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





Suspect booked for negligent homicide following shooting in Oracle

On Saturday, Jan. 11, 2014 at 8:22 p.m., the Pinal County Sheriff's Office received a 9-1-1 call from a female who said she shot somebody because she was being stabbed.

Deputies arrived at the residence in the 800 block of Evergreen Road in Oracle within two minutes of the call being dispatched. Deputies knocked on the front door to the residence but nobody answered. They opened the front door and yelled into the residence and still nobody answered. While searching the residence for the shooting victim, they discovered both the shooter and victim in the dining room.

The adult female victim was lying on her back and the female who shot her was kneeling over her. The victim was given Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) by deputies until medical personnel arrived at the home and took over. Unfortunately the victim was pronounced deceased a short time later.

The reporting party, who was also the shooter, was identified as Leanor Guitard, 55. The deputies also seized a .357 Smith and Wesson revolver which was used by Guitard to shoot the victim. Guitard told deputies the female was breaking into her house and she shot her. Guitard also said she was being beaten up by the female friend she shot.


Guitard was transported to a substation to be interviewed by homicide detectives. When

detectives attempted to question her she declined to answer any questions. Guitard did not have any signs of physical injuries nor were any knives located around the victim. Guitard was booked into the Pinal County Jail for one count of Negligent Homicide.

"According to investigators, Leanor Guitard was so intoxicated she was difficult to understand and had to be assisted when she walked," said Sheriff Paul Babeu. "Guitard is the only person who now knows why she shot her friend. She gave investigators conflicting information as far as what occurred. This case is a tragic reminder of how quickly a life can be taken by those who handle firearms irresponsibly."



FRED LITTAU

Fred Littau was already a veteran basketball and football coach with an outstanding record when he arrived in

San Manuel in 1960. His football teams in South Dakota provided him with a coaching record of 80 wins, 25 losses and 2 ties. His basketball teams won 313 and lost 80. His basketball teams were state champions in 1955 and consolation champs in 1949 and 56. The football stadium in San Manuel, Littau Field is named for him. His contributions to SMHS athletics were many.

After leaving San Manuel and returning to his hometown of Superior, he continued his coaching career. His 1974 Panther team were 3A State Champions and the 1975 team were 2A state runners-up losing to Florence 67-63. He is a member of the Superior High School Hall of Fame. After coaching 31 years, 10 in San Manuel and 21 in Superior, his teams provided him an overall record of 333 wins and 240 losses.

He was a two year First Team College All-American performing a rare feat by making it as a defensive guard one year and as an offensive tackle the following year. In 1963 he was drafted by both the National Football League (NFL) and the American Football League (AFL). The NFL Minnesota Vikings drafted him in the 16th round and the AFL Oakland Raiders chose him in round 20. Rex signed with the Raiders. Rex played defensive tackle and end during his career, starting numerous games. He was traded along with a draft choice to the Denver Broncos at the end of the 1966 season for cornerback Willie Brown and quarterback Mickey Slaughter. Willie Brown would go on to become a member of the National Football League Hall of Fame. Rex would end his career playing for the Boston Patriots (New England Patriots) in 1970.

Small community students have great big hearts

San Manuel Miner Students from the Mammoth-San Manuel School District have been participating in a community service learning program that benefits others as well as themselves. The Hoops for Heart program is an educational and fundraising program

that teaches kids the importance of developing heart-healthy habits, the fun of being physically active and that raising funds to support heart research helps save lives in their community as well as around the world. The kids learn basketball skills and how being physically active along with good nutrition can help them live longer healthier lives. It promotes community service and teaches children about helping others.

Hoops for Hearts is organized and managed by the American Heart Association. They partner with schools to educate children and raise money for cardiovascular research. The American Heart Association/ American Stroke Association supports close to \$12 million per year on pediatric research and millions more on the study of childhood obesity. Research funded by the American Heart Association has led to most of the major cardiovascular disease developments of

the 20th century. These developments/discoveries include heart and brain medications, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), AEDs, microsurgery, transplant technology, prevention measures and much more.

The Hoop for Hearts program was coordinated by Mike Sloan. Some of the fourth, fifth and sixth graders from First Avenue Elementary and Mammoth STEM school participated in the event. Participation in the fundraiser is voluntary. The students are divided into teams by classroom. There is one week of promoting the fundraiser and then a week where the kids raise money and shoot basketball free throws. In one week's time the school raised \$2,643. Mike said that Teresa Hogue, district representative was amazed at the amount that the community raised considering the economic times and size of the area. Usually schools this small raise five or six hundred dollars which is considered

good. In three years the students of the Mammoth-San Manuel Unified School District have raised over \$8,000.

The competition between classrooms was won by Parish's fifth grade class. The competition included the amount of money raised plus the number of free throws made in a thirty minute period. Parish's class was rewarded with a pizza party. The top fundraisers for First Avenue Elementary were Tori Medina, Reggie Romo and Vince Nguyen. The top fundraiser at Mammoth Elementary was Hannah Smallhouse. Mike Sloan said he would like to thank the community for their generosity. In a letter to the principal from the American Heart Association, they said, "We can't continue to make a difference in people's lives without the help of our students, their families and moreover, through our schools. Thank you!"
