

To protect our residents and do our part to fight the community spread of this disease, I declared an emergency on Thursday, March 12, 2020. This entailed cancelling the Apache Leap Mining Festival and all public events on Town Property with attendance over 100 people. Since then, Governor Doug Ducey has issued a variety of Executive Orders that mandate compliance from all Arizona communities.

The Governor's most recent order requires our local gyms and bars to close completely. Restaurants must also close their dining rooms, but can continue to serve food through carry out, delivery and to-go orders. The coronavirus is not only a menace to our health, but also a real threat to our local economy. I encourage everyone to find ways to support our local restaurants and retail

Arizonans ordered to stay at home, stay healthy and connected through April 30

On Monday, Governor Doug Ducey issued a Stay at Home order in an effort to add another level of social distancing. This order came after a letter signed by several Mayors of Arizona asked the Governor to issue the Stay at Home order.

Town of Superior Mayor Mila Besich joined Mayor Ana Tovar of Tolleson, Mayor Coral Evans of Flagstaff, Mayor Ginny Dickey of Fountain Hills, Mayor Valorie Molina of Guadalupe, Mayor Mark Mitchell of Tempe, Mayor Kate Gallego of Phoenix, Mayor Regina Romero of Tucson. Mayor Thomas McCauley of Winslow, Mayor Alexis Hermosillo of El Mirage

and Mayor Sandra Moriarty of Sedona in preparing and signing the letter. The Governor issued his Executive Order about 90 minutes after the letter from the Mayors made it into the news. In a written statement to local media outlets, Mayor Besich stated. "Our rural communities. do not have enough EMS or healthcare resources to manage the realities of the COVID-19 virus. We ask the Governor to act with urgency to protect all Arizonans."

The Stay at Home order starts at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, March 31, 2020 and will remain in effect until April 30. The order does allow essential workers to get to and from work or to volunteer and allows people to tend to errands such as picking up prescriptions, grocery shopping or doing any other task or errand at an "essential business". Bars, gyms and movie theaters are still closed across the state and restaurants may continue their operations with take out and delivery orders. The order also encourages Arizonans to get out and exercise and recreate in the outdoors, such as biking, hiking, walking or enjoying local parks. Another focus added into this order included a reminder and encouragement for everyone to stay connected digitally, via their phones and the internet.

The Governor's orders did not change any of the essential businesses that are allowed to be open during the "Stay at Home" order. This new order continues to recommend social distancing and also limits groups from gathering of more than 10 people. One of the big questions being asked of the Governor's office, is why are beauty services such as salons,

barbers, nail salons and spas considered essential along with golf courses, pawn shops, and gun stores. The order also does not require employers to provide an employment letter proving that a person is employed by an essential business. In neighboring, California, residents are not allowed to leave their city or county boundaries and they must also have a letter proving that they are an essential employee.

Local leaders have been growing concerned by the high use of the public lands in the area, which are now becoming high use areas for camping and outdoor living for those wanting to avoid living in the more urban areas during this time of social distancing. The Tonto National Forest closed many congregate camping locations including the Picket Post Trailhead on the Arizona National Scenic trail but did not close the Oak Flat Campgrounds. Picnic areas at Roosevelt lake and areas in the Pinal Mountains and Sierra Ancha mountains have been closed.

School closures affect JTED programs

Arizona's public schools have all had to adjust for the realities of schools closures due to the COVID-19 Virus Pandemic. The precautionary methods to help flatten the curve of the outbreak in Arizona has called for social distancing and the realities of implementing the strategy has been difficult for all schools but it proves even more difficult for the Joint Technical Education programs such as the Cobre Valley Institute of Technology and the Pima Joint Technical Education District, since the courses taught at those schools require some on the job training and clinical testing.

Both schools have deployed an online program. Students can access their coursework and engage with their teachers.

The challenge comes when students need to complete the actual job training. For nursing students in these programs, the ability to complete the job training components are non-existent at this time due to the COVID-19 virus, and it is unclear how the State licensing department will handle the clinical aspect. With the high demand for health care workers, these students are the future

workforce and may be needed much sooner rather than later. In a normal course, the students in the Certified Nursing Assistant program would do their on the job training at a nursing home or at a local hospital, but that part of their program is not available right now due to the virus.

This policy and technical lessons for other industry trades such as cosmetology and welding are also affected by the school shut down and social distancing procedures. Cosmetology students are not able to practice their technique or work hours at the school salon during this crisis. Interim Superintendent Mike O'Neal explained that CVIT is waiting on clarity from the state.

"If we need to have our students come back next year to complete the clinical and on the job training, we will do that at no extra cost," O'Neal said.

School districts across the state are waiting on policy revisions and graduation requirements now that the COVID-19 virus has affected the rest of the school year. Schools should be receiving more official word from the State of Arizona during this



This also includes all spring assemblies and banquets. We will be working with our administration, staff, and seniors to find possible alternative solutions to graduation.

The Superior Unified School District will continue serving a combined breakfast and lunch to all children ages 18-under in the Superior Unified School District boundaries until May 22. Families must call the high school office (520) 689-3000 ext. 3101 by 10 a.m. to request a meal(s). Meal(s) can either be picked-up through a drive-through service behind the high school kitchen (11 a.m.) or delivered to a designated bus stop. Meal(s) will begin to be delivered by 10:50 a.m. each day. Families can request to be served on multiple days. If you are picking-up a meal(s) please enter through the main entrance of the District parking lot and then proceed west along the front of the high school through the bay gates. Cars

will stop behind the kitchen, receive their meal(s), and exit out the opposite bay gates by the tennis courts. Students must be present at all times in order to receive a meal. This is a Department of Education requirement.

The Superior Unified School District will continue to provide alternative forms of instruction to its students. This will include independent study options for JFK Elementary and both online and independent study options for students at Superior Jr/Sr High School. There are also online resources that parents can use to support their child's education as well. Please visit our District website or you can also email your child's teacher.

The District office and both school site offices will remain open on a limited basis during the closure. We are grateful for your patience and support. We will continue to keep you informed as best as we can. Feel free to contact the District office or each school site if you have any questions.



FUN FACTS ABOUT WOLVES

- 1. Wolves mate for life. They stay together until the end!
- 2. Wolves tend stay in packs and, together, they can take large prey like deer and moose. Alone, wolves only hunt small prey, like rabbits and squirrels.
- 3. Packs can be as big as 30 wolves or as small as 2. Generally, packs are about 7 or 8 wolves strong.
