

Guy W. Bryant

Guy W. Bryant died June 9, 2015 at his home in Superior following a lengthy illness. He was born on May 4, 1923 in Pleasant Ridge, Kentucky. He was 92 years old at the time of his death.

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He worked his family's farms until he was 21 years old, moving to Superior in 1945 for health reasons. Guy owned the Neighborhood Market on the corner of Hill and Stone for a period of time, was the Rainbow Bread Salesman several years, then bought the Union 76 Service Station. He retired from Union Oil 30 years later in 1988, and then went to work for the owner of the new Express Stop until he was 88 years old.

Guy was very active at the local, county, and state level. He was elected to the Superior School Board for over 20 years, serving as it president several years, and he was president of the Pinal County Board of Education several years. Guy also served at the county and state level on the Housing and Urban Development Program (HUD), helping institute low income housing projects at the county and state level, was appointed to serve

on an advisory committee to the Arizona School Board Association, and served on the Pinal County Highway

Advisory Board. During the 60's and 70's he was the July 4th Parade Director, attracting entries from all over Arizona and from several western states. He also helped raise money for the July 4th Fireworks and helped make sure it went off to everyone's delight. Guy was an active member of the Rotary Club, Lions Club, Miami Elks Lodge, Superior Sportsmen's Club, and the Saddle Club.



Guy was an avid hunter, fisherman, and water skier. He and two other friends developed methods and tackle for deep sea fishing in Mexico which resulted in many successful fishing trips and numerous, perhaps exaggerated, fish stories for all to tell. He loved introducing young people to the work field and to the sports of hunting, fishing, and water skiing.

Guy traveled about the USA, rode camels in Morocco, walked sunlit streets in Spain, made countless trips to Mexico, and hunted and fished to his heart's content. His tombstone reads, "Been there, done that." He loved people and enjoyed family functions and social gatherings. Guy was a good storyteller and was happiest when others were having a good time. He was notoriously afraid of lightening which was the source of many stories. He lived a long and full life. He treasured family and friends.

Guy is survived by his son, Guy W. Bryant Jr. of Superior; his daughter, Leslie Bryant of Queen Valley; and a sister, Midge Cole of Sonoita, Arizona. He also has seven stepchildren, Bart, Kathy, Michele, Carrie, Wayne, Delores, and Victoria. He has a slew of grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nephews and nieces, all of whom he was very proud. He was preceded in death by his parents, Guy and Christine Bryant; his brother, Paul Bryant; and a sister, Jean Crutchfield.

A memorial service for Guy is planned on Tuesday, June 23, 2015 at 1 p.m. at the Superior High School Gym, followed by lunch for family and friends at the home of Guy Bryant Jr. at 216 Smith Dr. in Superior.

Free blood lead and urine arsenic testing offered

Cobre Valley Superior Clinic, along with the Arizona Department of Health Services, is offering free blood lead and urine arsenic testing to those who are eligible.

Arizona Department of Health Services is conducting a Community Lead Screening Project which is part of a four-state consortium including: Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona. A summary of statistics will be shared with them, and with the Center for Disease Control, but individual results will be kept confidential.

All children 6 years old or younger, as well as pregnant women, living in high risk zip codes should receive a blood lead test. Urine arsenic testing will also be available for children 6 years old and older who drink from a private well. For those living just outside of high risk zip codes, a questionnaire will be available in order to determine risk.

Lead poisoning can cause learning disabilities, interference with growth, and behavioral problems in children. Arsenic can cause gastro-intestinal upset, skin changes, and kidney malfunction. Testing is free, so please get checked with a blood lead test or a urine arsenic test.







US 60 passing lane project east of Superior starts this week; Intermittent closures for blasting work will be necessary

PHOENIX — The first of a series of planned improvement projects along US 60 between Superior and Globe will start Wednesday, June 17, when the Arizona Department of Transportation begins work to construct a new passing lane from Devils Canyon to Oak Flat (mileposts 231-233), along with other improvements.

When completed, this \$8.8 million safety improvement project will make it easier for motorists to pass large trucks and slow-moving vehicles whose speed drops because of the sustained grades along this stretch of highway from Devil's Canyon to the Oak Flat area.

