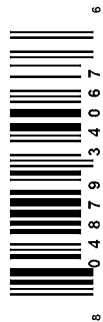

Drought conditions mean potential for early fire activity in some areas with widespread activity by June

Fire managers with the Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management say current conditions continue to line up for another potentially active fire season across all corners of the state.

Once temperatures warm up, the central and southern regions may see an early start to wildfire activity due to multiple factors, including the state's severe drought status, a lack of precipitation, and a carryover of heavy, grass mat in unburned areas. By June, fire managers say the potential for widespread, statewide fire activity exists if precipitation remains minimal through early summer. Forecasters do expect La Niña conditions to linger for the next few months, however early indicators point toward a

timely arrival of a normal monsoon season.

Last year's extreme heat and lack of moisture coupled with a blanket of fine fuel across the Sonoran Desert provided a foundation for one of worst fire seasons in the state. More than 2,500 fires burned 978,519 acres of state, federal, and tribal lands.

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 environment, DFFM will again operate within its COVID-19 wildfire mitigation plan. Some items addressed under the plan include increased sanitizing of vehicles and equipment, social distancing and mask usage within fire camp and during briefings, and temperature checks for all fire personnel assigned to incidents. Again, this year, DFFM plans to

provide engine patrols and stage crews in higher risk areas to provide for faster response with the goal of limiting fire activity and spread, and ultimately, the amount of resources requested.

"Not one of us wants a repeat of last year. However, if we do not get more help from the public we may find ourselves in a similar, precarious situation. Eighty-two percent of 2020's fires were human-caused and all likely avoidable if people paid more attention. State fire investigators responded to one too many fires started by folks using equipment or target shooting in restricted areas that sent sparks flying into dry fuel beds.

Four Tong War Killers Hanged on the Same Day

Copper Area News has received some articles from a former corrections officer from Arizona State Prison. This retired officer spent 25 years with the Arizona Department of Corrections working all custody levels from juvenile detention units to Death Row. The author wishes to remain anonymous. He hopes to provide the readers with a view of what it is like working with inmates and what life is like behind prison walls.

INTRODUCTION

The job of a corrections officer is not easy. The nature of the job, working with men or women behind bars can be stressful. Working in high custody units can add to the stress. The Arizona Department of Corrections has a high staff turnover rate. One

On Oct. 20, 1926, in Kingman, Arizona, Tom King was sitting in the kitchen of his restaurant, the Mohave Café, smoking his pipe and talking with his friend, Don On, when three men appeared in the doorway. One of the men approached Tom King placed his hand on King's shoulder and said, "Hello Tom King." The other two men then aimed pistols at King and fired five shots, killing King. They then fled outside to the back alley where two other Chinese waited in a vehicle. Two pistols were later found in a garbage can by the rear door of the restaurant.

Five hours later Mohave County Sheriff W.P. Mahoney and his deputies captured the five Chinese men six miles from Topock, Arizona. Three of the men were from Los Angeles and the other two from San Bernardino and Needles, California. The five men that were arrested were: Gee Long, Jiu Har, Wong Lung, B.W.L. Sam and Shiu Chin. Authorities believed that the killing of Tom King was the result of rival gangs involved in a tong war that started in California. King was said to be an active member of the Hop Sing tong and the five alleged killers were part of the Bing Kong tong.

Tom King had lived in Kingman for 20 years and had lived a quiet life. He was said to be the 12th victim of the tong feud that was the result of a power struggle over the lucrative income from the Chinese lottery and gambling.

B.W.L. Sam was the first of the alleged killers to be tried in December 1926. On the eve of the trial, Don On, the only known witness to the murder, disappeared. Local

in five staff members quit within the first couple of years of being hired or use the training and experience they receive to transfer to Sheriff departments or Federal corrections.

