Martina Burnam was selected as the new Town Clerk for the Town of Kearny during the March Council meeting. The position has been vacant since January 2019.

Martina started in her new position on April 29 after resigning her position with the Gila County Probation department. In her 15 years with Gila County, she worked as a case manager and managed agency statistics for the probation department. Her roles at the Gila County probation

department prepared her for the Clerk position, as it required understanding of Arizona Revised Statutes and detailed record keeping. The Town/City Clerk position is the oldest known professional position in municipal government. Each incorporated Town and City in Arizona are mandated by law to employ a Town Clerk. The person employed as a Town Clerk is responsible for maintaining all official Town records such as minutes, resolutions, proclamations, contracts and all correspondence. The Clerk is also responsible for declaring and managing elections, and is the official treasurer for a city or town.

Martina, in her new role, will also manage the human resources for the Town of Kearny and is responsible for the management of the Library and Swimming Pool. She also oversees the utilities clerk and the accounts payable clerk.

She will be taking the Certified Municipal Clerks courses to gain her official clerks certification. The job of Clerk has many deadlines and processes that must be completed and recorded throughout the

year. The certification will help Martina further understand all the complexities and also network with other Clerks throughout the State.

"The job will be challenging, especially understanding new laws and legislation that will affect the Town," she said. Her personal advice on handling all the complexities and deadlines: "Do it early and don't procrastinate," she said.

Martina explained that she has always been called to work with the public.

"My grandfather, Lon S. Burnam, was the Magistrate for the Town of Hayden. It's in the blood," she explained.

Martina lives in Dudleyville and has been an active member of the Copper Basin communities. She has served on the Copper Basin Chamber Board of Directors for 13 years.

"I enjoy serving our communities," she said.

She is looking forward to being able to work on larger projects that will impact the Town of Kearny and the region.

Head Start to reduce services to Copper Corridor

Late last week, educators and town officials throughout the Copper Corridor were stunned to learn that Pinal-Gila Community Child Services (PGCCS) would be closing Head Start preschools beginning with the 2019-20 school year.

Superior town and school officials learned of the planned closure of the Superior Head Start when a member of the community approached the town manager and informed him. He immediately contacted Superior Mayor Mila Besich with the news. Besich is also a member of the Superior Unified School District Governing Board.

In an email to Charity Russell, Chief Executive Officer of PGCCS, Besich expressed her outrage that the information about the closure didn't come from the organization.

"I would like to assume that this decision was not made lightly," Besich wrote, "but it is disrespectful that this was not explained to our community leadership and has happened under our noses without any consultation to the Town of Superior or the Superior Unified School District."

Russell, in response to the inquiries about the closure, cited budgetary shortfalls as the reason for closing the Superior site.

"We are a federally funded grant program," Russell responded, "and, other than a few cost of living adjustments (less than 2%), have been flat funded over the past 13 years. The increase in Arizona minimum wage and continuing rising costs have hit our agency extremely hard. I assure you agency and community data was reviewed before we were forced to make decisions that cause great heartache for us."

"We have been in that same situation for several years," said Steve Estatico, Superintendent of the Superior School District. "This doesn't even include healthcare costs, which have risen over 20 percent in the last three years alone. We had to be creative in our operations so that we could maintain the same programs and quality of education for our kids. This includes maintaining full-day kindergarten, small class sizes, 100 percent free breakfast and lunch, and a tuition free preschool. These programs are in place because we have built partnerships and have advocated for Superior Schools. If we were notified in advance of our Superior Head Start closure, we would have taken action to support its existence."

Estatico reached out to First Things First, a voter-created, statewide organization that funds early education and health programs to help kids be successful once they enter kindergarten, to see if they had any programs that could assist the school district. During that conversation, it was learned that the Mammoth, Payson and Globe sites were also being closed, which Russell later clarified that PGCCS would be closing Globe and Superior this year. Payson's Head Start closed last year. Mammoth's Head Start moved from classroom-based to home-based last year. She said that Mammoth's enrollment in the home-based program would drop to 30 from 36.

Russell explained that the PGCCS program plan for 2019-2020 includes reducing their capacity by 55 Head Start slots across its entire service area and that only 12 currently-enrolled children will lose its services. Russell

Woodbury Fire burning northwest of Superior

A human caused fire, named the Woodbury Fire, is burning near Superior. It started June 8 and has grown to 1,400 acres and as of Monday, June 10, was 0% contained.

An update issued Monday by the U.S. Forest Service said that the fire is actively burning within the wilderness and can be seen by nearby communities. Tree crews and five engines are assigned to the fire and additional resources have been requested. The Superstition Wilderness is extremely steep and rugged and the fire is burning in an area with thick brush, making direct suppression tactics a safety concern for firefighters.

The public is asked to avoid the Woodbury and Roger's Trough trailheads and roads in the area to allow firefighters to work safely building their fire lines.

