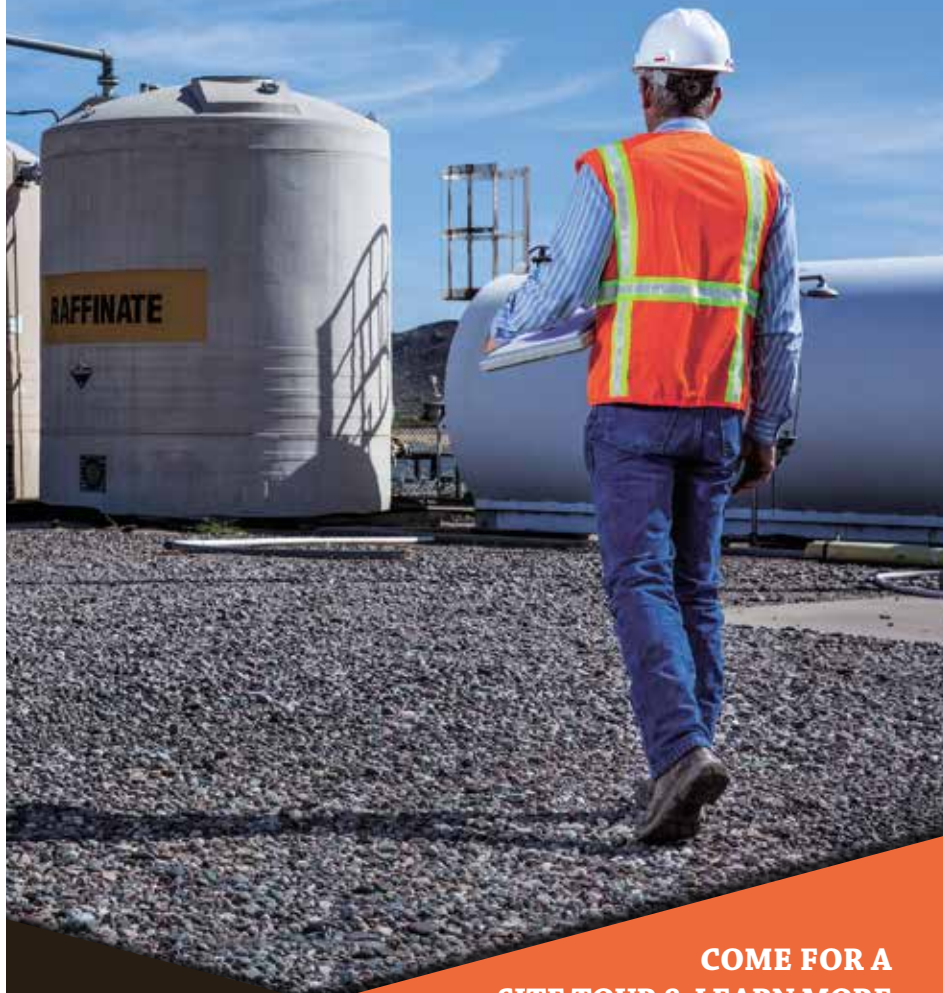

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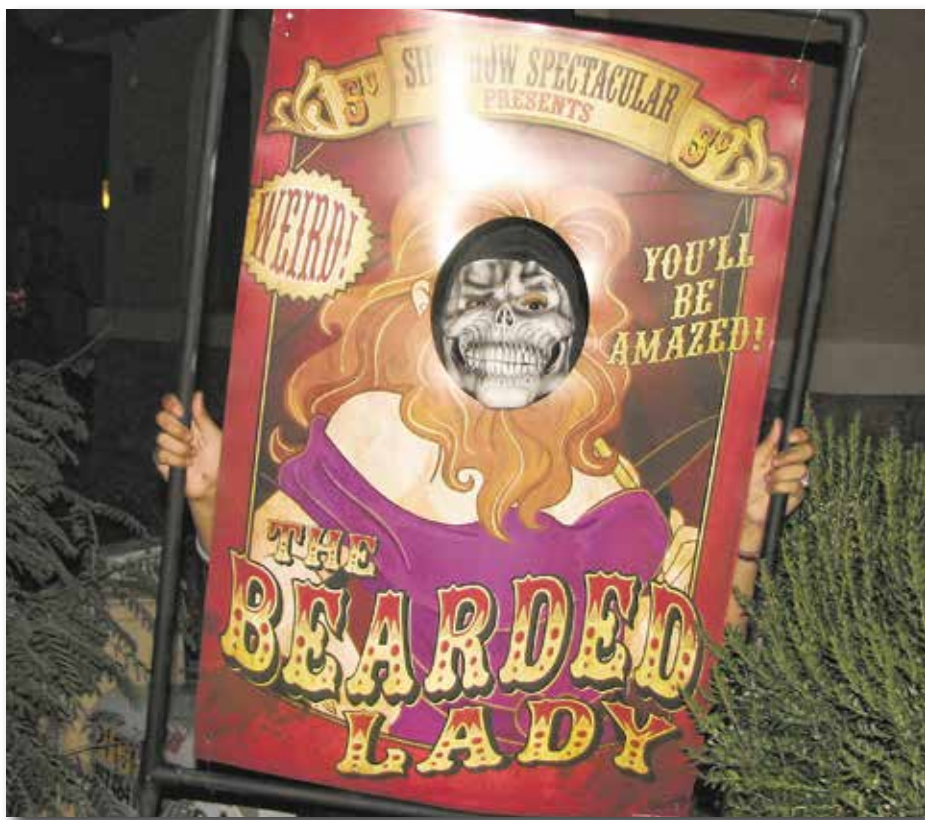
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Circle Cross Ranch neighborhood goes all out for Halloween

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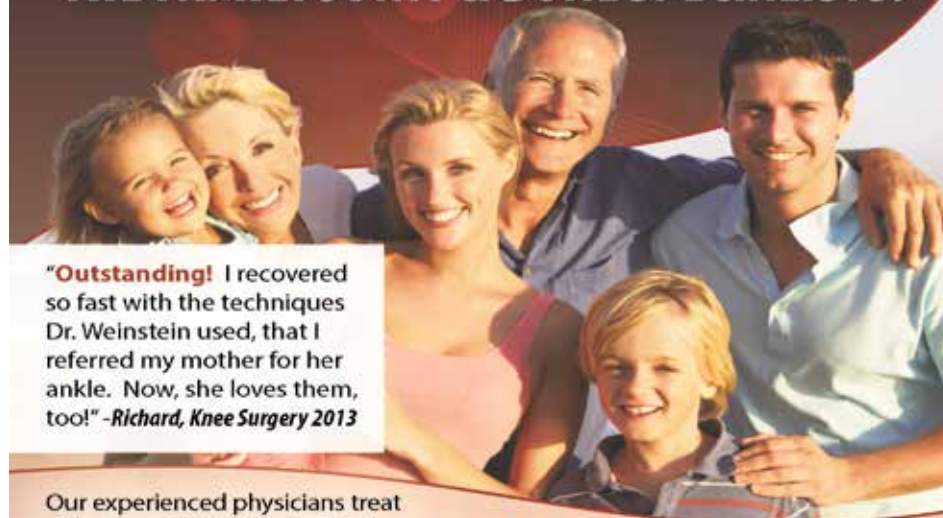
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Fall Sports Wrapping Up With Trips to Playoffs on the Line for Some

QUEEN CREEK

Boys' Golf – The No. 10-ranked Bulldogs played for the Division II State Championship on Nov. 2-3 at Randolph North Golf Course in Tucson. The Bulldogs were one of four teams from Section IV – Seton Catholic, Campo Verde, and Williams Field – to qualify for the state tournament.

Head coach Mark Underwood believes the regular-season competition with the other Section IV teams will benefit his team at the tournament.

A total of 96 golfers competed earlier this week with 75 of them from one of 15 teams that earned automatic or at-large berths. The remaining golfers represented the top 21 individuals not on a qualifying team.

Five Bulldogs' golfers competed for Queen Creek, including Gabe Salvanera (Fr), Jarrett Fultz (Fr), Chris Heath (Fr), Bryson Gwilliam (Jr), Connor Duyck (Jr). Salvanera (16) is the highest ranked Bulldogs' golfer, according to the AIA individual rankings.

Girls' Golf – The No. 13-ranked Bulldogs played for the Division II State Championship on Nov. 2-3 at Dell Ulrich Golf Course in Tucson. The Bulldogs were one of three teams from Section IV – Higley and Skyline – to qualify for the state

tournament.