Maximum custody inmates are either there because they are doing long sentences, are convicted of violent crimes or they are problem inmates while in prison. Inmates on Death Row are under a sentence of death and have nothing to lose by acting out against staff or other inmates. Officers must always be on the alert to prevent these inmates from harming other inmates or staff. To understand the type of inmates that are housed on Death Row, I will provide you with a few of their stories, the crimes they committed and some of their prison life.

police searched every home and building in Kingman's Chinatown but On was not found. It was reported that On had sent a telegram to his grandfather in San Francisco saying that he feared for his life and was going into hiding. A reward of \$1,000 for anyone finding Don On was offered by the Hop Sing tong. Some believed On had been murdered. Despite the chief witness missing and the request for a continuance by Sam's defense attorney, Louis L. Wallace, Judge Bollinger refused to postpone the trial.

At the trial, Judge Bollinger overruled the protest by attorney Wallace and allowed the prosecution to admit the transcripts from Don On's testimony at the preliminary hearing as

evidence. After the prosecution completed their case, Wallace said he had no evidence at the present time to introduce. Sam was identified as one of the men waiting in the getaway vehicle. The jury found him guilty of first degree murder and recommended the death penalty.

Shiu Chin was the next one to go to trial. Again, defense attorney Wallace failed to offer a defense for his client although he did offer a plea for mercy. Chin was found guilty and the death penalty was recommended. Judge Bollinger announced that the remaining three defendants would have their cases consolidated and be tried together.

As the trials began, "strange" Chinese men were seen in Kingman. Extra security measures were put in place and the five alleged killers were moved to the Yavapai County Jail in Prescott. Members of both of the feuding tongs were reported in town and the Sheriff's deputies were closely monitoring them.

Newspapers reported that the tongs had declared a truce. Members of the Hop Sing tong had hired E.L. Oker, ex-lieutenant of detectives

of the Los Angeles Police Department, as their body guard. A Mohave County deputy was assigned as a bodyguard for the Chinese interpreter from Los Angeles.

On Dec. 22, 1926 the remaining three defendants were found guilty of first degree murder. It took the jury only 25 minutes of deliberation to find them guilty and recommend the death penalty. A surprise eye witness at this trial was provided by the prosecution. Arizona newspapers reported that "White man asserts he was in kitchen of restaurant with Don On when King was slayed . . . Frank Craig, a white man, swore he was putting milk away for the night in the ice box. At the sound of another Chinese voice, calling Tom King by name, he turned in time to see the three imported gunmen open fire, looked them full in the face and was positive today about identifying them."

Craig's testimony differed from Don On's in that On had said he was the only one there with Tom King and only two men had fired guns. On said that the man who had identified King for the others did not shoot King. Craig testified

that there were three shooters including the man who had called out Tom King by name. Defense attorney Craig did not provide any evidence or offer any testimony at the trial. He announced he would file an appeal. The Arizona Republic called it "one of the strangest murder cases in the history of Arizona." It would get stranger during the appeal process.

On Dec. 31, 1926, Judge Bollinger sentenced all five men to be hanged on March 11, 1927. It was Judge Bollinger's last official act as his term of office expired at the end of the day. The five convicted felons were transported to the state prison in Florence. In March they were granted a stay of execution so their appeal to the Arizona Supreme Court could be heard.

In June of 1927, Louis Wallace and Struckmeyer, Jennings and Strouss filed motions on behalf of each defendant in the Mohave County Superior Court in Kingman. Each motion asked the court to set aside the convictions and the sentence of death. The defense alleged that the outcome of the trials was the result of fraud, false testimony and tampering with witnesses by county officials. The allegations were shocking and unusual. For attorneys to accuse officials of criminal acts was serious. The defense attorneys had sworn affidavits from trial witnesses including Don On, who was alive and back in Kingman, that they had been paid and/or promised more payment for their false testimony.

