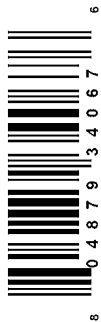

Take marijuana cultivation question to Pinal County voters

On Feb. 27, 2015, the group Citizens Against Open Cultivation filed a referendum petition application (REF20150227) against Ordinance No. PZ-C-001-

14, which is a text amendment to the current medical marijuana ordinance. The Pinal County Board of Supervisors approved the text amendment to the current ordinance on Feb. 18, 2015. The Planning and Zoning Commission voted 9-1 and recommend the Board of Supervisors deny the proposed changes. The Pinal County Attorney's office and the county staff members assigned to the case also recommended the board deny the changes to the current ordinance.

The new ordinance dramatically alters the manner and

location of which medical marijuana can be cultivated in Pinal County. Under the prior county ordinance, medical marijuana could be cultivated in an enclosed building no more than 2,000 square feet and located in a commercial zoning district. The new ordinance allows medical marijuana to be cultivated in an open field, on no more than five acres of land, in general rural zoning districts. General rural districts include residence uses.

The Rose Law Group, on behalf of Sidewinder Dairy, proposed the new law. The Rose Law Group argued, to the Board of Supervisors, the open cultivation of medical marijuana would allow local farmers another farming option. This information is misleading because according to Arizona law, medical marijuana is not an accepted agricultural product and it does not receive an agricultural farming exemption. The ordinance change will result in an overabundance of medical marijuana in Pinal County. It is important to note, there is just over 2,500 qualified medical marijuana patients in Pinal County. The overabundance of medical marijuana in Pinal County will greatly increase the access of marijuana to the county's youth and likely increase the potential for criminal activity throughout the county.

It is the intent of Citizens Against Open Cultivation to send the newly adopted county ordinance to the voters of Pinal County to decide if outdoor cultivation of medical marijuana should be permitted in the county. The group must obtain approximately 8,000 signatures, from registered voters in Pinal County, on the referendum petition by March 20, 2015 for the issue to be presented to the voters. The vote would be held at the next general election in November 2016. 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Pinal County resident shares memories of Selma

There are times in our lives that define who we are. There are the small things, personal tragedies and triumphs. Then there are the big things. The things that make us ask, "Where were you when?"

We are just now as a country experiencing the anniversaries of those defining moments.

We mourned again in 2011 the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks in New York and at the Pentagon. The nation remembered the 50th anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy in 2013. Last year marked the 70th anniversary of the end of World War II.

Saturday, though, was the anniversary of one of the most powerful times in American history.

On March 6, 1965, Civil Rights Activists began their historic march from Selma, Alabama to the state capitol in Montgomery in protest of practices that the local government were using to obstruct voter registration of African Americans. That day became known as Bloody Sunday after 600 peaceful unarmed marchers were attacked by Alabama State Troopers as they attempted to cross the Edmund Pettus Bridge.

A second march began March 9, 1965. Protesters again headed to the Bridge, but when Troopers stepped aside to allow them to pass, they instead returned to the church in Selma.

It wouldn't be until March 21, 1965 when the march would finally get underway.

Alabama Governor George Wallace refused to help the marchers in any way and so it fell to President Lyndon B. Johnson to intervene. The marchers, under the protection of the United States Army, National Guard, Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Marshals, crossed the bridge and began the 50-mile, four-day trek to the Alabama State Capitol in Montgomery. Just outside of Montgomery, the protesters were joined by more than 25,000 students and church members from across the United States, who walked the remaining two to three miles to the square in Montgomery where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered a speech.

For those born after 1965, the march from Selma to Montgomery is just a chapter in a history book. It's real, but not really tangible. It's studied in school, dissected in college courses, but hard to really understand. Hollywood has brought this time back to life with its dramatization of those events in the movie Selma. This makes the history a little more real.

But for one Pinal County man, this is more than a story. It was very real.

James Walsh, the former Pinal County Attorney, grew up in Chicago, Illinois, "in the real city," he said, and not a suburb. It was a segregated city with real divisions.

