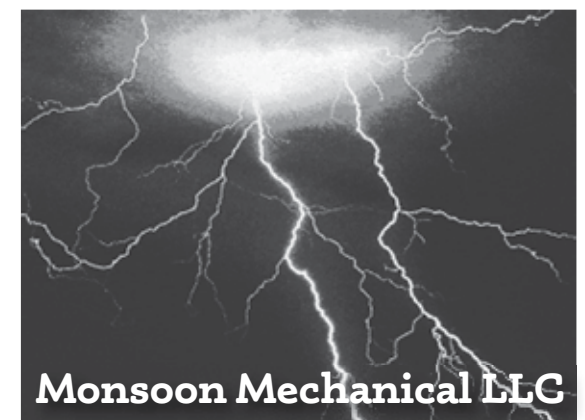

# COVID-19 takes the life of community leader Roy Chavez

The COVID-19 Pandemic has not discriminated, and it has taken its toll on the entire Copper Corridor and as Arizona continues to be a hotspot, Superior has realized its fifth death due to COVID-19.

While the death of the beloved and longtime Hayden-Winkelman teacher, Kimberly Chavez-Lopez-Byrd made national headlines, her brother Roy Chavez was fighting COVID-19 in a Valley hospital. On the afternoon of Friday, July 17, 2020 Roy "Potts" Chavez lost his battle with this raging, savage, virus.

Roy devoted his life to community service. The lists of boards and commissions he served on throughout his life were numerous, not to mention times he pitched in to help coach parks and recreation programs. He was elected as a Town Councilmember, Mayor and was hired as the Town Manager in Superior. He was the first Mayor to be directly elected by the voters of Superior. During his career as an elected and staff person, he helped to lead a variety of new ideas for community improvements such as the Queen Creek Riparian Restoration plan and downtown amphitheater, plans

that are being brought into fruition today. He was a founding member of the Superior Optimist Club, served as President of the Superior Chamber of Commerce and Superior Rotary Club. He helped to breath life into Superior during the 1980s and 1990s when things were much more dire for the community.

Later in his career, he became an advocate for Saving Oak Flats, serving with the "Concerned Citizens and Retired Miners" group. His oftentimes controversial position against Resolution Copper brought to light some of the inequities of the 1872 Mining Law and the potential for environmental destruction of the project. His voice was heard at the local and state levels but his voice and advocacy were also heard in the national and international news.

His voice carried with a booming, jovial tone and he was often the community Master of Ceremonies for parades, an announcer for hundreds of sporting events and the prompter of the oohs and ahhs of fireworks shows for decades. While he was a fighter for what he believed in, he brought joy to people's lives through

his work as a DJ and bar owner. He was a friend many could call on and, in his time of need, his friends rallied for him. His ability to assist with golf tournaments raised hundreds of thousands of dollars throughout his life.

He was also a teacher; he served as substitute teacher in San Carlos prior to his death and over the years also worked for the Superior and Hayden-Winkelman school districts. He was the father to Josh and Andrea Cruz, a brother, a friend and community leader who truly never stopped caring for his community of Superior. He also taught the value of community service to others, and many will tell stories of the times Roy called on them to "help" with community projects or how he inspired them to "get involved"

This is just a glimpse into the life of Roy Chavez, taken from our archives and our memories at the *Copper Area News*. He will be missed by everyone who knew him. Our communities are better because of him, even if we all did not agree with every position he took. Our team at *Copper Area News* mourns with his friends and family.

At 18 years old I joined the U. S. Marines out of a sense of duty to our great nation and its citizenry. Even at this young and inexperienced age I deeply believed that I owed my country this enlistment. I served with some of the best men and women from all over this diverse nation.

I was deployed to five countries and served on two ships and was away from my family for nearly a year. The pay was minimal, but it was an adventure and honor to serve along side my fellow Marines and Sailors. I believed then and now in serving others first.

After four years I was honorably discharged and began my Law enforcement career with the Department of Corrections. I worked shift work and was subject to mandatory hold overs when we were short staff. I again was honored to serve alongside dedicated Correction Officers. This was my first opportunity to observe the criminal justice system and how it operated. The pay was a little better than the military and I am thankful for the experience.

In 1994 I began my career as a Peace Officer as a Patrol Deputy in District One Pinal County. I worked graveyard shift for the first year of my career. The starting pay was around \$ 13,00 an hour. I was promoted a total of four times in my career. On my spare time I was able to obtain my degree using my own money to pay for classes. My pay raises mainly came from promotions as I did not rely on my opponent who was on the board at the time for pay raises.

Throughout my career I was subject to call outs on nights, weekends, and holidays. I spent many hours away from my family while my opponent slept comfortably in his bed. Throughout my 31 years of public service there were times when my personal safety was at risk. What personal risk has my opponent ever taken? Yet he attacks me for drawing a retirement that I have worked hard for my entire career. Does my opponent feel this way about the hundreds of Arizona Peace Officers and Corrections Officers that have loyally served and earned a retirement?

My opponent sleeps in his three-bedroom house in Apache Junction, which is District five. He does not even respect voters enough in District one, where he is elected to represent.

I have defended our country and protected our communities for 31 years. I will accept the will of the people on the August 4th primary. I will not let attacks on why I have chosen to serve, and my record of service go unanswered.

