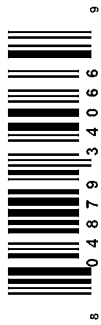

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Sheriff to redeploy Deputies to fast growing San Tan Valley

Our population continues to grow in Pinal County, even in a down economy. New families are relocating in the faster growing cities of Maricopa and Casa Grande, yet it doesn't compare to unincorporated San Tan Valley. The 2010 census counts 81,321 San Tan residents and current estimates show 90,000 or more.

Last year, the county contracted with the Segal Company of Washington DC to perform a staffing study for the Sheriff's Office which said, "Based on population, the average staffing for Maricopa and Pima Counties is 1.33 per 1,000 residents...Pinal County would need 141 additional sworn personnel."

The Board of Supervisors approved our current \$330 million county-wide budget with nearly \$40 million in cash reserves. I requested 64 additional sworn positions to meet the increased demand for service and population growth, yet the board denied any new positions.

Last week, the board hosted a budget summit with all elected officials and we heard a gloomy forecast of shrinking cash reserves. I will again make a request for additional Deputies this year, yet I'm not counting on the board to view this second request as their priority.

At this meeting, I challenged the board to make good on their campaign promises of 2012. While campaigning, they promised to reorganize county government and prioritize public safety, yet there have been next to no changes in the priorities of this government.

In 2008 I made several promises to you - my future

bosses, that I would improve staff training, hold staff accountable, obtain Jail accreditation and reduce Deputy response time to emergencies. We've achieved all these goals and more, yet continued population growth requires additional staff to keep up with increased demand for service. Instead, the 2014 Sheriff's Office budget has 29 less full time positions than in 2008.

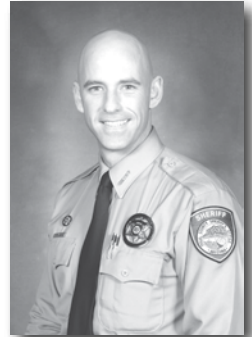
My senior staff has recommended that I redeploy Deputies and other sworn staff to meet the changing demands for service. I have already terminated long standing agreements with the FBI and DEA multi-agency task forces in order to reassign deputies back to uniformed patrol. My staff recommended permanent reassignment of 20 deputies from other areas of Pinal County to San Tan Valley effective June 1st.

I'm bringing this issue to your attention in advance, to let you know that with current staffing levels I can no longer fulfill my promise of faster emergency response times in most areas of Pinal County. We shall respond immediately to all emergency calls, yet lower priority calls (non-life threatening) may have an extended response time.

As Sheriff, I will make do with whatever financial resources and staff that the board provides. I am confident that our Sheriff's Office shall continue to provide exceptional law enforcement services.

I thank and appreciate the citizens of Pinal County for your continued trust and support as we strive to be the very best in law enforcement. It is our sincere privilege at PCSO to serve and protect our Pinal families.

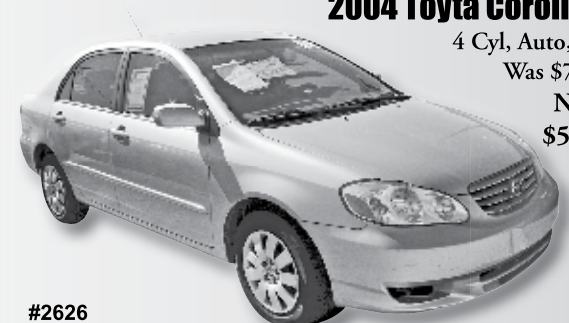

Sheriff Babeu to reallocate 20 officers to San Tan Valley

The Pinal County Board of Supervisors and the Sheriff's Office have begun the political posturing portion of the budgeting process.

During a recent budget working session, the Board of Supervisors left Sheriff Paul Babeu with the impression that new funds would not be forthcoming in the 2014-2015 budget. In response, Sheriff Babeu released a letter to the media outlining his plan to deal with the growing population in unincorporated areas and a lack of new

resources. According to his letter, the Sheriff will reallocate 20 sworn personnel to San Tan Valley from the rest of the County areas.