"I grew up in an atmosphere of bigotry," Walsh said. He explained that he attended a Catholic high school for boys. There was only one African American boy in his entire school.

Segregation was worse in the south with the "Jim Crow" laws which kept the races "separate."

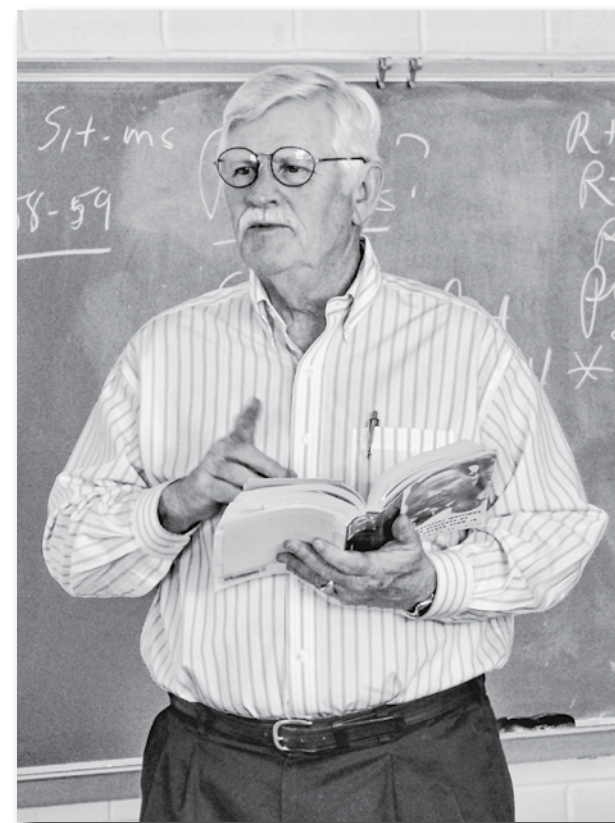
In 1955, the Montgomery Bus Boycott began after Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat in the "colored" section of the bus to a white person. This act of defiance became a symbol in the Civil Rights Movement and the mark on the timeline of where it all began. She collaborated with civil rights leaders including Dr. King, who at the time was a new pastor at the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama. African Americans stopped riding the buses, crippling the public transportation in the city.

King advocated a non-violent form of protest, learned from Mahatma Ghandi, called passive resistance.

"This was a very powerful form of protest," Walsh explained, "and a very dangerous form of protest." He said people died from this. In spite of being teargassed or clubbed, protesters did not fight back.

African Americans were prevented from protesting and they were prevented from voting. Sure, they could vote if they were registered, but the government had devised several deterrents for registration:

They issued a "poll tax" which had to be paid before the person could register to vote. African Americans in the south were some of the poorest in the country.

Warrior Hike hopes to visit with VFW Post 2767 on April 4

Mammoth - Warrior Hike is a non-profit outdoor therapy program which supports combat veterans who are transitioning from their military service by thru-hiking America's National Scenic Trails. This summer, two veterans will be hiking all 800 miles of the Arizona Trail, from March 15 to May 16. During their journey, they will be stopping in Mammoth on April 4. Warrior Hike is in the process of inquiring to see if VFW Post 2767 would be willing to host these veterans during this stop.

By hosting veterans in your community, you are providing them with a much needed rest from their journey, in addition to helping them reintegrate into society by establishing meaningful relationships between them and your community's veterans and citizens.

The Warrior Hike program has a list of support which would be most beneficial to the veterans who are hiking

the Arizona Trail, which includes transportation to and from the trailhead, lodging and use of amenities, and dinner. In other words, the little things in life that most of us take for granted would be appreciated by these men who have forgone them, for a time, for a cause that is near and dear to many hearts.

In 1948, Veteran Earl V. Shaffer told a friend he was going to "walk off the war". Starting from Mt. Oglethorpe in Georgia, in his worn boots and carrying his army rucksack, he walked for four months, becoming the first known person to hike the entire length of the Appalachian Trail. In 1965, he hiked from Maine to Georgia, this time to Springer Mountain which had become the new trailhead at that end; thusly becoming the first known person to complete a trip in each direction. At age 79, in celebration of the 50th anniversary of his first through-hike of the Appalachian Trail, he made another hike from Georgia to Maine in 174 days.

