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Strong social connections key to supporting families

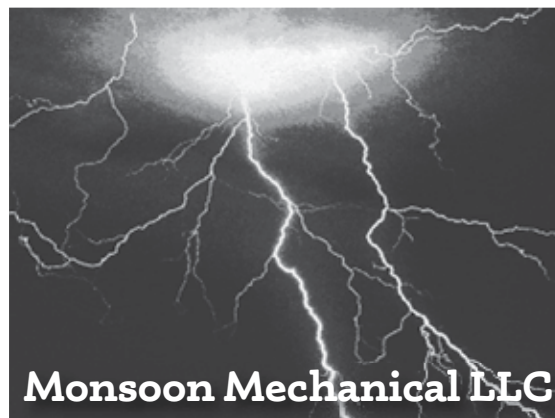
As Arizona's early childhood agency, First Things First (FTF) recognizes that babies, toddlers and preschoolers need positive interactions with adults for healthy development. It's equally important that their parents and caregivers have positive connections in their community to help them face the challenges of parenting.

During these times of social distancing, FTF, along with

community partners remind families that there are ways to reach out and find places to make these social connections – for example, within local communities of faith, online support groups and local health providers. Social connections that provide emotional support to parents is one of five protective factors that families are encouraged to develop as a way to mitigate or eliminate stress more effectively. The other four are parenting skills, concrete support through meeting basic economic needs like food and shelter, resilience (ability to manage and bounce back from challenges) and social and emotional competence in children.

"Having someone to reach out to is important when you're stressed and searching for support," said Sandy LaCava, community development manager at Southwest Human Development, which runs the Birth to Five Helpline, a

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To mask or not to mask – Governor Ducey gives mayors authority to mandate masks

Last week, Arizona Governor Doug Ducey signed an Executive Order to allow Mayors and County Supervisors to make their own ordinances and policies to mandate mask wearing in their local communities.

Here is our local breakdown of communities in the Copper Corridor. **Hayden:** At press time, Mayor Dean Hetrick was working to call a council meeting for the Town of Hayden to discuss and approve an ordinance to wear a mask. Hayden shows one case according to the Gila County Health Department.

Kearny: The Town of Kearny said in a statement to Copper Area News, “Rather than placing restrictions on Kearny’s residents, the Town Council instead believes the residents of Kearny are capable of making their own decisions. With that in mind, the Town Council wishes to extend their trust and faith in residents, and asks everyone to exercise responsible decision-making.” During a phone call with Town Manager Jeff

McCormick, he stated that residents, visitors and business owners were “encouraged to make the decision best for them.” Kearny is showing 6-10 positive cases according to the Arizona Department of Health Services data dashboard. Mammoth: In a brief phone call with Mayor Joe Dietz, he reported that the Mammoth Town Council voted to approve a resolution requiring everyone to wear a mask.

Superior: Mayor Mila Besich signed an emergency proclamation requiring everyone in Superior to wear a mask when in public in Superior. The order took effect on Friday, June 19. The ordinance will remain in effect until 11:59pm on Thursday, July 9, 2020 to allow the full Town Council to vote on the policy and ratify her decision.

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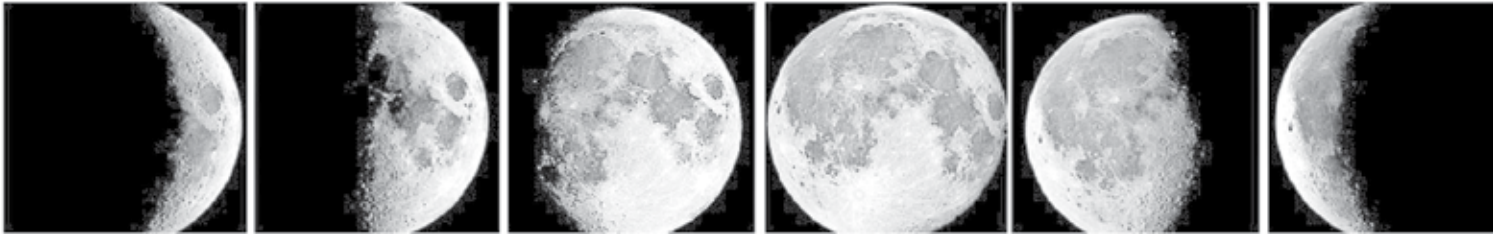
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PHASES OF THE MOON



Have you ever looked up at the sky and noticed how the moon changes shape each night? Why does it do that? How does it do that? It doesn't "change shape" at all!

