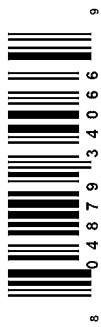

Superior Police Report

According to state law, police may arrest suspected offenders by two methods. The suspect may be physically taken into the department and booked into jail, or the arresting officer may write a citation and release the suspect to appear in court later. 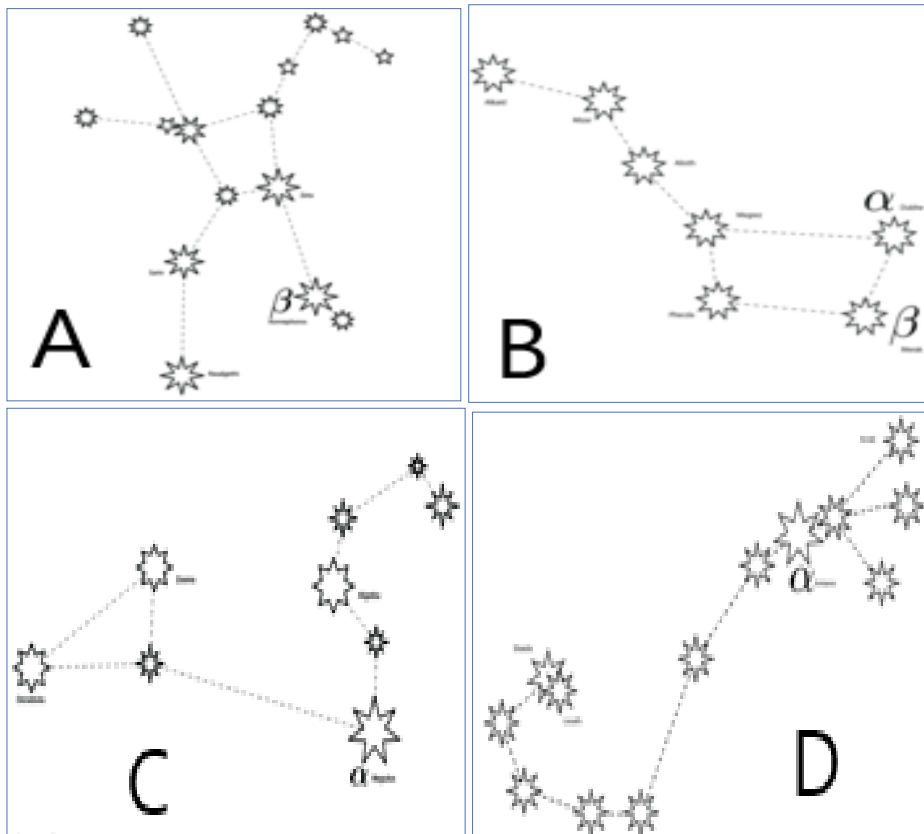

PEOPLE-POWERED SCIENCE

“People-powered science” is the slogan for **SciStarter.org**. This website is a great resource for citizen scientists of all levels and interests. SciStarter promoted April as Citizen Science Month – but don't worry that you missed it! Although April is over, the CitSciMonth tab on SciStarter will remain active indefinitely and has “*featured projects that are perfect for beginners.*” As stated on the site: “*You can play a game to fight COVID-19, take pictures of nature near you to help scientists document biodiversity, stargaze to monitor light pollution, or choose from thousands of other fun and rewarding activities to advance important research that needs you. Citizen Science Month offers thousands of opportunities for you to turn your curiosity into impact. There's **something for everyone, everywhere!** Join a project or event from wherever you are to help scientists answer questions they cannot answer without you.*”

STAR PATTERN MATCH

Match the letter of the illustration to the description of the constellation:

___ **Leo** is imagined as a resting lion. Its brightest star Regulus seems to be the “dot” at the bottom of a backwards question mark that forms the head.

___ **Scorpius** includes the giant red star Antares (the “heart” of the scorpion). The shapes in this constellation remind us of the pincers and tails of the arachnids that are out in warmer months.

___ **Hercules** represents a mythological hero. Unlike the more well-known Orion, which is visible in winter and has several bright distinctive stars, Hercules shows up in the summer. It appears close to Vega, the fifth brightest star in the night sky.

___ **Ursa Major**, or the **Big Dipper**, is easily recognized year-round and its stars are often used to help observers find other stars. For example, one of its stars will lead you to Vega and on to Hercules. Currently, if the Dipper had holes in the bottom, it would be pouring water on LEO's head as it rises.

If you like stargazing, visit **GLOBE at Night.org** to learn about the constellations featured for late spring, early summer observations. Try the matching game (above) for the illustrations here to see what you know about these star patterns.*

Many popular projects involve getting outside and observing plants and animals. **iNaturalist & eBird** are particularly phone friendly – their FREE, mobile apps are easy to use. For families, budburst.org has activities and reporting techniques especially designed for kids.

