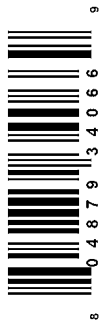

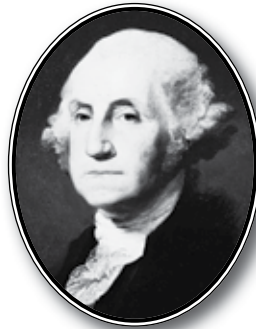

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Mining industry adjusts to COVID-19 protocols

In the mining industry, safety is a top priority even when there is not an active global pandemic. Local mines Resolution Copper and Capstone - Pinto Valley shared some of their latest protocols to ensure their work force and their communities stay as safe as possible through the duration of the COVID-19 pandemic. Mining remains an essential service and operation in Governor Doug Ducey "Stay Home, Stay Healthy, Stay Connected" Executive Order.

Without a doubt, each of these mines are following the CDC and State protocols for following physical distancing, disinfecting high touch/high traffic areas and of course encouraging hand washing as much as possible. Staggering lunch times and breaks to keep groups from congregating together, allowing as many staff to work

from home as possible has also become a new normal for both mines. Employees are encouraged to stay home if they are not feeling well.

Obviously, many jobs in mining cannot be done from home so both companies must balance having enough staff on site to do the jobs safely and ensure that physical distancing can occur to avoid any unintentional spread of the virus.

At Pinto Valley, employees and contractors there are required to take their temperatures upon arriving on site. They also limit employees to only two per vehicle and beginning on May 1, everyone onsite will be required to wear a N-95 mask. Both companies have limited their visitation to only business-critical visitors to the mine sites and travel amongst the employees of these mines

have been restricted as much as they possibly can.

Both Capstone Pinto Valley and Resolution Copper report that to date none of their employees have tested positive for the virus. Capstone has donated N-95 masks to the Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center and Resolution Copper is developing local plans to provide food and necessities to vulnerable populations in their areas.

"The health and safety of our employees, contractors, and the community is our top priority. We are making every effort to protect our people while safely operating our business," said Dan Blondeau, a Senior Advisor in Communication for Resolution Copper.

Grupo Mexico-ASARCO was contacted for the story but did not submit comments for for the article.

Arizona Science Center steps up to support parents, educators and students with new online resources

April 13, 2020 – Phoenix, AZ - During COVID-19 shutdowns, Arizona Science Center continues to build on its mission to inspire, educate and engage curious minds through science.

"As Arizona's largest provider of interactive on-site and outreach STEM education, we are stepping up to deliver critical online science learning resources for parents, educators and students throughout our state," said Chevy Humphrey, The Hazel A. Hare President & CEO, Arizona Science Center. "Families and educators alike are looking for support and resources to make teaching and learning from home easier, and we are here to help."

Parents added the role of educator to their already busy lives. To support this new role, the Science Center developed a range of interactive, online resources (<https://www.azscience.org/learn/educators>) to assist parents in planning, preparing, and supporting their children's learning from home.

To help children with online schoolwork, the Science Center developed weekly online lesson plans, including hands-on activities, science demonstrations, and other learning materials for use in grades K-8. Each lesson plan follows the state of Arizona Science Standards and provides 150 minutes of weekly science content.

Leaders and educators from the Center's Learning Team are providing ongoing counsel for parents who are new to tackling online learning.

Teachers are working to transition classroom lessons to online activities at a moment's notice, and to feed curious minds of all ages looking to be inspired by engaging science content. Each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:30am AZ time on educators from our Learning Team will host a Facebook Live session offering teaching tips, virtual learning best practices, and a review of the weekly lesson plans the Center supplies. In keeping with the Center's focus on interactive, personal

experiences, coaching from certified science educators on the Center's Learning team is also available.

Moreover, in support of the broader community, the Science Center serves as a resource for families and individuals seeking engaging science content and activities that spark curiosity and motivate learning at home. The Center's new online learning content is easy to navigate, and most activities take an hour or less. A familiar face for all who follow the Center, Sari on Science plays a prominent role across the Center's media in interpreting both what is happening in the rapidly changing environment triggered by the pandemic and in supporting online learning.