We know that the moon orbits or circles around Earth. As it does, the sun lights up different parts of it, making it seem as if the moon is changing shape. But really, it's just our view of it that keeps changing.

The moon is Earth's only natural satellite (a celestial body that orbits a planet). It takes the moon 27.3 days to make a complete orbit around Earth, but because Earth is moving around the sun at the same time, it takes the moon 29.5 days to go through its eight different "phases", also called a lunar month.

When the moon appears to be getting bigger, it's "waxing" and when it looks like it's getting smaller, it's "waning". During a full moon, the moon is turned towards the sun. As the moon moves

around Earth, the face pointing towards Earth gradually becomes hidden from the sun and then it can barely be seen at all. That is called a new moon.

On Saturday, June 27, at 2 p.m. Arizona time, the Tucson Amateur Astronomy Association will be doing a Facebook Live event to explore the moon. This will be a great activity for the entire family.

"We will help participants see familiar outlines on the moon like the Lunar Poodle, the Lady on the Moon, the Man on the Moon, and the Apollo Lunar landing sites," said Jim Knoll, Tucson Stargazing Adventures Coordinator for Tucson Amateur Astronomy Association. "We will also explore some other interesting objects and lore about the moon. When we are done with the event, you can go outside and look up at a First Quarter Moon."

OREO COOKIE MOON PHASES

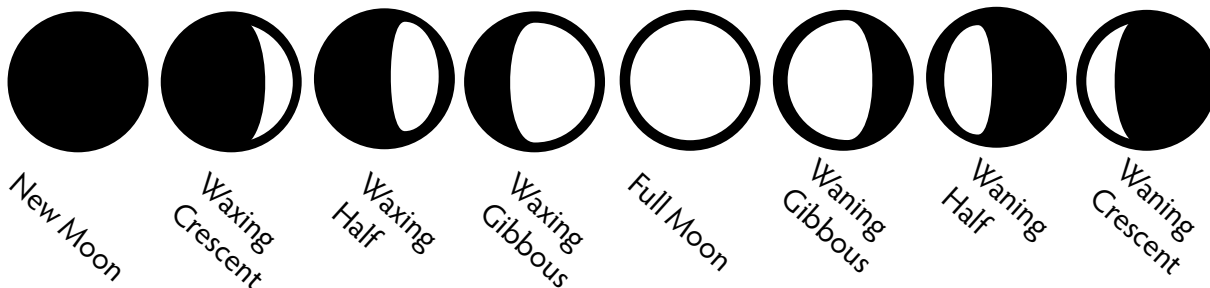
Oreo cookies were made for this activity!

You will need:

- An Oreo cookie for each moon phase
- A Popsicle stick or other tool for scraping the frosting

What to do:

- Slowly twist the Oreo cookie to keep as much of the frosting on one side. You can also cool the cookies in the refrigerator, but then you can't eat the mistakes.
- Use the popsicle stick or other tool to scrape off frosting to create the phases of the moon out of the frosting.
- Arrange the phases of the moon in order to show how the moon changes from new moon, to full moon, and back every 28 days. Recreate each phase in cookies and frosting, and then snack on the results. Yum!



