### Cellulite – Differences in physiology make it more prevalent in women

pring is here with its rising temperatures that are often accompanied by rising hemlines. This

extra reveal leads some to be self critical of their dimpling skin.

Cellulite is the cosmetic condition that manifests in this uneven surface on the skin. It is the result of lifestyle choices coupled with physiology that is distinctively female. Ninety to ninety-eight percent of all cellulite is found in women.

Basically, women have a row of standing fat cell chambers just below the surface of the skin that

get distorted with excess fat. Along with this, there is a weakening of the connective tissue that holds them in place. Men have a criss-cross mesh of connective tissue that holds their narrower layer of fat even firmer in place.

The combination of thin surface layer, weakened connective tissue and enlarged fat cells cause the skin of women to buckle and dip in an uneven fashion. Even if an uneven surface is not seen, one can test these structures by pinching the skin to reveal what is called a "mattress phenomenon" (pitting, bulging and deformation of the skin). Ninety percent of women will develop this effect.

The skin may be tender. However, this condition is not the result of an infection or inflammation. It is the result of excess accumulation of fat and the weakening of the tissues that hold these fat cells in place.

Therefore, the most reasonable approach to addressing this phenomenon is to exercise regularly and regulate the


amounts and types of fat that are eaten.


Once cellulite is evident it is harder to reverse. There are many remedies on the market with varying success. Massage is helpful in conjunction with topical applications of herbs or essential oils.

herbs that reportedly strengthen connective tissue. Others that increase one's off excess fat. There are

laser treatments that help break up fat and stimulate the collagen tissue production.

Neither liposuction nor extreme diet regimes have proven to be effective at removing cellulite. It is far more helpful to eat responsibly, exercise, balance one's hormones, reduce stress and avoid constant exposure to toxins (e.g. cigarettes and processed foods).

## Alberto Rios: Arizona's First Poet Laureate

n August of 2013, Arizona became the 46th state in the union to appoint a poet laureate when Governor Jan Brewer selected Alberto Rios to be the state's inaugural poet laureate. On Oct. 10 of that year, I had

the honor to host Mr. Rios for his first public reading as Poet Laureate of the great state of Arizona. The reading was held at the Sedona Public Library and Sedona is a poetry kind of town. The night of the reading as the crowd arrived early, (crowds in Slo-dona never arrive early) it was obvious there was a buzz in the air. The library was forced to put out more and more chairs in the big auditorium as people kept arriving. The local newspaper sent a photographer and newspaper reporter to cover the event. I stood at the podium and addressed the crowd.

"Hola, Beinvenidos amigas y amigos." I addressed the crowd in Spanish to begin the show because Alberto

Rios is a native of Nogales, a town which is split by the international border. His poetry has earned national acclaim and frequently deals with themes of being both Mexican and American. Much of his poetry uses both languages. Rios says that he is often asked which language he spoke first English or Spanish. He laughs and says that as a child, distinctions such as language are adult terms. A child says the word which gets them the cookie. They do not worry about whether that word is galeta or cookie, Spanish or English, they only worry about speaking the word that will get them the cookie. Maybe

as the child grows older, and more sophisticated they begin to learn which words will work on which people. He remembered being a child in elementary school and having a teacher address him and his friends. The teacher

told them, "Your boy's Spanish has a lot of Yaqui words mixed in." Again, Rios points out, as children they were not concerned about the label of the language they were speaking – they were merely trying to communicate. Rios ponders for a moment, and then states. As infants we learn to speak by hearing others form words and ideas – so I suppose my first language was listening.

Rios holds up a piece of melted metal and tells a story about a fire in the Nogales train depot. This chunk of slag was once a boxcar which was melted in the fire, he remembered being young and being transfixed by the roaring fire, so hot it even had the ability to melt

Rios addresses the audience in a soft, gentle voice that is strong and confident at the same time. He speaks at a slow and mellow pace, gesturing with his hands, his stories often building to a hilarious conclusion which leaves the entire audience laughing. He paces as he walks, speaking about why he does not write more about border "issues" such as smuggling, crime and drugs. Rios states plainly that there is no need for him to write about such things, that many people are already speaking about them. He prefers to write poetry about the places where no one

is looking. If the border region is so terrible, afflicted with all these issues and problems, then why do so many people choose to live there – both sides of the border are crowded places. This is what he likes his poetry to

# Sierra Oaks School to close in May; administrator says 'great journey'

The Sierra Oaks Community School in Oracle will be closing its doors at the end of this school year. The closure is due to budget challenges that cannot be overcome.

