

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PBHS Bassoonist performs with All-State Orchestra

Poston Butte senior Rylee Brower's music career started, like most accomplished musicians, as a child, when she would belt out whistling performances on request from whistle-starved family members.

Her musical performances continued throughout the years, not as a whistler but as a bassoonist, culminating with her second appearance with the Arizona All-State Orchestra in a concert that took place on Apr. 23 at Northern Arizona University. Brower started playing the bassoon – one

She unwittingly chose the bassoon over the trombone when given the choice by her music teacher. Like many other bassoonists, she was initially attracted to the instrument by all of its buttons and levers.

Brower's high school music career started at Combs, where as a freshman she was "forced" to audition for regionals by Mr. Warner, her band teacher at the school. Auditions were mandatory in Warner's class and part of his grading rubric.

In her first audition, Brower did not make it but was selected as an alternate.

"It was very scary," she said about her first-ever audition. "I had never really auditioned like that before and had to prepare hard music. Then I had to go in there and perform in front of judge, who sat behind a screen.

"We had to do sight readings, scales, and I wasn't familiar with my scales," Brower continued. "It was a big mess."

Despite the difficult experience, Brower acknowledged she was more inclined to audition each year thereafter, progressing from a first-alternate as a sophomore to a third-chair bassoonist in the All-State Orchestra as a junior to a second-chair bassoonist in her most recent All-State Orchestra performance.

"(Music) is something that you can't just say, 'Oh, that's easy," said Brower, who transferred to Poston Butte during her junior year. "So every year I've noticed that I wanted to (audition) because it was a challenge that I wanted to concur."

She admitted her failure to make regionals as a freshman made her work on music, which increased her knowledge and growth as a musician. The result of her hard work was realized when she earned one of the six bassoonist chairs in the orchestra in each of the last two years.

"It's surreal almost," Brower answered when asked to describe the ascension between her freshman and senior years. "The fact that I've seen myself progress so far in a short amount of time."

Brower credits taking private lessons, which started during the last half of her sophomore year, for her success. Coincidently, it was shortly after the commencement of those lessons that she was selected to her first All-State musical group.

"It always takes someone who has a good work ethic, in general," Poston Butte music teacher Jedadiah Mixdorf said about Brower. "Someone who is willing to practice at home and responds well to feedback. If they don't do those kinds of things they're probably not going to do well."

"Rylee has someone who gives private instruction," he added. "She found a person that can help her refine her skills, take that person's feedback and apply it."

Brower was asked for the single, mostimportant advice she would give any aspiring musician.

"Don't give up, just keep practicing," she responded. "It's terrible at the beginning. A person may hate it and won't want to practice any music. My first concert was terrible. Luckily I had directors that kept pushing me and said, 'just keep doing it.' The repetition is how we learn."

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Lady Broncos efficient in playoff opener

The No.2-seeded Poston Butte softball team scored two runs in each of the first three innings of last Saturday's first-round playoff game against No 31-seed Holbrook. Co-ace pitchers Taylor Strupp and Lindsay Lopez combined to retire the side in order in four of the seven innings and faced only four Lady Roadrunners' hitters in two others, helping the Lady Broncos advance after a 6 – 1 victory in a game that took less than 90 minutes to complete.

"We played well enough to win," Poston Butte head coach Don Baker said after the game. "We were able to pitch to contact and let the rest of the defense do some work. I think overall, if we can keep (performing) like that, we'll be fine."

Senior leadoff hitter Kaily Candell singled to start Poston Butte's half of the first of inning and advanced to second on a sacrifice by Skyler Jenkins. The Phoenix College commit later scored on an RBI-double by freshman cleanup hitter Lindsay Lopez to give Poston Butte an early 1 - 0 lead. Amanda Pachello, another freshman, followed with an RBI-single that scored Lopez to make it 2 - 0.

