Let's Learn Something New! MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day, celebrated on the last Monday in May, honors all of the men and women who died fighting for our country. These men and women dedicated their lives so we can be a free nation.

Having a day to honor the soldiers who lost their lives started after the Civil War (1861-1865). The original name was Decoration Day.

Decoration Day was started on May 5, 1868 by General John A. Logan, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, head of the Organization of Union Veterans to honor union soldiers who died in the Civil War. It was called Decoration Day because family members of fallen soldiers decorated their graves with flowers.

The first service to honor fallen soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery was held on May 30, 1868. President Ulysses S. Grant

Decoration Day originally only honored the soldiers who died in the Civil War. After World War I it was changed to all soldiers who lost their lives in war.

On May 11, 1950 Decoration Day was changed to Memorial Day. In 1966, Congress along with President Lyndon Johnson declared Waterloo, New York the birthplace of Memorial Day, and President Richard Nixon declared Memorial Day a federal holiday in 1971

The official flower of Memorial Day are red poppies. People celebrate Memorial Day by placing flowers on soldier's graves, flying flags at half-staff, attending parades and remembering soldiers who lost their lives.

So, who is most at risk for developing a heat-related illness? Older adults, the very young, and people with chronic diseases. Some factors, but not all, that might increase your risk of developing a heatrelated illness include things like:

- High levels of humidity
- Heart disease
- Obesity

It is not only those with existing health issues who may be affected by high heat at-related and temperatures. Young and healthy people can be affected if they participate in strenuous physical activities during hot itself by weather. So, what can you do to help you and your

Dehydration

• Sunburn

So, what can you do to help you and you family stay cool? Try these suggestions:
Wear appropriate clothing. Choose lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing.

• Stay cool indoors. Stay in airconditioning as much as possible. A fan can help provide comfort but they aren't effective when the temperatures are in the high 90's. Take a cool shower or bath.

• Schedule outdoor activities carefully.

• Pace yourself. Cut down on exercise during times of high heat.

• Wear sunscreen. Use "Broad Spectrum" or "UVA/UVB protection".

• DO NOT leave kids or pets in hot cars! Temperatures in a vehicle can climb to life-threatening levels in a relatively short time.

• Stay hydrated. Drink more fluids, regardless of how active you are. If your physician has you on medication for water retention, check with your doctor on how much water you should consume.

• Replace Salt and Minerals: Heavy sweating removes salt and minerals from the body that need to be replaced. A sports drink can replace the salt and minerals you lose in sweat. If you are on a low-salt diet, have diabetes, high blood pressure, or other chronic conditions, talk with your doctor before drinking a sports beverage or taking salt tablets.

• Make sure you also keep your pets hydrated!! Leave them bowls of cool, clean water.

While everyone can experience a heatrelated illness the most susceptible groups are the very young, the elderly and those with certain medical conditions. When





Town of Superior Public Hearing Regarding Use of CDBG Funds

The Town/City/County is expected to receive approximately \$\$223,627 in FY2020 federal CDBG funds from the Arizona Department of Housing Regional Account (RA). The Town/City/County also intends to apply for \$300,000 in FY2020 CDBG funds from the State special projects (SSP) account. CDBG funds must be used to benefit low-income persons and areas, alleviate slum and blight or address urgent need. Based on citizen input as well as local and state planning objectives several potential projects have been selected to be forwarded to the State of Arizona with a request for funding. A public hearing will be held at the regular Town Council meeting at 7:00 pm on June 11 at 199 N. Lobb Ave., Superior, AZ 85173 to discuss the potential projects. It is expected that the Town Council will select the final project at this hearing and adopt applicable resolutions. In the most recent Special Income Survey Superior was found to have 60% low/mod families, or approximately 1254 low/mod beneficiaries for area wide projects.

Due to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, which have prompted declarations of a public health emergency at both the state and federal levels, this meeting will be conducted using measures to protect public health. Members of the public are encouraged NOT TO ATTEND THE MEETING IN PERSON but instead to attend and listen to the meeting remotely by telephone.