There will be minimal impacts to the traveling public during this initial phase of the project prior to Fourth of July holiday weekend.

Construction of the passing lane and some shoulder widening will require US 60 to be closed during blasting,

which will start after the Independence Day holiday weekend.

The project will include the following:

- Construction of a new westbound passing lane from Devil's Canyon to Oak Flat (mileposts 231-233)
- Widening shoulders in the Devil's Canyon area (milepost 233-234)
- Improvements to the Waterfall Canyon bridge (milepost 229)
- Box culvert drainage improvements (milepost 242 just west of Miami)

Work hours will be 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Work crews may also be working at night during different phases of the construction. The project is anticipated to be completed by summer 2016.

Removing several areas of rock embankment will

require blasting during the project. The first phase of blasting is being planned for the week after the Fourth of July holiday weekend during morning hours around 9 a.m. The exact day has not been determined. Blasting will occur about every five to seven days in a five-month period until it is completed. Closures during the initial blasts may be up to three hours. As blasting continues there will be a lesser impact on traffic and delays will be reduced.

ADOT will work to minimize the traffic impacts as much as possible, including scheduling some nighttime work.

There will be narrow traffic lanes, wide-load restrictions and a reduced speed limit through the work zone. Flaggers and pilot cars will be used at different times throughout the project. Drivers are asked to use caution, watch for construction equipment and personnel, and allow extra time for your commute.

ADOT works to inform the public about planned highway restrictions, but there is a possibility that unscheduled closures or restrictions may occur. Weather can also affect a project schedule. To stay up to date with the latest highway conditions around the state, visit the ADOT Traveler Information System at az511.gov or call 5-1-1.

Are you ready for the summer heat?

Summer is almost here (June 21) and with it comes the brutal heat that Arizona is known for. Yes, it may be a dry heat but it is still hot, darned hot!

The 100 plus degree temperatures will be starting this week and with it some harmful effects that can even be deadly. In Arizona over 2,000 people end up in the emergency room every year for treatment of heat related illnesses. These illnesses include sunburn, heat rash, heat cramps, heat exhaustion, heat stroke and even death. Over 1,500 people in Arizona died from heat related illnesses between the years 2000-2012, over 100 each year!

Those people with the highest risk of suffering heat exhaustion include the elderly, young children (age o-4), those with high blood pressure, those using alcohol, prescription drugs, or illicit drugs and those people that work or exercise in a hot environment. Please do not leave a child or pet in your car unattended.

Sun Life Health Center has provided information to make the public aware of heat related illnesses and how to identify heat stroke and help prevent it. Their information follows:

The majority of heat-induced stress in Arizona usually occurs during outdoor activities. Help protect yourself and your family this summer from heat/sun stroke and dehydration with some basic precautionary measures:

Drink water: Individuals who are outdoors in the summer heat should drink 1-2 liters of water, and those doing strenuous activity should drink up to 4 liters. Avoid coffee or alcohol, which will dehydrate you.

Protect your skin: Always wear sun screen if you will

be out under the sun for more than 20 minutes. Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing to reflect the heat. Other options are hats or umbrellas.

Take it slow: Try to keep strenuous activity during the cool morning times (between 4-7am). If you are doing hard labor during the hottest times of the day, take frequent breaks in a shaded place to cool down.

Eat more, eat less: Eat smaller meals more often throughout the day. This keeps your energy up, but does not overwork your body. It's advised to especially avoid protein (meat, sea food, eggs, dairy, beans) which can raise your body temperature as you digest it. Also it is wise to eat room temperature or raw foods so that your body does not have to work to keep your body temperature equilibrium.

Despite our best efforts, children and our elderly population are at most risk during the summer months. Knowing what to look for can help save lives. Signs of heatstroke are vomiting, mental confusion, throbbing head, decreased alertness, loss of consciousness, high body temperature (as high as 105 degrees), hot and dry reddish skin, a rapid and weak pulse, rapid, shallow breathing, and seizures. If a loved one begins to show these signs, seek medical attention immediately.
