Let's Learn Something New!

Want to go on an ed-venture? No need for a fancy GPS for this one; you just need to go outside and look at the sky: day or night; morning, noon or evening. We can look at the sky to view the stars or the moon but our imagination gets the chance to really let go when we look at clouds.

A few basic vocabulary words can help you talk about the clouds. **Cumulus** means heap. Those are the type of clouds that look like a bunch of cotton balls piled on top of each other. **Stratus** means layer.

This type of cloud is stacked flat with lots of layers. Sometimes it is just one big flat cloud that stays a long time and rains soft and slow. It is pretty rare to get that around here but other places get them for weeks and it really bums you out. **Cirrus** means curl of hair, and it looks like a horse's tail as it runs. You see these clouds first when the weather is about to change. **Nimbus** means rain. If a cloud is a rain cloud it will have the word nimbus in it.

When the monsoons start, we get

to see lots of cumulo-nimbus clouds. These are the puffy white clouds that build higher and higher until the bottoms turn dark gray and the rain finally falls out. When they start to form you can see the flat bottom. If you pay attention to the flat parts of the clouds you can see the different layers of air. Have you ever seen puffy white clouds racing along below layers of gray clouds? This shows you the different air layers. They have different densities because of temperatures. Things with different

densities settle in layers, just like the oil and vinegar in Italian salad dressing. Thunderclouds are sandwiched between two layers of air. You can see their flat bottoms and their flat tops stretching out like anvils.

Clouds form when warm, moist air meets a layer of cool dry air. Sometimes parts of the air with high pressure meet low pressure areas. This makes the warm moist air rise up into the colder parts of the atmosphere. If you have trouble remembering how that works, just think about when you make your own clouds from your breath on a cold winter day. Your warm, moist breath comes out and the water condenses into a cloud when it hits the cold air outside your body.

The lowest clouds are called fog, which forms on or near the earth, and the highest clouds, cirro-stratus float at higher than 20, 000 feet. There is a lot to learn about the atmosphere and the water cycle.

CLOUD-RELATED ACTIVITIES

- 1. Make up a story: If you lay on your back and look at the sky, you can find out a great deal about each other by "seeing" things in the clouds. You can make up stories about the things you see.
- 2. Write a poem.
- 3. Paint a picture: There is nothing more challenging and at the same time nothing easier than drawing a cloud. You can use blue construction paper and white chalk for the novice in the family. Tear or cut a piece of paper into a lumpy-bumpy shape. Rub white chalk onto the edges. Use a piece of tissue (Kleenex) to wipe the chalk onto the blue construction paper. Move it to another spot and repeat. Use other colors for sunset, sunrise, or storm.
- 4. Create a model: Cotton balls glued on clear plastic can make good models of clouds. Go online and find examples of the different kinds of clouds and try to make all of them. Hang them together as a mobile and challenge yourself to place the different types of clouds at the correct layer of the atmosphere.


