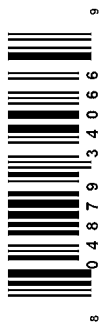

Midseason report: past, present and future of Copper Area Basketball Teams

As most, if not all, Copper Area high school basketball teams and players enjoy a break in the schedule and from classes, let's take a look how the teams and players have fared at what can be considered the season's midpoint.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Hayden Lobos

Record (Overall, Region): 2-10, 1-5

Next game: Jan. 7, 2020 at Baboquivari

Notes: The Lobos season so far has been one of streaks, unfortunately, two losing streaks sandwiched around a modest two-game winning streak. After starting the season with six-straight losses, the Lobos defeated Ray (65 – 48) and Immaculate Heart (53 – 48) before losing four-straight,

including a 59 – 50 defeat at Globe in the Copper City Tournament on Dec. 27.

Ray Bearcats

Record: 1-11, 0-5

Next game: Jan. 9, 2020 at Leading Edge Academy

Notes: The Cats lone win to this point of their schedule was on Dec. 2, a 59 – 50 victory against Immaculate Heart. They've dropped seven-straight games since, including a 49 – 46 loss at Superior in one of their final games before the break.

San Manuel Miners

Record: 10-2, 4-1

Next game: Jan. 7, 2020 vs Miami

Notes: The Miners have shown to be a legitimate state title contender, finishing as the runner-up in the preseason Boyd Baker Tournament. As a matter of fact, the only team to beat the Miners so far

has been St. Augustine Catholic, which it did in consecutive games, including the championship game of the Boyd Baker Tournament. Since those losses, the Miners have won five-straight games, including a couple of lopsided victories against Santa Rita (64 – 37) and Globe (78 – 48) before the break.

Three players are averaging more than 10 PPG – Javy Tamayo, Jose Moreno and Caleb Quintero.

Team Leaders: Points – Javy Tamayo, 13.8; Rebounds – Gabe Pinedo, 7.8; Assists – Jose Moreno, 2.8; Steals – Benny Laguna, 2.6.

Superior Panthers

Record: 4-6, 2-1

Next game: Jan. 6, 2020 vs St. David

Notes: The Panthers won only one of their first six games but have won 3 of their last

four, including their last two before the break – Ray (49 – 46) and Hayden (79 – 67).

A long football season is partially responsible for the Panthers slow start to their basketball season, but that start figures to give way to strong finish as the second half of the season commences.

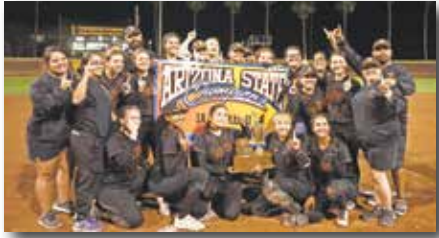

A Decade of Transformation: A review of the archives

Staff at the Superior Sun took some time over the holidays to compile some of the highlights of the past decade. Without a doubt the past 10 years have been transformational for Superior. We hope that you enjoy this glimpse into the past 10 years. It is impossible to capture every detail, as much as we would like to. Groups, Organizations, Community Development

Reviewing the decade of archives, showcased Little League ball players won multiple district and state titles. The Little League made significant improvements to the field and, with the support of Resolution Copper, grass was installed at the field in 2011. Those athletes in Little League went on to be Junior and Senior High State Championship winners in Softball, Baseball and Football. The Boys basketball team went on an unexpected winning spree in 2016 which took the team to the semi-finals in basketball. Without a doubt, throughout the past decade Superior has celebrated their local student athletes.

Student groups like DECA and FCCLA participated in State and National competitions. Superior High School had two students who competed in the DECA International Competitions. Robotics programs were offered for a few years but couldn't be sustained.

