## APS temporarily halts customer disconnects; thorough review of disconnection policies to be initiated with community groups

PHOENIX – Arizona Public Service announced last week that it will temporarily suspend disconnections for residential customers who are behind on their payments and launch a review of its disconnection policies.

The decision was driven by a number of factors, including recent public comments at Arizona Corporation Commission Open Meetings and conversations with community stakeholders about customer care and safety; the onset of summer heat; and reports of a 2018 customer death in which heat may have been a contributing factor after electricity service was disconnected.

“Our hearts go out to the family of the customer,” an APS spokesperson said. “The safety of our fellow Arizonans is our top priority. We want all our customers to stay connected, especially during the summer.”

Over the next 30 days, APS will conduct a thorough review of its disconnection policies. They will bring together a group of community organizations, advocates for limited-income customers and other public agencies to

work together on the best options to help customers keep their service connected.

Customers will still be billed for energy usage during this suspension of disconnections, and responsible for paying their bills in a timely manner. APS offers a number of assistance programs including payment arrangements, due-date extensions and bill support programs. There are also options for customers who may want to pick a preferred due date, set up auto payment or enroll in the Safety Net program, a resource for customers who may need extra help with bill reminders.

“We are working to serve our customers better and will use this time as an opportunity to improve the way we serve customers whose accounts become at risk of disconnection,” the spokesperson added.

# Quick response contains Kearny's Tilbury Fire

On Friday, June 14, at approximately 3:21 p.m., a fire was reported just east of the railroad tracks near the corrals in Kearny. The fire spread quickly to an area behind the 500 block of Hartford Rd. and the 400 block of Jamestown Rd.

Multiple structures in both areas were threatened but the quick response from the Kearny Volunteer Fire Department turned back the flames preventing damage to any of the threatened structures.

The Kearny Volunteer Fire Department along with aviation resources from the Arizona Forestry Department and numerous other agencies were able to contain the fire to approximately 22.5 acres. There was also a smaller fire that broke out simultaneously between Kearny and Kelvin which was contained at approximately 3 acres. By Saturday morning both fires were 100 percent contained.

The Town of Kearny would like to thank

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# Jeff 'Legend' Garmire to share stories of his Arizona Trail adventure

The average time for a hiker to complete the 800-mile Arizona Trail is 50 days. The rugged and remote trail crosses deserts, mountains, canyons and forests between Mexico and Utah with over 180,000 feet of vertical elevation gain. In April, Jeff "Legend" Garmire finished the entire length of the Arizona National Scenic Trail in only 15 days, 13 hours and 10 minutes. Legend's speedy crossing establishes a new Fastest Known Time (FKT) for the Arizona Trail. He completed the entire journey self-supported—no outside assistance along the way—and shattered the previous FKT by over three days.

How does one person cover more than 50 miles per day, every day, without a day of rest while traversing some of the most rugged terrain in the West? Find out for yourself when Legend shares stories at a series of presentations throughout Arizona this summer!

"It was truly one of the harder things I have ever done," Legend said. "My feet were cut and bruised, my mind was cloudy with exhaustion, and my body was wasted away down to nothing. It was not exactly the experience I was expecting, but it was the one I was searching for."

# Goodbye, blight! Hayden Hotel torn down

This past week, residents of the Copper Basin traveling through Highway 177 may have noticed that a portion of the Hayden Hotel was demolished. The demolition came after years of trying to find a process and procedure that would allow Gila County to demolish the property.

Supervisor Woody Cline started having a few discussions with the County Supervisors Association and even Governor Doug Ducey about the dangerous structure that has been a blighted eyesore on the highway for many years. Local leaders had been trying to have the building cleaned up or demolished for years, but the property owner was unable to make necessary repairs or fund a demolition. The property owner also had not kept the property taxes up to date.

The property had a tax lien on it for \$96,000 and a provision within State law allowed the county to purchase the structure for a reduced amount, so long as it would benefit transportation or drainage. Gila County plans to make this property a parking lot and also install one of the Copper Corridor Ore Carts public art pieces, which will become a destination for local visitors and help with transportation by providing additional safe parking near the highway.

Once Gila County purchased the structure for back taxes they were able to qualify for a Brownfields grant from the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality. This funding allowed Gila County to cover the cost of demolition of the building. The demolition required a special process to protect ensure that lead and asbestos

contaminants did not get into the air. A demolition involving hazardous materials increases the cost, as the crews have to use special procedures, seal the loads to ensure that nothing hazardous enters the air. The crews also have to wear special haz mat suits to protect them.

The other portion of the Hayden Hotel is on a separate parcel and the County hopes to purchase it for back taxes and apply for another Brownfields grant to demolish that section of the building.
