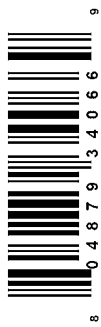

Copper Area News is committed to providing our readers with as much information as possible. This graph shows the positive cases as of press time on March 30, 2021. We have also included a graph showing the daily counts for the past week. Statewide, positive case counts have reduced dramatically, as the number of people vaccinated has increased. Case counts in the Copper Corridor are not increasing and have been holding steady.

New data reported this week is the number of residents who have been vaccinated per zip code. We will update that on a weekly basis.

There are a few points we would like our readers to consider when following this data.

1. This will continue to be a rolling total of positive cases. It does not reflect recoveries or deaths. The Arizona Department of Health Services does not break out this data.
2. If you see a reduction in numbers from day to day it is most likely due to a data entry error or mis-coding of a zip code (at the state level).
3. This is all zip code based data; most of our zip codes include unincorporated areas. There is no way to track exactly which areas each of the positive cases are. Example, Kearny and Winkelman each have small communities in their zip code that are not in the Town's incorporated boundaries.
4. If you live in Gila County, please follow the Gila County Health and Emergency Management, Facebook. They have maintained their data on recoveries and current positive cases.

Working together, we can slow the spread of the virus across the Copper Corridor. Wear a mask in public, remain physically distant (6ft apart or more) and practice good hygiene (wash your hands frequently, sanitize high touch areas), stay home if you are not feeling well.

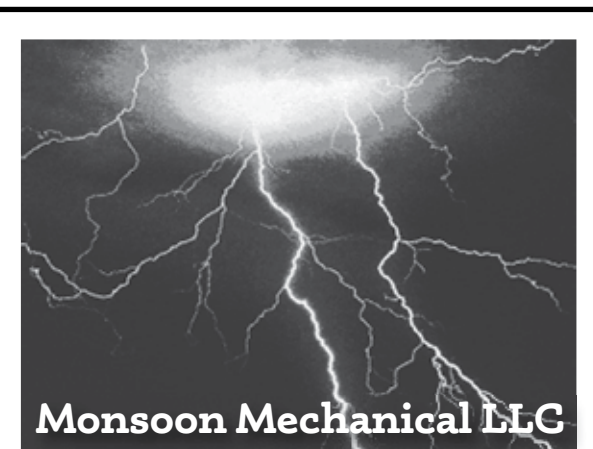

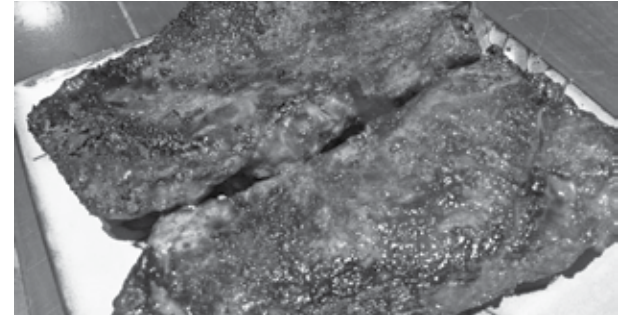
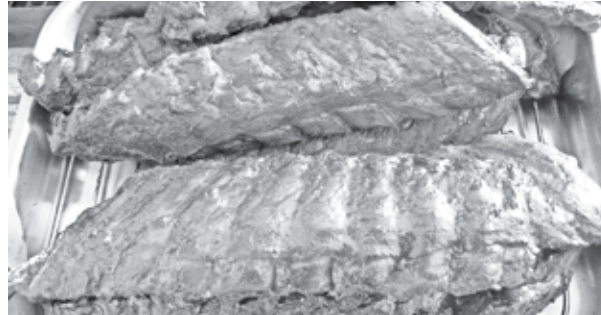

Drought conditions mean potential for early fire activity in some areas with widespread activity by June

Fire managers with the Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management say current conditions continue to line up for another potentially active fire season across all corners of the state.

Once temperatures warm up, the central and southern regions may see an early start to wildfire activity due to multiple factors, including the state's severe drought status, a lack of precipitation, and a carryover of heavy, grass mat in unburned

areas. By June, fire managers say the potential for widespread, statewide fire activity exists if precipitation remains minimal through early summer. Forecasters do expect La Niña conditions to linger for the next few months, however early indicators point toward a timely arrival of a normal monsoon season.

Last year's extreme heat and lack of moisture coupled with a blanket of fine fuel across the Sonoran Desert provided a foundation for one of worst fire seasons in the state. More than 2,500 fires burned 978,519 acres of state, federal, and tribal lands.

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 environment, DFFM will again

operate within its COVID-19 wildfire mitigation plan. Some items addressed under the plan include increased sanitizing of vehicles and equipment, social distancing and mask usage within fire camp and during briefings, and temperature checks for all fire personnel assigned to incidents. Again, this year, DFFM plans to provide engine patrols and stage crews in higher risk areas to provide for faster response with the goal of limiting fire activity and spread, and ultimately, the amount of resources requested.

