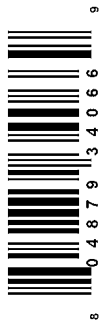

Erminio 'Shorty' Perea



Erminio "Shorty" Perea, 81, passed away peacefully on Thursday, Feb. 27, 2020 in his Phoenix home following a short but hard-fought battle with metastatic mesothelioma.

Erminio was born May 28, 1938 in Alpine, Texas. The Perea family moved to Ray-Sonora, Arizona in 1948 where he later met his future wife and love of his life, Angie

(Perez). He enlisted in the U.S. Army his sophomore year of high school and proudly served overseas as a tank mechanic. Upon returning home, Erminio and Angie married and had three children in Superior, AZ. He found the mining equipment there was similar to his military equipment and began his career as a mechanic. During the mining strike, the family moved to Phoenix, AZ in 1969.

Erminio enjoyed a 28-year career with the City of Phoenix as the Superintendent of Equipment Management. He retired but remained busy until late 2019 when he fell ill. He was proud to have kept in touch with the many friends he gained during his time with the City.

Erminio also enjoyed spending his weekends on horseback rides across the state with the Arizona Desert Riders as well as the El Zaribah Shriners. When he was not riding or caring for his horses, he was spending time with his family, making memories at "Nana and Tata's

house."

He leaves three brothers; Orlando, Raymond and Joe and one sister, Frankie; as well as his two daughters, Ofelia Cole (husband Greg) and Diana Hancock (husband Frank); son, Joey Perea; grandchildren, Crystal, Desiree, Wendy Jo, Rene, Justin, Candise, Alex, and Zachary; and 13 great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 59 years, Angie Perea, in 2017.

Presumptive positive case of COVID-19 identified in Pinal County; may signal community spread in Arizona

Pinal County Public Health Department last week confirmed a presumptive positive case of COVID-19. The case, a healthcare worker in her 40s, lives in Pinal County and is currently in stable condition in a Maricopa County hospital. She is not a known contact of any confirmed COVID-19 cases and has not traveled to any areas where COVID-19 is spreading widely. For this reason, Public Health is treating this case as its first instance of community spread. On Friday, two more cases were identified in Pinal County, both from the same household as the current Pinal County case. State and local public health are currently investigating the cases.

“Community spread refers to the spread of an illness for which the source of infection is unknown. Just like during flu season, if you get symptoms, you need to stay home and take care of yourself,” said Dr. Shauna McIsaac, director of Pinal County Public Health Department. “Similar to the flu, most people will only have mild symptoms that do not require a visit to a healthcare provider or hospital. Individuals who are older or have underlying health conditions like chronic lung disease are at higher risk of more severe illness. Occasionally, a young, healthy person will have severe disease. Unfortunately, this woman is one of those people,” she added.

“We are moving into a public health strategy that is just like seasonal flu. We know that healthcare workers are exposed to people with flu and other infectious diseases all the time and therefore are at higher risk, which is why they wear personal protective equipment,” said Dr. Rebecca Sunenshine, medical director for disease control at Maricopa County Department of Public Health. Now that there is community spread of COVID-19, just like during flu season, it is important for everyone, especially healthcare workers, to stay home when they are sick to avoid exposing others. “We are no longer recommending quarantine of exposed healthcare workers who don’t show any symptoms because we need our healthcare workforce during this response,” Dr. Sunenshine added.

COVID-19 is a respiratory infection with symptoms including fever, cough, and shortness of breath. The vast majority of people with the disease have mild symptoms and will not require medical intervention.

COVID-19 is believed to spread mostly through respiratory droplets produced when a sick person coughs or sneezes. Currently, there is no vaccine or treatment, but treatments are being studied and a vaccine is currently under development. Individuals with COVID-19 should be provided with supportive care including fluids or fever-reducing medication.

Since receiving the presumptive positive test result, Pinal County and Maricopa County have been working together to interview close contacts of the case and recommend symptom monitoring.

Overall recommendations to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and other diseases spread through respiratory droplets are:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water is not readily available, use

an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently-touched objects and surfaces like door knobs, light switches, and electronic devices using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.

Symptoms of COVID-19 are thought to appear within two to 14 days after exposure to the virus and consist of fever, cough, runny nose, and difficulty breathing. Those considered at risk for contracting the virus are individuals with travel to an area where COVID-19 is spreading or individuals in close contact with a person under investigation for COVID-19.

If you recently traveled to an area where COVID-19 is spreading and have developed fever with cough or shortness of breath within 14 days of your travel or have had contact with someone who is suspected to have COVID-19, stay home and call your healthcare provider. If you do not have a healthcare provider, you may need to be seen at your local hospital emergency room/urgent care center. Please call the emergency room/urgent care center to get instructions before going in.

Pinal County continues to lower tax rate

FLORENCE, AZ - Pinal County is proud to be able to lower the tax rate for another year. On Aug. 19, 2019, the Pinal County Office of Management and Budget proposed to the Board of Supervisors a primary property tax rate of \$3,7900 per \$100 of valuation. The proposal stemmed from an overall Pinal County Strategic Plan, Strategic Priority #4 - Financial Health. The goal, maintain a structural balance while investing in the County’s future and reducing the primary property. Objective 4.2: Reduce the primary property tax rate at or below \$3,7500 by

fiscal year 2020/2021. Director of the Pinal County Office of Management and Budget, Angie Woods stated, “Not many counties in the state have a strategic plan in place for primary property tax rate goals. This has been a great success for us and we are very satisfied with the outcome.”

