

Resolution Copper Mine Plan of Operations now available online

Resolution Copper Mining has posted its 1,000+ page Mine Plan of Operations on its company website, www. resolutioncopper.com.

"Posting the MPO to the website demonstrates our commitment to openly and transparently working with our neighboring communities and

stakeholders," said Andrew Taplin, project director. "Often. MPOs are not available for public review until the governing agency – in our case, the U.S. Forest Service – concludes its completeness review. This review is expected to take many months."

The plan was filed with the Forest





There will be winners in both the middle school and high school essay and speech categories.




