Joe Duarte Rios



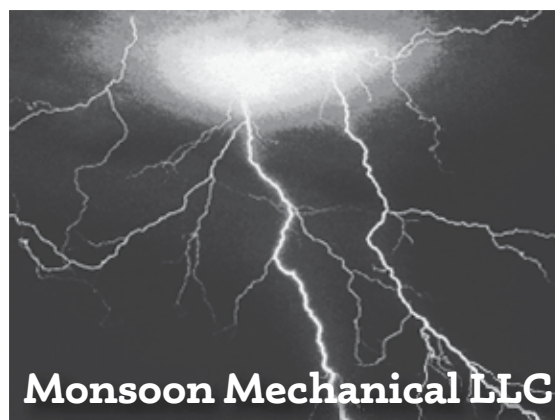
On Monday, Jan. 4, 2021, Joe Duarte Rios, beloved brother, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, uncle, and friend, passed away at the age of 73 from complications related to COVID-19.

He supported those in his family who held political office and served as a delegate to five Democratic National Conventions. Joe also donated his time to be a baseball coach for many years. It was obvious from his stories, which he told for decades, how much those teams and players meant to him. Joe loved hunting, horses, the outdoors, and had an obsession for classic cars. His creative talent allowed him to draw and paint impressive pictures. He also enjoyed playing the guitar and carving animals out of wood. Joe cherished old photos of his family, often spending hours on the computer making sure those images live on. Joe had a strong connection to his Catholic faith. For many years of retirement, he donated his time and effort to the church. Above all, Joe's most meaningful passion was for his family. Whether it was a weekend or a holiday, he wanted to be at the house of a brother or sister, where he always looked forward to the next game of Trivial Pursuit. Christmas was always about time with family and then mass. His love for his family lives on in those who knew and loved him.

Joe was preceded in death by his father, Santiago, his mother, Angela, his brothers Manuel, Chente, Tony, Jimmy, and his sisters Helen, Maria, Carmen, Jenny, and Emmie.

Joe is survived by his brothers, Peter and Tommy; sisters, Ruth and Angelita; four children, Annette, Joe Jr., Kenny, and Danielle; 11 grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, many other relatives, and Evangeline, to whom he was married for 37 years before they went their separate ways.

Calls will only be accepted during the date and time listed above. Please do not leave any messages in attempt to apply to the waiting list as messages will not be returned and you will not be placed on the waiting list.

Please be prepared to provide the legal name, social security number, and birthdate for yourself and each of your household members. Additional information that will be collected will include; mailing address, email, and phone number. You will also be asked if you qualify for any of the waiting list preference points, which include; being elderly or disabled, homeless, an armed force veteran, or victim of Domestic Violence. Please make sure to have all the required information ready to provide to the Agent. 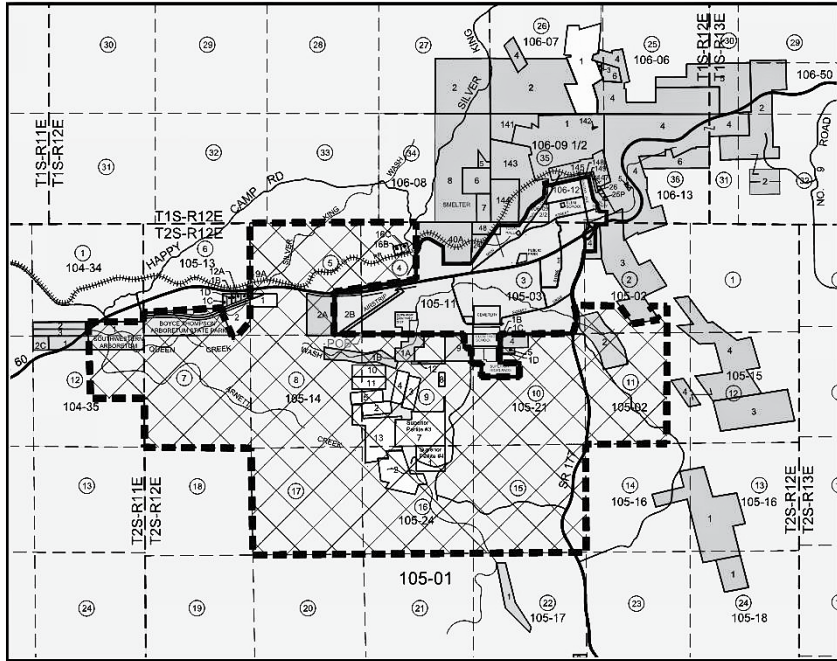

