Superior Schools Receive Grades from the State

n Friday, Nov. 1, the State Board of Education (SBE) released A-F Letter Grades for all schools in Arizona. Superior Jr/Sr High School received a letter grade of "C." They had previously received a "D." The formula used in calculating the grade was a hybrid model of the K-8 formula (AZMerit data) and the 9-12 formula (AZMerit data/graduation rate/ College Career Ready Points).

JFK Elementary received a "C" letter grade. They previously received a 'B." The K-8 formula was used in calculating the grade. (AZMerit data). JFK was only a couple of percentage points away from a "B." We are proud of our students and staff for all of their efforts. This is a good step in moving our District to the next level. SUSD's academic programs are designed and implemented to build upon our current letter grades. This has been a priority of our Governing Board, administration, and our staff. Superior in familiar place following semifinal victory

The Superior football team will be in a familiar place come this Saturday night: The 1A State Championship Game. The No. 3 Panthers are making their third-straight state championship appearance following last Saturday's 52 – 28 semifinal victory against No. 7 Mogollon.

"Our kids came out and executed well," Superior head coach Ryan Palmer said afterwards. "When we're executing well and we're mentally sharp then we are, if not the top team, one of the top teams, and we have a shot to win every game."

Superior left no doubt from the game's outset, scoring 14 points before the Mustangs took their first offensive snap from scrimmage.

The Panthers capitalized on great field position after recovering consecutive onside kicks, including the opening kickoff by Mogollon. Sophomore quarterback Matthew Cruz connected with senior receiver Sammy Lopez on a 62-yard touchdown play to start the game's scoring. Superior doubled-down by recovering the ensuing onside kick. Two plays later, Cruz threw his second of seven touchdowns in the game, this one a 43yard hookup with junior Adam Navarrette, who finished with four touchdown receptions in the game, all of them in the first half.

"We played excellent (on Saturday)," said Navarrette, who caught eight passes for 173 yards in addition to rushing for 94 yards. "The first quarter (and) the first half was perfect."

After Andrew Martinez' interception on Mogollon's first possession, Cruz threw his third touchdown pass of the first quarter, a 13-yarder to Navarrette to give the Panthers a commanding 22 - 0 lead halfway through the first 12 minutes of the game.

Cruz, who completed 17-of-24 for 329 yards, played his best game to date in his biggest game to date. He acknowledged he didn't do it alone.

"Our receivers were running good routes and were always open," he said. "My linemen (played well) also again today."

It was an impressive by Cruz, who also threw scoring passes to Gabe Otero and Daniel McConnell, and he's still learning, which requires some tough love on occasion.

"Matthew is only a sophomore, so he's Continued on page 8

Celebrating a military career: Senior Master

It was January of 1981 when Victor Velasquez and his childhood friend Kathleen Aldrete Beaudet decided to join the Air Force. Friends since the first grade at Superior Unified School district, they traveled to Casa Grande, raised their right hands and took their oaths of military enlistment.

After graduation these two Superior Alumni would graduate from Air Force basic training at Lackland Air Force base in San Antonio, Texas. Kathleen would serve for nine years in the Air Force and Victor continued on to retire after a 38-year career.

"Victor left Superior as an adventurous young man, but today he returns to us as a loyal son, husband, father, grandfather and a distinguished military leader, as well as a hero to a grateful nation," said Kathleen in her speech during his retirement ceremony.

During his military career he traveled to all seven continents, a total of 60 countries and was assigned to 11 different duty stations. Throughout his career he worked in combat readiness and support anywhere in the world to all branches of searches to the war on terrorism and served on many humanitarian missions during crisis around the world. He also provided direct support to President George H.W. Bush, President Bill Clinton, President George W. Bush, President Barrack Obama and current

President Donald Trump.

As an Air Force Loadmaster, his career statistics includes: flying 274 combat and support missions on the C-130 Hercules, C-141 Star-Lifter and C-17Globe Master. He has received 65 medals and decorations. Some of his awards includes: Air Force Meritorious Service medal, Air Force Commendation Medal, Combat Readiness Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Nuclear Deterrence Operations Service Medal and the Humanitarian Service Medal. Some of these medals he may have received multiple times during his career. Velasquez served his

Velasquez served his county with his family standing by his side. He met his wife in the Philippines and she left her country to keep the home fires burning throughout his career. He also has two sons, Joshua and Justin, who missed their father during their childhood, while he was serving in the military. Velasquez is the son of Lorenzo and Sally Velasquez. For years his mothers prayers were heard, that her son remain safe as he served.

Senior Master Sergeant Velasquez celebrated his retirement at the Hotel Magma surrounded by family and friends. Retired Air Force Master Sergeant James Bault presided over the ceremony reading the official retirement orders which read, "By the order of the President of the United States Donald Trump you are official ordered to retirement. Thank you for your sacrifice and service to your country." The ceremony also included the Honor

learning," Palmer said. "I didn't even realize he threw seven touchdown passes. I'm worried about his footwork, I'm worried about his reads, (and) I get on him.

"I want him to learn," Palmer continued. "I don't want him ever to be satisfied. I want to keep pushing him because I think he has tremendous talent and a lot of potential. The sky is the limit if he continues to work hard."

The Panthers' biggest lead of the game was 34 points, 46 – 12, before they became a little sloppy, something hard to overcome as the game winds down in a dominant performance.

"We started to let down a little bit in the second half, but then we picked it up a little more and got the (win)," Navarrette said.

There can't any "let down" in the championship game against top-ranked Williams on Saturday.

"We're definitely going have to bring our execution for four quarters and we're going to have to do a much better job," Palmer said. "We're playing a really tough team and they're physical. We have to match that physicality and I think we have the players to do it."

Up next: 1A State Championship versus No. 1 Williams on Saturday, Nov. 16. Kickoff is scheduled for 6 p.m.
