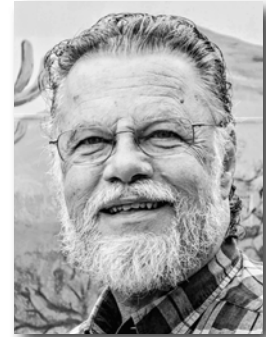
This Thursday, April 28, several of us from Kearny will journey to Arizona State University for the final review of the four projects done by the students at the Design

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CAC Governing Board hosts meeting at Aravaipa Campus; president vows that current board will not close campus

It is well known that in small towns and organizations everyone must wear multiple hats, and if you are not wearing at least two or three then you must not be busy enough.

Last week business owners, elected officials students, faculty, Copper Corridor residents filled the cafeteria at the CAC Aravaipa Campus to share with the board during call to the public how important the Aravaipa campus is to them and its benefit to the community. Many of those speaking wear multiple roles in their community from teachers and elected officials, business owners and non-profit board members.

The board heard over 50 comments from these community members in the call to the public, some of them were encouraging the board to approve a two percent pay increase for the staff and a majority of the comments were personal stories and requests that the board do everything in their power to keep the Aravaipa Campus open.

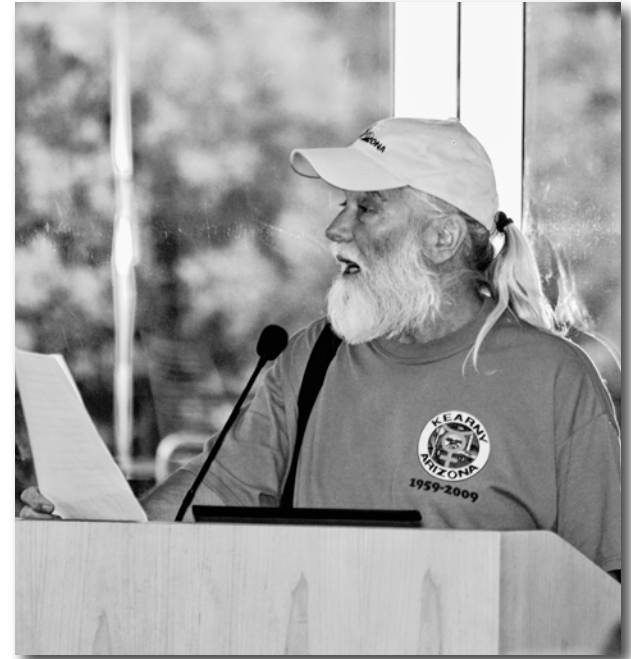
There were a few residents who explained that they are not against education but they are not in favor of additional tax increases and called for the board to be more fiscally

conservative.

Board President Gladys Christiansen thanked everyone for their comments and stated that they would not close the campus for as long as they can keep it open. Since late 2015 there have been major rumblings and suggestions made to the Central Arizona College Governing Board that the Aravaipa Campus should be closed in order to save money and avoid any further property tax increases to the tax payers of Pinal County. Investments, they were told, should be concentrated in the populated areas of the county. The board has been hearing from many anti tax groups who have become very vocal at board meetings.