A total of 96 golfers competed earlier this week with 75 of them from one of 15 teams that earned automatic or at-large berths. The remaining golfers represented the top 21 individuals not on a qualifying team.

Five Bulldogs' golfers competed for Queen Creek, including Taryn Simmons, Victoria Barbari, Jessica King, Madison Norris, and Baylee Blanchette. Simmons (23) is the highest ranked Bulldogs' golfer, according to the AIA individual rankings.

COMBS

Girls' Golf – Hannah Brown, who is ranked No. 38, according to the AIA individual rankings, qualified for the Division II State Championship. The event took place on Nov. 2-3 at Dell Ulrich Golf Course in Tucson.

A total of 96 golfers competed earlier this week with 75 of them from one of 15 teams that earned automatic or at-large berths. The remaining golfers represented the top 21 individuals not on a qualifying team, which included Brown.

Football – Knowing it needed to win to have any chance at making the state playoffs; the Combs football team took care of its end, steamrolling Fountain Hills on

Homecoming and Senior Night last Friday, 50 – 7.

Saturday, during the AIA Playoff Selection Show, the Yotes were rewarded with the No. 15 seed in the 16-team Division IV Playoff bracket. They'll play at No. 2-seed Show Low on Saturday in a rematch of a game played on Sept. 25, a 49 – 22 Cougars' victory.

Senior running back Jake Green rushed for 133 of the Yotes' 383 rushing yards and scored three touchdowns in the win against Fountain Hills. Senior quarterback Ethan Hunt threw for a touchdown and ran for another. Senior receiver Dalton Lupton was on the receiving end of Hunt's scoring pass. Josh Espinoza, a senior, rushed for 95 yards and a touchdown.

Senior defensive end Coda McLaws, who was named Homecoming King at halftime, led the Yotes' defense with 10 tackles. Todd Goodman-Schweikart, also a senior, added eight tackles, a sack, and a fumble recovery. Lupton and Fide Quirarte each had an interception in the win.

The Yotes held an opposing team to seven points or less for the third time in their five wins.

SAN TAN FOOTHILLS

Football – The Sabercats sent off 13 seniors in style with a 48 – 6 victory in the season finale against San Carlos on Senior Night last Friday.

The Cats scored 48 unanswered points during the game's first three quarters before the Braves scored in the fourth quarter to avoid the shutout.

Head coach John Sanders started the season in haste due to accepting the position late, which was proceeded by a difficult transition involving other coaching

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Broncos honor seniors in finale

The Poston Butte football team honored 13 seniors before last Friday night's season finale versus cross-town rival Queen Creek.

Last week's game – a 40 – 14 Bulldogs' victory – like the season, didn't go as planned for the Broncos, especially for the seniors on the team.

"It's sad, but I've had an amazing four years here with a lot of these guys," senior Sergio Hernandez said after the game. "I've come to love them all; they're my brothers and at the end of the day I love them."

After a playoff appearance in head coach Paul Moro's first season, the Broncos figured to have an even better season in 2015. But for a number of reasons it didn't happen like it was supposed to.

Tragedy hit the team before the season even started and once it did injuries stacked up quicker than the pancakes at IHOP and, unfortunately, so did the losses.

Moro talked about teaching his players more than football when he took the job before the 2014 season. Despite a winless season on the field, he still had success teaching his players life off the field.

"He's taught us how to be men and how to persevere through everything," Hernandez said about Moro, who is unsure if he will return for a third season at Poston Butte. "He's had (tragedy) in his life recently and he's been here every day – he's persevered. He's been in it for us."

The outcome of Friday's game was never in doubt after the first quarter with the Bulldogs holding a 30 – 0 lead thanks to two rushing touchdowns by junior running back Jace Koester and one from quarterback Kaleb Honea.

The Bulldogs other touchdown in the quarter came on the first play from scrimmage, when Honea hit receiver Ian Woods on a 70-yard touchdown pass and reception.

Senior Hayden Espericueta, who's rushed for 49 total yards this season, recorded 40 of them on a second-quarter touchdown run to make it 37 – 0 at halftime.

"It's always good to come out of the gate fast," Bulldogs' head coach Travis Schureman said. "We talked about, this week, preparing for ourselves, getting better, and not worry about who we're playing. I thought our kids did a good job of that tonight."

Queen Creek increased its lead in the third quarter after a 42-yard field goal by Zach Glaess.