Administrator Lynn Eggleston said, "Small schools are not making it and the state is making it harder for small schools to stay open." The economy played a big role in the dwindling of enrollment over the years with families moving out of the area. This year's enrollment was 32 students.

Sierra Oaks is a public charter school that opened its doors in 2002. "It has been 12 years of a great journey," said Lynn. "Sierra Oaks offered a safe haven for kids in the community where they could be themselves and felt comfortable." "I feel confident that wherever our students go they will be successful." Lynn said she would like to thank the community for its support. "When I think of all the families and kids that have graduated and come back to say hi and thank us, it will be hard to let go of the kids, staff and families."

The historical building that houses the school is up for sale. It was once a doctor's office. It is located at 650 W. Linda Vista Rd. The school will be holding an auction of school items and equipment sometime in June. The last day for Sierra Oaks Community School will be May 22, 2014. On May 21 there will be a final performance by the students at the Oracle Community Center at 6 p.m.

### Oracle art installation celebrates the Art of Peace

A group of local artists have planned a community art project that is a fundraiser, learning and creative experience as well as an expression of peace. The public art installation will create an army of "Peace Warriors." The idea is for community members to come together and create a band of terracotta soldiers that will stand in a field overlooking and guarding the Catalina Mountains. These unfired terracotta soldiers will stand watch until they eventually, slowly melt back into the earth.

The concept for the terracotta soldiers was inspired by the discovery of the first Chinese Emperor Quin Shi Huang's burial ground. Quin Shi had a terracotta army of 8,000 life size sculptures plus terracotta horses, chariots and real weapons entombed with him at his death around 210 - 209 B.C.. The terracotta army was discovered in 1974 by farmers. Archaeologists then began excavating the

The idea of using the project as an expression of peace came from a woman who became known as the Peace Pilgrim, Mildred Norman Rider became known as Peace Pilgrim when she began walking across North America in 1953. She vowed to walk until mankind has learned the

way of peace. She walked until given shelter and fasted until given food while spreading her message of peace. She wandered from 1953 until 1981 when she died in an automobile accident while on her way to a speaking engagement. She touched many lives and hearts during her journey of over 25,000 miles trusting people to give her shelter and food. Most of the artists working in the project have a connection with the Peace Pilgrim in some way or knew someone who had a connection to her. For Carol Mahoney the connection began in a book store. ABC Books was a store in Denver, Colorado owned by Carol. Her mother Gerry Magnie worked there. Many customers came in the store and asked for books about or by the Peace Pilgrim. They finally ordered some and were so touched by the message in the book they organized an annual Peace Walk which was held every October. The Peace Pilgrim's message continues to inspire people around the world.

No experience is necessary to participate and artists of all levels are welcome. Everyone will be able to personalize their sculptured soldier starting with a clay impression of their own face. Each participant will be given a 25 pound bag of terracotta clay. Five Arizona sculptors will give a demonstration on how to build the figures and will help guide you along the way. The five sculptors are Sharon

Brady, Fox McGrew, Julie Stein, Carol Goldberg and Danielle Neibling. There will also be live music performed by John Magnie of the New Orleans band "Subdudes." The fee for participating in the community art project is

\$60. There is no charge for observers. The profit from the

event will go towards the purchase of a large state of the art community kiln. The event will be held April 5 at the Wilson Barn, 2436 W. Linda Vista Road in Oracle. It is from 10:00 am to 3 pm. The schedule for the day follows: • 10 am to 11 am: Participants will observe five artists each build a soldier figure to start the army. You will be able to ask questions and collect ideas while you prepare to make your soldier.

• 11 am to 3 pm: Everyone will build their soldiers and help place the army facing the mountains, photographing as we go.

If you can't make the event you can still donate as there will be some scholarships made available to local junior high and high school students interested in the project. 

address, the struggle to live ordinary lives of purpose and noble meaning.

Rios tells another story to illustrate his point. A few years ago he was commissioned by Governor Brewer to dedicate a new border crossing in Rios' hometown of Nogales. Rios read his poem at a formal opening in front of a large audience which included Governor Brewer as well as then President of Mexico Vincente Fox. One by one the dignitaries were introduced and stepped up to the podium. Finally President Fox was introduced and people turned their heads from side to side, expecting him

to appear from either the right or the left of the stage. Vincente Fox chose to enter from the rear of the auditorium. He strolled through the crowd, a large man who appeared bigger atop the heels of his cowboy boots and big cowboy hat atop his head. As he walked towards the stage, Fox stopped to shake hands and greet people. President Vincente Fox walked with all the charisma of a rock star.

Then Rios read his poem, describing the shared landscape, the swirling together of cultures, and concluded his poem with the words "it is not the border which divides us – it is the border which unites us."