Warrior Hike follows in the footsteps of Earl Shaffer,

Lady Miners have what it takes to 'three-peat'

By any measure the San Manuel softball team, the defending back-to-back state champions, appear armed and ready to make it three-straight in 2015. The Lady Miners, who return 10 players with varsity experience, are the No. 1-ranked team in Division IV, according to the rankings released by azcentral.com on Mar. 2.

"We're pretty solid," Lady Miners' fourth-year head coach Deanne Brewer recently told The Miner. "It's just a matter of attitude; not being overconfident but, at the same time, having the confidence to do what we know we can do."

Although Brewer didn't address a three-peat during a recent interview, there is little doubt her team has the talent and, perhaps more importantly, the experience to pull off the rare feat.

The Lady Miners return two of top players in the division in junior pitcher Lyana Waddell and senior co-captain Felicia Medina, one of four seniors on this year's roster. The duo, along with junior Ashley Vargas, were first-team All-Division selections a year ago.

Waddell, the Section VI Co-Player of the Year in 2014, finished first in the section with 27 wins, second in ERA (1.51), and tied for first with 190 strikeouts.

Medina, a Central Arizona College signee, is coming off a shoulder injury she sustained near the end of last season. She returned in time for the state playoffs and, according to Brewer, is completely healthy for her final season at San Manuel.

She is the big bat in the Lady Miners' lineup and Brewer believes she is the ultimate team player who can execute in any situation, including laying down

a bunt if that's what the team needs. Last year Medina ranked fifth in batting average (.539), second in RBI (48), and tied for second in runs scored (43.)

Senior Alyssa Cuellar, one of six returning Lady Miners who earned All-Section recognition last year and a Pima Community College signee, led the section in homeruns (10), RBI (52), slugging percentage (1.060), and was tied for second with teammate Medina in runs scored (43).

Senior co-captain Mireya Tamayo (2B), another All-Section selection last year, and Kadi Monfred (SS) are both four-year varsity players and make the Lady Miners strong up the middle defensively.

Junior Angela Navarro is the final returning All-Section Lady Miners' player. Juniors Nicole Encinas and Maria McBride; sophomore Dionne Ruiz; and freshmen Clarissa Lizarraga, Nikki Baldenegro, and Daniela Guerrero round out the 2015 Lady Miners' roster.

The Lady Miners started their season last week, participating in the 24-team Wrangler Softball Classic in Wickenburg. Many of the schools in the tournament are in higher divisions, but Brewer believes competing against those schools will benefit her team in the long run. After all, four teams in Section VI – San Manuel, Ray, Superior, and Hayden – all reached

the state playoffs last year.

Additionally, Ray (No. 3) and Superior (No. 9) are also listed in the same azcentral.com rankings that have San Manuel at the top.

"As far as (Division IV), we definitely play in the toughest section," Brewer acknowledged. "It's been that way since I've been coaching."

With two state championships in three years as the Lady Miners' head coach, Brewer knows a thing or two about winning. She runs one of the most premier programs in the state, regardless of the division, and always has her team prepared in every aspect of the game.

What does she want her players to focus on from game to game in order for the team to have success?

"Focusing on the team aspect is the biggest thing for me," she responded. "Sometimes we don't need a homerun, we need a base hit. So we want to focus on what's best for the team."

"You might be a big hitter, but we still need you to execute a bunt," she added, citing an example. "Knowing (the game situation) and being disciplined (is important)."

Upcoming schedule: Mar. 10 at Hayden, Mar. 16 at Tombstone, Mar. 17 vs. Hayden, and Mar. 18 at San Carlos. All games are scheduled for 4 p.m.

