# Copper Corridor broadband study proposal goes before Pinal County Supervisors

FLORENCE - In last week's special session, the Board of Supervisors heard a proposal from Bill Bolin of the Copper Corridor Economic Development Coalition regarding a proposed study for the eastern portion of Pinal County.

Bolin came before the Supervisors to inform the Board on a proposed study that would look at how to set up a



broadband network that would stretch from Oracle to Superior. This would give the Copper Corridor **Economic Development** Foundation an estimate on what a project of this magnitude would cost. Bolin said the study would cost in the neighborhood of \$17,000, he was asking the Board to consider investing \$10,000 to help it get off the ground. The study would begin January 2015 and end in June. Supervisor Pete

Rios, whose district is within the Copper Corridor, spoke in support of the proposal and encouraged the other board members to also support it.

"The Copper Corridor is not competitive," Bolin said. "We need to make them competitive. The Copper Corridor is losing business, we are in the middle of a brain drain in the area."

Bolin explained that a broadband network would be a key to helping create a better communications network for public safety providers, expand educational services, bring telemedicine to the area and to help small businesses be competitive in southern Arizona.

Bolin, who represents the Copper Corridor as well as Systems Technology Staffing, LLC (STS) said his company

along with One Random Act of Kindness (ORAct) would be spearheading the project.

"We have a template that is workable and that has a track record," Bolin stated. "We will be working with several broadband providers as well as with stakeholders in the area."

Bolin added that such a plan to bring broadband service to the area would need the help of large employers like ASARCO and SRP. He added that

ASARCO currently has fiber optic service for internet. "Will people buy in?" Bolin said. "I don't know. But we will have something to put on the table. This will give everyone a cost estimate of this project."

The geography of the region with its mountain ranges

and valleys along with its rural spaces has made it tough for companies that depend on broadband service to survive. Supervisor Rios said such a system is desperately needed.


"In the mountain area, if you have a cell phone, you might just want to turn it off," Rios said. "You can rarely find a signal."

Bolin said that such a study would be based on the

success on getting broadband services started in Safford, Douglas and Tuba City.

"In the end, success would be coming close to the Federal Communications Commission requirements for broadband service that would help public safety, telemedicine, education and businesses," Bolin stated.

The Supervisors will decide on whether or not to help fund such a study in a January 2014 board meeting.



# State poised to withhold highways funds to Superior

Charges by the Arizona Office of Auditor General (OAG) that the towns of Superior and Mammoth misdirected funds targeted for road, bridge and transportation projects to other municipal uses could soon result in the state withholding further highway funds to both communities. Without such funding, local construction and maintenance of streets and bridges could grind to a halt.

Both towns, plagued by declining populations and tax bases, reportedly loaned these highway funds to cover shortfalls in the budgets of other municipal projects. But because of the economic downturn in late 2008 the two towns were unable to immediately pay the monies back into the highway fund.

OAG uncovered the loans in a 2011 audit, declared them outside the scope set by Arizona law, and has ordered the towns to restore the redirected funds. But due to continued revenue shortfalls, Superior and Mammoth have been unable to restore these funds, prompting OAG to ask the Arizona Treasurer's Office to suspend sending further highway funds, which are derived from state and local taxes, until the lost monies are repaid.

For Superior, the loss of highway funding would put an \$18,000 per month hole in the town budget.

With such funds, Superior maintains 46 miles of road and Mammoth 36 miles of road in Pinal County (out of 4,229 miles total).


Part of the highway targeted funds comes from a 0.5-cent addition to the local sales tax, which under Arizona statutes can be authorized by voters in individual counties to provide additional funding for road, bridge and transportation projects. Pinal County voters approved this tax increase in 1986 and again in 2005. The current increase is in place until December 31, 2026.

Additional revenues for road projects come from the Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) are derived from transportation taxes and fees, such as the motor fuel taxes, and the title, registration and driver licenses fees. These are distributed by the Arizona Treasurer's Office to all counties based on population.

But the statute (28-6392) limits the use of transportation excise tax revenues and HURF funds to street and highways purposes and for transportation projects. These can include right-of-way acquisitions, and the construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair of roads, streets and bridges; and for roadside development. Excise revenues also can be used to pay principal and interest on highway and street bonds and personal costs, including salaries and benefits for employees working directly or indirectly on transportation projects.



The Town of Superior was just informed that its HURF funds would be withheld.

### and Mammoth for not repaying non-statutory loans

To assure that these revenues are spent properly, auditors regularly review financial statements and a sample of excise tax expenditures from Pinal County's 10 incorporated municipalities.

During a 2011 audit, OAG found most excise tax monies in Pinal County were used for authorized purposes. However, it was determined that the towns of Superior, Mammoth and Kearny has inappropriately loaned excise tax and/or HURF monies to other municipal funds and were ordered to repay them.

Kearny, which had in fiscal 2006 loaned \$207,000 to maintain ongoing operations of its Utilities Fund, has since repaid these funds. However, Superior and Mammoth have not repaid loans to other agencies within its government.

According to the 2011 audit, Superior owed \$1.5 million to the various highway funds which it had used to pay for excess grant expenditures that it made over grant reimbursement monies it received. This sum has since grown to \$2.6 million, though the exact amount is uncertain as Superior has yet to complete annual financial statements for 2009 and 2010, OAG said.

Mammoth likewise was cited by OAG in 2011 of owing \$389,000 on highway-targeted funds the town loaned itself to cover cash deficits in its general and grant funds. The owed amount has since grown to \$646,795, OAG said.

Both Superior and Mammoth struck deals to repay the inappropriately used highway funds on monthly installments. Mammoth agreed to repay at \$500 a month, while Superior offered to repay at the rate of \$100 a month.

