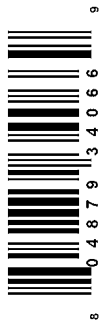

# Pinal County voters mostly elect incumbents in 2016 election; but McGuire loses State Senate seat

It was a good day for incumbents on November 8 as nearly all who ran were reelected by voters in Pinal County, according to the unofficial returns released by the county Board of Elections. The sole exceptions were State Sen. Barbara McGuire and Kearny Mayor Sam Hosler.

McGuire, who has held the state senator position in Legislative District 8 for several terms, was unseated by Frank Pratt, who moves up from LD8 State Representative, by a vote of 20,453 for Pratt to McGuire's 18,453. McGuire was the only Democrat representing a portion of San Tan Valley in the Arizona State Legislature.

Replacing Pratt as one of the two state representatives in LD8 was David Cook, who topped the field with 20,164 votes.

Thomas (TJ) Shope was reelected with 19,196 votes. Carmen Casillas finished third with only 16,876 votes.

In the runoff for Mayor of Kearny, Debra Sommers again topped incumbent Sam Hosler 293 to 281 votes. Both finished in that order after the August 30 Primary, but because Sommers did not receive 50% of the total vote, the top two candidates were put into a runoff.

Neither Kearny mayoral candidate has

commented on the outcome pending the official results, which the Pinal County Board of Elections said will be announced on November 28.

Pete Rios defeated Thomas Sorensen by 5,362 to 4,540 votes to win reelection as District 1 County Supervisor and remain the only Democrat on the Pinal County Board of Supervisors. The other candidates, all Republicans, ran

## Safety Miners

There was a day when work place safety was an afterthought; there wasn't a regulation in sight and in many cases if you were at least 18 you could take a job with the mines or work on a factory line. And so long as productivity kept up safety remained an afterthought. As workers were injured on the job, safety laws came into effect. The Federal Government would provide regulations on how to ensure that companies kept their employees safe. Those regulations created the oversight of Mine Safety Health Administration (MSHA) and the Occupational Safety Health Administration (OSHA)

Ron Murphy started his business Safety Miners after working in the mining industry for the past 43 years. He has been working specifically in mine safety training for 12 years. His dream has been to develop a school dedicated to mine and occupational safety. When he learned about the vacant space at the Town Hall (formerly Roosevelt Junior High School) he approached the town about leasing the older portion of the building to establish his school, Safety Miners. They rented the building in October of 2014 and to date they have made completed major repairs to the building while maintaining the character and original floor plans.

Safety Miners offers MSHA training including new miner and refresher courses. OSHA and workplace safety training along with first aid and CPR classes. Custom training can be developed. Safety Miners offers a unique service to their clients; their training school offers catered meals and an onsite lunch room to accommodate their students. The training room is also available for meetings and other training. Those looking to be employed in the mining industry will need an MSHA safety clearance. Safety Miners can arrange for group trainings or individual training.

The training classes are taught by local resident Ken Almejo. He has been teaching for over 20 years. Ron's daughter Cayci

manages the scheduling and registrations. During the interview about the services of Safety Miners, the three gave some advice to future business owners and their fellow entrepreneurs: "Attitude is important in anything that you do. There will always be challenges but if you have a positive attitude you can get through any obstacle," said Ken.

Ron spoke about the need for persistence. "In any new business, you will struggle, but you must stay positive," he said. All three agreed that you must surround yourself with the right people.

Superior Arizona- The Superior Chamber of Commerce is seeking commercial building property-owners in the downtown Superior area who would like to participate in a Rebuild Superior murals project.

Additional criteria are:

- 1) The owner must invite the Chamber to paint a mural ("A painting or other work of art executed directly on a wall") on his/her building;
- 2) The owner must allow before, during and after photos to be taken;
- 3) The owner must be

willing to review possible murals with the Art Committee to determine a mutually agreed upon design;

4) Owner must be willing to contribute financially to the costs, which will be determined with owner before a contribution is negotiated;

5) The owner must allow Chamber-coordinated volunteers to help paint the mural; and

6) Owner must allow the resulting mural to be photographed, publicized in the community and used in Chamber, or other, publications related to Rebuilding Superior.

Interested property-owners are urged to contact Ken to express

initial interest and to set up a meeting with the Art Committee.

The Chamber's Art Committee Consultant, Juliana Brutsche, has extensive outdoor murals experience and will be managing the selected projects with Ken. Ken is a member of the Chamber Business Attraction & Retention Committee and has extensive project management experience. This past year, with property-owners, the Chamber painted murals at Random Boutique and the Payer Motors building, both on Main Street, as part of Rebuilding Superior.