Wayne Newman takes Atlantic-Sun Conference title

Wayne Newman took home first place in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.95 seconds, setting the Lipscomb University record and the Atlantic-Sun record in the process on March 1, 2015 in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. "Newman had a terrific 60-meter hurdles," head Coach Taylor said. "He defended his Atlantic-Sun title from 2014 and set the Atlantic Sun Conference record and the Lipscomb school record in the process. That was

definitely a highlight at the meet. He came back, literally 10 minutes later, to finish fourth in the 400m with a time of 50.70".

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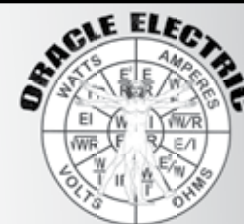
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SMHS softball players receive college athletic scholarships

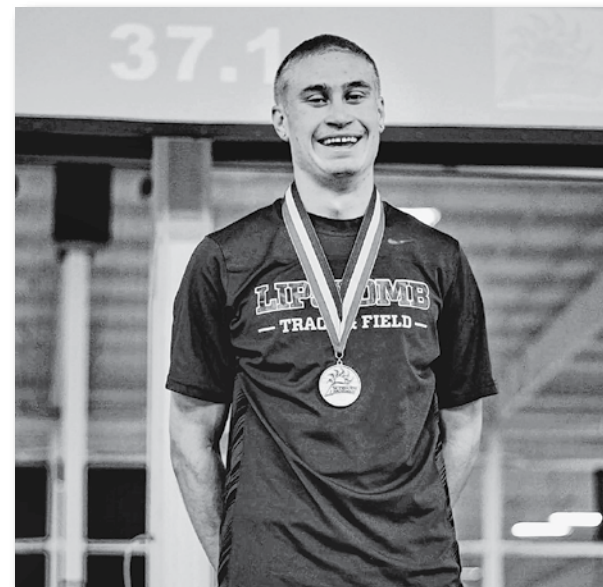

Coach Taylor said.

The 2015 Track and Field competition was Wayne's second year of participating in indoor events. In the 2014 Track and Field competition, Wayne and his teammates ran the distance medley relay and placed first at the Emory Crossplex Invitational with a time of 10:19.93. Wayne placed second in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 8.19 and finished second at the Southern Illinois University Invitational in the 400 meters (51.06). At the Atlantic-Sun Championships, 2014, Wayne won the 60-meter hurdles championship with a personal-best time of 8.07 also breaking the indoor Lipscomb school record. He then recorded personal bests in the 400 meters (50.64), 500 meters (1:06.72) and the 600 meters (1:25.05).

Wayne currently attends Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tenn. and is majoring in nursing. He is from San Manuel, Ariz. While in high school, Wayne participated in the track and field competition while attending San Manuel Senior High School. The following were some of his recognitions: named Academic All-American by National High School Coach's Association; named to All-State First Team in the 110 meter hurdles in 2012-13; named to All-State First Team in the 300 meter hurdles in 2013 as well as All-State Second Team in the 300 meter hurdles and the All-State Second Team in the long jump in 2013. Wayne was named All-Southern Arizona Athlete of the Year in 2013 and named to All-Southern Arizona First Team in the 110 meter hurdles in 2013. He was the 2A South Region Athlete of the Year selection in 2011 and was a member of the 2012 Arizona Division IV Section II Championship team. Wayne won Arizona State Championships, Division IV in 2013 in the following events: the long jump (22'08".25); the 110 meter hurdles (14.52) and the 300 meter hurdles (38.41). In 2012, he won the Arizona State Championships, Division IV in the 110 meter hurdles (14.80) and the 300 meter hurdles (39.79). Wayne lettered all four years of high school in track and field.

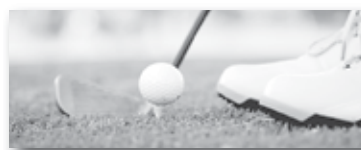

Pinal County Wildland Team is a consortium of nine fire agencies located in Southern Pinal County and Northern Pima County that participate in nationwide and state wildland fires and all hazard incidents. The agencies are: Oracle Fire Department, Avra Valley Fire District, Casa Grande Fire Department, Eloy Fire District, Golder Ranch Fire

District, Maricopa Fire District, Northwest Fire District, Picture Rocks Fire Department, and Regional Fire and Rescue.

