Mary Ellen (Schmoker) Endsley

Mary Ellen (Schmoker) Endsley, 92, passed away on May 15, 2020 at Solterra Senior Living. She was born on Jan. 12, 1928 to Fred and Grace Schmoker, in southeast Kansas on a farm near Earlton.

Ellen was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Fred (Bill); three brothers, Harold, John and Walter; and two daughters, Julie and Rebecca (Becky).

She is survived by two sons, Douglas (Cindy) of Chandler and Donald (Valerie) of Litchfield Park; two sisters, Hazel Wright of Kearny and Dorothy Gyger of Atlanta; as well as numerous grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and many nephews and nieces.

Ellen grew up on the farm with her two elder brothers and her younger two sisters and brother. She helped with haying, gardening, gathering eggs, hoeing the corn fields, picking off potato bugs. She attended first through eighth grade at a country school named Little Friend, and, grades nine through 11 at a Junior /Senior High in Chanute, Kansas.

The summer before Ellen started her senior year, the family moved to Glendale, AZ, where she graduated from high school, attended a year of Junior College in Phoenix, before going to work for Valley National Bank in Phoenix.

She met Bill on a blind date, riding in the rumble seat of a Model A. Three months later, he and his twin brother, Ted (Bob), joined the Navy, serving the Pacific, but not together, until World War II was over 16 months later. Bill and Ellen were married six months later in Glendale at the First Baptist Church.

Bill attended Lamson Business College while she continued working at the bank, until they were expecting their first child, when Bill quit school and they moved to Ray, where he took up work for Kennecott Copper near Ray. Their children were all born at the old Ray Hospital and graduated from Ray/Kearny Schools; except Rebecca, who died at seven years of age.

They were instrumental in starting the First Baptist Church of Ray in their home and, later, the church and most of the members moved to Kearny, when Kennecott decided to mine the town area of Ray. They both taught Sunday School classes at their church, both in Ray and Kearny, where she also played the piano and organ. Ellen started to work at Ray High School in Kearny, where she stayed for almost 30 years, retiring in 1989. Bill passed away in 1990.

They loved to travel, visiting 48 of the 50 states, and she visited all but two of the continents: South America and Antarctica.

Ellen was a gracious lady, with great leadership and people skills, and a winsome way about her. She often helped out at the church, getting up early in the morning to clean and organize. At times, she would even perform services for another church, when they needed it. Even in her later years, with the pain of arthritis, she was known as someone who "just keeps going and going". She loved to take care of others, serving her community and teaching children both as her vocation and her volunteer work. She also loved to play piano and organ, and was so good at it that the other church she volunteered at would adjust their schedule during the summertime so that they could hear her play.

Ellen will be missed by her family and friends, former students and so many people whose lives she touched with her generosity and kindness.

Services will be given by Pastor Joe Palmer on Saturday, Nov. 7, at 1 p.m.

Let's Learn Something New!

PHASES OF THE MOON



Have you ever looked up at the sky and noticed how the moon changes shape each night? Why does it do that? How does it do that? It doesn't "change shape" at all!

We know that the moon orbits or circles around Earth. As it does, the sun lights up different parts of it, making it seem as if the moon is changing shape. But really, it's just our view of it that keeps changing.

The moon is Earth's only natural satellite (a celestial body that orbits a planet). It takes the moon 27.3 days to make a complete orbit around Earth, but because Earth is moving around the sun at the same time, it takes the moon 29.5 days to go through its eight different "phases", also called a lunar month.

When the moon appears to be getting bigger, it's "waxing" and when it looks like it's getting smaller, it's "waning". During a full moon, the moon is turned towards the sun. As the moon moves

around Earth, the face pointing towards Earth gradually becomes hidden from the sun and then it can barely be seen at all. That is called a new moon.

On Saturday, June 27, at 2 p.m. Arizona time, the Tucson Amateur Astronomy Association will be doing a Facebook Live event to explore the moon. This will be a great activity for the entire family.

"We will help participants see familiar outlines on the moon like the Lunar Poodle, the Lady on the Moon, the Man on the Moon, and the Apollo Lunar landing sites," said Jim Knoll, Tucson Stargazing Adventures Coordinator for Tucson Amateur Astronomy Association. "We will also explore some other interesting objects and lore about the moon. When we are done with the event, you can go outside and look up at a First Quarter Moon."