For background: The Chamber's Business Attraction & Retention ("BAR") Committee is focused on helping existing businesses to expand, attracting new businesses and encouraging entrepreneurship in Superior. The BAR Committee has set up three sub-committees—Art, Marketing and Blight Mitigation—to work on improving the whole community. 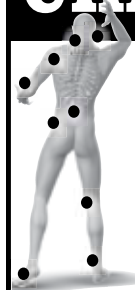

# Thanksgiving Traditions - Is it the meal, the memories or the leftovers?

It seems the years keep flying by, faster and faster. Each year as the holidays arrive, there is anticipation of tasty foods, family gatherings, parties and gift giving. From the first Thanksgiving until today, food plays a significant role in the holiday; the act of breaking bread and sharing a meal has become symbolic in our culture. Whether its and elaborate meeting of leaders, a business meeting, lovers or family members food plays a role.

We thought about just providing a few recipes for leftovers but quickly the discussion changed into what is your favorite Thanksgiving food, do you have a favorite dish that you use your leftovers for? I asked a few of our community members what is their favorite dish and why.

Superior Councilman Michael Alonzo said his favorite Thanksgiving food was his Nana

Vicky Alonzo's turkey and stuffing. For Melissa Rabago, of Resolution Copper, her favorite dish is the stuffing, every year she makes the recipe that her mother-in-law, Dora Rabago gave to her.

Lucy Wing a local food expert said her favorite part of Thanksgiving is eating the Turkey wing. "My husband and I fight over the wings (every year)," she said. She explained that he was a little upset that this year, she plans to only cook a turkey breast. "It is less calories," she said. Lucy recommends making a simple turkey pot pie using vegetables, chicken gravy and a single pastry crust for the top for left overs or even a turkey tetrazzini which uses leftover turkey, Alfredo sauce, mushrooms and fresh veggies along with pasta base.

Susan Anderson, President of the Superior Chamber of Commerce said her favorite Thanksgiving dish was the turkey dressing and gravy.

If this was some kind of scientific survey,

the stuffing or dressing would be the winner. My grandmother Mickey Preciado made a one of kind dressing, there wasn't a secret recipe it was a little bit of this and that, days old bread and parsley. Her turkey wasn't the focus of the meal, it was the hope of having leftover ham for "Ham Noodles" which is our family favorite leftover, simple at best: some spaghetti noodles, chopped up ham cooked on the stove, diced boiled eggs and green onion. It was simple but even today that is a special recipe reserved for those holiday leftovers. Her recipe just like most families held the secret ingredient of love and gratefulness that is probably what made these special dishes, extra good.

In the publisher's household, Cranberry Apple Salad is the favorite. Even the teenagers request it be put on the table. A double batch ensures enough for leftover snacking.

# International mining industry leaders visit Superior

The United States Forest Service recently introduced a group of 16 mining industry professionals to community leaders in Superior. The students to the seminar visited Arizona for two weeks where they learned more about the mining laws and practices in the United States. They also learned about various environmental concerns, the permitting process and the various controversies surrounding mining.

During their visit to Superior they had the opportunity to meet with Mayor Mila Besich-Lira, Town Manager Todd Pryor, Councilmember-Elect Bruce Armitage and Sue Anderson, President of the Superior Chamber of Commerce, during a session about how local mines interact with the local government.

The group also had an opportunity to meet with officials from Resolution Copper to learn about the process that Resolution Copper will go through and how the company works with local groups and organizations during their half day visit to Superior.

Following their meeting with officials from Superior and Resolution Copper they traveled through the Copper Corridor to visit San Manuel and learn more about the mining operations that once operated in San Manuel.

During the two week seminar the students also met with the Tonto National Forest representatives, members of the Apache Stronghold and the Retired Miners and Concerned Citizens.

This was the first year that the US Forest Service held an International Seminar on Mining. The students came from the countries of: Georgia, Colombia, Armenia, Guatemala, Madagascar, Nepal, Democratic Republic of

Congo, Guinea, Peru, Ecuador, and the Philippines. Their roles in the industry ranged from attorneys, government employees, resource managers, engineers, forestry and ecological services.

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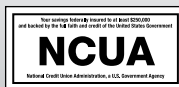

unopposed. New to the Board from District 2 is Mike Goodman, who defeated incumbent Cheryl Chase in the August 30 Primary. Reelected incumbents are from District 3 Stephen Miller, District 5 Anthony Smith and District 5 Todd House.

Of the two contested countywide positions, Republican Mark Lamb was elected Sheriff, defeating Democrat Kaye Dickson by 43,684 to 32,210 votes. Republican Douglas Wolf also won reelection as County Assessor, defeating Democrat Jacqueline Minto 43,980 to 29,621 votes.

