MPD identifies found body as Roberto Medina

On Saturday July 6, it was reported to the Mammoth Police Department that a body had been found in a wash off of Old Tiger Mine Rd. The body was later identified as Roberto "Robert" Medina. Medina was reported missing on July 1 by a family member. He was last seen on the morning hours of June 29 headed toward the desert area west of Ruiz Park in Mammoth. It was alleged that he was leaving from a scene where police had been called. It was also reported that Medina had been drinking and was possibly on meth. An investigation and search was initiated by the Mammoth Police Department with assistance from the Pinal County Sheriff's office. Officers interviewed family and friends of Medina in an attempt to locate him. On

until proven guilty in a court of law. Only criminal citations are listed. All damages are estimates.

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Oracle author Catherine H. Ellis receives Goldwater history award

While attending the 2013 Arizona History Convention, Oracle author Catherine H. Ellis and her co-writer D.L. Turner won the Barry M. Goldwater award, given to the best convention paper on Arizona history.

Her paper, "The Trail to Sunset; Anton L. Westgard and Automobile Tourism in Arizona and New Mexico", is about how Westgard, an early automobilist, was instrumental in mapping early transcontinental routes for the early days of automobile driving.

The convention was held in Las Cruces, New Mexico, a joint event with the fellow southwestern

state, from April 18 to 20. Her paper will appear in the next Journal of Arizona History.

Ellis is the noted author of numerous historical books and articles, which have appeared in the Journal of Arizona History. Her books include histories of Oracle and the San Pedro Valley, Latter-day Saints in Tucson, Show Low, Holbrook, the Petrified Forest and The White Mountains of Apache County.

She also got to participate on a panel about the Power brothers shootout for a new documentary film being produced called *The Power Shootout: An*

Arizona Tragedy. The film is about the Power family of the Galiuro Mountains of Graham County, the subsequent shootout with law enforcement, and the manhunt and trial that followed in 1918.

Ellis presented a Church of Jesus Christ Latter-day Saint viewpoint on the incident. Other members of the panel were historian and writer Heidi Osselaer, filmmaker Cameron Trejo and director Dodge Billingsley.

Trejo and Professor Heidi Osselaer are producing the film, which is due out in the fall. A trailer of the film and more information on the DVD release is available at Facebook.com/ThePowerShootout.

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Monsoon weather hits Mammoth

On Wednesday, July 11, 2013 the area of Mammoth saw an amazing monsoon strike through the area. In some places the wind was approximately 50 to 60 mph gusts. Pablo Rodriguez of the Town of Mammoth said they were extremely busy through the night and the next day, they had many transformers and power poles that were down. Many people in town were out of power for several hours, some as long as 24 hours.

The Town of Mammoth began working the night that the storm came through and were up early the next morning back at it. Some people had minimal damage, but others had flooding, trees through windows, coolers ripped off homes and significant damage. It will take some time to have everything back to normal but power has been restored and the Town of Mammoth truly did everything they could to restore power to everyone as quickly as possible, along with road crews working to clear the roads and helping each other in the community.

It is so important that we show appreciation to not only the people in police, fire, medical, and life saving professions, but also the community pulling together. On Thursday, when power was still being restored in many areas, Mammoth San Manuel Community Schools opened the cafeteria and auditorium to help people without power. On Wednesday, July 10, a wind, hail and rain storm hit Mammoth. The storm knocked out power and caused flooding throughout town. Electrical power was out for 26 hours. They served water and acted as a cool place to stay until power could be restored. Some people reported losing food due to spoilage. Mammoth-San Manuel Summer Elementary Program: four weeks of learning for local students

The Mammoth-San Manuel Unified School District has been fortunate enough to hold a four-week summer school for the students of First Avenue Elementary School and Mammoth STEM School. The programs started June 3 and ended

June 27. The programs were sponsored by the generous donations from SaddleBrooke Community Outreach and Mammoth-San Manuel Community Schools.

Most of the students were in the preschool program and were taught the importance of goals for

learning, playing together, being nice, following directions and self-care. There are different themes one teacher was using small chalkboards to have the children write letters, they write them in chalk and with a sponge and water. Learning letters is essential in the beginning

stages of school. The teachers also worked with the children with drawings, finger paints and reading books. They also learned about different colors and items that correlate with them: an example would be red like a fire truck, blue like cookie monster, etc. This

is a fun time for the young children and they learn a variety of things.

The students in Kindergarten through sixth grade worked with teachers and had smaller class sizes to focus the difficulties the students were having throughout the previous school year. This gives the students an opportunity to ask more questions, have a little more attention from the teachers and hope to build up the learning skills, getting them ready for the upcoming year.

Mammoth-San Manuel Unified School District strives to provide comprehensive, successful

learning activities for young people in school. The opportunities help develop a student's potential in the areas of academic ability, physical well being, social development and community contribution. Schools belong to the community, are people developers and most importantly schools are for expanding the minds of our children!

July 3, the Pinal County Sheriff's office Search and Rescue was notified and were asked to assist in the desert search for Medina. Deputy McGuinness said he would assist with the search and help with a follow-up on a person of interest who lived in San Manuel. McGuinness later advised the Mammoth Police that they had been unable to locate Medina in the desert area west of Mammoth. It was also noted on a Mammoth Police Department report that on July 4 the Pinal County Search and Rescue had advised a Mammoth police officer and the

family that the case did not warrant a full search by Search and Rescue.

On July 6 two people that had been exploring the area looking for Indian pottery, gold and caves came across the body in the wash laying face up. They walked back to their vehicle and called 911. When officers arrived they found Medina laying face up wearing only a pair of shorts. He was lying approximately 15 feet

away from the nearest tree. His personal belongings including his wallet, shoes, socks, shirt and hat were on the ground spread out under the tree. It appeared that Medina had been dead for some time as the body showed signs of decomposition. Police reports indicated that there were no signs of trauma on the body nor did it appear that any criminal

activity was involved. The Mammoth Police Department is waiting for the autopsy report to determine cause of death. Robert Medina was 34 years old.