# We Serve Together For Superior! Vote Yes on Prop 413

**E**lection time is once again upon us. Voters in Superior will be asked to vote for three Councilmembers to serve four year terms. For this election, has three incumbent candidates that are seeking re-election: Councilmember Olga Lopez, Councilmember Vanessa Navarrette and Councilmember Bruce Armitage. While they are running unopposed, are each seeking re-election to the Superior Town Council, they do not have opposition, you - the voters of Superior - should all feel confident that your vote for them will ensure our community continues to move forward.

Each of these incumbent candidates brings a wide variety of experiences and knowledge to the leadership of our community. They work as a team with our colleagues Vice-Mayor Michael Alonzo, Councilmember Stephen Estatico, and Councilmember Gilbert Aguilar, and our staff at the Town of Superior. Together, we have been able to make many improvements to Superior. When you vote to keep this team in tact, it means that we can continue to keep our community's momentum moving forward. Our Council works together to provide checks and balances, and as Mayor, and I can count on each of them to weigh in on the tough decisions we are often faced with.

As a team, we have completed park improvements, developed and managed a comprehensive road maintenance and improvement plan (we still have a lot of work to do here, but we are working on it). We will break ground on improvements to the Waste Water Treatment Plant and finalize designs for the construction of

our new multi-generation center for our residents by the end of 2020. Soon, we will be finalizing the annexation of additional land into our Town limits. We have improved our working relationship with Resolution Copper and together with their partnership, we are making significant and lasting positive improvements to our community. Our team, has many accomplishments to list, but the one thing I am most proud of is that our entire Council is focused and determined to help Superior thrive and together, we find a way to lead through the challenges that we encounter.

I would also like to ask that voters in Superior vote Yes on proposition 413, the Alternative Expenditure Limitation. Voting yes means that the Town can spend the additional funding that we receive from grants and other revenue sources above the State imposed limitations.

As an example, in 2021-2022, the state-imposed limitation plus applicable constitutional exclusions will allow expenditures of \$1,963,744.00. Under the proposed alternative expenditure limitation, we estimate expenditures of \$7,773,486.00. The additional expenditure funding goes to administration, streets and building maintenance, public safety, sewer/refuse services and special projects. The additional revenues come from federal and state grants and other local sources.

With humility, I ask that you keep our community moving forward, together. Vote for Armitage, Navarrette and Lopez and YES on Proposition 413.

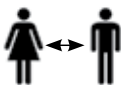

## Copper Corridor businesses receive over \$4.2 million in Federal PPP loans

While headlines across the nation focussed on the very large businesses such as Ruth Chris Steakhouse, AutoNation and other large corporations who received Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans, businesses across the Copper Corridor also received some of this much needed funding. The Copper Corridor region received roughly \$4.2 million dollars from 136 loans that were less than \$150,000. In addition to these loans, 19 loans were awarded that over \$150,000 but exact amounts were not listed. The combined loans programs saved approximately 1,159 jobs in total.

The PPP program was designed to help companies with fewer than 500 employees maintain their payrolls and cover expenses for two months such as rent and utilities. These PPP loans will convert into grants and not have to be paid back if the businesses maintain their payrolls and keep their businesses operating.

In addition to these federal programs, Pinal County also offered a Business Assistance Support Grant to businesses in unincorporated Pinal County. The Town of Superior also issued \$97,000 to 21 small businesses operating in Superior. Both Pinal County and the Town of Superior used their CARES funding, which was granted from the State of the Arizona allocation of CARES funding that was

released by Governor Doug Ducey, to create their grant programs. The Town of Superior utilized the services of Local First Arizona to manage the grant applications and make the awards. Pinal County filed a lawsuit against Governor Ducey to release the CARES funding to communities and counties that did not receive a direct allocation of CARES funding. Cities and counties with populations over 500,000 received direct allocations of CARES funding from the Federal Government. The smaller cities and counties in Arizona had to wait for the Governor to release funding to the smaller counties and cities.

The federal programs were a life saver for the Boyce Thompson Arboretum. The funding allowed the park to remain open and retain their staff. The ongoing watering and maintenance of the plants at the Arboretum is not a task that could be left undone. The funding helped to keep the Arboretum growing and also ensured that guests to the park had a safe place to participate in physically distant recreation. The federal applications were challenging for many businesses and several called upon the help of Senator Kristen Sinema's office to help move the process along.

Businesses in Globe were the largest recipients, saving 736 jobs and \$2.6 million in loans under \$150K. The only town that did not have any businesses receive any PPP funding was Hayden. The business types varied from non-profits, LLCs and corporations.

Copper Area News is committed to providing our readers with as much information as possible. We post a daily update on our Facebook page with the total positive COVID-19 Data. This graph shows the daily counts of positive cases for the past week as of press time on July 21, 2020.

There are a few points we would like our readers to consider when following this data.

1. This will continue to be a rolling total of positive cases. It does not reflect recoveries or deaths. The Arizona Department of Health Services does not break out this data.
2. If you see a reduction in numbers from day to day it is most likely due to a data entry error or mis-coding of a zip code (at the state level).
3. This is all zip code based data; most of our zip codes include unincorporated areas. There is no way to track exactly which areas each of the positive cases are. Example, Kearny and Winkelman each have small communities in their zip code that are not in the Town's incorporated boundaries.
4. If you live in Gila County, please follow the Gila County Health and Emergency Management, Facebook. They have maintained their data on recoveries and current positive cases.
5. You can follow other data such as ICU bed use, Ventilator use and hospital capacity online: <https://bit.ly/3inh280>