Unopposed candidates elected are County Attorney Kent Volkmer, Treasurer Michael McCord, Recorder Virginia Ross and School Superintendent Jill Broussard.

Democrat Tom O'Halleran won election to the U.S. Congress in Arizona Congressional District 1, which includes most of Pinal County and runs north to the northeast corner of the state. In the entire district, O'Halleran received 110,894 votes to 93,004 for Republican and former Pinal County Sheriff Paul Babeu and 12,326 for Green Party Candidate Ray Parrish. However inside Pinal County Babeu received 650 more votes than O'Halleran.

Republican David Farnsworth rolled to an easy victory over Democrat challenger Scott Prior to win reelection as LD16 State Senator on a vote of 38,870 for Farnsworth to 21,462 for Pryor. For LD 16 State Representatives, Republicans Doug Coleman (35,489 votes) and Kelly Townsend (35,565) were reelected over Democrats Sharon Stinard (18,609) and Cara Prior (17,583). Coleman was the bigger vote getter in the Pinal County and San Tan Valley section of the district than Townsend, who dominated the vote on the Maricopa County side of the district.

In the runoff for the fourth council seat in

Mammoth, Bart Goff won with 132 votes to Frances Wickham, who withdrew from the race before November 8.

There was jubilation in the J.O. Combs Unified School District as the proposed \$38.8 million bond issue rolled to a lopsided victory. But although the vote was 3,614 votes Yes to 2,192 No, Combs Superintendent Gayle Blanchard is holding off making a victory statement until the official tally is announced; perhaps hesitant because a similar bond issue in 2015 appeared to have won by 36 votes only the have the official results that eliminated some twice-counted ballots, resulting in a 16-vote loss.

The Combs bond issue will be used for school and building renovations, including the construction of additional classrooms, technology upgrades, new classroom furniture, and better student transportation. Bigger ticket items include a new maintenance/transportation facility and a 600-seat community auditorium/concert hall adjacent to Combs High School on Germann Road.

But there was no joy in the Queen Creek Unified School District (QCUSD) as its \$95 million bond issue suffered a 6,027 NO to 4,435 YES defeat. Voter and taxpayer fatigue may have contributed to the rejection as QCUSD had enacted a 15% override and another bond issue during the past two years.

The bond issue would have been used to build two additional elementary schools and a second high school in the district to accommodate student enrollment currently rising at more than 10% a year, said Crystal Korpan, QCUSD chief financial officer.

No decision has yet been made on whether another attempt to win bond approval will be made next year.

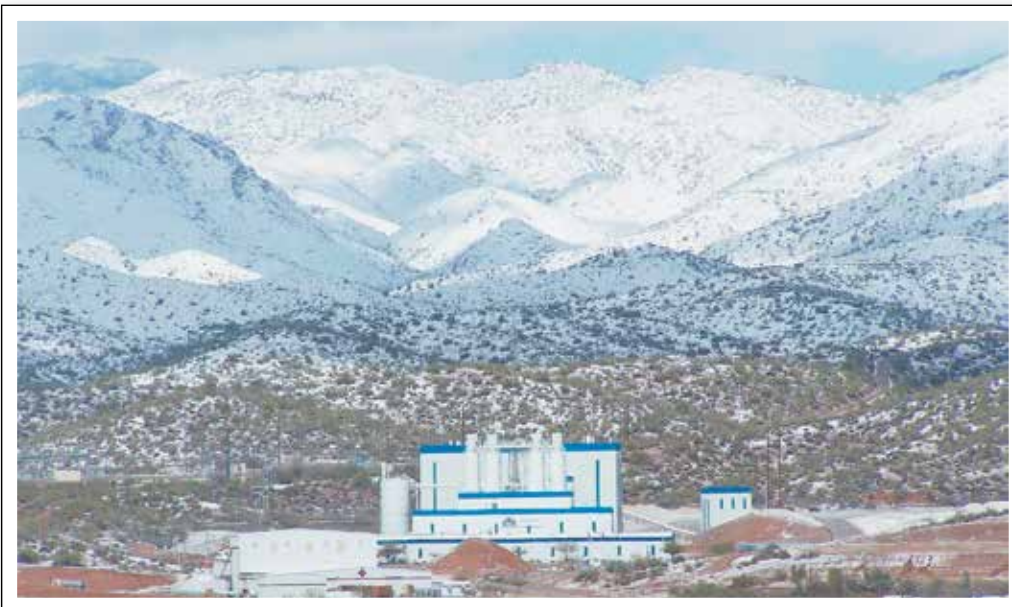