In addition, the Center's Blue Crew science interpreters and educators from the Learning team offer regular science content and inspiration. This includes a 9:30

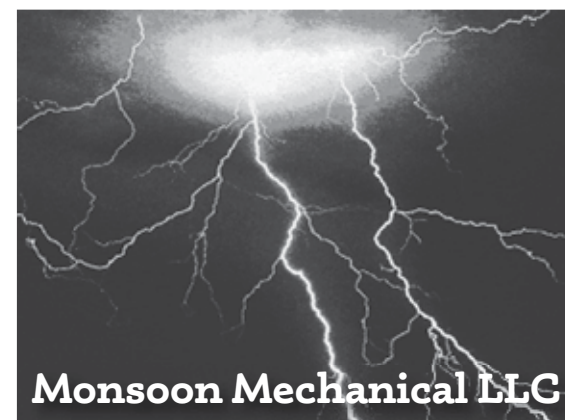

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PPE in short supply for hospitals, EMS

It's no surprise that hospitals and local first responders are struggling to protect themselves in light of the ongoing pandemic.

PPE (or personal protective equipment) protects healthcare workers as well as patients and visitors from viral and bacterial infections that can enter through the skin, eyes, nose and mouth. PPE includes facemasks, gloves, face shields, gowns and goggles, to name a few items.

Currently, all healthcare facilities, including emergency responders, are in need of PPE. Not only facemasks, but gowns, gloves and goggles, too. Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center in Globe, like other hospitals in Arizona, is tracking the inventory and utilization rates of these items on a daily basis and is in constant contact with suppliers for availability.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is the authority in guiding healthcare facilities in the best practices for controlling and preventing the

spread of disease. The appropriate use of PPE is a major part of the regulations put forth by the CDC and outlines "Strategies for Optimizing the Use of Facemasks."

These strategies are broken down into Conventional, Contingency and Crisis capacities. As hospitals across the nation are experiencing a crisis in their PPE, a last resort is to use homemade masks. Many hospitals are referring to these masks as "comfort masks" and will be used in non-clinical areas of the hospital.

The Town of Superior has mobilized quilters in their area to sew these masks and make them available to the elderly and to First Responders, who are using them to cover the facemasks they do have.

CVRMC has requested homemade masks from members of our community in preparation for a "Crisis Capacity" situation. Lee Ann Powers took the lead on this effort and has mobilized many amazing community members to cut and sew the "Olson Mask," a pattern that

is being used by many other hospital facilities who are in short supply. CVRMC leaders in Infection Control and Nursing will determine the best utilization and distribution of these homemade masks.

"Olson Masks" or comfort masks are fairly easy to make, especially for quilters and others who sew. If you have a sewing machine, some scrap material and time, why not sew a few masks for our local medical facilities?

**PROPOSITION 443
REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE
TOWN COUNCIL OF SUPERIOR**

OFFICIAL TITLE: A RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN EXTENSION OF THE ALTERNATIVE LOCAL EXPENDITURE LIMITATION FOR THE TOWN OF SUPERIOR.

DESCRIPTIVE TITLE: Pursuant to the Arizona State Constitution, this proposal extends the alternative expenditure limitation for the Town of Superior for the next four years. Annually, the Town Council will determine the amount of the alternative expenditure limitation for the fiscal year after at least one public hearing. This alternative expenditure limitation replaces the state-imposed expenditure limitation.

A "YES" vote shall have the effect of extending an alternative expenditure limitation for the Town of Superior.

A "NO" vote shall have the effect of not allowing the Town of Superior to continue an alternative expenditure limitation and to require expenditures of the Town to be limited by the state-imposed expenditure limit.

Arguments for or against ballot measures may be filed with the Town Clerk no later than 5 p.m., Wednesday, May 6, 2020. Arguments may be submitted to the Town Clerk, P.O. Box 218, 199 N. Lobb Ave, Superior, Arizona 85173. A \$200 fee must accompany each argument submitted and each argument must not exceed 300 words. Arguments must be signed by the submitting person. Arguments submitted by organizations shall be signed on behalf of the organization by one of the executive officers of the organization authorized to take the action, or if a political committee, by the Chairperson or Treasurer. No person or organization shall submit more than one argument for each ballot measure to be voted on.