But both towns have fallen behind in these payments. The latest OAG report said Superior has not made a repayment since September 2013. Interim Town Manager Margaret Gaston said that Superior has had significant financial issues that has not allowed it to make such

payments.

Mammoth Town Manager Patsy Large reportedly told OAG that the town doesn't have monies specifically dedicated to repayment.

The extent of both town's adherence to the law on highway fund usage since 2011 also is not known as neither town has completed its annual financial statements to OAG from 2011 to 2014.

Both towns were warned that they could be cut off from further excise tax and HURF funds in a letter sent September 29 by Dale Chapman, director of the OAG Performance Audit Division.


For Superior, the other shoe dropped on Nov. 26 when John S. Halikowski, director of ADOT, sent a letter to the Arizona Treasurer notifying the office to withhold transportation excise tax revenue to the town for inappropriately spending earlier revenues.


On hearing of the ADOT letter, Gaston called the whole situation "a complicated issue. The town currently cannot justify how the highway revenues were spent until we complete those back financial statements. Only then can we prove if the funds were spent right or wrong."

As for paying back \$2.6 million, Gaston added that Superior currently has significant revenue issues and cannot pay such an amount at this time. However the sum could be changed once the financial statements are finished and accepted by OAG.

If Superior is denied highways funds from the excise tax and HURF, it will lose \$18,000 a month for road improvement and other projects.

It is not known if a similar letter was sent to Mammoth. The town is still getting settled after recent recall elections and





Don Jones, Town of Mammoth Mayor



### Southeast Arizona Land Exchange

The Southeast Arizona Land Exchange and Conservation act was approved in the Senate on Friday, Dec. 12, through

Justice Court Judge Arnold Estrada Nora, Carolina & Mallory the passage of the National Defense Authorization Act. The bill was proposed by Resolution Copper in order to extend the life of the mine. The bill is expected to be signed by the President in the coming days, should the President not sign the bill it will take effect in 15 days.

Project Director Andrew Taplin explained, "There is much more work to be done before commercial mining can begin and Resolution Copper looks forward to working with all stakeholders as we continue to progress through the regulatory review process toward responsible development and operation of a world class copper mine that will safely produce over 25 percent of the current annual demand for copper in the United States."

There were a few amendments to the land exchange bill which include additional environmental protections; those amendments were approved in both the house and senate versions of the bill. The amendments included that the federal land will not be transferred to the mining company until the environmental studies are completed; it will also allow Native American tribes to access the property until the area in longer safe to use. Another critical amendment designates 807 acres of the Apache Leap Cliffs as a special management area which places it under Forest Service Protection. The designation of the Apache Leap will allow the Forest Service and other stakeholders to monitor the area and ensure that mine operations are not destroying the cliffs.

This legislation has been introduced into Congress several times over the course of a decade. Senators McCain and Flake along with Representatives Gosar and Kirkpatrick were instrumental in gaining approval in this Congress despite the opposition of the bill from the Superior Town Council, San Carlos Apache Tribal leaders and environmental groups. Opposition groups



### and Conservation Act approved by the U.S. Senate

have criticized the fact that the bill did not pass on its own but it is not uncommon for lands bills to be included in the annual Defense Authorization Act. "To maintain the strength of the most technologically-advanced military in the world, America's armed forces need stable supplies of copper for their equipment, ammunition and electronics," explained Senator McCain. "Most importantly Resolution Copper represents a game changer for an area of Arizona facing grave economic challenges."

Recently the Superior Town Council held an open discussion on the status of negotiations with the company. The town Attorney Steven Cooper is now at the helm leading the discussions. Councilmember Gilbert Aguilar was quoted in the Arizona Daily Star: "We're still going to keep negotiating our concerns. You can say there's going to be jobs, but put it in writing that they're going to be here."

Rep. Ann Kirkpatrick sent this written statement upon the passage of the bill in the Senate. "Arizona is just one momentous step from the finish line. I urge the president to sign this legislation and open the door for thousands of good jobs in District One. My vision for this district is to build a strong and diversified, stable economy-and the Superior mine is an important part of that vision. This project will lift the local economy and out working families in Superior and the Copper Corridor."







Governor Palmer also told the members about the build up for the upcoming Centennial in 2017. Lions International wants to do 100 million acts of service leading up to the Centennial. Governor



## Sea Lions shine at Winter Lights Swim Meet

Over the weekend of Dec. 5-7, the Sea Lions Swim Team competed in the Winter Lights Swim Meet in Oro Valley. Out of the 16 teams from Arizona and Mexico that participated, the Sea Lions finished fourth overall with 1166 points.

Preliminaries were held each morning and swimmers who qualified in the top 16 swam in finals each evening. Medals were awarded for top three finishes in each individual event. This meet format is similar to the format used at State Championship meets. With the 2015 Age Group State Championship Meet scheduled to be held in the Oro Valley pool in March, the meet was a great preview for many swimmers.

The distance events were held Friday afternoon to start the meet off. Despite most Sea Lions swimmers being at the bottom of their respective age groups (a 9-year-old in the 9-10 age group or an 11-year-old in the 11-12 age group), they had some great achievements. Ethan Kellam (8) and Ben Fister (9) both achieved a **Regional Qualifying Time** in the 500 freestyle on their way to top 10 finishes. Later in the evening, Riley Stewart (11) and Evan Apuron (11) both achieved State Qualification Times in the 1650 Freestyle on their way to top five finishes. Riley was the first Sea Lion to earn a medal with his third place finish in the 1650 Freestyle with a team best time of 21:37.48. 

The San Manuel Wrestling team went 6 - 4 at last weekend's Red Mountain Inviational, finishing in 8th place and winning the Silver Pool.