The Broncos finally found some success in the fourth quarter. Junior quarterback Shavez Hawkins and senior running back T'reek Hendrix each scored rushing touchdowns in the final

quarter. Kicker Zack Piwniczka was successful on both PAT's.

Poston Butte Athletic Director Jeff Cox said he expects Moro to make a decision early this week about returning next season.

And even though the season didn't go as planned for Poston Butte, the players are still looking forward to the next step in their football careers.

Players like Sergio Hernandez and Chase Taylor, who each received a scholarship offer from Adams State University before the season, will have opportunities to play at the next level.

"I'm still unsure (about where I'll play in college) but I'm planning on taking some visits to a couple of schools and see what else opens up," Hernandez said.

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Bulldogs, Yotes earn football playoff berths

The Queen Creek and Combs football teams each earned a spot in the 2015 AIA State Championships.

Queen Creek, the No. 2 seed in Division II, will open the playoffs at home this Friday with a rematch versus season-opening opponent Desert Mountain (No. 15 seed). The Bulldogs won that game in overtime, 20 – 14.

Combs, the No. 15 seed in Division IV, will open with a rematch as well, traveling north to battle No. 2-seed Show Low this Saturday. The Cougars defeated the Yotes on Sept. 25, 49 – 22.

playoff brackets for all divisions, including game dates, times, and locations.

What: Desert Mountain (15) at Queen Creek (2) – First round of Division II playoffs

When: Friday, Nov. 6 at 7 p.m.

Next: Winner will play either No. 10 Apollo or No. 7 Saguaro on Nov. 13.

Some hype surrounded the first meeting between these teams, but almost none had to do with the players on the field and that's who ultimately decided the outcome of the overtime thriller.

For the Bulldogs, who won 20 – 14, much has changed since the first game, including a new starting quarterback,

more consistency and balance on offense, and perhaps most notably a new starting tailback.

"For us, there is a lot different," Head coach Travis Schureman told the *Ledger*. "I think we're playing well on both sides of the ball right now and we're going to need a great effort by everybody to beat (Desert Mountain)."

Senior running back Gavin Danielson, who is out for the season with a leg fracture, rushed for more than 200 yards and scored two touchdowns against the Wolves in the season opener, including the game winner in overtime.

Jace Koester is his replacement and so far the junior has been everything the Bulldogs expected and more, rushing for 235 yards and two touchdowns in two-plus games since filling in for Danielson, his mentor.

Queen Creek is known to be without a shortage of outstanding running backs and Koester is only the most recent to almost "Wally Pipp" an injured star.

The Bulldogs have been in this position before; in 2013 Weston Barlow took over for an injured Matt Guida and just last season Danielson replaced Barlow when

the current Arizona Wildcat was out of the lineup with a lingering ankle injury.

One thing that hasn't changed much is the Bulldogs' defense. It's just as stifling now – perhaps even more – as it was 10 weeks ago. It limited the very-much-hyped Desert Mountain offense to 281 total yards and only 14 points, a season-low in scoring by the Wolves.

The Bulldogs must be cognizant of a triad of scenarios entering Friday's game.

First, it's never easy to beat the same team twice, partially because the losing team has the advantage of making adjustments based on its deficiencies in the first game.

Schureman and his staff will make sure the Bulldogs are focused during practice.

"It'll be nice to have some film to be able to what they've done since the first game and maybe (prepare) a little bit better than last time," Schureman said. "Both teams had opportunities to win the last game. It's going to be a great high school football game and we're excited to get to play."

Second, the Bulldogs can't look ahead to a potential second-round matchup with the Sabercats, a team that has ended their last two seasons in the playoffs. And that doesn't include the results between the teams during the regular season over the past few years.

And finally, the Bulldogs should be motivated knowing they'll get to host another playoff game in the second round regardless of which team – Apollo or Saguaro – wins. Queen Creek owns one of the best home-field advantages in the state.

"We always talk at Queen Creek about earning those two playoff games at home," Schureman said. "Playing at our place is great; it's always electric. The fans are great, the Dawg Pound is great, and the community really comes out and supports us. It's always great to wear purple and play on our home turf."

It would be a shame to waste it.

Combs has to sweat out the release of the playoff brackets to find out if they qualified for the state playoffs with a 5 – 5 record.

Some teams across the state are feeling snubbed after not qualifying even though they had a better record than the Yotes.