Agencies from Pima, Cochise, Maricopa and Santa Cruz counties are expected to attend as well as Arizona State Forestry, Arizona Department of Corrections Wildland Fire Crew and the USDA Forest

Service Coronado National Forest. The all day event will be held at Mountain Vista School. All the training will be in the one location rather than spread out over Oracle as it has been in the past.

The purpose of the training is to refine wildland fire fighting skills. The simulated incident is set up like a real life

large emergency. The agencies participating get to familiarize themselves with each other as well as the Oracle area. Oracle Fire Chief Larry Southard said, "We look forward to the event every year. They were told they needed to pass a kind of "pop quiz" to prove they were smart enough to vote. They could have been asked to recite the Preamble to the Constitution (and this was way before School House Rock put the jingle in the minds of young people). Or they might have been asked to tell how many supreme court judges there are in the state/country/both.

In 1965, Dr. King and other leaders felt the time had come to do something about this. Selma, Alabama was chosen because of its low number of registered African American voters. Only 200 were registered in a place that was predominately African American. On March 6, 1965, King and others began the march to Montgomery to register their protest against such practices.

Dr. King and others realized that this issue was so much bigger than the state of Alabama. It really had implications for the entire country. A call was sent out to churches throughout the nation to send more protesters to Montgomery.

"Alabama was never a place I wanted to go," Walsh said. But when sign-up sheets began appearing on his college campus, Walsh made the decision to go. His roommate who was from South Carolina "begged me not to go," he said. His roommate was convinced that someone would die.

Someone did. An auto worker and a white mother of five who had come to Alabama to support voting rights for African Americans, Viola Liuzzo was killed while helping to ferry protesters back to Selma from Montgomery.

Walsh joined the marchers in Montgomery and was there when Dr. King delivered his speech.

Walsh said he remembered mailing a letter to his mother just before leaving on the bus to Alabama, telling her of his decision to go. His mom, understandably, was upset by his decision. She told him in a return letter that "of all the damn fool things, this one takes the cake."

As a direct result of Selma, Congress passed the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Registered African American voters in Selma went from 200 to 9,000.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of these events. Many of those who were there, marching with Dr. King, are returning to Selma and Montgomery to remember. Walsh said that he had considered going to Montgomery to pay his respects and to reminisce, but ultimately decided not to go. Instead, he chose to speak to an American history class of freshmen and sophomores who have just begun to discuss the Civil Rights Movement.

"This was my Selma," he said.

One thing Walsh noted when speaking to the students, in the movie Selma at the end where Dr. King is delivering his speech, the only part that was used was the lyrics of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Movie makers ran into a copyright issue and were only able to use the portion that is considered Public Domain. Walsh read the speech to the students, who listened with rapt attention. He apologized in advance to the students explaining that when he reads the speech aloud, he often gets choked up.

Included below is an excerpt from the speech delivered by Dr. King and read by Walsh.

I come to say to you this afternoon, however difficult the moment, however frustrating the hour, it will not be long, because "truth crushed to earth will rise again."

How long? Not long, because "no lie can live forever."

How long? Not long, because "you shall reap what you sow."

How long? Not long:

Truth forever on the scaffold,

Wrong forever on the throne,

Yet that scaffold sways the future,

And, behind the dim unknown,

Standeth God within the shadow,

Keeping watch above his own.

How long? Not long, because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice.

How long? Not long, because:

Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord;

He is trampling out the vintage where the grapes of wrath are stored;

He has loosed the fateful lightning of his terrible swift sword;

His truth is marching on.

He has sounded forth the trumpet that shall never call

retreat;

He is sifting out the hearts of men before His judgment seat.

O, be swift, my soul, to answer Him! Be jubilant my feet!

Our God is marching on.

Glory, hallelujah! Glory, hallelujah!

Glory, hallelujah! Glory, hallelujah!

His truth is marching on.