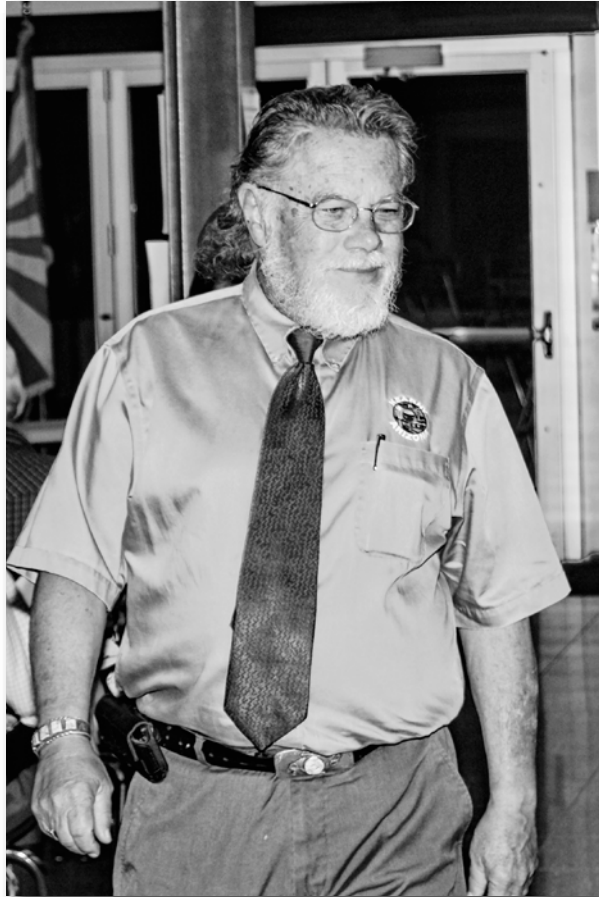
Following the two-hour call to the public session, the board went into executive (secret) session. After the executive session the board voted unanimously to provide staff with a two percent pay increase and not to increase the cost of the employee benefits and not to increase taxes to accommodate this increase.

The board also received a report on financial expenditures and viewed a presentation by CAC Aravaipa student Edward Aguirre, who showcased many student success stories from the CAC Aravaipa Campus.

MSgt Jordan then outlined the activities the unit participated this year that included memorial services, parades, color guard events, leadership camps, incentive trips and various community service events including Toys



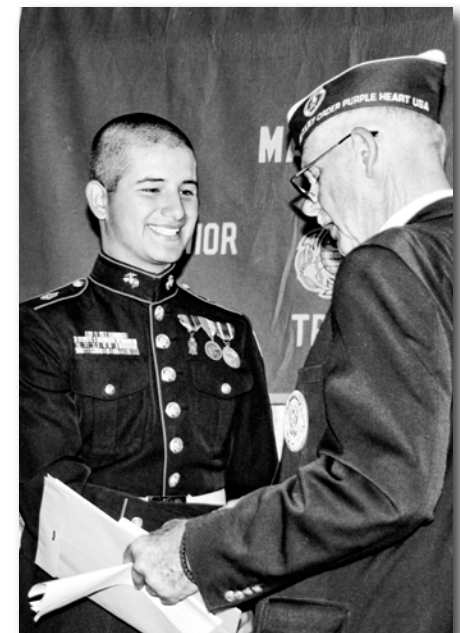

Next on the program was the presentation of plaques in recognition of completion and participation in athletics, rifle drill team, color guard, civic service and orienteering.