"Not one of us wants a repeat of last year. However, if we do

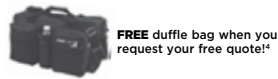

Proposed Flood Hazard Determinations for the Town of Superior and Unincorporated Areas of Pinal County, Arizona, and Case No. 20-09-1494P. The Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) solicits technical information or comments on proposed flood hazard determinations for the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM), and where applicable, the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report for your community. These flood hazard determinations may include the addition or modification of Base Flood Elevations, base flood depths, Special Flood Hazard Area boundaries or zone designations, or the regulatory floodway. The FIRM and, if applicable, the FIS report have been revised to reflect these flood hazard determinations through issuance of a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR), in accordance with Title 44, Part 65 of the Code of Federal Regulations. These determinations are the basis for the floodplain management measures that your community is required to adopt or show evidence of having in effect to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program. not get more help from the public we may find ourselves in a similar, precarious situation. Eighty-two percent of 2020's fires were human-caused and all likely avoidable if people paid more attention. State fire investigators responded to one too many fires started by folks using equipment or target shooting in restricted areas that sent sparks flying into dry fuel beds. It is imperative everyone takes personal responsibility and help us as we work together to prevent wildfires," said John Truett, Fire Management Officer for the Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management.

When working outdoors, always pay attention to the weather. Never burn on windy days or use equipment that can throw sparks. If having

a campfire, be sure it is out and cool to the touch before leaving the area. Drown, stir, and repeat. Secure tow chains, ensure vehicles and tires are in good working order before getting on the road, and avoid pulling a vehicle over into tall vegetation.

Residents need to be proactive and create defensible space around their properties. Remove any dead or dying vegetation, keep lawns watered and mowed, remove flammable materials from around the exterior of the structure and remove leaves from rooftops and gutters.

Shop at Home: Ray Federal Credit Union

In April 2020, COVID-19 brought much of Arizona's economy to a screeching halt. All businesses not deemed "essential" were ordered closed by Arizona's governor Doug Ducey.

The lockdown continued for nearly two months. When Gov. Ducey finally gave the go ahead to reopen, businesses slowly began the road to recovery. Even those listed as "essential" had a challenge with this economic recovery.

Many small businesses and non-profits in Arizona didn't survive the lockdown. The businesses that did survive are hanging on as best they can. *Copper Area News* wanted to give something back to the local business community. Over the next several weeks, our newspapers (*Copper Basin News*, *Superior*

Sun and *San Manuel Miner*) will be featuring local businesses and non-profits, encouraging our readers to Shop at Home, stay local and support our local businesses. To date, *Copper Area News* has featured 39 businesses in the Copper Corridor.

It is hard enough making it as a small business in a small town during normal times. But to balance those difficulties during a pandemic adds an entirely different twist to things.

Ray Federal Credit Union was deemed an "essential" business and were forced to immediately make changes and put pandemic protocols into practice. They had to hit the ground running and quickly set some guidelines for customers and their employees. Both branches of RFCU began

limiting customers in the lobby and began requiring appointments to see loan officers. Additionally, the credit union's annual business meeting was cancelled.

"Our credit union is financially solid, has strong capital reserves, is well managed, and has the resources to help members with their financial needs now," said Ralph Dubois III, Chairman of the Board.

The credit union has been in operation for the past 66 years and membership requirements, once very stringent, have been relaxed so anyone can now join. (The fine print says that membership is open to persons of qualified groups, and anyone wishing to join or open an account should call or visit the RFCU office for details.)

They offer free checking, Visa® debit cards,

auto loans for new and used vehicles, express short term personal loans with no credit check and four local ATMs with no service fee for members. The credit union is membership-owned with a local board of directors. They advertise better rates, lower fees and friendly service.

Kearny office hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. (except Wednesdays, when they close at 1 p.m.). Superior office hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Kearny office is located at 112 Williams Lane, Kearny; the Superior branch is located at 161 Main St., Superior. You can reach either branch by calling 520-363-5681.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires Pinal County to publish a five year consolidated plan and annual action plans outlining the use of funds for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG).

All Pinal County citizens are invited to voice their comments regarding housing and community development needs, strategies to meet identified needs, and identifying barriers to those needs. Public input is an essential component of this planning effort.

The Pinal County Board of Supervisors, in conjunction with the cities and towns of Eloy, Florence, Mammoth and Maricopa would like to invite all members of the public to a public hearing on May 5, 2021 at 9:30am. The public hearing is to accept comments on the proposed FY21 Annual Action Plan for the use of CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds.

Pinal County will receive \$1,287,410 in FY21 CDBG funding. Participating communities will receive an allocation of \$130,000 each totaling \$1,807,410 in CDBG funds for the county. Four participating cities and towns have elected to join the county's entitlement program. Those communities include: Eloy, Florence, Mammoth, and Maricopa. Pinal County will also receive \$612,860 in HOME funding, and \$156,877 in ESG funding. Pinal County is seeking input on the Annual Action Plan which outlines the proposed projects to include:

6. Mammoth water system improvements = \$65,000 to benefit 1,530 persons of whom 69% are LMI.
7. Maricopa utility improvements = \$130,000 to benefit 76 persons of whom 100% are LMI.

HOME

1. CHDO set-aside for housing development = a minimum of \$91,929 to serve LMI households/persons.
2. Owner occupied housing rehab = \$260,000 to serve low income households/persons.
3. Housing development = \$260,931 to serve LMI households/persons.

ESG

1. Rental assistance and case management services to persons experiencing homelessness = \$150,000
2. Administration of ESG program = \$6,877
