United Way of Pinal County county-wide human services assessment under way

Keith McGlaughlin, president of the United Way of Pinal County Board of Directors, said today that the county-wide assessment of human service needs is under way, and results are beginning to come in through the online Survey Monkey document. The project is managed by an Americorps Vista member working with United Way through the Arizona Alliance of Nonprofits and a generous grant from the Corporation for National and Community Service. The goal of the program is to help communities reduce poverty. McGlaughlin noted that Manuela Bowler's education and background are in empowering communities by helping address issues through planning and resource development, and she has been assigned the task of conducting a new needs assessment of county human service needs, a role that fits her background well.

On assignment for one year, Bowler of Apache Junction, Ariz. has been visiting Pinal County communities and individuals to get support, and with a steering committee, developed the survey tool currently being used. The Steering Committee members are Maria Munoz, Town of Havden: Mary Witkofski, City of Maricopa; Heather Patel, City of Apache Junction; Bonnie Palmer, Coolidge Youth Coalition; Captain Mark P. Davey, Salvation Army in Casa Grande; and

Scott McEuen

The survey will be open until Jan. 15, 2015 in an effort to allow residents from across the county to share their view. Once completed, focus group meetings will be held around the county and the feedback will provide assistance to the United Way Board in updating the board's Community Impact Plan.

Pinal County, the size of the state of Connecticut, has diverse regions and issues and residents in all parts of the county have experienced tremendous financial impact while surviving past economic boom and bust cycles. Human services that have responded to these needs have done so for many years with shrinking funding levels, making it most difficult for them to respond and to meet all the needs. Gaps often emerge between needs and services delivered, and identification of gaps will be a key component of the survey. McGlaughlin said that the United Way of Pinal County aims to create collective community impact by funding efforts that leverage resources that address gaps in the county's human service system.

"The last needs assessment was conducted in 2005." Beverly Prueter, United Way executive director, said, "An update is needed, and it is important to get opinions from across the county. The survey will be

made available to other organizations and individuals, and it will help the United Way board assess the best way to distribute funds raised in its annual campaigns." Currently, United Way focuses on improving lives by providing educational programs, including early childhood development and training, and substance abuse awareness services; income stability programs such as VITA and emergency assistance; and health, including many supportive feeding program and home alone safety pendants, gardening projects and



assistance for our county's veterans, to name a few.

SailCart sculpture installed in Oracle

The SailCart, a metal sculpture designed by artist Chris Lucic and fabricated by Randy Halliday, was installed this week. The art structure weighs over two tons. Kevin Armbrust organized the installation and was helped by Steve Brown, Frank Pierson, and Marcos Robles of Oracle Electric Service who provided a crane. Frank Pierson and Mary Ellen Kazda donated the use of their land where the sculpture sits off American Avenue next to the post office.

The SailCart honors the mining history of the area. According to the Oracle Historical Society, Prospector Albert Weldon survived a terrible storm on the ship Oracle while sailing around the Cape of Good Hope. He named his first mining claim "The Oracle" in gratitude. The town of Oracle takes its name from the mine and indirectly from a ship.

ADOT awarded \$1 million grant for lighting project in US 60 Queen Creek Tunnel; Innovative project near Superior to improve visibility, reduce maintenance costs

PHOENIX — In an ongoing effort to modernize the state's highway system, the Arizona Department of Transportation recently secured a \$1 million federal grant to replace the antiquated lighting in the US 60 Queen Creek Tunnel near Superior with a new lightemitting diode (LED) lighting system, which will be the first tunnel in Arizona to have this new innovative technology.

The new lighting system will improve visibility in the tunnel, which was originally built in 1952, by using an adaptive control system that will adjust the lighting level within the tunnel based upon ambient light and weather conditions outside the tunnel.

The new lighting system will also significantly reduce the power consumption, while decreasing maintenance frequency for the tunnel (lane closures, traffic delays).


"This project is one of several in store for the US 60 corridor that will ultimately enhance safety between Globe and the Phoenix metro area, including the Silver King/Superior Streets widening project west of the Queen Creek Tunnel and the Oak Flats climbing lane project east of the tunnel," said ADOT Globe District

Engineer Jesse Gutierrez. "The new lighting system will provide sufficient visibility in the tunnel for safety while using the least amount of energy."