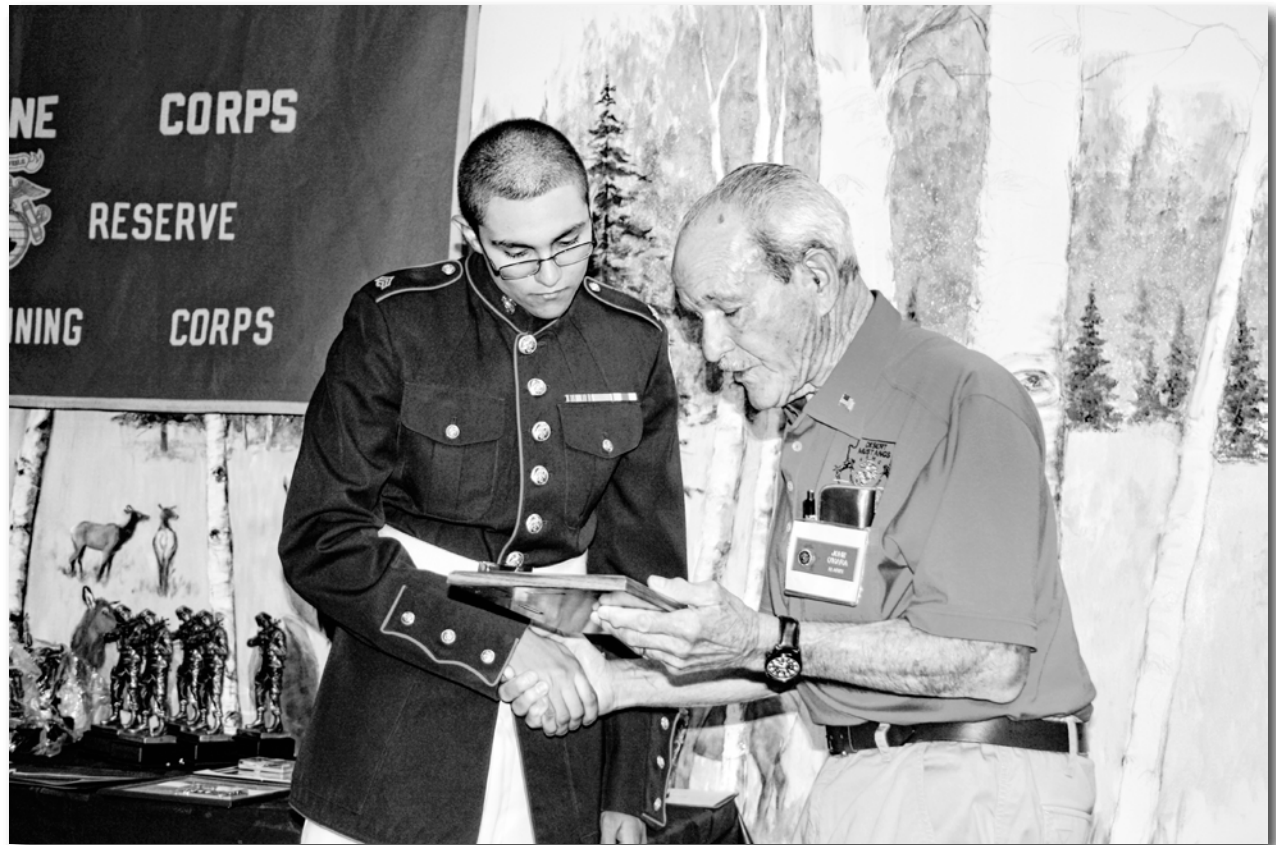

Sophomore Janae Ruiz had four hits, including a double and a homerun, with an RBI in the 11 – 1 win against the Apaches.

Tara Lorona, Stormee Galka and Ashley Ortiz each had two hits, including a double and a triple from Lorona and Galka, respectively. Ortiz and Savannah Willis each drove in two runs and Galka had a game-high three RBI.

Galka and Daniella Hinojos combined to limit the Apaches to only one run on three hits. The duo did not walk any batters and fanned nine.

Hinojos came back on Friday and tossed a no-hitter against the Falcons. The freshman right-hander did not walk a batter and struck out nine in the four-inning outing.

Willis and Galka each had four hits in the shutout win, which includes two homeruns by Galka and a double from Willis. The senior teammates combined to drive in nine runs, seven of them by Galka.

RESOLUTION NO. 16-724 FAIR HOUSING RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF KEARNY, ARIZONA, ADOPTING A FAIR HOUSING POLICY, MAKING KNOWN ITS COMMITMENT TO THE PRINCIPLE OF FAIR HOUSING, AND DESCRIBING ACTIONS IT SHALL UNDERTAKE TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING. WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended, requires that all applicants for Community development Block Grant Funds certify that they shall affirmatively further fair housing; and WHEREAS, the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (commonly known as the Federal Fair Housing Act) and the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 declare a national policy to prohibit discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing and financing of housing or land to be used for the construction of housing or in the provision of brokerage services, on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, disability, familial status or national origin; and WHEREAS, fairness is the foundation of the American system and reflects traditional American values; and WHEREAS, discriminatory housing practices undermine the strength and vitality of America and its people; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Kearny, hereby wish all persons living, working, doing business in or traveling through the Town know: That discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing and financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin is prohibited by Title VIII of the Fair Housing Act Amendment of 1988; and That is the policy of the Town of Kearny, Arizona, to implement programs, within the constraints of its resources, to ensure equal opportunity in housing for all persons regardless of race, color, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin; and That with available resources the Town of Kearny will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against in housing issues on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, handicap familial status or national origin to seek equity under existing federal and state laws to file a complaint with the Arizona Attorney General's Office or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and That the Town of Kearny shall publicize this Resolution and thereby encourage owners of rental properties, developers, builders, and others involved with housing to become aware of their respective responsibilities and rights under the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 and any applicable state or local laws or ordinances; and That the Town of Kearny shall undertake the following actions to additionally "affirmatively further fair housing."