Superior Town Council approves annexation

The Superior Town Council held a special meeting last week to complete the annexation process and approve a resolution expanding the Town's boundaries by 6,000 acres. Following the unanimous approval by the council, the resolution was recorded at Pinal County. The boundary expansion will be official 30 days after the document was recorded.

For almost two decades the Town of Superior has been attempting annexation to expand the Town's boundaries but had been unable to secure the necessary signatures within the timeline required by state law. This completed annexation will grow the town from two square miles to 12 square miles to the south and west of the current Town boundaries. The annexation will allow the town to have room to grow but also protect recreation areas important to both residents and visitors.

The annexation required a majority percentage of the the property owners and utility infrastructure owners to sign off on the annexation allowing them to be included into the Town's municipal boundaries. The annexation includes the Boyce Thompson Arboretum, the Castleberry ranch property currently owned by Resolution Copper, the Imerys operation, and several acres that are owned by private property owners including 40 acres owned by the Superior Unified School District. Voters in Superior

approved the sale of the acreage by the school district.

In addition the Town was able to annex the properties that they will be able to purchase following the final approval of the Southeast Arizona Land Exchange properties proposed by Resolution Copper, these are properties that are adjacent to the Superior Municipal Airport.

"We are very proud of this accomplishment" explained Mayor Mila Besich. "This has required a great deal of tenacity on behalf of our staff and the trust from the property owners to allow us to annex them, most importantly, it is an honor to finally have our legacy attraction the Boyce Thompson Arboretum officially in our community."

Off again, on again for AIA and winter sports

The screen of the virtual AIA Executive Board hearing, live-streamed on YouTube, started filling up. Board members, athletic directors, coaches and other officials joined the hearing on Jan. 12. Quietly muted screens waited to find out if the Jan. 8 vote to cancel winter sports would be reversed.

On Jan. 7, the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee or SMAC recommended cancelling the winter sports season.

“Unfortunately, it is expected that the state will see a continued rise in Covid-19 hospitalizations for some time. As medical professionals, we cannot in good conscience recommend that students engage in a winter season under the current conditions,” said SMAC Committee Chair Dr. Wilson in the recommendation to the AIA Executive Board.

The Jan. 8 vote to cancel the winter sports season passed narrowly, 5-4.

During last week’s special meeting, AIA Board Members expressed their concerns for a canceled season, one of them being a worry that athletes will join other leagues or clubs.

“I do believe that canceling the winter sports in our high-schools does not provide the stop [to Covid-19] that SMAC is trying for. In-fact, much like when you dam a river, the water has to go somewhere, and the same is true of our students. We can cancel winter sports in the high-schools, but that will not stop our athletes from participating,” said board member Jeannine Brandel during the virtual hearing.

Four other board members agreed that canceling the winter season could lead to future problems with student athletes joining third-party athletic programs or other leagues. Another concern is that these other clubs and leagues might not be as concerned with enforcing health and safety regulations, like the AIA would. The other four board members stood by their previous vote to cancel the winter season, under the concerns of health risks for athletes, staff & faculty, and their communities.

In the end, after a 5-4 vote, the Jan. 8 decision was overturned, and the winter sports season is back on. Although, much like everything else in recent times, this winter sports season will not be like previous ones.

This year’s winter sports season will see a handful of health and safety regulations attached to it. All officials, coaches, and student-athletes will be required to wear a cloth-mask or gaiter throughout the entire event. Competing schools will need to have completed AIA COVID-19 Athlete/Coach Monitoring Forms the day of each game/event. Spectators have been limited up to two parents/legal guardians for home events, provided it’s in co-ordinance with county and school regulations. If any participating schools fail to comply with the new mandatory modifications they risk losing access to AIA officiating. All of these modifications were added in an attempt to help minimize the spread of Covid-19.

