrants came from all over the world to conquer the wild west and make their riches, and set their legacy working in the mining camps. This piece of the earth was bearing riches for all who ventured to dig for them, those minerals transformed the world, Copper aided in the advancement of electricity and many other common uses we enjoy today.

In those early days of mining, there were no governmental permits to apply for. First come, first serve and if you claimed it, the riches could be yours. Engineering was checked but the level of knowledge was minimal in those early days as Arizona was being settled. Tailings spots were not planned; they were put where it was convenient. The same was true with the rest of the mining operations: water and air quality were not considered when building the mine - the most important thing was mining the ore and getting it into the marketplace. The town grew up around the mine and most accepted the surroundings, including the mountains of tailings and slag as home. Some will even recall playing in the tall steep slopes of the tailings. There were very few precautions in place for the aging mine; they were not required until most recently.

Fortunately, the terrain around Superior was conducive and forgiving to allow tailing piles in the area. The ground where the historic tailing sites are placed are in areas that naturally keep the toxic materials from seeping into the earth based on the geography of the area. The arid climate keeps the tailings from forming acid rock drainage. Acid rock drainage occurs when the water and air meet the tailings. There was a tailings spill in the 1990s but that was a rare occurrence and was caused due to an above normal rainy winter.

In the early 2000s, Resolution Copper began working on a plan to reopen the historic Magma mine. The new mine would be required to clean up old mining waste and build the new mine to ensure that all environmental regulations were met and this is where the story of reclaiming the old tailings begins.

Casey McKeon, Environmental Manager with Resolution Copper explained how the new mine would be required to start with a clean canvas in its development. In order to do that the company would need to clean up the old mining operations to make sure that the existing tailings would not contaminate the new operations since they were working in the same footprint. The company could have waited to clean up the old tailings site but in order to meet Rio Tinto's standards for environmental quality, the company enlisted the help of the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) and the Voluntary Remediation Program (VRP). This program helped them to establish a timeline to clean up the old tailings site and begin the processes There are at least 15 permits that must be received by the ADEQ just to ensure that aquifer is protected. Those permits are called the Aquifer Protection Permits (APP).

"We could have easily completed the clean up much sooner," McKeon explained. "We could have hired a huge firm to clean up the tailings and manage all the engineering. Instead we opted to hire local companies to complete the cleanup." she said. The reasoning behind hiring local companies was to start infusing some cash into local businesses for services and also hire a local work force who would see and understand firsthand the reclamation project along with the overall mine project.

The new engineering and clean up of the existing tailings site will ensure that all storm water remains on site and does not get into local aquifers of the town. The water that does build up onsite is then processed through the wastewater treatment plant onsite and is processed until it is clean enough to send to the farmers in the New Magma Irrigation district near the Florence - San Tan Valley area. The water sent to the irrigation district is monitored several times to ensure that the nothing in the water will damage the fields or the crops that the water is used on.

Currently Resolution Copper is working on the Lower Smelter Pond (LSP) reclamation. This is the area closer to Main St. and passersby can see the work being done. The contracts for that work have been awarded to Superior Environmental, Oddonetto Construction and Albo Guzman Trucking. The workers are all from Superior and

## Resolution Copper hosts open house, apologizes for layoffs

Resolution Copper hosted an open house at the Superior Junior-Senior High School last week. Project Director, Andrew Taplin gave a brief update on the project then opened the forum up to the public for questions.

Taplin reported that the project had to lay off 36 workers. For a decade, the company marketed that there would be 3,700 jobs following the completion of the land exchange. Taplin apologized for the miscommunication and he further explained that the company needs to conduct further studies on the drilling and engineering before they can complete sinking the number nine shaft to meet the depth of the number ten shaft. The number ten shaft was completed in December and many of those

workers have been laid off due to the work not progressing on completing the number nine shaft. A few have been hired by local firms that will be conducting drilling on the project.

Taplin explained that the Tonto National Forest has selected their third party consultants to conduct the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) permitting. The NEPA process will allow the public to comment on the project. It is expected that this public hearing process will begin in early 2016. The company expects the permitting to take up to five years to complete.

Safety continues to a main topic for the company. Taplin reported that the company works relentlessly to ensure a safe working environment. Resolution Copper has went 1,000 days injury free at their drilling projects.

Resolution Copper has received confirmation that Rio

Tinto will fund their 2016 budget in the amount of \$100 million to maintain current assets, understand the ore body better and continue the permitting process; \$50 million will be spent on reclamation, explained Taplin. They will also use the funding to refine the studies of number nine shaft with hopes that shaft sinking will resume in 2017.

The four main goals for the company in 2016 are safety, permitting, engaging the support from local communities and maintaining a solid business case to move the project forward





the surrounding areas.

The process of reclaiming this area has involved digging much deeper than most have expected. The contaminated dirt is moved to older tailing piles on the far northwest side of the property. The land reclaimed will be filled with clean dirt and native vegetation will be planted on the reclaimed area. The open tailing piles where the contaminated dirt will be taken will eventually be closed once all the old contaminated sites on the property are

reclaimed then those tailing ponds will be capped and the area will be reclaimed and that area will be revegetated with native plants.

The company expects to complete the reclamation process by 2020. For those wishing to see the reclamation process up close, Resolution Copper is hosting public tours of the area on Saturday, Oct. 10, 2015. You can RSVP for the tour at 520-689-3409 or email info@ resolutioncopper.com.
