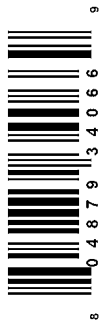

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Local residents participate in study on time

In today's lifestyle, we live busy lives often bouncing from one activity to the next, our cars, and electronic devices help to speed us along faster than any generation before. A life where time seems to move faster and faster each year, however, have you ever asked yourself what does time mean to you? Is time just a tool we use to conduct our work and create success, is time more of a precious commodity that we monitor closely and use it to spend time with those we love? Is time really infinite and no matter what your beliefs are, will time continue on long after you stop breathing?

That was a discussion that 25 Superiorites had recently when Dr. Joaquin Trujillo presented his first article for his study on everyday meaning in small town America. His first article is titled: The Everyday Comprehension of Death and its Potentiality for Meaningfulness. Trujillo explained that his analysis yielded three observations. "The common tendency to reject death appears

to be grounded in the affirmation of life as much if not more than the flight from death," said Trujillo. "Although the affirmation of life appears to underlie the everyday rejection of death, it also alienates us from basic elements of life, including the body, our primary relation with the world, and our given task and responsibility to be. Also, insofar as we reject death as a meaning-generating function and essential characteristic of human life, we tend to dehumanize others, dislocate our comprehension of existence, and diminish life's potentiality for meaningfulness." Trujillo is preparing to submit the paper to a peer-reviewed academic journal for publication.

Trujillo began his research in late 2010 and early 2011, he interviewed 39 residents of Superior about their beliefs on time, death and nothingness. These initial interviews will be part of a more inclusive ethnography of everyday meaning in small town America. Trujillo initially found Superior while motorcycling through the area in 2009 while

on a leave from service with the United States State Department. To conduct his research Trujillo moved into the community and immersed himself in the life of the community, hiring a local residents

to assist him with the facilitating the research needed to prepare this project.

The presentation was coordinated with the assistance of Superior Library Director, Josie Campos, and Library Assistant, Tony Solis. During the presentation

Dr. Trujillo thanked Superiorites for their support completing the research and expressed special thanks to Mila Besich-Lira, JoAnn Besich, Anthony Acosta, and Leslie Martin for facilitating the interviews. This paper represented the first part

of Dr. Trujillo's Superior Research Project studying everyday meaning in small town American life.

During his presentation Dr. Trujillo also commented on the improvements he has seen in the community since he first encountered Superior in 2009.

Manny Ruiz makes another Hall of Fame

Manny Ruiz has received many honors for his accomplishments as a coach as well as his long time service to others over the years. He is in the Arizona Coaches Hall of Fame, Arizona Hispanic Hall of Fame, and Superior High School Hall of Fame. It came as no surprise to those in San Manuel who knew him as a teacher, friend and coach that he was selected to the San Manuel High School Hall of Fame in its second year of existence.

Before moving to Superior in 1967, "Coach" Ruiz taught school and coached in San Manuel from 1956 until 1966. He was head basketball coach 1956-66 and coached football from 1957-1966. His basketball teams qualified for state in 1963, 1964 and 1965. The '63 team finished second losing to a heavily favored Agua Fria team by two points.

A number of his former players in San Manuel attended the induction ceremony. One of his former players Rex Mirich was inducted with him. Rex graduated from San Manuel in 1959. Manny coached him in basketball and football. Rex is a two time college All American and a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. He played professional football for seven years with the Denver Broncos, Oakland Raiders and Boston Patriots. He also

has a connection to Superior. His father Nick Mirich and mother were long time residents. Rex attended grade school in Superior until moving to San Manuel when the Magma mine opened up around 1954-55.

A former player coached by Manny and a member of the San Manuel High School Athletic Hall of Fame, Greg Parker had some nice words to say about Coach Ruiz. These words echo many of the sentiments held by the young men that were lucky enough to have been influenced by him.

"We called him "Coach Ruiz" when we saw him in the gym (which was most of the time), school or downtown but he was so much more. Manny Ruiz was not only my best basketball coach, but he helped all of us that were lucky enough to be with him for our San Manuel High School years."