According to the Sheriff, PCSO would need 141 additional sworn personnel to meet similar staffing levels maintained by Maricopa and Pima counties. Last year the Sheriff sought 64 new sworn personnel, but received no additional funds. Babeu indicated that the efficiency gains via new technology, procedures and training allowed the department to handle the growing population while overall staffing was reduced. However, the

Sheriff asserts population gains coupled with efficiency improvements have reached parity. To maintain countywide service levels, PCSO must increase staff, or barring that, shift resources to meet minimum service levels in the high population grow areas. The beneficiaries of the reshuffle will be the residents of San Tan Valley.

The effect on the remaining areas of the county is not clear. The Sheriff indicates that Priority 1 calls will be still be handled quickly, but lower priority calls might have a longer response time.

As the county continues to add

population to unincorporated areas, the pressure on PCSO will continue to increase. Either additional funds will need to be provided or the high growth areas could take steps to build their own police forces via incorporation. No one has a crystal ball to determine which course makes the most sense for the high growth areas and the County as a whole. What is all but certain, is the pressure on County finances and the Sheriff's department will continue.

Supervisors Pete Rios and Cheryl Chase did not have a comment before press time.

Resolution Copper celebrates five years of operation at onsite water treatment

This week, Resolution Copper Mining is celebrating five years of operation at its onsite water treatment plant. In the five year history of the plant, water removed from the inner workings of the old Magma Mine has been sent by pipeline to farmers in the New Magma Irrigation and Drain-

age District. Resolution Copper Mining is helping deliver water to 6,800 acres of crops near San Tan Valley via 27 miles of pipeline by electing to pump out, treat and pipe water for beneficial use. "Finding a way to benefit Arizona farmers through our dewatering project is a win-win

scenario," said James Almaas, Manager of Dewatering and Reclamation, "Using our water allows local farmers to reduce groundwater pumping." The Resolution Copper Project is located in the same area occupied by the Magma Mine, which ceased production in 1996. After its closure, groundwater has been accumulating in the abandoned workings and in order for mining operations to be feasible again; the water needed to be removed. Beginning in 2009, excess mine water has been brought up from 4,000 feet below the surface to be treated at an onsite state-of-the-art treatment plant, where it is cleaned and filtered. "I am pleased about our exceptional safety record over the last

five years of the plant's operation," said Andrew Taplin, Project Manager "finding a mutually beneficial use for this water only adds to its success. This is the way Resolution Copper does business." The pipeline runs downhill and uses gravity, not energy-driven pumps, to move the water. The water is blended with Central Arizona Project water and used to irrigate crops including alfalfa, cotton, turf and small grains. Growers are provided with all data pertaining to their fields at the end of each growing season. To date, sampling and monitoring results have indicated water quality has been suitable for soils and crops grown within New Magma Irrigation and Drainage District.

The group was hosted by Elijah and Marjorie Cardon, who own and live in the old school. Elijah, who also serves as the local leader for the LDS branch, commented, "We love to have groups from the Valley come and enjoy the facilities and the history here in Superior."

On Friday afternoon, the youth spent three hours beautifying our Fairview Cemetery. They kicked off the event with an introduction from Margaret Gaston, town manager, and Anthony Huerta, public works director, who reminded the youth that every grave represents a life and a story worth telling. The group's activities included removing weeds and applying weed killer across large swaths of the cemetery, pruning back unwanted trees, planting six additional Italian Cyprus trees, re-painting of all garbage cans and spigots, cleaning up generally, especially around the section of unknown graves, and picture-taking of all headstones so that they can be catalogued and included in online family history sites like billiongraves.com. The youth enjoyed the project, with one participant, Britni Porter, saying, "I loved doing my little part to clean up this

important resting place." And President Michael J. Toone, the president of the Mesa East Stake, added, "It was sweet to see all of the kids working so hard together. When we were finished, in their eyes I could see a real sense of pride in their work and a connection with this town and its cemetery."

As the group left town on Saturday afternoon, they took memories of Superior with them. One of the boys, Austin Denham, said, "What a great three days. I made some new friends, laughed

a lot, and got to give back to the community."
