

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# Firefighters respond to nearly 50 wildfires over July 4th weekend

The 4th of July holiday weekend keeps Arizona firefighters extremely busy.

The Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management reports, between Thursday, July 4, and Sunday, July 7, firefighters responded to 46 wildfires across Arizona, on all land

jurisdictions. Those 46 fires burned a combined total of nearly 4,000 acres.

Most of the fires over the holiday weekend were human caused, including vehicles parked in tall grass, debris burns, and welding.

Fire activity remains high across the state, including the desert areas, due to an abundance of grass from last year's winter rain and snow

Residents need to use caution when conducting outdoor activities that require an active heat source and should have water nearby if debris burning or using any equipment with an open flame

Drivers should avoid pulling off to the side of the road into tall grasses, ensure tow chains are properly secured, and vehicles are inspected before getting on the road.

Campers need to check area fire restrictions before leaving for their destination. Stage I fire restrictions are in place on some state and federal lands.

Where campfires are allowed, always make sure they are cool to the touch before leaving. Drown campfires with water, stir, and then repeat until completely out.

As of today, 935 wildfires have burned more than 205,000 acres on private, state, federal, and tribal lands. Of the 935 wildfires so far this year, 94 percent of them were determined to be human caused.

# Supervisors vote to open negotiations with Public Works Director Louis Andersen for County Manager position

FLORENCE – The Board of Supervisors have ended a month of speculation and guessing by voting to begin negotiations with Public Works Director Louis Andersen for the soon-to-be open County Manager position.

The vote was 3-2 with Supervisors Todd House, Pete Rios and Anthony Smith in the affirmative, Chairman Mike Goodman and Vice-Chairman Steve Miller as no votes.

The County Manager position was posted in May after Greg Stanley announced his intention to retire in October. Three candidates were the finalist for the position – Andersen, Assistant County Manager Leo Lew and Chief Civil Deputy Attorney Chris Keller.

Following the vote, District 5 Supervisor Todd House said Andersen has demonstrated excellent professional aptitude in this position which he has held for many years. In conjunction with his professional history/education, Mr. Andersen and his family contribute in the public sector.

Chairman Mike Goodman said that he fully supports the outcome of the Board's

decision, and looks forward to working with Andersen in improving our County.

"We had three extremely qualified and competent candidates for this position." Goodman said. "It was a difficult decision as we knew all of the final candidates would do a great job in this role. It was a very tough choice."

The County Manager is the top administrative post for Pinal County. The Board of Supervisors develop and vote on policy initiatives for the county, the County Manager is in charge of having those policies implemented.

# Imerys hosts public meeting on Forest Road 4

The Imerys perlite mining plant manager Tom Hawk and a corporate representative from Imerys, Todd Whitacre, hosted a public meeting on Friday evening to address the closure of Forest Road 4 south of Superior.

In June, Imerys closed access to Forest Road Four when the company began developing a plan to conduct ore sampling in the Old Chicago pit and the New Chicago Pit. Both of these pits have been inactive for over a decade, but a new type of drywall being manufactured may require the grade of perlite that may be present in the inactive pits. In order to determine of the grade is sufficient the mining company must test ore. If the ore can be used the company may go into production. However it could be up to a year or more before the mining pits are prepared for active mining. Imerys owns the land and patented mining claims where both pits are located – they are not located on Forest Service land.

Imerys corporate headquarters are located in Paris, France and there are multiple operations in America and across the world.

For many years, this area, despite being private property, has been an important recreation area for residents of Superior and visitors to the area. This year, the Forest Service created a southern access hiking trail into Arnett Canvon near the pit, with the closure of the Forest Road 4, access to this trail head is now closed off. One of the pits has been the location of an unofficial shooting range and the pits do cross some riparian habitats near the

Forest Road 4 is a major four wheel drive/ATV route connecting Superior to the Box Canyon area near Florence. It also provides one of the main access routes to deliver water and maintenance supplies to the Arizona Trail near Superior and also is a main route that hunters use to access various hunting camps. The Town of Superior is concerned that the closure of this road will pose a health and safety issue and have long term negative affects on the local economy.

Local residents Hank Gutierrez and James Schenck were vocal during the meeting, expressing concern that the officials from Imerys did not have

any real answers or solutions to the problem. There were no officials from the Tonto National Forest present at the meeting. There was discussion during the meeting that Forest Road 4 may pre-date statehood, which would mean that it is a historic route, thus access should not be restricted. Superior Town Manager explained that one of the entities concerned about the closure would need to file a lawsuit and retain an attorney to fight the restricted access.

Officials from Imerys, did not have any immediate answers but suggested that


a meeting with Tonto National Forest be held to discuss potential options to re-route Forest Road 4 away from their mining operations. Recreation users in the area are concerned that permitting a new road on the Forest Service lands could take up to three years or more which would limit their access to the recreational areas. Anyone who is concerned about the

Superior businesspeople and residents listen as officials from Imerys Perlite talk about the closure of Forest Road 4 and the reopening of their closed mining pit.





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

# Central Arizona College supports manufacturing industry

As part of a regional consortium of community colleges and industry partners, Central Arizona College will receive \$1.2 million in federal funding to develop industryrecognized apprenticeships in manufacturing. Pima Community College will lead the \$4.23 million federal grant to develop Arizona's consortium project, named the Industry-Recognized Apprenticeship Model in Manufacturing, or i-RAMM.

Under i-RAMM, Central Arizona College, along with education partners Pima Community College, Estrella **Mountain Community** College, GateWay Community College, and Mesa Community College, will work with industry to develop apprenticeships

that are competency-based and blend classroom and on-the-job experience.

The National Institute of Metalworking Skills (NIMS), The Manufacturing Institute of the National Association of Manufacturers (NAM), and the National Tooling & Machining Association and Arizona Chapter (NTMA and ATMA) will provide assistance to the consortium by offering workforce credentials, certifications and technical assistance for apprenticeships at employer sites and promote opportunities to their members in Arizona and nationwide. In collaboration with the Arizona Commerce Authority Office of Economic Opportunity, the model will be expanded

to other participating employers and colleges in the Arizona Advanced Technology Network (AATN).

"CAC is pleased to collaborate with our educational colleagues and industrial partners in Pinal County to positively impact the manufacturing workforce," said Dr. Jackie Elliott, CAC President. "This enhances the work we have done as a member of the AATN to develop **Automated Industrial** Technology program curriculum, which is a result of our work with Pima and the Maricopa County Community College District, to address employer's needs."

Beginning this fall, CAC will offer a 16 credit

**Automated Industrial** Technology Certificate I and a 16 credit Automated Technology Certificate II. These systems include robotic, mechanical, hydraulic, pneumatic,

electrical, and electronic devices. Graduates will gain the skills to define. integrate, install, program, and maintain complex control and production systems.

After completion of the certificates, students may continue on to complete an Associate of Applied Science in Automated Industrial Technology.
