Local First Arizona Partners with Pipeline AZ to revitalize the rural job market in Pinal County

Local First AZ and Pipeline AZ are pooling their resources to optimize how rural job seekers and businesses in Pinal County connect in an ever-evolving, competitive, and fast-paced job market. The rural employment portal found at localfirstaz.pipelineaz.com provides one centralized platform for rural career exploration, posting available jobs, and one-on-one career consultation with intent to keep rural talent working in or near their hometowns.

Over the next 10 years, the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) estimates that Pinal County will see between 1,800 and 3,400 new jobs each year as well as a 50% population growth. These numbers mean that an estimated 4,850 of Pinal County residents may find new employment in their local region instead of relocating to Maricopa County.

LocalFirstAz.PipelineAz.com is working to connect these

workers to jobs that match their skills and interests.

“Pipeline AZ is a rural workforce initiative in Pinal County that Local First Arizona is launching to showcase education and career opportunities that exist locally,” said Lexie Krechel, rural community development manager at Local First Arizona. “Being from a rural community, I know firsthand that often it doesn’t seem possible to get the required training and find a career that you qualify for or are interested in locally. Our goal is to break that cycle. We want those seeking employment in Pinal County to know that local opportunities do exist. Through a quick skills assessment on Pipeline AZ that links candidates directly to local training and career pathways, we are able to show job seekers the track to attain their career goals in their hometown.”

Registration is easy for job seekers and employers. For those seeking jobs, the four step process includes creating their candidate profile, taking a skills assessment, and being matched to jobs in Pinal County where their skills can be applied. ACF activates Disaster Relief Fund in response to Telegraph and Mescal fires

Following the emergency declarations issued by Governor Ducey last week, the Arizona Community Foundation has activated its Disaster Relief Fund to respond to the Telegraph and Mescal fires in eastern Arizona. ACF will seed the fund with \$10,000 to support recovery efforts.

The fund will address post-fire recovery, repair, and community rebuilding efforts. These needs may include environmental and infrastructure projects, community clean-up, support for displaced families, animal care, and/or rehabilitation and rebuilding of damaged buildings or homes resulting from the Telegraph and Mescal fires.

ACF has a successful track record of deploying disaster relief funds to address long-term needs, particularly in response to wildfires. In the wake of the Yarnell Hill Fire in 2013, \$1.14 million was deployed to address the most critical post-emergency needs including help for the underinsured, unmet needs of fire victims,

and aid to the Yarnell Water Improvement Association and the Yarnell and Peoples Valley fire departments. ACF deployed a similar strategy in the wake of the Monument Fire in Cochise County in 2011 and the Slide Fire in Oak Creek Canyon in 2014.

"After over a decade of organizing disaster response funding ACF has honed its strategy and tactically activates the Disaster Response Fund when Arizona communities are impacted by the unknown," said Lisa Urias, ACF Chief Program & Community Engagement Officer. "We work in partnership with local leaders, community residents, and nonprofits to assess needs after the immediate crisis ends and then decide how best to deploy resources to help communities heal and rebuild."

