# Data Points Not Definitions

Much discussion is underway about what the 2015 AZMerit test results mean. I'm guessing they don't mean our students are failing, that our schools are less effective, or that our teachers don't care. Rather, they reflect the raising of the bar and should direct us, not define us. Better scores could after all, mean bettereducated students or just an over-thetop focus on test taking. Likewise, higher teacher salaries could indicate more experienced, higher quality teachers or it could mean that the

district must pay more to attract teachers to their location. The bottom line is that we must not give data points more power than they deserve.

As the Pinal County Chair to the Arizona School Boards Association, I've been to all but one of the districts attending board meetings, meeting key players and touring the campuses. What I saw across the board, were caring professionals who want all their students to succeed. Yes, some of our districts have been more successful with testing than others. Districts with the lowest poverty rates and percentage of students on the free and reduced lunch program,

generally did best. More proof that socio-economic status is the greatest indicator of success in school. With few exceptions, the larger districts also did better. Likely reasons include more flexibility in the application of resources and the ability to attract more skilled leadership and teaching talent. This is not to say that smaller, more rural districts don't have very talented people. I know they do. But, school leaders, like any others, generally work their way up to larger districts and with experience, often comes the ability to produce better results.

# Dracle's Most Famous Christmas

ithout a doubt the most famous Christmas in the history of Oracle, Arizona would be the one which took place in 1912. The reason for all the commotion was the international celebrity who played Santa Claus.

"Buffalo Bill" as he was known or William F. Cody, was one of the more colorful real life characters in the history of the Old West. Buffalo Bill was a pony express rider, buffalo hunter, scout, entrepreneur, Indian fighter, actor, and showman. At any given time 3 or 4 different larger than life tales were being serialized in the national newspapers and magazines. After the massacre of Custer's troops at the Battle of the Little Bighorn, Cody was pulled offstage by military forces to serve his nation as a scout. Cody quickly led the cavalry soldiers in an ambush of Cheyenne warriors and still wearing his stage costume of a black and red velvet vaquero outfit - Cody waved the bloody scalp, the first

taken in revenge of Custer, above his head. His wild west shows played to sold out shows across the world, including royal audiences in Europe before kings and

William F. Cody was a frequent visitor to the Mountain View Hotel in Oracle. Eventually he invested in the area, owning Campo Bonito and the High Jinks Mine. It was in the winter of 1912 that Cody portrayed Santa Claus for the Oracle schoolchildren. Santa Claus was a role the veteran actor was well suited for. He had long flowing white hair and a white beard which trailed neatly trimmed from his chin. His natural charisma put a twinkle in his eye and most of the children were already in awe of both his legendary and historical personas.

The scene is described in Pipe Dreams, Stories of Buffalo Bill and included in Paradise Found by Kathy Alexander.

"Children and parents came from all directions through

the mountain passes and trails, some on horses, some on burros, in wagons and all sorts of conveyances... Promptly at noon, the arrival of Santa Claus in Campo Bonito was announced and he appeared by

the Christmas tree. The words of Santa Claus, although spoken in kindly tones, were strange to all present and not until afterwards was it learned that the greetings of Santa Claus were in the tongue of the Sioux Indians and told of the Sioux conception of the Great Spirit that sent Santa Claus to gladden the hearts of the



# Interpreting Blood Tests

aboratory testing is a valuable tool in medicine. It can provide important clues about our health. We are, in essence, a vast chemical soup. The composition of this soup is a reflection of what we take into our bodies and what our bodies do with these outside chemicals (food, drink, pills, smoke, etc., etc.). This information can direct our attention to the various organs and functions that are most associated with the chemicals tested. A typical "screening blood test" looks at red and white blood cells, minerals, enzymes and, occasionally, some hormones.

A typical report is laid out according to the most influential organs involved in a group of tests. For example, there may be 3-5 electrolytes (minerals) that are grouped together to help evaluate the kidneys. These include sodium,

potassium, and chloride. All tests are listed with a reference range next to them that indicates what that lab believes should be the normal values for those tests. For example, the reference range for your hematocrit might read 40-50%. This means that for most individuals their red blood cells will comprise 40-50% of their overall blood volume (women might be a little less). If your percentage is less than the reference range you might look for anemia or blood loss. If it is larger than 50% it might mean that your body is compensating for low oxygen by making more red blood cells in order to deliver enough oxygen to survive. This is often the case with smokers.