Early in the decade, the leadership at the Town of Superior championed the economic diversification. Community volunteers chaired many committees to clean up the town. By 2013 over a million pounds of trash had been removed from the Town through community clean up days. The Superior Substance Abuse Coalition hosted many events and helped to bring awareness to the community on substance abuse prevention. While the Superior Substance Abuse Coalition does not exist in its original form, many of the events they created have continued and a regional group has been formed and funded. A Trails group morphed into the Legends of Superior Trails Inc.

Longtime organizations like the Chamber of Commerce and the Optimist Club continued to

flourish and add activities for the community. The Prickly Pear festival made its debut in 2012 and continues to be part of the events. The Optimist Club added the Magma Royale event, which adds to the community fun in the Summer. The Chamber developed a sub committee called the Business Attraction Retention Committee which helped to develop work plans to combat blight, promote Superior and add more art to Superior. Murals have been painted, roofs have started to be re-done and many more ads have been placed to promote Superior. The Rotary Club and VFW lent their support across the community, with the VFW taking a leading role in mentoring youth and hosting the annual Halloween event.

Many businesses opened, some closed, some opened in this decade and are continuing to grow. Legacy businesses like Dairy Queen and Leo's Market closed over the past 10 years, leaving only the memories of these special places. Some businesses have transformed such as the Copper Gecko which morphed into Rose's Roses and is now the Sunflour Market which moved down the street. Our local grocery store Save Money Market has transformed, adding modern payment options like Apple Pay and their social media meat box specials have become well known across the state. Local merchants started the Second Friday events downtown and it has started its 5th season. A brand new Circle K opened in a new location in 2016 and Farmers Market moved into the old Circle K. Random Boutique opened downtown and over the years they have been joined by other boutiques and art galleries. Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center opened its new clinic on the highway in 2012 and in 2019 the Hotel Magma and the Barmacy opened to the public after a decade of planning and construction.

The community rallied around events raising money for Cancer research by supporting the Superior has Heart event in the early 2010-2015 and the Superior High School FCCLA still continues their Cancer Fight by Candlelight event each year.

The Legends of Superior Trails celebrated its first grand opening in 2011 of the desert gateway segment, only to have it closed in 2014 when the highway was expanded. The trail re-opened in 2019. The Caboose Visitor Center at the US 60 park opened in 2011. The LOST became a 501c3 non-profit organization in 2015 and has continued to play an active role in promoting and advocating for trail development in Superior. The Town and Resolution Copper signed an agreement to open the old US 60 road as part of the LOST trail system.

Schools and Education

Leadership at the school changed a few times



over the decade. Pete Guzman retired in 2013 and was replaced by Patrick O'Donnell who worked for the district until 2015. Stephen Estatico was hired in 2015 and is currently the top administrator for the school district. The District faced many challenges over the decade from reduced funding from the state and in 2010 the community rallied to install new football lighting after a storm blew the lights over. In 2019 the School District signed a multi-year funding agreement with Resolution Copper to help support the school.

Leadership on the school board remained consistent over the decade, as members retired new members were appointed/elected. The community remained supportive of the school district by supporting override elections. In 2011 the District sold the Roosevelt School to the Town of Superior.

Superior Headstart played a critical role in the community as the primary pre-k program. They made field trips to the post office and the Resolution Copper Main Street office. Community leaders dropped in and over this decade we watched the youth of our community transition from pre-schoolers to high schoolers.



Infrastructure

US Highway 60 was expanded to four lanes through Superior and the highway opened in 2016. This section completed the US 60 improvement project which had been an ongoing project for almost 20 years.

Pot holes and road maintenance remain a top priority for the Town of Superior, Main Street, Magma Avenue, Panther Drive and Sunset drive were paved throughout the decade. Tesla charging stations were installed in 2019 and the

food court park was remodeled through grants the town received. The skate park was opened at the pool in 2010. The town completed a major cleanup mandated by ADEQ at the Transfer Station in 2016.

The Belmont building was repaired using Brownfields funding and the Town started a clean and lien program to help clean abandoned properties. The Town allocated its CDBG funding to repairing the Magma Club and Waste Water Treatment Plant and in 2017 the funding was directed to developing a comprehensive capital improvement plan for the parks.