Are you a weather watcher? **GLOBE** (clouds), **Rainlog.org** or **SkyWarn** might be for you.

Not interested in outdoor activities? Many projects can be done at home. There are even projects for those who love video games. Check out the Project Finder on SciStarter.org and GET STARTED!

Governor announces reopening of some businesses

On Monday, Governor Doug Ducey announced that barber shops, beauty salons and non-essential retail stores may open on Friday, May 8, with increased sanitation protocols and physical distancing requirements in full force. Restaurants can also open their dining rooms on Monday, May 11. Restaurants may only be able to use a portion of their dining capacity and staff will be required to wear face coverings.

Other services such as massage, aesthetics and nail salons were not reopened on this round of opening.

Ducey indicated in his press conference that the Stay at Home order is set to expire on May 15, 2020. During

his press conference he shared data that indicates that hospitals are not seeing an increase in COVID-19 or influenza symptoms.

These openings come with the requirements for physical distancing, increased sanitation and personal hygiene to be in order. Movie theaters are not expected to open until July, in part because the major film producers will not have new releases available until July.

Local businesses in the Copper Corridor will be preparing for their reopenings. In Superior, the local business community and the Town of Superior have signed on to a safety pledge.

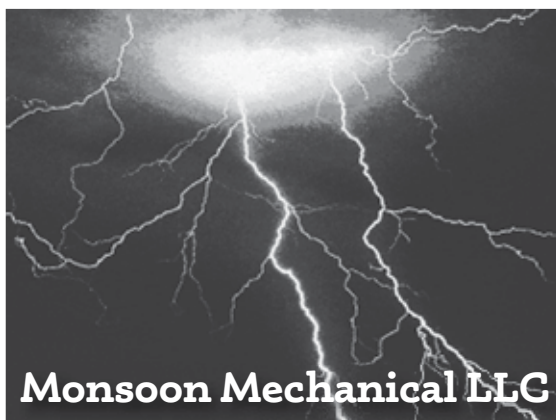

SuperiorCAN: help for the community

“Where is the greatest need in our community?”

In response to COVID-19, Regenerating Sonora, a Superior based nonprofit, began hosting conference calls to ask the diverse community members for their answers to that question.

This approach led to the creation of Superior Community Action Network (Superior CAN). Teachers, parents, a local food bank leader and others participated, and the issue was raised that while the schools are giving out food Monday through Friday, there is a need for food on Saturday and Sunday, as well.

An agreement was formed to fix this problem and the Feeding Our Future Project was put into action as research into finding a reliable distribution source, forming a workable plan, and starting a fundraising campaign at GoFundMe.

The Superior Community got more involved. Bus drivers posted flyers and sharing information with parents on their routes. One driver posted on social media, inspiring 33 others to share. Inspired by the project, a community member stepped in to help and share videos, boosting views and shares. Save Money Market donated plastic bags, gloves and cups. VFW Auxiliary Post 3584 helped pack food bags. Even the students got involved, with the Junior/Senior High Youth Council jumping in to help with distribution. In addition, 55 donors helped raise money.

On Saturday, May 2, volunteers and those they were working to help met at Leo's, from 11 a.m. - noon, to provide the youth of Superior with food for the final weekends of the school year. 74 bags were distributed to 27 families and 296 meals were provided.

What now? Two more weekends until school ends, allowing the community two more opportunities to help or seek help. Plus, SuperiorCan held another meeting

on Tuesday, May 5, to discuss possibilities of providing meals during the summer.

What is Hyperbaric Wound Therapy?

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy involves breathing pure oxygen in a pressurized room or tube. Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is a well-established treatment for decompression sickness, a hazard of scuba diving. Other conditions treated with hyperbaric oxygen therapy include serious infections, bubbles of air in your blood vessels, and wounds that won't heal.



In a hyperbaric oxygen therapy chamber, the air pressure is increased to three times higher than normal air pressure. Under these conditions, your lungs can gather more oxygen than would be possible breathing pure oxygen at normal air pressure.

Your blood carries this oxygen throughout your body. This helps fight bacteria and stimulate the

release of substances called growth factors and stem cells, which promote healing.

- Anemia, severe

- Skin graft or skin flap at risk of tissue death
- Wounds that won't heal

During Hyperbaric Therapy

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy typically is performed as an outpatient procedure and doesn't require hospitalization. If you're already hospitalized and require hyperbaric oxygen therapy, you'll remain in the hospital for therapy. During hyperbaric oxygen therapy, the air pressure in the room is about two to three times normal air pressure. The increased air pressure will create a temporary feeling of fullness in your ears — similar to what you might feel in an airplane or at a high elevation. You can relieve