The usual areas of interest that the typical blood test covers are red and white blood cells (RBC, WBC), differentiation of WBC's (neutrophils, lymphocytes, etc.), kidney function, liver

# Out of Body Experiences

ike the tales of many local residents about how they found Oracle, Peter Van Keuren's story is another one of lucky discovery, rather than focused planning.

In the pursuit of eclectic endeavors, Van Keuren found himself visiting the Triangle L Ranch one day in January 1975. He so much liked the community that he moved up here and has lived in town ever since.

Van Keuren states that this is the smallest town he has ever lived in, and he loves the welcoming and inclusive spirit of the Oracle community.

During our conversation, we discovered a shared interest in certain paranormal phenomena.

He tells of his extraordinary out of body experience (OOBE) as having taken place at night around the age of 28.

As a teenager, Van Keuren had been observed sleepwalking a couple of times by his parents. They would gently guide him back to bed without waking him up, and then tell him about it the next morning. He has no recollection of these events, except for what he was told.

However, the OOBE was different and he remembers it clearly. Sometime during the late hours before midnight, he found himself standing in front of the bedroom dresser. There was no mirror over the dresser. He looked down and saw his hands on the dresser and the thought occurred to him that he must be sleepwalking again.

As he turned around to head back to bed, he was startled to see his body lying there asleep. At that moment, he felt a strong grip in the back of his neck and he was flung toward the bed and slammed back into his body, with a jolt.

This was a very frightening experience to say the least. He was not able to sleep all night after that. He does not remember any voice or other sounds associated with this experience.

According to Van Keuren's subsequent research into out of body experiences told by other individuals, there appears to be a 'silver cord' connecting the spiritual body to the physical body. This ethereal cord is said to be fairly thick and subject to emotions when the spiritual body is in close proximity to the physical body. It may extend up to about 20-40 feet in length, or greater if persons are in control of their emotions. Theoretically, the silver cord can stretch to infinity. However, if the 'silver cord' detaches or is somehow cut, the physical body dies.

Apparently there are some individuals who claim to manipulate an OOBE at will. This facility is reported to be achieved through control of one's emotions. Research data tells us that OOBEs usually occur spontaneously, for no known rhyme or reason that we can understand.

The interesting thing about Van Keuren's experience is the fact that he did not indulge in any opiates or alcohol prior to the event, nor were there any particular stressors in his life at that time. He only remembers being quite tired when going to bed that night.

It has turned out to be a once-in-alifetime experience that never repeated itself throughout his whole life.

He further mentions that there are persons who find themselves in colocation, being in two different locations at the same time. This is faintly reminiscent of the mind control experiments conducted in the USSR during the last century for purposes of espionage.

In his spare time, Van Keuren attends meetings of the ManKind Project in Tucson, mentoring new members. The ManKind Project supports a global network of over 1,000 peer-facilitated men's groups serving close to 10,000 men each week. Its 'New Warrior Training Adventure' has been described by many participants as the most powerful men's training available.

The MKP empowers men to missions of service, supporting men to make a difference in the lives of others – men, women, and children around the world.



function (ALT, AST), cholesterol and sugar metabolism (glucose). Unless otherwise directed by specific symptoms, this group of tests is usually adequate to point out problem areas.

Some screening blood tests also include indicators of inflammation (sedimentation rate) to catch degenerative processes like arthritis, hardening of the arteries and autoimmune conditions. They may also include a hormone test (TSH) for the thyroid, as this particular gland is becoming more commonly associated with problems. This is an example of a feedback hormone such that if the result is high it is an indication that the thyroid is low functioning (hypo-thyroid) and if the Thyroid Stimulating Hormone is low the thyroid is high functioning or there is an outside source of thyroid hormone.

Occasionally a report will also include blood typing. This is a reflection of the unique makeup of your body's cells. All the cells in your body, including red blood cells, have several hundred different types of markers populating their walls. These markers determine how compatible the cells are with surrounding cells and chemicals. Blood typing identifies two (A/B/O and Rh factor) of the more than 400 markers on a cell.

It is a good idea to keep a copy of your blood tests for your home records. This will insure access to them in the future. Blood tests represent a snap shot in time. It is very helpful to compare the results of any instant in time with those of other times to get a better picture of what changes are occurring.



This year, Mr. Claus has given us permission to accept letters through our Facebook page (www.Facebook.com/


CopperArea). Just send us a private message (PM) with your child's letter to Santa. Please be sure to include the town where you live so we can publish it in the right newspaper.