To get a better idea of what happens to a taxed one dollar bill in Pinal County, here are some insights. In the fiscal year 2019-2020, the Pinal County portion of the tax levy was roughly 26 cents. In the fiscal year 2010-2011, the

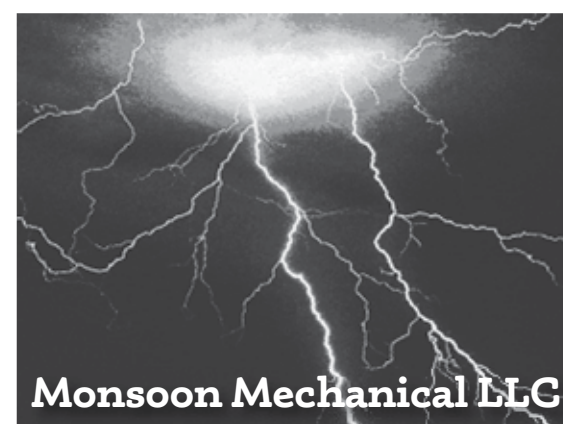

Did you know that Sudden Cardiac Arrest is the leading cause of death in adults and 75 percent of all Cardiac Arrests happen in the home?

On Monday, April 6, 6-8 p.m. Pinal County Adult Probation will provide coaching to the local residents and teach them to save lives through compression-only

CPR. The training will be held at the Superior Town Hall, 199 N. Lobb Ave. and is for anyone (age 10 and older) who wish to attend.

Compression-only CPR allows bystanders to keep life-saving blood flowing through a victim's body just by pressing on the chest in a hard, fast rhythm. Bystanders who provide compression-only CPR can double or

triple a cardiac arrest victim's chances of survival.

The Pinal County Adult Probation's vision is to raise awareness and hope in our community. CPR saves lives, one compression at a time through project C.A.R.E.

Preparing for the first day of kindergarten starts now

The holidays are behind us, but if you have a preschooler who will be entering kindergarten next school year, it's not too early to start getting them ready. In fact, many schools hold their kindergarten registration events beginning this month.

First Things First (FTF), Arizona's early childhood organization, has many suggestions on what families can do at home to prepare their child to be successful on the first day of kindergarten. The FTF Kindergarten Readiness page, found at <https://www.firstthingsfirst.org/resources/childergarten-readiness/>, is a resource for parents and caregivers to help children be prepared for school success.

For Sharyn Weinheimer, a National Board Certified Teacher in the Kyrene Elementary School District in Tempe, reading at home is one of the best ways for adults to help a child be ready for kindergarten.

Weinheimer works with families from kindergarten to eighth grade, and leads an early literacy parenting series for the school district.

"There's a lot of research behind the importance of reading to your child at home and how it promotes brain growth and helps you bond with your child," Weinheimer said. She tells parents to set a routine to read with their child.

"Don't just skip it," she said. "I'm a parent. I know it's not easy. But it doesn't have to be at home in a reading corner. Bring a bag of books and read in the car. They'll read at the breakfast table. I'll show parents a picture of my daughter reading outside."

Below are some tips from First Things First to help your preschooler have a fun, easy transition to kindergarten:

- Read with your child at least 20 minutes per day. Try books that repeat words; involve activities like counting,

identifying colors, objects or letters; or, are about things your child likes. Ask questions like, "What do you think happens next?"

- Talk with your child everywhere – at home, in the car, at the store. Make up stories or songs about your outings.
- Writing begins with scribbling. Give your child safe writing tools to play with, like crayons, chalk or markers and blank paper. Ask your child to tell you about their drawings.
- Teach your child how to use the bathroom by

tax levy was up 31 cents. The rate reduction over the past five years results in a significant amount of savings estimating \$22 million in primary property tax levy reduction from the start of the fiscal year 2015-2016 tax rate at \$3,999.

"Over the last several years, my fellow Board Members and I voted to decrease the property tax levy. By doing so, this \$22 million goes back into the pockets of the residents in Pinal County," Supervisor Goodman said. "The Board of Supervisors and staff are working more efficiently with our taxpayer dollars as well as maintaining our reserve for a rainy day."

themselves, to wash their hands after going to the bathroom and before eating, to blow their nose and sneeze into their elbow.

Before the first day, talk with your child about what to expect during the school day and types of after-school activities they may be involved in. The more details kids know, the less anxious they will feel.

Rehearse for the big day with test-runs of the new routine, which will include:

- Choosing what to wear the night before.
- Waking up with early to have plenty of time to get ready.

- Eating a healthy breakfast.
- Walking to the bus stop and talking about boarding and where to sit.
- Practicing how to open parts of lunch, whether it's a carton of milk or a small bag of carrots. Remind them that teachers or lunch staff can help if needed.

Even if you don't have kindergarteners this year, it's never too early to start helping kids prepare. Children who have positive early childhood experiences tend to score higher on school readiness assessments and are more likely to do well in school and graduate.

By turning everyday moments into learning moments, we can send our young kids to school with the skills and confidence that will help them succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

About First Things First – First Things First is a voter-created, statewide organization that funds early learning, family support and children preventive health services to help kids be successful once they enter kindergarten. 

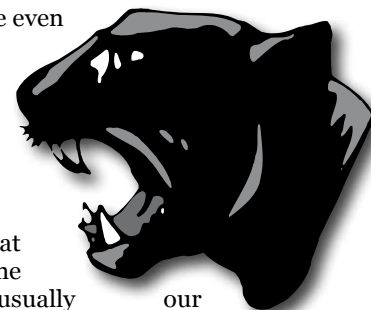
Freshman pitcher Richard Drennan threw a four-hit complete game, allowing just two earned runs with a pair of strikeouts and two walks in the first start of his high school career.