The sworn affidavit from Don On said that his statement that was used as testimony at the trial was false and that after providing the written statement, he was told to hide by both Judge Bollinger and Sheriff Mahoney. He was taken to a goat ranch about six miles outside the town of Hackberry, Arizona by Vernon Hubbs. He hid there from Dec. 12 until Christmas Day 1926 when he was escorted by Vernon Hubbs and Walter P. Jones and "smuggled" back to Kingman. Vernon Hubbs was the Chief Deputy Assessor for Mohave County and Jones was the Mohave County Treasurer. The owners of the Three Bar Ranch where he had been kept, Elmer and Hattie Welch, provided a sworn statement supporting On's story.

The other main prosecution witness Frank Craig said his testimony at the trial had been false. He had not been at the Mohave Café on the night of the murder. He had been approached by Jimmy Young, the attorney for the Hop Sing tong and promised \$250 to give false testimony against the defendants. Young told him what to say at the trial and later paid him \$25 in the presence of Don On who also promised Craig he would help pay him.

Another witness who helped identify the five tong assassins at the trial, James Carwile, also provided an affidavit that Jimmie Young had offered him \$250 to testify falsely. Indian Steve

Leve-Leve had identified the defendants at the trial. On his affidavit he swore that Sheriff Mahoney had given him \$15 with the promise of more money for him to testify for the prosecution. He said that Mahoney showed him a photograph of the five defendants and their automobile and told Leve-Leve how to testify.

Retired Judge Bollinger and former Sheriff Mahoney denied the accusations. Mahoney's term as Sheriff had ended in January 1927. He had attempted to run for the State Mine Inspector's position but lost in the primaries. He was now working for the Santa Fe Railway Company as a Special Officer between Winslow, Arizona and Needles, California. An Arizona Republic editorial lauded the records of Judge Bollinger and former Sheriff Mahoney attesting to their honesty and incorruptibility while deriding the witnesses who had changed their testimony.

The Mohave County Superior Court refused to hear the case citing that they could not vacate a judgement after the Supreme Court had taken the jurisdiction. On March 19, 1928, the Arizona Supreme Court upheld the convictions and death sentences of the five Chinese. They said there was enough evidence presented at the original trial for the conviction and for the sentences of death.

On May 22, 1928 B.W.L. Sam and Shiu Chin went before the Board of Pardons and Parole

Miners do well at state wrestling tourney

On Tuesday, March 16, The San Manuel Miner wrestling team set off to compete in the AIA Wrestling State Championship. The Miners arrived with nine wrestlers on the first day of the two-day tournament at Poston Butte High School.

“We had some tough losses on the first day,” commented Miner wrestling coach Mike Borg.

The second day only five Miners returned to continue their quest for a state medal, and a spot on the podium. Those wrestlers were Austin Axe (113 lbs.), Oliver Ochsenfeld (126 lbs.), Isiah Lopez (170 lbs.), Adrian Romero (195 lbs.), and Justin Tafoya (220 lbs.).

After losing his first match, Adrian Romero was able to

walk away with a 12-5 decision win for his second match. He followed that win with a victory by fall for his third match. During his fourth match he had another win by decision, 7-2. Only one win away from receiving a medal, Romero lost his fifth match by decision, 2-9.

Isiah Lopez had two wins in the consolation round before losing by fall to Morenci. Alex Axe had a 6-0 win by decision in the consolation round before being taken out by Willcox.

