Do you see birds, bats, bees and butterflies in your backyard? Notice a plant has gotten new leaves or flowers? Watch clouds and stars in the sky? If so, you have what it takes to be a **Citizen Scientist!** Citizen Scientists help professional scientists by observing and recording data for them. What is data? It's information - all the stuff you notice around you - a hummingbird sipping from a flower, how blue the sky is today, the brightness of the stars in our southern Arizona sky. Citizen Science sites collect this data so scientists can use it in their work.

The website **JourneyNorth.org** is a great introduction to being a citizen scientist. You can choose your topic (see word search puzzle) and begin observing and reporting *Signs of Spring* all around you!

Latest Governor Executive Orders: beauty, barber shops closed; playgrounds open; rental eviction prevention

Mayors across the state called on Governor Doug Ducey to refine the essential services list. In the original listing, barber shops, beauty salons, massage clinics and nail salons were allowed to stay open. Parks and golf courses were also allowed to remain open. On Friday, the Governor issued an executive order to close the beauty services listed above and allowed for playgrounds, basketball courts and other park amenities to remain open as long as they allowed for proper social distancing. Golf courses are still allowed to remain open.

Amenities such as playgrounds, basketball courts, picnic areas and restrooms at parks throughout the Copper Area readership will be closed. Swimming pools may also be closed. The Town of Hayden announced that the park will be fully closed on Easter Weekend to ensure that groups do not congregate in those places. The Town of Winkelman has also closed the Winkelman Flats Park for

All park events have been cancelled or postponed through May 8.


Oracle State Park remains committed to providing open spaces, hiking trails, and outdoor destinations for people to safely enjoy in small groups.

Deadline for AZ Travel ID delayed one year

PHOENIX – The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has announced that the deadline for air travelers to get a driver license or ID that complies with the REAL ID Act, including the AZ Travel ID, has been pushed back a full year to Oct. 1, 2021.

With this delay and the need to reduce customer traffic at MVD locations during this public health situation, all current AZ Travel ID appointments have been canceled. Customers are urged to delay getting an AZ Travel ID until the coronavirus situation has passed to reduce customer traffic at MVD offices.

More than two-thirds of MVD services are available anytime at ServiceArizona.com.

Additionally, customers with a license or permit set to expire between March 1 and Sept. 1 have had that expiration date automatically extended by six months and updated on your motor vehicle record. They do not need to get a new license at this time.

During these times – read your Bible daily. Also, spend time just talking to God, He loves to hear from you. Ask Him – what are Your plans for me, and