The winter sports season will begin Jan. 18. Even though

some might not get a chance to watch their favorite school sports team perform this season, continued support is always helpful. Purchasing team merchandise or contributing to fundraisers are just a few ways to show support this season. Let’s hope for a safe and successful winter sports season.

Copper Area News attempted to contact local athletic directors for comment, but as of press time, none had reached out.

Copper Area News is committed to providing our readers with as much information as possible. This graph shows the positive cases as of press time on Jan. 19, 2021. We have also included a graph showing the daily counts for the past week. Daily statewide case counts are recording higher than they were during the last peak this Summer and hospitals are becoming overwhelmed by COVID-19 patients.

There are a few points we would like our readers to consider when following this data.

1. This will continue to be a rolling total of positive cases. It does not reflect recoveries or deaths. The Arizona Department of Health Services does not break out this data.
2. If you see a reduction in numbers from day to day it is most likely due to a data entry error or mis-coding of a zip code (at the state level).
3. This is all zip code based data; most of our zip codes include unincorporated areas. There is no way to track exactly which areas each of the positive cases are. Example, Kearny and Winkelman each have small communities in their zip code that are not in the Town’s incorporated boundaries.
4. If you live in Gila County, please follow the Gila County Health and Emergency Management, Facebook. They have maintained their data on recoveries and current positive cases.
5. You can follow other data such as ICU bed use, Ventilator use and hospital capacity online: <https://bit.ly/3inh280>

Working together, we can slow the spread of the virus across the Copper Corridor. Wear a mask in public, remain physically distant (6ft apart or more) and practice good hygiene (wash your hands frequently, sanitize high touch areas), stay home if you are not feeling well.

