# Concerned citizen encourages attendance at School Board meetings

The next one is May 15. All of you should try attending two or three meetings and see for yourselves the chaos our kids are going through daily. Even many of the staff work under stress and harassments. It's a hostile work environment for a good many of our school employees.

This hostile and fearful environment is also alive and well with our children. There have been at least seven reported cases of sexual assault in the primary grades. Bullying and assaults are common place. These are criminal acts! There was a poisoning incident as well.

What did the administrators do? As usual, nothing. They

didn't even call the First Responders to check the child out. They didn't even call the parents of the child who was poisoned.

There has to be changes in our School Board. They have a sign out front of the school stating "Kids First." Do they care for our children - boasting catch phrases for the public to see, but, withholding the real information that the public should know. Their sign should say "Beware all who enter here."

I'm speaking on behalf of our parents who have been hurt, angered beyond the limits. Their children have been and still are being assaulted, threatened and don't even want to go to school because they are afraid. A school should be a safe place for our children who are taught varied topics and teachings they will need in adult life. How can they focus on learning when they are terrorized

by classmates? Ignoring parents and children in need of help, and sweeping the chaos under the rug is no acceptable response.

Our School Board denies much of the reported complaints, ignores the seriousness of the situation. The Head Administrator chooses to remain in denial about the incidents, but, it is also noticed that several School Board members have been infected with a serious case of selective memory loss, or pretend ignorance of situations.

We need immediate change and actions in our schools! Let's all work together to effect the changes we need. Children are products of their environments; not just in the home, but, the schools as well.

# Business as usual by the Superior School District

The Superior School Board had many items to discuss. The 27 seniors were approved for graduation and the preparations for graduation are underway. Many students are securing scholarships which make the school district proud.

Student will be traveling out of state to San Antonio, TX for the National Family, Career and Community Leaders of America competition on July 4-11, 2014. This item was discussed and approved. Five students and their parents have committed to their attendance and participation in the conference. This is a fantastic leadership conference for these young adults to attend.

There was a presentation regarding the district-wide Security Equipment Grant from Logicalis of Tempe, Ariz, and the photovoltaic array for the JF Kennedy campus from Sun Renu of Scottsdale, Ariz. These two projects can improve security and reduce energy costs. The cost of both programs requires no expenditure of the district funds except those provided specifically for this use. The plan is to install digital cameras and inter-lock doors at the jr./sr. high campus as well as video monitoring equipment.

Cameras and video monitoring equipment will be installed at the JF Kennedy campus as well. The photo-voltaic array will provide 80 percent or more of the necessary electricity for the entire campus. This will allow the district to use electric utility payment money for other uses.

The Superior School District has help programs for kindergarten through sixth grade students based on appropriate behaviors with others, including a thorough discussion of what is and what is not bullying. Janina Watkins, Pinal County Attorney's Juvenile Office presented information and answered student questions and parents were invited. There is an all day training scheduled for July 24, 2014, this is designed for all students K-12 and an evening for parents. Mr. O'Donnell recently held 43 parent conferences regarding student behavior.

There have been a few students who are utilizing the district counselor for discussions. The JFK conference room is set aside for counseling services when needed. O'Donnell said, "We have created and





Hunter Flanagan, Cierra Navarrette, and Matthew Zavala took home the top awards at last Tuesday's Sports Banquet at Superior High School. All three are multi-sport student athletes.

Hunter Flanagan was the winner of the Manny Ruiz Award, given each year to the student-athlete who displays good citizenship, excels academically, and performs well on the field.

"It's really great to be selected as the Manny Ruiz Award winner," Flanagan answered when asked what the award means to her. "It's a great honor, and represents citizenship, academics and sports. It's really a great accomplishment."

Flanagan also received the Co-Offensive Player of the Year Award as a member of the Panthers' state playoff softball team.

Cierra Navarrette was named the Female Athlete of the Year. She also took home awards in volleyball, basketball and softball.

"I think it's an honor to be considered," Cierra Navarrette said about winning Athlete of the Year Award. "I think it's awesome that all three of us (won the awards) because we're all friends and we're all juniors."

Navarrettte's other awards included Outstanding All-Around Player (volleyball), Defensive Player of the Year (basketball), and Co-MVP (softball).

Matthew Zavala was named the Male Athlete of the Year. He played football, basketball and baseball this year and won the Big Man Award for his efforts on the Panthers' basketball team.

"It's a great honor. I'm not sure if I really earned it," a humble Matthew Zavala said.

"I'm going to work my butt off next year to make sure I do earn it."

Most of the student-athletes at Superior are compete in multiple sports and several athletes won multiple awards last Tuesday.

Freshman Nicolaus Cruz took home four awards in football, basketball, and baseball. Elizabeth Ochoa took home three awards in JV Volleyball, varsity basketball and softball.

In an interview before the banquet, Superior Principal and Athletic Director spoke about the success of the studentathletes and the Panthers' athletic program this year.

"Education and athletics go together, obviously," Duarte said. "It's always good when we have student-athletes who can take on both and be successful."

"If they continue to work and grow as people, and players, we're going to see that translate in the next year," he continued. "It's all about the work and the most important work is in the classroom."

Duarte acknowledged that success can mean different things for some of the Panthers' teams. He said he doesn't considering wins as they only to measure success. Making progress, as many of the Panthers' teams did this season, equates to progress.

The softball, baseball and tennis teams, to name a few, had great success on the field and on the courts this year. With a number of returning players on all the teams, Duarte said Panthers' fans can expect the teams to improve going forward.

"Most of the underclassmen (boys and girls teams) will be back to do it again," Duarte predicted. "With one more year of experience, I think it's going to translate well for them."



distributed information flyers for students and their families which outline information of available counseling services."

There is a new procedure of calling parents when students are involved in situations which require the calling of law enforcement officers. This has been used three times since the incident on April 7. O'Donnell also said, "We are working with the attorney and the Superior Chief of Police to draft a protocol for use by staff when dealing with situations of these types."

Summer school was approved to be held during the month of June. The funds to pay for the summer school will come from Rural Education Achievement Program (REAP) federal funds. At JFK the scheduled days will be June 27 through July 26, Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to noon. At the jr./sr. high the activities will be a credit-recovery format with students working on the PLATO software from noon to 4 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

There will be an ASBA Board Member Training on Wednesday, May 14, 2014 at 5:30 p.m. The next regularly scheduled school board meeting is scheduled for June 4, 2014 at 7 p.m. everyone is encouraged to attend.