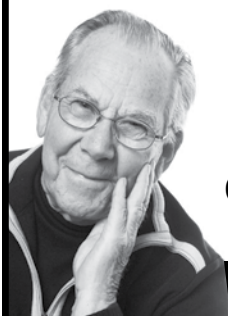

First WNV positive in Pinal County for 2019

FLORENCE – This week, during seasonal mosquito surveillance, the Pinal County Public Health Services District (PCPHSD) detected the first West Nile Virus (WNV) positive mosquitoes in the county. Mosquito surveillance is done throughout Pinal County in order to determine the relative risk of mosquito-borne disease to the community. Vector control specialists hang traps to catch mosquitoes, identify the mosquitoes to determine if they are the type that carry disease, and check if WNV is present in the mosquitoes caught. This data is used to help determine the risk of mosquito borne disease to Pinal County residents and visitors and it guides PCPHSD's disease prevention efforts.

Chris Reimus, who manages Pinal County's vector control program said, "This is a good time to remind people that the best ways to prevent mosquito-borne illness are for residents to stop mosquito breeding on their property by checking for and emptying any standing water. Even a short time outdoors can be long enough to get mosquito bites, so take care to wear protective clothing and use an effective insect repellent."

Other ways to help prevent mosquitoes and mosquito bites:

- Eliminate standing water where mosquitoes can lay their eggs. Check for items outside the home that collect water, such as cans, bottles, jars, buckets, old tires, drums and other containers and get rid of them.
- Change water in flower vases, birdbaths, planters, troughs, and animal watering pans at least twice a week. Be sure to scrub them out when changing water.
- Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets, and move air conditioner drain hoses frequently to prevent standing water.
- If you have a swimming pool or backyard pond, keep it operational. If you must keep it out of use, make sure you remove the standing water, keep it chlorinated, or run the filter daily.
- Keep mosquitoes outside of your home by having well-fitting screens on both windows and doors.
- When using an insect repellent, make sure it is proven effective. EPA-registered and CDC recommended insect repellents include: DEET, Picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon

eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, and 2-undecanone. · When using sunscreen, always apply the sunscreen before you apply the insect repellent.

West Nile Virus is spread through the bite of certain mosquitoes and is now common in Arizona. Other mosquito borne diseases, including Zika virus, are emerging into North America, but have not yet been spread locally in Arizona. Pinal County's mosquito surveillance program specifically looks for mosquitoes associated with human disease.

Not everyone who gets mosquito-borne diseases has symptoms, but for those who do, some may experience lasting or permanent effects and in the worst cases, the diseases can be fatal.

Pinal County also investigates complaints related to disease causing mosquitoes, such as permanent standing water, green pools, or other reports of mosquito activity. added that it was her understanding that the children in Superior affected by the closure would be enrolled in the preschool at the Superior School District.

Estatico told Copper Area News that the preschool classes offered through the district has a very limited capacity, between 20-30 students over two daily classes (morning and afternoon half days). The preschool is tuition-free and is funded entirely by the district, which receives NO funds from the state government for the program. The district offers full-day kindergarten, of which the state government funds only half. Superior's preschool is limited to children age four.

Further, Russell also stated that a private school that is opening is "willing to take all Head Start children that do not get into the school district at no cost."

Estatico said that while there is someone claiming that a preschool will soon open in Superior, the person in question is not certified nor licensed for that service. He said that the person making the claims is doing so only on Facebook.

PGCCS's website, pgccs.org, lists 12 sites in the two counties: Apache Junction, Casa Grande, Coolidge, Eloy, Florence, Mammoth, Maricopa, Miami, San Tan Valley, Stanfield, Toltec and Winkelman. Winkelman's Head Start does not include classroom learning – it is strictly home based. Jeff Gregorich, Superintendent of the Hayden-Winkelman Unified School District, clarified that the Lobitos Preschool being operated out of the Winkelman Primary School has no affiliation with Head Start. Head Start, he said, only has an office on the campus and hasn't been a classroom-based preschool for many years.

Julie Dale Scott, Superintendent of the Mammoth-San Manuel School District, learned of the closure when Copper Area News reached out to her for a comment. Scott was very concerned when learning of the news.

"Our rural area certainly needs the Early Childhood Resources it receives and more, so cutting back is detrimental to our young population," she said.

"I am very concerned about the cuts being made to Head Start Programs in the Copper Corridor. As an educator of over 33 years, I believe early identification and intervention is the hallmark of quality early educational system and is supported by countless educational research-based studies. Reducing early education programming for disadvantage children is a serious mistake that will have a lasting impact on learning and emotional growth for many children in our geographic area," Gregorich said.

"Head Start provides the foundation for our youngest residents," Besich said. "It is often a life-changing program for many families in Superior."

Gregorich concurred.
"This program is a game changer and is needed in through the United States and especially in rural Arizona communities that don't have other programs and options to provides these services. I know that Head Start is a no brainer early educational program that works, and I hope there is still have time to prevent any reduction to Head Start programs," he said.

"I recommend everyone let our political leaders understand that making cuts to Head Start Programs will

hurt children and parents who need it the most,” Gregorich added.

Congressman Tom O'Halleran has been apprised of the situation. His office has not yet released a statement, but is working with local educators and town officials to mitigate the loss of the Head Start sites.