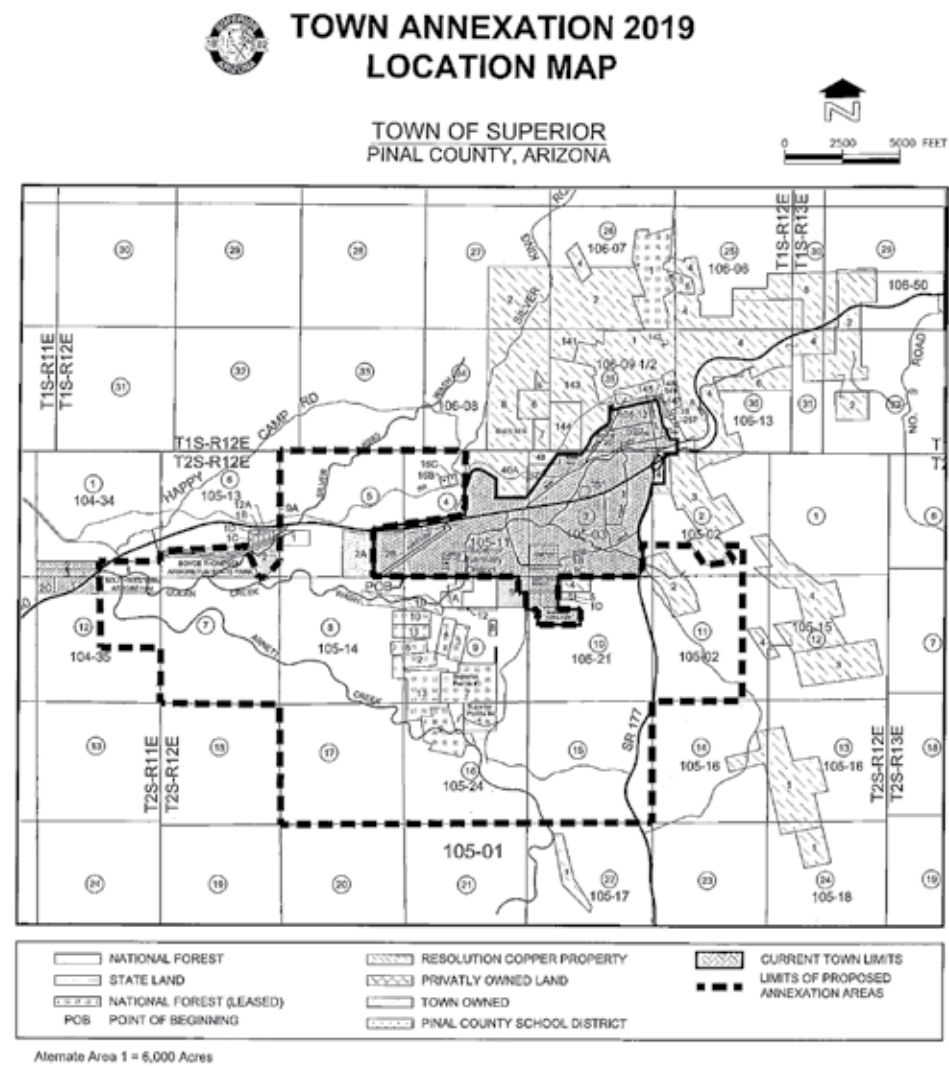

Final Environmental Assessment on Resolution Copper Project
Tonto National Forest officials announce the release of a final environmental impact statement (FEIS) for the Resolution Copper Project and Land Exchange. The FEIS discloses the potential environmental effects from the disposition of National Forest System land and development of the proposed Resolution Copper Mine near Superior, Arizona.

The FEIS analyzes several alternatives to the proposed action submitted to the Tonto National Forest by Resolution Copper Mining, LLC (Resolution Copper), and identifies Alternative 6 – Skunk Camp as the preferred alternative. The FEIS also identifies mitigation measures, both required and voluntary, that would minimize, reduce, or offset impacts from the proposed project.

The Tonto National Forest also prepared a draft Record of Decision (ROD) that documents the U.S. Forest Service's decision to issue a roads use permit and special use authorizations for pipeline and power line corridors associated with the Resolution Copper Project as described by the preferred alternative, Alternative 6 – Skunk Camp. How to file an objection, and time frame

This proposed project is subject to the objection process pursuant to 36 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 218 Subparts A and B. Objections to the Resolution Copper Project will only be accepted from those who have previously submitted timely comments regarding this project proposal during a designated opportunity for public comment, unless based on information not available during an earlier designated opportunity for public comment (i.e., new information).

Objections on the Resolution Copper Project must be submitted within 45 calendar days following the publication of the legal notice in the Arizona Capitol Times. The date the legal notice is published in the Arizona Capitol Times is the exclusive means for calculating the time to file an objection. We anticipate this publication to occur on or about January 15, 2021. We will post a copy of the published notice on our website (above) once received.

Those wishing to object should not rely upon dates or time frame information provided by any other source. A timely submission will be determined by USPS postmark; the agency's electronically generated posted date and time for email and facsimiles; or shipping date for delivery by private carrier. It is the responsibility of the sender to ensure timely receipt of any objections submitted. The regulations at 36 CFR 218 prohibit extending the time to file an objection.

Eligible objections must be filed, in writing, with the reviewing officer of the project, and must be open to public inspection during the objection process. Specific written comments are written comments within the scope of the proposed action, with a direct relationship to the proposed action, and include supporting reasons for the responsible official to consider. 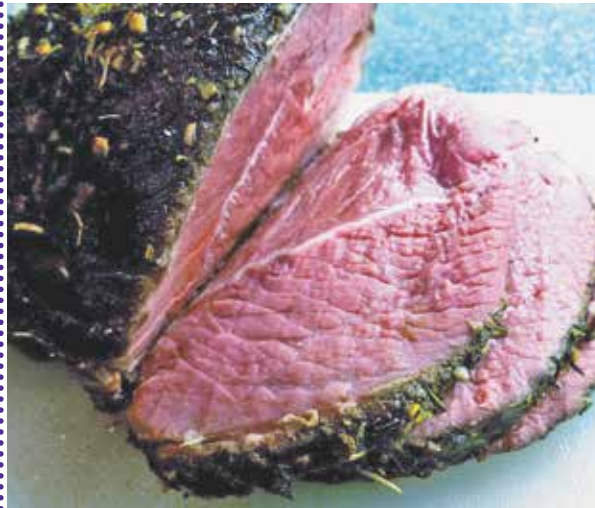