OREO COOKIE MOON PHASES

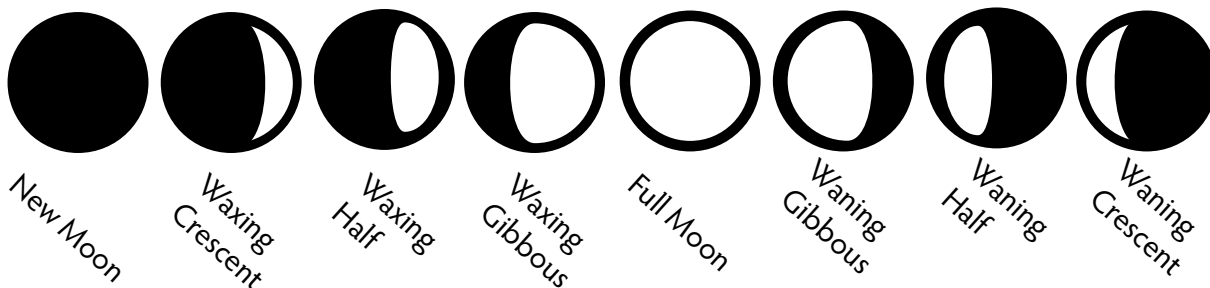
Oreo cookies were made for this activity!

You will need:

- An Oreo cookie for each moon phase
- A Popsicle stick or other tool for scraping the frosting

What to do:

- Slowly twist the Oreo cookie to keep as much of the frosting on one side. You can also cool the cookies in the refrigerator, but then you can't eat the mistakes.
- Use the popsicle stick or other tool to scrape off frosting to create the phases of the moon out of the frosting.
- Arrange the phases of the moon in order to show how the moon changes from new moon, to full moon, and back every 28 days. Recreate each phase in cookies and frosting, and then snack on the results. Yum!



FUN FACTS ABOUT THE MOON

1. The moon moves away from the Earth about 2.8 cm every year.
2. Twelve humans have walked on the surface of the moon.
3. The gravity on the moon is 1/6th the gravity of Earth.
4. The moon averages a distance of 238,600 miles from Earth.
5. Most mythologies include a legend about the sun and moon. One such mythology is Skalli/Skoll and Hati, a pair of wolves in Norse (Viking) mythology that chase the sun and moon across the sky and eat them, causing the beginning of Ragnarök, the end of the world in Viking legends.

To mask or not to mask – governor gives mayors authority to mandate masks

Last week, Arizona Governor Doug Ducey signed an Executive Order to allow Mayors and County Supervisors to make their own ordinances and policies to mandate mask wearing in their local communities.

Here is our local breakdown of communities in the Copper Corridor.

Hayden: At press time, Mayor Dean Hetrick was working to call a council meeting for the Town of Hayden to discuss and approve an ordinance to wear a mask. Hayden shows one case according to the Gila County Health Department.

Kearny: The Town of

Kearny said in a statement to Copper Area News, “Rather than placing restrictions on Kearny’s residents, the Town Council instead believes the residents of Kearny are capable of making their own decisions. With that in mind, the Town Council wishes to extend their trust and faith in residents, and asks everyone to exercise responsible decision-making.” During a phone call with Town Manager Jeff McCormick, he stated that residents, visitors and business owners were “encouraged to make the decision best for them.” Kearny is showing 6-10 positive cases according to the Arizona Department

of Health Services data dashboard.

Mammoth: In a brief phone call with Mayor Joe Dietz, he reported that the Mammoth Town Council voted to approve a resolution requiring everyone to wear a mask.

Superior: Mayor Mila Besich signed an emergency proclamation requiring everyone in Superior to wear a mask when in public in Superior. The order took effect on Friday, June 19. The ordinance will remain in effect until 11:59pm on Thursday, July 9, 2020 to allow the full Town Council to vote on the policy and ratify her decision.

Winkelman: The Town of Winkelman recently announced that effective July 1, 2020 they will close the Winkelman Flats Park indefinitely. Mayor Louis Bracamonte explained that he would be working with Gila County to determine a mask ordinance for Winkelman. Currently the Winkelman zip-code shows 12 positive cases. That zip code also includes residents of Aravaipa, Dudleyville and Dripping Springs; the zip-code also crosses into Pinal

and Gila counties.

For communities of San Manuel, Oracle and other communities and businesses in the unincorporated areas of Pinal and Gila counties, both counties will

be discussing and voting to determine what is best for each county. The Pinal County Board of Supervisors held a meeting on Friday, June 19, 2020, after several

A Statement from the Town of Kearny on Wearing Face Masks

Fortunately, Eastern Pinal County has not seen the elevated COVID-19 numbers found in primary population centers located in other regions of Pinal County.

However, despite fewer cases in Eastern Pinal County, the Town of Kearny believes our Town’s residents should be encouraged to take any and all reasonable precautions, as they decide for themselves to make those decisions as individuals, parents, and families.

Rather than placing restrictions on Kearny’s residents, the Town Council instead believes the residents of Kearny are capable of making their own decisions. With that in mind, the Town Council wishes to extend their trust and faith in residents, and asks everyone to exercise responsible decision-making.