"A few of the spin offs from being with Coach Ruiz: We learned respect, responsibility, sportsmanship and love of the game. The best and most important thing I learned was by watching Coach Ruiz and how he handled life. How he handled mistakes, frustration with players, and how he managed pressure. What a great leader he is and always will be! We were so fortunate to be exposed to such a man! Here is a big thank you from one of your players. Congratulations on your Hall of Fame induction."

renovated by his grandson Chris and his wife Lori Ketron. The Ketrons have completed almost a full remodel of the 1956 ranch house. One signature piece of construction was the fireplace that had not been used in 30 years. The Ketrons used an old beam of wood found on the property to build the mantle and a screen found at the Copper Gecko completed the decor of the home.

The apartment of Valerie Macias was originally constructed by the late Andy Besich. While the overall construction and remodeling has been completed by Bill and Sue Anderson, Valerie has put many artistic touches in her home including a wide array of colors and fabrics that added much decorative flair to her home. On the tour this home was called the recycled house because when it was first built by Mr. Besich in the 1950s, he primarily used recycled materials from the mine. Valerie along with her father Tommy Macias created several wrought iron pieces to frame a door way.

Mr. and Mrs. Pat O'Donnell opened their home which most recently served as the art studio for the late artist Ms. Leslie West. West was a prolific artist who moved to Superior from California. Several of West's paintings were on display in the home. Originally West's studio belonged to the Besich family who sold the property to the Wests in the early '90s. The home was recently renovated and is being rented by the O'Donnell's. The two bedroom bungalow features a deck and rich dark wood floors and pained windows that showcase the views of Superior.

Insurance 'Marketplace' enrollment window closing soon for 2014; Sun Life offering free application help to community

CASA GRANDE – Are you still uninsured? Have you been dragging your feet in purchasing federally-mandated insurance through the “marketplace,” because you don’t understand how?

Sun Life Family Health Center can help, but your window of opportunity is swiftly closing. The initial open enrollment period for health coverage through the Marketplace for 2014 began on Oct. 1, 2013, and ends on Monday, March 31, 2014.

Sun Life has full-time Certified Application Counselors (CACs) staffed at each of its Pinal County locations in Casa Grande, Coolidge, Maricopa, Eloy, and San Manuel. CACs can help you navigate the Marketplace, discuss options, and assist you in your application process for coverage and potential tax credits. These services are absolutely free, and open to anyone. You may submit a Marketplace application at any

time during the year with a counselor’s help at Sun Life; but if you miss the March 31 deadline for 2014, you will not be able to enroll for insurance until the next specified enrollment period starting in October.

After the close date on March 31, marketplace insurance enrollment for 2014 will only be available to the general public during special periods. Those periods pertain to any of the following changes of situation:

- Loss of minimum essential coverage
- Termination of job-based coverage
- Change in job-based coverage (e.g., if it doesn’t meet minimum essential coverage standards)
- Marriage, divorce, birth, pregnancy, or adoption
- Change in income
- Enrollment error
- Change in citizenship (e.g., acquiring citizenship status) or qualifying immigration

status

- Violation of a contract by a health plan
 - Gain or loss of eligibility for premium tax credits or cost-sharing reductions, or change in level of cost-sharing reduction if the consumer is already enrolled in a qualified health plan (QHP) through the Marketplace
 - Relocation or change in address
 - Change in status as an American Indian or Alaska Native
 - Occurrence of other exceptional circumstance
- For those who are currently

uninsured and do not acquire insurance either privately or through the Marketplace for 2014 could face a \$95 fee at tax time per adult (or 1 percent of your annual family income, whichever is higher). Some exemptions are allowed.

For insurance coverage in 2015, the annual open enrollment period will begin on Oct. 15, 2014, and then will close on Dec. 7, 2014.

Sun Life’s outreach and enrollment team also assists with enrollment in AHCCCS, Arizona’s Medicaid program, at no cost. Anyone looking to

apply for AHCCCS may do so at any time of the year; the program is not dependent on state or federal marketplace insurance eligibility.