Political Leadership

Over the past decade, there were many political changes at the Town level. Michael Hing ended his tenure as Mayor in 2011 after a recall election against Jayme Valenzuela. Hing served for 11 years on the council, nine were as Mayor. A recall election following the Town's cancellation of their support for the Resolution Copper Land Exchange, had Councilmember Soyla "Kiki" Peralta running against Mila Besich for Council. Besich won the recall in 2013 and completed Peralta's term. In 2016 the community recalled Mayor Valenzuela after he admitted to using the Town's debit card at casinos. Besich won and was the first direct-elect woman Mayor in Superior.

In 2013 Michael Alonzo and Stephen Estatico were elected to the Town Council, they were re-elected in 2018 when they ran unopposed along with Mayor Besich. In 2016, Olga Lopez was re-elected to the Superior Town Council for her fourth term. Bruce Armitage and Vanessa Navarrette were elected to their first terms on the Superior Town Council in 2016.

The Town had multiple town managers during this decade which started with Melanie Oliver and deputy manger Lou Digiralomo. They were followed by interim manger Rita Wentzel who was then replaced by Margaret Gaston. Fire Chief Todd Pryor and former Police Chief David Neuss served as interim Town Managers until the Council voted to hire Todd Pryor permanently.

Serious Challenges & A Focus on the Future

The Town faced many serious challenges over the past 10 years, including mounting Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) imbalances. Those imbalances and lack of completed audits caused the state of Arizona to withhold transportation excise taxes. The funds were eventually returned to the Town after the Town repaid the balance and the Town continues to put as many resources as possible to improve road conditions.

The Council considered contracting police services to Pinal County, that was voted

down by the Council in 2014. In 2017 and 2018 the Council grappled with many issues surrounding the Superior Police Department and in 2019 after an exhaustive search the Council hired Frank Alanis as the new police chief.

By 2017 all of the audits were caught up and for 2017, 2018, and 2019 the Council received clean audits.

The Town of Superior approved two multi-year agreements with Resolution Copper to develop a multi-generational center and an entrepreneur/innovation center. As 2019 comes to a close, the architectural designs and service contracts are being put into place for these two projects.

Resolution Copper

The archives highlighted the development of the Resolution Copper project, including the clean up of historic mining operations and in 2018 the historic Magma smelter was torn down. The number 10 shaft was completed in 2014 and was sunk to 6,943 feet below the Earth's surface. During the first few years of the decade, Congress was working to approve the Southeast Arizona Land Exchange. The land exchange was finally approved in December of 2014 when the late Senator John McCain was instrumental in attaching the bill to the National Defense Authorization Act. In 2019, the Tonto National Forest released the Draft Record of Decision that will give the final Record of Decision to complete the land exchange.

The project brought great media and political attention to Superior. Senator

McCain made several visits to Superior along with Representatives Anne Kirkpatrick and Paul Gosar. Interior Secretary Tom Vilsack visited in 2010.

In 2013 the company learned that it would need to find a new location for the tailing dams. This came as a big concern to the community who anticipated the tailing would be placed at the Pinto Valley mine, which was slated for closure. The company created the Community Working Group (CWG) which is managed by Godec and Associates. The CWG was tasked with helping to find solutions to critical issues surrounding the development of the mine. The CWG continues to maintain an important role in the development of the mine.

Resolution Copper also experienced many leadership changes. David Salisbury retired in 2010; he was followed by John Cherry who served as Vice President of Resolution Copper until Andrew Taplin arrived at the project. Andrew Lye was appointed the project director in 2016 and continues to serve in that role.

How it all gets done

Volunteers continue to be a driving force behind the transformation and as the community has become stronger, so has the base of volunteers and the projects they take on. The St. Francis Catholic Church, the Latter-day Saints Ward and the Jehovah Witness Hall all received major remodels in the last 10 years. Veto Cervantes has built benches that are now iconic to many local homes and businesses, he has also led many major community beautification projects.
