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Influenza activity increasing rapidly in Pinal County

The Arizona Department of Health Services announced last week that influenza activity is now widespread in Arizona.

Pinal County has also identified this recent trend upward in flu activity. As of Dec. 20, the Pinal County Public Health Department has confirmed 244 cases of influenza compared to 14 at this time last year. Pinal County also identified its first influenza related death of the season this week, an elderly resident of the county that passed away after being admitted to a local hospital.

"If you are thinking about getting a flu shot now is the time to do it," said Graham Briggs, Manager for Infectious Diseases and Epidemiology with Pinal County Public Health. "Since only the sickest people seek medical care when they have influenza our reported cases represent just a sliver of the overall activity occurring in our community."

The CDC recommends that everyone over the age of 6 months receive vaccination each season.

Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness and can lead to hospitalization and death. The flu virus spreads when someone with influenza coughs, sneezes, or talks. You can also catch influenza by touching a surface or object that the virus lands on and then touching your face. People at higher risk for severe disease include those with asthma, diabetes, pregnant women, people that may be immune-compromised and

Most primary care providers as well as pharmacies and other medical providers offer flu shots. Interested residents are also able to get influenza vaccination free of charge for all children under 18 years old, and at low or no cost for adults at Pinal County Public Health clinics.

Santa Claus makes annual Christmas Eve trek through

















Superior, delivering presents and joy to local children


event, all of the content has to be researched and that history must preserved for future generations.

Superior's history is kept, recorded and maintained by a non-profit organization known as the Superior Historical Society. The society was founded in the late 1980s after the Superior Museum Association closed. The Superior Historical Society worked with the Town of Superior to develop the Bob Jones Museum at 300 Main St. in Superior. The home of the museum was the home of former Governor Bob Jones, who was Arizona's sixth Governor. After much hard work and financial investment by donors to the museum, Superior finally had a home for the history of the community. Another project that the Superior Historical Society collaborated and constructed was the Mining History Trail and the Copper Corridor Ore Cart public art tribute to miners at the US 60 Park. As Superior becomes more of a visitor destination, the museum becomes a corner stone of of the downtown attractions. What does this organization need: The

historical museum is run completely by volunteers, their board members and members of the organization. Society President Richard Hing explained that the group needs more volunteers to help keep the museum open and help with fundraisers. Currently the only income that the museum received are the annual dues from members, profits from their cookbook and history DVD sales and donations that are received by visitors to the museum. Membership to the society is \$15 for individuals or \$20 for family memberships, annually. Members receive a monthly newsletter highlighting activities at the museum and Superior history. If you are interested in purchasing any of the Superior Historical Society items you can find them at the museum.

Maybe your New Year's resolution is to get more involved in the community or learn more about the Town. Consider volunteering with he Superior Historical Society.

The museum is open Wednesday, Friday and Saturday from noon to 3 p.m.

Santa Claus Years /

n April 6, 1917, America entered World War I. The war and the draft were not popular among the American people. It was a time of dissension and sacrifice. The American government passed laws suppressing free speech and civil rights. Through all of this, the Christmas spirit survived and old Saint Nicholas spread his Christmas cheer throughout the world. It was a time when the spirit of Christmas was needed for the many families that had loved ones fighting and dying in Europe. Here are a few ways that Santa Claus made the Arizona news of the times. GERMAN XMAS TOYS VERBOTEN read the Dec. 1 headline in an article in the Mohave County Miner newspaper. The article read in part: "Liberty toys are coming across the continent for the kiddies of the west. They are loyal Yankee toys, not an enemy alien among them."

"Time was when the mark 'made in Germany' was the proper credential for a toy in this country, but that is all gone now. German dolls are 'verboten'. Other countries are to busy for toy making, and if they weren't, ship space would be needed for something else. There will be no toys from the Orient because of the demand for steamers."

"But the Liberty toys, made by clever and nimble American fingers, Sammy Dolls, Red Cross Dolls, Pershing Dolls, and Hoover Dolls, are already arriving. These are troubulous days for the railroad, but the word has gone out that there must be no embargo against Santa Claus."

On Dec. 16, the Bisbee Review reported on local women preparing Christmas packages. "The Christmas boxes that are to carry clothing, stockings and little gifts across the U-boat haunted Atlantic to the children of France.' It was announced that the municipal Christmas tree would be put up again this year. It was explained about the importance of the tree especially during the troubled times. "There are several reasons why the municipal tree should be held this year, more than ever before, but the main reason is that it gives a great many children the

opportunity to get acquainted first hand with a certain personage whom they do not often have a chance to meet, that quaint old saint, Santa Claus.'

"Many Bisbee homes have been visited by the twin unwelcome guests, Hard Times and War Times. There will not be as much gaiety among the old folks this Christmas, and the children, who can't understand, feel vaguely that something has happened to upset their Christmas happiness." The Bank of Bisbee used Santa Claus to sell War Bonds under the heading "Send Santa Claus to the Front". The ad asked for people to buy the saving certificates to buy guns

antithesis of the Christmas spirit. In other ads, Albert Steinfeld and Company used Santa a bit more eloquently in getting people to shop at their downtown Tucson store. "No matter if conditions are changed materially, no matter if we are plunged deep in war and plunging deeper, the beautiful spirit of Christmas will prevail. If we cannot yet have Peace on Earth we can continue good will towards men and women." Overseas where the Christmas spirit was needed more than ever, American troops helped bring Christmas to some children in France with the help of Santa Claus. The Arizona Daily Star reported "The first of the Christmas concerts and entertainment for the children, especially the little

refugees, will be held in a theater in a town where the correspondents have their headquarters. There will be a Christmas tree presided over by Pere Noel, or Santa Claus, who on other days is an American officer. Any or all of the above-described lands may be exchanged if the values are equal As specified in the Act, if the value of the Federal land exceeds the value of the non-Federal lands, Resolution may equalize the values by making a cash payment or add additional land.

The FS and BLM propose to acquire land with floodplains associated with the Lower San Pedro River, Cave Creek, Tangle Creek, Turkey Creek and East Clear Creek The Act segregated the Federal lands from appropriation under the public land laws and mineral law.