 - mail this resolution to the media regarding issues relating to Fair Housing;
 - post copies of this Resolution at the Town Hall and Kearny Library;
 - distribute flyers regarding Fair Housing month in the Town Hall, Kearny Library and Kearny Post Office.

Ray Elementary Pre-K Registration

Ray School District will have its Pre-Kindergarten registration for the 2016-2017 school year on Monday, May 9. 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. In order to register your child they must be four years of age prior to September 1. You must have a complete immunization record and a birth record in order to register for school. If you do not have a birth record you can get one for a small fee, from the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the State in which your child was born. Those addresses are available at the Primary School Office. Your child's physician or clinic may also provide an immunization record. The Ray School District also offers a Pre-Kindergarten Program for students with special needs. This provides services to children, ages 3 and up with disabilities. Registration will be in the Elementary School Office and screenings for all eligible children will be in the Pre-Kindergarten rooms 212-211. The tuition cost is \$100 per semester which averages out to approximately \$1.80 per day. Tuition must be paid in advance of each semester (before Aug. 10 for the 1st semester and before Jan. 9 for the 2nd semester). If payment is not made by the 1st day of each semester, your child will not be eligible to attend. Refunds must be requested by Sept. 6 for the 1st semester and Feb. 6, for 2nd semester. If you have any questions you can call the Elementary Office at 363-5527 ext. 101.

Waste Voucher Program

The Pinal County Waste Disposal Voucher Program will begin on Jan. 11, 2016. Please remember that in order to obtain vouchers those interested must present a current utility bill dated within the last 60 days with their name and physical address imprinted on it. No vouchers will be issued without proper documentation. Three vouchers will be given and they will be good from Jan. 11, 2016 until Dec. 30, 2016. If those participating own more than one residence they can only obtain vouchers for the primary residence. Vouchers can be used at the Oracle Transfer Station and are good for a truck load of up to 750 lbs. or the Dudleyville Landfill and are good for a truck load of up to three cubic yards. Vouchers will be issued according to the name that appears on the utility bill and that person must be present when redeeming the vouchers at the Oracle Transfer Station or Dudleyville Landfill. Approximately 1,000 endangered Arizona Hedgehog cactus grown on Resolution Copper's JI Ranch were collected and replanted.

San Carlos Apache Tribe.

We are honored to have the opportunity to protect and preserve the Arizona hedgehog cactus, a plant that is mutually important to the San Carlos Apache Tribe and to Resolution Copper," Kitcheyan said.

In August 2012, under the watchful eye of biologists from Tucson-based WestLand Resources, approximately 1,000 small vegetative propagations, called "offsets" or "pups" were collected from mature Arizona hedgehog cactus

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growing on the JI Ranch. These cacti were planted in pots containing a mixture of native soil and sand, and kept in a greenhouse at the JI Ranch where they were monitored and watered monthly for more than three years. Some were observed budding, flowering, and producing “pups” of their own while in the greenhouse.

In March 2016, 364 Arizona hedgehog cactus offsets were planted by Resolution Copper within suitable habitat at the JI Ranch and with the help of volunteers from a youth group affiliated with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Chandler Stake. Habitat chosen for transplant sites included rock crevices,

the base of boulders, and soil pockets under shrubs, with partial shade. The remaining Arizona offsets continue to be nurtured in the greenhouse for future planting.

“Working with young people in our community helps connect the youth to the environment and

educates them on how to protect these natural ecosystems,” says Kami Ballard, Environmental Advisor, Resolution Copper. “In addition, these transplants will enhance the natural cactus population at the JI Ranch by increasing Arizona hedgehog cactus density.”

Arizona hedgehog cactus (*Echinocereus triglochidiatus* var. *arizonicus*) is a low-growing succulent native to the southwestern United

States. On October 25, 1979, it was listed as an endangered plant under the Endangered Species Act. This cactus earned its name because its short, spiny stems resemble hedgehogs.