FUN FACTS ABOUT THE MOON

1. The moon moves away from the Earth about 2.8 cm every year.
2. Twelve humans have walked on the surface of the moon.
3. The gravity on the moon is 1/6th the gravity of Earth.
4. The moon averages a distance of 238,600 miles from Earth.
5. Most mythologies include a legend about the sun and moon. One such mythology is Skalli/Skoll and Hati, a pair of wolves in Norse (Viking) mythology that chase the sun and moon across the sky and eat them, causing the beginning of Ragnarök, the end of the world in Viking legends.

Superior Public Library to host Grab 'n Go Summer Reading Program

This year due to COVID-19, the Superior Public Library will not be meeting in person for its annual Summer Reading Program as they have done in the past.

This year, instead, they will have a GRAB 'N GO and Virtual Story Time Program.

"While we can't have any in person programming during the summer, we will want you to have great educational and entertaining activities to enjoy!" said librarian Josie Campos. "We will be putting together 'Make and Take' kits each week that you can pick up outside of the library downstairs."

Participants will have to use the outside stairwell on the north side of the building to receive their kits. The program starts June 30.

HOW WILL IT WORK?
Every Tuesday, beginning June 30 through July 21 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., parents/guardians/caregivers may come or bring their child to pick up their bag. Children in Preschool through 6th grade may participate in the Grab 'n Go Program. Bags are packed with activity pages, crafts, and FREE books. A Drawing for prizes will be held at the end of the program for those who participate!

"We will be receiving new books provided by the Arizona Reading Program Outreach: Special COVID-19 Opportunity Grant," Campos explained. "This project is supported by the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records, a division of the Secretary of State, with federal funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Service. Each participant will receive one or more new book in his/her Grab 'n Go bag."

You must call the library and register your child by June 26 to participate in the program. It is limited to 50 participants. You can call the library at 520-689-2327, Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The library will also have carts full of withdrawn children's books on the patio downstairs and you may take as many as you want. Library personnel advise adults and children to wash their hands well after handling the books. The books were previously planned to be sold at the library's annual book sale, an event that was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Please wear masks when coming to pick up the summer reading program materials. The library will not be open and will hand out bags at the door downstairs.

recently announced that effective July 1, 2020 they will close the Winkelman Flats Park indefinitely. Mayor Louis Bracamonte explained that he would be working with Gila County to determine a mask ordinance for Winkelman. Currently the Winkelman zip-code shows 12 positive cases. That zip code also includes residents of Aravaipa, Dudleyville and Dripping Springs; the zip-code also crosses into Pinal and Gila counties.

For communities of San Manuel, Oracle and other communities and businesses in the unincorporated

areas of Pinal and Gila counties, both counties will be discussing and voting to determine what is best for each county. The Pinal County Board of Supervisors held a meeting on Friday, June 19, 2020, after several hours the meeting was adjourned and the board is expected to vote on the matter on Wednesday, June 23, 2020. Gila County Board of Supervisors have not announced when they will officially discuss this matter. San Manuel and Oracle both show that they are in the 1-5 case category. The larger communities in Gila County, Globe and

Payson have adopted policy to require the wearing of masks. The Town of Miami has not announced their policy as of press time.

The City of Casa Grande, Town of Superior and Town of Eloy all have mask mandates. The communities of Coolidge and Florence are developing their plans and the Mayor of Apache Junction, Jeff Serdy, has announced that Apache Junction will not mandate masks, but they will encourage everyone to follow mask requirements of each business.

statewide helpline that is partially funded by FTF.

The helpline is a free service for all Arizona parents or caregivers to call, text or email with questions about their young child's development. The helpline can also offer families connections to local resources and supports.

The Birth to Five Helpline is available at 1-877-705-KIDS (5437) from Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. You can also leave a voicemail, submit your question online, or text the Helpline 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Or download the Birth to Five app for your phone through the Apple App Store or Google Play.

Before the coronavirus pandemic hit, the helpline had started meeting with parents to answer questions over online video chat.

"The specialists are able see mom or dad face-to-face," LaCava said. "It's an opportunity to enhance that support."

Aside from help from early childhood experts, families can seek out social connections in a variety of ways. Immediate family can provide the support in home, or reaching out to non-immediate family, friends and neighbors through the

use of video chat programs such as FaceTime, Zoom and Skype.

