



To the Residents of Superior: As a resident, all my life, I have seen a lot of things go and come and every now and then I have asked myself the same question, year after year: "Why do most residential homes have no visible house numbers, somewhere on their homes?"

In case of an emergency and needing assistance from paramedics or police, how are they supposed to find your house?

Sure, we are a small town and supposedly everyone, but, in case of an emergency and someone doesn't know you, how do they find you? Department personnel change now

and then.

Sometimes, even a child or young adult who might make that emergency call doesn't know the number. Or, a package delivery from somewhere else like UPS or FedEx can't find you! Keep your house number somewhere by your phone.

Most important, paint, glue, buy large numbers and place where they can be seen! This should be a requirement in any town. It's for your own safety and survival.

ocated on Magma Ave., you will find the Wild Cow Gallery, home of the Cactus Moon Foundation. As you enter, you will see a large horse sculpture and colorful flags to greet you. The Wild Cow Gallery features the art of many local artists including David Bentancourt, Terry Stone, Maya Barton, L. Woods, Tor, Deb Sears Michaele Cozzi, Charles Davison, Deb Olsen and Marilee Lasch, all for sale in the gallery.

You will find a wide variety of art from these artists including bright folklore paintings, custom bells and bowls, wood sculptures, jewelry, multi-media arts and photography. Residents of Superior and Pinal County do qualify for a 20 percent discount on the art being sold in the gallery.

The gallery helps to provide financial support to the Cactus Moon Foundation, the foundation was formed by Boonie LeBlanc and his sister. Originally the foundation assisted Native American artists from New Mexico, Arizona and California. They provide financial assistance to pay for registrations, travel and other expenses for their artists to attend art shows such as the Santa Fe Art Show, and many others in the Southwest. They also help these focussed artist to learn the business side of promoting their artistic works.

The Cactus Moon Foundation is now focusing on supporting local artists in Superior, the Copper Corridor, Pinal County and Arizona. By taking a more local approach they hope to provide assistance to locals who need assistance. To be considered by the foundation for support, artists should make an appointment with Boonie to have their artwork reviewed. If selected the artist must commit to creating a number of pieces that can be sold or reproduced to support the foundation.

One of the artists featured in the gallery and was an original donor to the foundation, L. Woods. Woods, one of the most prolific folk artists, she donated over 300 pieces that have been sold to support the foundation. She has also visited Superior where she hosted several painting and art classes. She will be returning to Superior in 2019.

State softball champs defeat Superior

Last Saturday's charity softball game, between the 1A State Champion Superior Pantherettes and the Superior Police and Fire Departments, proved two things after the champs' 17 – 2 lopsided victory at the Superior Little League Field.

- 1. The Pantherettes can beat any opponent equally, including a roster of 20 to 40-something police officers and firefighters.
- 2. Superior First Responders are far better at protecting and serving the local citizens and community than they are at playing softball.

The Pantherettes took advantage of the First Responders throwing the ball all around the field, using their speed to plate many of their 17 runs. The Superior defense was stellar behind pitcher Kiki Arriola, as the First Responders scored only 2 runs during the 7-inning game.

"I don't think these guys knew what they were getting themselves into," Superior head coach Martin Navarrette said afterwards.

The players appreciated the Police/ Fire Department's involvement in the charity event, which originated to assist in purchasing championship rings. A goal of \$6,500 is needed to purchase the girls' rings.

Earning the bragging rights in town was an additional benefit.

"It's always fun getting to play other people," senior-to-be Marisa Estatico told

the *Superior Sun*. "Of course, we're girls, so they got beat by a bunch of girls, but we're state champs, so they were going to have a hard time.

"We know how hard they work and they've been on a tight schedule lately, so we appreciate them coming out, taking the time to be a part of (this)."

Despite the beatdown, the First Responders enjoyed participating.

"It was so much fun," said Chief of Police Christian Ensley. "It was such a cool idea and came to be more and more fun. (The girls) beat us badly, but it was fun."

Everyone around Superior appreciated the efforts of the players, coaches and the police/fire department last weekend. The town displays extraordinary pride in being the home of the state champions. In return, the players are grateful for the support.

"It's good to get everybody together and bring opportunities in that will allow our team to get rings," senior-to-be Lindsay Ketron said. "This was opportunity for our team to get more exposure and play bigger and better people."

Added Chief Ensley: "They're the state champs and they should be proud. More importantly, they're good kids and good athletes. Our town has a lot of energy, I believe more than any other town in Copper Country. People rally over an activity like this and they want to be a part of it."



Long awaited completion of the Kelvin Bridge Replacement

FLORENCE, AZ - - A bridge that has been in use for over 100 years is nearing the end of having to see vehicular traffic travel over it on a daily basis.

The Kelvin Bridge was built in 1916. The single lane bridge has served the Kelvin/Riverside area for 102 years spanning the Gila River and connecting the eastern side of Pinal County to the central portion.

"For some people, the Florence/Kelvin Highway is the more convenient way to travel east to west in Pinal County," said District 1 Supervisor Pete Rios. "This bridge is a necessity for the residents in the area."

The objective of the Kelvin Bridge Replacement project is to replace the existing bridge with a 2 lane overpass bridge to not only span the Gila River but the existing ASARCO-Copper Basin Railway as well. The existing 1916 bridge will be repurposed to a pedestrian/ equestrian bridge only.

Almost two decades ago, Pinal County began to pursue federal funding to replace the antiquated Kelvin Bridge. The process for meeting federal funding requirements and the development of construction documents to build the new bridge began in 1998. When federal funds are used in transportation projects, there are specific requirements for environmental, right of way acquisition, utility clearances and the way construction is handled.

"This was a labor of love for Joe Ortiz, who, along with other employees throughout the years, worked on getting the approvals," stated



Public Works Director Louis Andersen. "It was a matter of patience, time and filling out stacks of paperwork to just get this project on the radar for the County. I applaud Ortiz's dedication to getting this bridge going from an idea to reality."

The County coordinated with the ASARCO and the Copper Basin Railway to generate an agreement for the improvements at the railroad crossing.

"At the end of 20 years of work, we have a bridge that will last the next hundred years," Supervisor Rios said. "I am pleased that everyone worked together to make this project a success. I think it's a testament to the hard working attitude and determination of our county employees that made two decades of paperwork, phone calls, emails and meetings into a new Kelvin Bridge."

There will be a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Kelvin Bridge on Friday, June 8 at 9:30 a.m. The public is invited to attend the ceremony.