While a role of government is to provide public safety, it is not government’s role to undercut people’s capacity to make reasonable and informed decisions, based on their own discretion and protection.

It is an individual’s decision whether to take reasonable precautions for their own welfare and preservation. Therefore, individuals are encouraged to make responsible and informed decisions. Individuals are encouraged to make their decision based on the best scientific information available.

The Arizona Department of Health Services website states six cases of COVID-19 have been recorded in Kearny. However, local health care sources indicate only three cases are currently positive in the Town limits. Three cases were formerly positive, and those three cases are no longer positive.

Other sources, including social media sites, suggest the numbers could be higher. Such claims could be unsubstantiated or unconfirmed. Social media sites often contain erroneous or misleading information.

Governor Ducey’s Executive Order allows a range of responses, guided by the discretion of local decision-makers. Some communities may have implemented overreaching policies that reduce a resident’s capacity to make their own decisions on how to best conduct themselves when in public settings and make decisions they believe best protect themselves and people around them.

Deciding whether to wear a face mask or face shield in public places is a decision for rational individuals to make themselves. While many government councils have prescribed restrictive measures for residents, the Kearny Town Council believes the residents of Kearny are capable of making reasonable and responsible decisions to protect their own health, welfare, and the safety of others.

Pinal Democrats support striking miners

Pinal County Democrats were given a warm reception by the striking Asarco miners on Friday, June 5th, as they delivered food and checks to the

recently reopened food pantry in Kearny. The visit was a demonstration of support for collective bargaining and for the United Steel Workers

(USW) Local 915 critical food distribution operation. More than 1,700 Asarco miners in Arizona and Texas have been on strike since October 2019.

Manny Armenta, USW spokesman in Arizona, told KOLD News 13 last year, "We've been in negotiations for over a year now trying to make some sense about this and to try to get a fair agreement. This is a last resort, we don't like going on strike but when we get pushed against the wall we are going to take action and we did." Armenta said many workers had not received a pay increase in about 10 years, and according to various reports, the proposal would more than double the out-of-pocket contribution individual workers would have to pay for healthcare.

There are signs the strike is having an effect on Asarco and its parent

Spike in number of wildfires concerning for fire management officials

A spike in the number of wildfires this year is concerning to fire management officers as resources become spread thin and fires compete for firefighters, equipment, and aviation.

The Bighorn Fire, which has threatened the communities of Oracle and San Manuel, was started by a lightning strike on June 5 in the Catalina Mountains northwest of Tucson. It has burned 58,553 acres (as of 8 a.m. Tuesday, June 23) and is 33 percent contained. In the Copper Corridor, it forced the evacuation of Peppersauce Canyon, High Jinx and the Campo Bonito areas. The evacuation orders lifted Monday, June 22, but those areas and most of Oracle is under a "set" order.

As of Tuesday, June 16, 2020, 941 wildfires have burned nearly 170,000 acres of private, federal, and tribal lands. Last year, during the same time frame, 689 fires burned close to 47,000 acres of land.

Ninety-five percent of this year's fires are human caused, and while a majority of the fires are not intentional, they are most certainly preventable.

Department of Forestry and Fire Management investigators found multiple ignition sources, including an abandoned campfire, fireworks, and cigarette butts at the point of origin on the Stage Fire, near New River,

back in May. The multiple ignition sources made it difficult for investigators to pinpoint the exact cause of the fire.

The East Desert and Ocotillo Fires were also determined to be human caused. Investigators say East Desert was started by someone using a weed eater to clear vegetation in their yard.

The ignition source of the Ocotillo Fire remains under investigation.

This year, state fire investigators report some wildfire starts on private and state lands include, target shooting, escaped burn barrels, abandoned campfires, grinding metal, welding, and a barbecue grill that blew over in the wind.

"All of these fires could have easily been prevented by paying attention to your surroundings, the weather, and fire restrictions. Fire crews are over extended and fire managers are competing for ground and air resources. We are throwing every available resource at these fires, yet upon ignition, fires are showing signs of extreme behavior. They are burning fast and hot through retardant lines and making containment efforts challenging. It is extremely important that people help

us out by doing their part," said John Truett, DFFM Fire Management Officer.

DFFM asks Arizonans to do their part by never burning on windy days or using equipment that may throw sparks. If you must work outdoors, do so in the early morning or early evening hours when temperatures are cooler.

Before getting on the road, check to ensure tow chains are secure and your car is in proper working order. Fires can start by overheating vehicles, blown tires, and drivers pulling off into tall grasses.

Residents need to create defensible space around their

property and establish a buffer zone between the home and potential wildfire.

Stage II fire restrictions are in place across Arizona; on both federal and state lands. Under Stage II, campfires are prohibited. Target shooting and fireworks are never allowed on state land at any time of the year.