No team in Division IV played a more

difficult schedule than the Coyotes and that was the difference between the Yotes getting in and others not.

Now it's up to the Yotes, who are making their third-straight playoffs appearance, to make sure they can take advantage of a tough schedule that was designed to prepare them for playoff competition.

"Playing tough teams during the regular season has our boys prepared," Head coach Jesse Hart told the *Ledger*. "We've had to make the trip up north twice this season so the boys know what to expect. Hopefully, all of that will help us this Saturday."

Like many other playoff matchups around the state, this game is a rematch of a regular season game, which the Cougars won, 49 – 22.

After the loss, Hart was quick to say there are no excuses, but the facts are the Yotes traveled to Payson the week before, where they had a dramatic last play victory, and were playing against the Cougars without starting quarterback Ethan Hunt.

Back-to-back long road trips and playing without the starting quarterback is not a formula for success for any team. That's a difficult task playing against Show Low, a top team in the state all season.

A key to Coyotes success in the rematch is their strong defense because defense travels well.

As a matter of fact, it can be argued that if the defense plays well the Yotes should win.

In their five wins this season, the Yotes allowed only 11 points per game. In their five losses they allowed almost 31 points per game.

"When you get into the playoffs you want to make sure you have a solid defense and a good running game," Hart said. "Those are two things we tried to base our team off this year and we're excited about our chances."

On offense, they Yotes' running game is its strength. Erick Guerra, Josh Espinoza, and Jake Green are a dynamic running back trio that has rushed for almost 1,800 yards this season. Hunt added another 316 yards to that total.

All four combined to score 27 of the team's 29 rushing touchdowns this season.

It'll be important to run the ball against Show Low for two reasons. First, it minimizes the Cougars time of possession and opportunities on offense. Second, it will help keep the Yotes' defense fresh against the Cougars potent offense.

During my recent visit to the Denver area, I didn't have a lot of time to socialize with family or friends – but made a point to check out Liquid Mechanics Brewing Company located in Lafayette. Where in the heck is Lafayette, CO? Well – just about 30 minutes north of downtown Denver. Not far at all.

Upon arrival, I found a cozy atmosphere – able to accommodate large crowds and at the same time, provide areas for more intimate gatherings with friends. With seating both inside and out – this is a great location to spend time enjoying local, Colorado, craft beers.

Liquid Mechanics also has lots of fun events for their patrons including live music, and various food trucks that come onsite to satisfy your munchies and cravings. You'll want to check out the events page on their website to get more details.

Before ordering my beer, I shared with one of the owners, Eric Briggs, that I'm not a huge fan of dark beer, but was willing to try anything and that I preferred lighter, wheat-y, Hefeweizen-

type beer. He was ready to accommodate, but wanted me to give a couple of other beers that were on tap first....

He poured a flight so that I could choose the perfect one for to enjoy. Unfortunately due to both of our busy schedules, we didn't have much time to drink more than one.

The first beer in my flight I tried was the Agave Barrel Aged Biere De Mars and I LOVED it! This particular beer is aged in Agave (American Tequila) barrels and tastes delicious. Liquid Mechanics uses barrels from Peach Street Distillers in Palisade, CO and is a collaboration beer between them and SKA Brewing Co. The photo included with this column is this beer – that's the one of which I had to have an entire glass!

The second one was their French Saison – this was VERY interesting, but I liked it a lot! It is brewed with honey and orange peel, has a beautiful color and is easy to drink. This one even took home the Silver Medal in the Denver International Beer Competition!

And last but not least, Liquid Mechanics' newest beer: Peanut Butter Porter. I will have to say when I saw their Facebook page post about this beer a couple of weeks ago, I did not give it a "Like" – I mean c'mon, peanut butter beer? Eric insisted that I would like it. Yes, it smelled like peanut butter. Yes, it was dark like a porter. Yes, I did like it! It really doesn't taste like peanut butter – it was VERY smooth and VERY tasty. Liquid Mechanics has this available on tap now and made available to purchase in bottles on Halloween.

I also tried their Lemon Drop Wheat – don't get me wrong, this was quite tasty too! Very refreshing and one that I would have normally ordered, but I'm glad he poured me the flight – it took me out of my beer comfort zone!

The beers at Liquid Mechanics Brewing Company rotate with the seasons – just like any good brewery. Once you are there, you'll find that the staff is friendly and the vibe inside is pretty cool.