A. The MP-CMP zoning district is established to provide an alternative to conventional residential, commercial and industrial zoning districts by promoting imaginative and innovative planning consistent with the goals, objectives and policies of the comprehensive plan and this title by permitting flexibility in the development standards for large multi-purpose developments that possess at least three of the following characteristics: 1. A central component of at least 1,000 acres involving a sporting, recreational or open space, entertainment, amusement, cultural, industrial or transportation facility; 2. Planned multimodal transportation systems; 3. Coordinated residential, commercial, industrial and public facility uses intended to complement the central component; and 4. Exemplary examples of thoughtful innovative design constructs and agglomeration of land uses. B. The MP-CMP zoning district is intended to accomplish the following purposes: 1. Permit and encourage innovative land development while maintaining appropriate limitations on the character and intensity of use and assuring compatibility with adjoining and proximate properties; 2. Permit greater flexibility within the development to best utilize the features of the particular site, in exchange for greater public benefits than could otherwise be achieved through standard development under this title; 3. Ensure that larger, multi-purpose planned development or employment centers function as integrated communities, with exemplary community amenities and benefits and with enhanced design not required or available in standard residential development; 4. Encourage integrated unified design and function of the various uses comprising the MP-CMP; 5. Encourage a more productive use of land consistent with the public objectives and standards of accessibility, safety, infrastructure and land use compatibility; and 6. Foster a strong sense of community based on the distinctive character of the development and a shared physical and economic environment. (Ord. No. PZ-C-001-16, § 1) 2.360.020. Applicable existing zoning districts and relationship to comprehensive plan. A. An application to rezone to a MP-CMP zoning district may be submitted only for land located within a rural zoning district or combination of rural zoning districts. Approval of a MP-CMP is required prior to development of a MP-CMP zoning district. An approved MP-CMP establishes the location and character of the uses and the unified development of individual development areas and phases within the MP-CMP zoning district. The MP-CMP shall be adopted by the county together with an approved development agreement between the county and the applicant/master developer. B. Projects developed under a MP-CMP zoning district are only appropriate for, and deemed to be in conformance with, areas designated in the county's comprehensive plan land use plan map as either: 1. Employment; or 2. Employment combined with primary airport, secondary airport designations, airport reserve, aviation based commerce center, high intensity activity center or general public services and facilities in any combination, provided, that the employment designation is no less than 75-50 percent of the total project area. At the time of the approval by the county of the MP-CMP, the land shall be designated on the county's comprehensive plan land use plan map consistent with one of the above land use designations. 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Shop at Home: The Hand Me Up Shop

In April 2020, COVID-19 brought much of Arizona's economy to a screeching halt. All businesses not deemed "essential" were ordered closed by Arizona's governor Doug Ducey.

The lockdown continued for nearly two months. When Gov. Ducey finally gave the go ahead to reopen, businesses slowly began the road to recovery. Even those listed as "essential" had a challenge with this economic recovery.

Many small businesses and non-profits in Arizona didn't survive the lockdown. The businesses that did survive are hanging on as best they can. *Copper Area News* wanted to give something back to the local business community. Over the next several weeks, our newspapers (*Copper Basin News*, *Superior Sun* and *San Manuel Miner*)

will be featuring local businesses and non-profits, encouraging our readers to Shop at Home, stay local and support our local businesses. To date, *Copper Area News* has featured 72 businesses in the Copper Corridor.

As the COVID-19 Pandemic took its toll, businesses, families and even local non-profits had to adjust their strategies to keep their missions moving forward while working through the pandemic. Meetings were moved to Zoom and fundraisers had to become creative as in-person events were not allowed.

The Hand Me Up Shop is the primary fundraiser for the Copper Area Health Volunteers.

It started in 1985 as the earning arm of the Kennecott Samaritan Hospital Volunteers. It was a thrift shop

then, and still is today, operating on donations from the local communities, businesses and other friends. The group continued after Samaritan closed the hospital in 1991. It began supporting the new formed Community Health Care Foundation, which organized to keep a clinic in the Copper Basin area. The Hand Me Up Shop operated in two rooms of the clinic building and a major part of the volunteers' effort went towards helping keep the clinic operating.

The group re-incorporated in 2003 and opened for business in a donated building in Kearny. They have since purchased the building and continue to operate as the Hand Me Up Shop. It is a completely volunteer organization and volunteers are always welcomed.

The Copper Area Health Volunteers provides scholarships – for graduating seniors and adults who are entering the health care fields. They are also available to help those who are victims of a disaster – allowing them to go through the shop and pick out what they need. It's a one-time option and is free to those whose lives have been uprooted by a disaster.

The area served by the Hand Me Up shop is the entire Copper Corridor, an area approximately 600 square miles. The mandate for the Volunteers is that they concentrate on health and that all donations are given in the area of health.

The shop is located at 117 Tilbury Dr., Kearny, and is open Tuesday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The phone number is 520-363-9683.