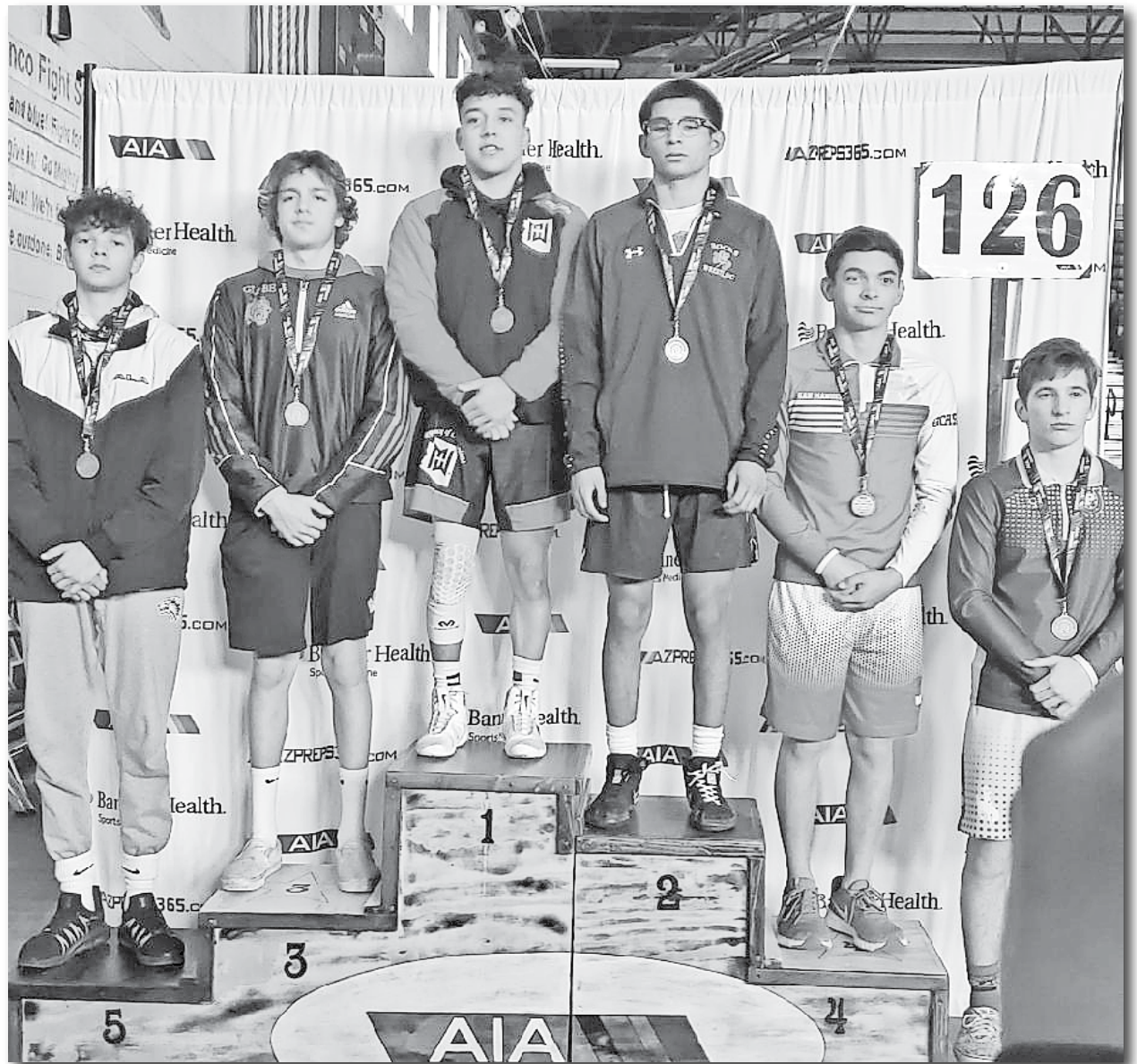
Notable freshman wrestler, Oliver Ochsenfeld won his first match 17-4, followed by an 11-7 win by decision. Ochsenfeld received his first loss for the tournament from the Morenci wrestler that went on to take first.

“He did good against the state champ,” commented coach Borg, “He put up a good fight, and didn’t get pinned.”

Ochsenfeld lost by 4-8 decision. He came back in the consolation round with three wins, one by fall, and two by points. Freshman Oliver Ochsenfeld found himself in the match for the third place position against Globe. After a tough match, he lost by fall to Globe, but was able to make it to the podium and walk away with the 126-lb., DIV. IV, fourth place state medal around his neck.