Support can also be found in communities with local organizations such as the Community Actions Human Resources Agency (CAHRA), a non-profit agency that provides Pinal County with services such as a food pantry and weatherization improvements for homes.

CAHRA understands that the overall health and wellbeing of the entire family impacts a child's ability to be ready for school and set for life. With this in mind, CAHRA provides services that benefit everyone in the home, knowing that work will deeply impact that home's youngest members, said CAHRA Executive Director Mary Lou Rosales.

"We know that children that have regular healthy meals do better in school," Rosales said. "The Food Pantry's goal is to provide those healthy foods. Weatherization benefits can also be felt by the cooler air in the home environment. Children and other household members feel better with cool air in the summer and warm air in the winter."

During this time, CAHRA has seen a dramatic uptick in the

needs of Pinal County families. According to Rosales, the agency has seen a 51% increase in families asking for food donations and as the weather gets warmer, more families will need to replace or repair air conditioners and evaporative water coolers. For more information, visit www.cahra.org.

Social connections can be a powerful antidote against the isolation and loneliness that parents of young children may feel even more now during social distancing. Helping to provide community connections to families can help buffer parents from stressors and help support nurturing parenting that will then benefit their young children. Spike in number of wildfires concerning for fire management officials

A spike in the number of wildfires this year is concerning to fire management officers as resources become spread thin and fires compete for firefighters, equipment, and aviation.

The Bighorn Fire, which has threatened the communities of Oracle and San Manuel, was started by a lightning strike on June 5 in the Catalina Mountains northwest of Tucson. It has burned 58,553 acres (as of 8 a.m. Tuesday, June 23) and is 33 percent contained. In the Copper Corridor, it forced the evacuation of Peppersauce Canyon, High Jinx and the Campo Bonito areas. The evacuation orders lifted Monday, June 22, but those areas and most of Oracle is under a “set” order.

As of Tuesday, June 16, 2020, 941 wildfires have burned nearly 170,000 acres of private, federal, and tribal lands. Last year, during the same time frame, 689 fires burned close to 47,000 acres of land.

Ninety-five percent of this year’s fires are human caused, and while a majority of the fires are not intentional, they are most certainly preventable.

Department of Forestry and Fire Management investigators found multiple ignition sources, including an abandoned campfire, fireworks, and cigarette butts at the point of origin on the Stage Fire, near New River, back in May. The multiple ignition sources made it difficult for investigators to pinpoint the exact cause of the fire.

The East Desert and Ocotillo Fires were also determined to be human caused. Investigators say East Desert was started by someone using a weed eater to clear vegetation in their yard.

The ignition source of the Ocotillo Fire remains under investigation.

This year, state fire investigators report some wildfire starts on private and state lands include, target shooting, escaped burn barrels, abandoned campfires, grinding metal, welding, and a barbecue grill that blew over in the wind.

“All of these fires could have easily been prevented by paying attention to your surroundings, the weather, and fire restrictions. Fire crews are over extended and fire managers are competing for ground and air resources. We are throwing every available resource at these fires, yet upon ignition, fires are showing signs of extreme behavior. They are burning fast and hot through retardant lines and making containment efforts challenging. It

is extremely important that people help us out by doing their part,” said John Truett, DFFM Fire Management Officer.

DFFM asks Arizonans to do their part by never burning on windy days or using equipment that may throw sparks. If you must work outdoors, do so in the early morning or early evening hours when temperatures are cooler.

Before getting on the road, check to ensure tow chains are secure and your car is in proper working order. Fires can start by overheating vehicles, blown tires, and drivers pulling off into tall grasses.

Residents need to create defensible space around their property and establish a buffer zone between the home and potential wildfire.

Stage II fire restrictions are in place across Arizona; on both federal and state lands. Under Stage II, campfires are prohibited. Target shooting and fireworks are never allowed on state land at any time of the year.