The funding comes from the Federal Highway Administration Accelerated Innovation Deployment Demonstration program, which will ultimately invest \$30 million in incentive funding for federal, state, local and tribal government agencies to hasten their use of innovative methods. The AID program builds on the success of the agency's ongoing Every Day Counts initiative, a partnership between the Federal Highway Administration and state and local transportation agencies to accelerate the deployment of innovative methods and cut project delivery times.

ADOT expects to replace the lighting system beginning in 2015, which will require new conduit and wiring in the quarter-mile-long tunnel. The total project cost is estimated to be \$3.8 million.

ADOT was one of only six states to receive one of the grants designed to accelerate deployment of innovative transportation projects, and the \$1 million grant to Arizona matched Michigan's for the largest received.


The chamber accomplished many goals in 2014, they started a marketing committee that is focused


on promoting Superior to tourists and other businesses, they were able to move into their newly remodeled building on Main Street all while continuing to host the annual events in the community.



Problem with online reporting site delays scores

Copper Area News tries to provide scores for all games played throughout the previous week. We obtain those scores first through the coaches and, when they do not respond to our inquiries, we obtain them online via MaxPreps and AIA365.

Unfortunately, this week we encountered a problem with the websites.

The scores and stats on MaxPreps do not add up and the scores on AIA365 differ from what's on MaxPreps. To further complicate issues, the game states on MaxPreps don't equal the final score.

AIA365 does NOT provide stats.

For example, on MaxPreps, the final score of San Carlos vs Globe girls' game is 31 - 18. But a review of the stats reflects that San Carlos scored 55 points. Clearly one of these is not accurate. Another example, Superior beat Ray in boys basketball last week, now the score is different and reflects a Bearcats win. And, the 2015 Football season records for some teams show their record as 91 - 0. Impossible, since we haven't played games in the 2015 season and for sure not 91 games.

We are hoping that the problem is rectified soon. We will report the scores of games played as soon as it is updated and corrected.

Superior Town Council wraps up the year, optimistic about 2015

The Superior Town Council continues working on having a successful year and looks forward to the new-year and the accomplishments they can make in the future. During the last meeting of this year the town council held a public hearing regarding a new flower business in Superior, new police officers added to the Superior Police Department, the moving of a Rectifier by Southwest Gas Company and other business issues.

The public hearing was held regarding the home occupation permit requested by Gloria Palacios to operate a flower shop for the assembly and sale of silk flowers and accessory products and materials in her home in an R 1-6 Urban Residential Zone District located at 1231 S. Belmont Ave. in Superior. After the public hearing, the town council approved the new flower business for Gloria Palacios.

Discussion of the possible easement for the Southwest Gas Corporation to relocate the Rectifier on Mary Drive was held and approved by the town council. A Rectifier is an electrical device that converts an alternating current into a direct one by allowing a current flow through it in one direction. The Rectifier needs to be moved for the expansion of the ADOT Highway 60 project.

Discussion and possible approval of a letter of support on proposed changes to the Tonto National Forest Recreation Fees was tabled until the next meeting.

During the town manager's report, Margaret Gaston reported that the HURF funds that the state recently announced that it would withhold was less than reported. She said, "The maximum Superior would lose would be

\$8,000 to \$10,000. Superior is taking steps to correct this error."

Superior Police Department Officer Nuess spoke to the town council regarding an additional four officers that have been hired. Officer Nuess also discussed the return of evidence from the Superior Police Department. If you would like to find out if any evidence confiscated by the police department belongs to you, please contact the police department for information. Officer Nuess reported, "I was able to return \$420 that was in evidence from a break in to the rightful owners and the owners were happy and did not expect the return of these funds." Officer Nuess also discussed the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) program to fight to keep children safe from abduction and sexual exploitation and that Superior is the first in the State of Arizona to have this program out of 14 throughout the state. This program provides the resources needed to help protect children and prevent these devastating crimes committed against children.

The mayor and Superior Town Council want to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and look forward to a successful new year for the town. The town hall will be closed on Christmas and New Year's Day. The next regularly scheduled council meeting will be Jan. 8 at 7 p.m. Starting