The Miner wrestling program faced a year full of changes, and new regulations. It was a season unlike any of the ones past, from no annual tournaments or classics, and no sectional tournament, to holding state in a smaller venue. This strange season comes to an end, with hope of returning to some kind of normalcy next season.

“They all did really good,” commented coach Borg, “I’m proud of all of my wrestlers. They wrestled hard, especially the seniors; they left it all on the mat.”

seeking a commutation of sentence. Affidavits by the witnesses Don On and Frank Craig who admitted lying in court and accepting bribes for the false testimony were submitted as well as affidavits from former Sheriff Mahoney and Judge Bollinger. In Mahoney's affidavit, he recommended that Sam and Chin should have their sentence commuted to life in prison. He said the other three he said should be hanged "higher than the moon" because "they shot Tom King down like a rat in a trap."

On May 31, 1928, a commutation of sentence hearing was held by the Board of Pardons and Paroles. The three remaining convicted murderers requested that the Board reduce their sentence from death by hanging to life in prison. Their attorney submitted the affidavits alleging that bribery of witnesses was involved in their convictions and Frank Craig testified that he had lied in court and been bribed. Evidence was introduced that Wong Lung was only 17 years old when the crime was committed.

On the eve of the execution date, it was announced that the Board reduced the sentence of Wong Lung to life in prison citing his young age at the time of the crime as their reason. The remaining four Chinese had their commutations denied and would die by hanging in the morning. One of the three Board members voted to commute their sentences to life citing the evidence presented that the main witnesses said they had been bribed and lied in court.

On June 22, 1928 at 5 a.m., the first of the four executions took place. The newspapers said that B.W.L. Sam collapsed while climbing the stairs and was carried unconscious up to the gallows. Shiu Chin was next followed by Jiu Har and Gee Long. There was a 20 to 25 minute interval between hangings which allowed for the doctor to pronounce each man dead and for prison staff to reset the rope and gallows. The final three Chinamen protested that they were innocent. Gee Long insisted that he and his companions "were railroaded to the gallows."

The Pinal County Historical Society says that the four Chinese were hanged with the same rope. According to the museum's Executive Director, Stephanie Joyner, "The story goes that they requested to be hung by the same noose and the prison honored the request. The rope symbolized brotherhood to them." The noose along with many others is on display at the Pinal County

Historical Society Museum in Florence.

The prison Superintendent Scott White oversaw the executions. He was a former Sheriff of Cochise County and had once conducted the double hanging of two notorious bandits. The Arizona Daily Star said, "Today, as superintendent of the Arizona state penitentiary, the pioneer peace officer had the task of conducting the largest wholesale hanging in the history of the state." The hanging of the four men is still the most men executed on the same day in state history although five men were hanged at once in Tombstone in 1883 when Arizona was a territory.

Frank shared this recipe for all to try and enjoy:

Nonna Maria's Chicken Marsala

By Chef Frank Palazzolo

Ingredients:

1/2 cup all-purpose flour
2 (6 ounce) boneless chicken breasts cut in halves and pounded thin
1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
4 tablespoons butter
3 cups sliced mushrooms
3/4 cup Marsala wine
1 cup chicken stock
Salt and freshly ground pepper

Directions:

In a shallow bowl or plate quickly dredge the chicken breast halves in the flour, shaking to remove any excess flour. Heat the extra virgin olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add 1 tablespoon of butter and cook the chicken breast until golden, about 3 minutes per side. Transfer to a plate. Add 1 tablespoon of butter to the pan, add mushrooms. Cook until mushrooms are golden. Add the Marsala vino and bring to a boil. When the vino has reduced by half add chicken stock, cook for 3 minutes. Return chicken breasts to the pan and cook for 5 or 6 minutes. Add butter, salt and pepper.