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Poston Butted added to its lead in the second when Candell's second hit of the game - a double - scored Jacqueline Hernandez, who singled leading off the inning. Jenkins then singled to plate Candell but was thrown out trying to advance one base.

The Lady Broncos scored two more runs in the third and could've scored more if not for Lopez getting caught in a rundown between third and home after she doubled to start the inning. A pair of singles and stolen bases by Pachello and Alexis Faust resulted in two runs on a two-out, two-RBI single by Ronni Sample.

Holbrook pitchers shutout of the Lady Broncos' the rest of the way but by then more than enough damage was done to make things easy for Strupp and Lopez.

"Our defense was solid today," Strupp said afterwards. "We just need to keep that up through the rest of the playoffs.'

According to Baker, the Lady Broncos' lineup needed to make adjustments during the middle-to-latter innings of the game.

"I would've liked to see us a little more aggressive at the plate the second and third time through (the order)," he said. "That's the biggest critique I have of (our hitters).

"A pitcher that throws a first-pitch strike to

nearly every batter, we should've been jumping on the first pitch," Baker continued. "But they've been taught all year to work counts and take pitches, but sometimes we need to make in-game adjustments. We still hit well, we just hit some right at them. We could've easily had a few more (hits) fall and extended the lead a

little bit more."

Strupp's nerves may have been a little overactive at the game's start after admitting, "I think the excitement of the game may have gotten the best of me, but I'll be more settled in for the rest of the games."

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

San Tan Foothills FBLA: a dynasty

Considering the San Tan Foothills' Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter is mentored by the Sabercats' varsity boys' basketball head coach Joe Galish, perhaps it's appropriate to describe the group with a word mostly associated with basketball teams such as the Boston Celtics, the Chicago Bulls and the Los Angeles Lakers.

That word is: dynasty.

It's the word that best describes the state's preeminent FBLA chapter, which has been at or near the top of the annual State Leadership Conferences (SLC) for at least the last half-decade.

San Tan's FBLA chapter once again performed well at the SLC in Tucson last month, resulting in 24 of the organization's 36 members qualifying for the 2016 National Leadership Conference (NLC), which is scheduled for June 27 – July 3 in Atlanta, Georgia.

FBLA is one of several Career Technical Student Organizations at San Tan Foothills and its mission is to combine business and education, ultimately preparing students for careers in business.

San Tan's FBLA chapter perennially ranks among the best in the state, a characteristic the group aims to demonstrate on a national level.

"Mr. Galish holds us to such high expectations that we feel like we have to win," San Tan Foothills' FBLA Vice President Kyle Stanifer told the San Tan Valley Daily PRSS during a recent interview. "We're going to NLC to represent our school and because we've had so much success in the past, everyone that enters our FBLA organization automatically has the same mindset. If a person wants to compete for us they're going to have to bring everything they've got and a will to win."

San Tan Foothills' enrollment is less than 400 students, at least for now. The students in the school's FBLA chapter take great pride in "winning" against schools with larger enrollment numbers.

Sydney Freund, a junior, won Public Speaking 1 at last year's SLC, which qualified her the NLC in Chicago, Illinois.



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

The Bubbly Hostess

The month of May had become an annual tradition for me to write and share some of my favorite cocktail recipes, wines, and beers. For the 4th year in a row, it's time to kick off "Cocktail Month"!

Another tradition that has been around for a few years now is that my neighbor (and friend!) brings a fun cocktail to serve out of her beverage dispenser for our Annual Easter Brunch and Egg Hunt. This year was no different. With a few lemon trees in her yard, she was ready to put the remaining harvest to use, and delivered.

The recipe she used called for smashed blueberries, but given that we were serving out of the dispenser, she thought using whole ones would be a better choice. This comes from a site called No More To-Go, a service that offers menus along with a

grocery list for healthy meal options. If you are making a large batch, you'll want to multiply the recipe as many times as needed as this serves 4 and add the vodka directly into the dispenser. Oh, and you may want more than a "splash" of vodka that it calls for in the recipe.

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
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
