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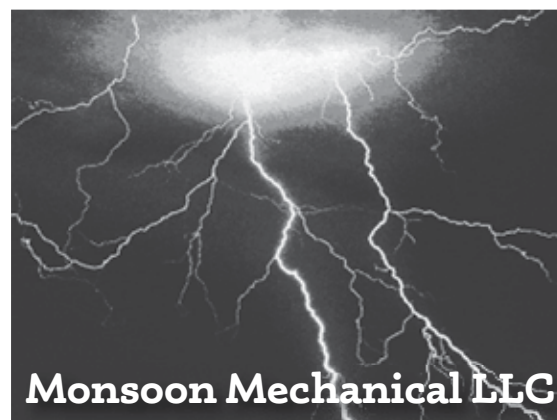
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## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

# Unhappy with plans for Besich Park

**T**he Town of Superior will be closing Neary Ave. turning it into a cul-de-sac and they want to use a 10 ft. solid concrete wall to close it. Townspeople will no longer have access to Main St. using Neary Ave.

Many neighbors were never notified. My handicapped sister got a knock on her door approximately 2 weeks before the planning & zoning meeting of July 3, 2019 that would forever be changing her life. The neighbors she was able to get hold of had heard nothing about the closing, AND they were not happy.

P & Z said they did not have to send notifications because it was in the Public Notice in the paper (which not everyone buys) and if people are that interested in what is going on they should attend meetings (which people don't do unless it personally affects them). How would you know if something is going to affect you if someone doesn't contact you??? Wouldn't

you think that a letter to ALL Neary Ave. residents would have been the courteous thing to do? P & Z, with the exception of 1 commissioner voted against Neary Ave. residents & want to build the 10 ft. solid concrete wall anyway.

My sister has lived in her home, adjacent to Besich Park for 43 years. She became a stroke victim June 1999 (20 years ago). That stroke cost her a husband, friends became non-existent and her only happiness was caring for her 9 year old son. She had to re-learn to walk, read, write left handed, speak, cook, and care for her home. This, to a woman who loved to dance, joke and entertain friends and family. She loved life...So what is left?

1) Her Family  
2) Sitting on her front porch with a cup of coffee people watching.

What does the town want to do? Well with the 10 ft. solid concrete wall they want to cut off the only outside

stimulation she has. That is a huge ask of a handicapped person. With a 10 ft. solid concrete wall she will no longer have direct access to or be able to view Main St. The town originally told her the wall was a sound barrier to help her with the noise. As my sister told them ... SHE HAS NEVER COMPLAINED ABOUT THE NOISE, HER CAR BEING BLOCKED FOR SEVERAL DAYS AT A TIME, THE TRASH THAT PEOPLE DUMP IN HER YARD AFTER EVENTS (Apache Leap Festival, Prickly Pear Festival, etc) ... Never a single complaint from her. This is her only entertainment. Due to her handicap she does not go to public functions because she is afraid of tripping or being tripped by people that are unaware of her situation.

Next Stop ... July 11, 2019 ... Superior Town Council where the vote was 3-3 ... a tie! Where my sister pleaded with them to "Have a Heart". It was finally decided that

the town would try to find a compromise.

What would a good compromise look like?

A 6 ft. solid concrete wall with the remaining 4 ft. constructed of an OPEN material, equaling 10 ft.

The town says it is the musicians that need the 10 ft. solid concrete wall.

I personally contacted 3 local musicians and through an intermediary 3 more were contacted.

Only 1 expressed an interest in the 10 ft. solid concrete wall. The latter 3 laughed and said 10 ft. concrete wall WAS NOT needed. That is why speakers and amplifiers are used.

How can you help? Contact the Town Manager, Todd Pryor at 520-689-5752 or manager@superioraz.gov and ask him to continue to work in finding a solution NOT using a 10 ft. solid concrete wall.

## Prepare yourself, your vehicle before highway trips in extreme heat

PHOENIX – With merciless temperatures forecast over the coming days, be sure you and your vehicle are prepared before traveling on highways in the Arizona desert.

Motorists should always be ready for the possibility of becoming stranded, but that need is even more critical in extreme heat.

The Arizona Department of Transportation's safety tips, available at [azdot.gov/ExtremeHeat](http://azdot.gov/ExtremeHeat), including the following:

For you and your passengers: Have extra drinking water for everyone in the vehicle, including pets, an umbrella for shade and a fully charged cellphone. Pro tip: Take a cooler to keep extra drinking water cold, and consider adding several frozen bottles of water to use for cooling off or to thaw and drink if needed.

If you must spend extended time along a highway due to a breakdown or some other delay, you'll need sun protection. In addition to an umbrella, take sunscreen and a wide-brimmed hat and wear loose-fitting, light-colored cotton clothing.

For your vehicle: Check the air conditioner and coolant levels, top off any vital engine fluids and make sure your battery is

up to par. Check your tire pressure, as the combination of underinflated or overinflated tires and hot pavement can lead to a blowout.

Keep your tank at least three-quarters full. Running out of gas, especially in a remote location, is dangerous in extreme heat.

If your vehicle breaks down, call for assistance right away to reduce your wait, and run the air conditioning. If your vehicle's air conditioner isn't working, roll down all windows.

Here are other recommendations if you are stranded along the highway in extreme heat:

- Avoid parking in tall brush. A vehicle's undercarriage is very hot and can ignite grass and other vegetation.
- DRINK WATER. Make sure everyone, including pets, stays hydrated.
- If the temperature inside your vehicle becomes too hot, everyone, including pets, should exit carefully and seek out or create a shaded area as far away from the travel lanes as possible.

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# Opportunity to improve transportation safety in Pinal County; Join us at a community meeting to learn more about the safety plan and future transportation safety projects

(Pinal County, AZ) With 530 fatal crashes on roadways within Pinal County between 2008 and 2017, the Sun Corridor Metropolitan Planning Organization, in cooperation with Central Arizona Governments, Maricopa Association of Governments, and Pinal County, is developing a comprehensive Strategic Transportation Safety Plan for the cities, towns, and tribal communities located within Pinal County. The goal of the study is to identify crash trends and safety issues, develop strategies to reduce the number of crashes, and implement solutions for safer travel in the county.

Community members can learn more about the transportation safety plan by attending one of the upcoming meetings. Each meeting will be an open-house format with a brief presentation at approximately 5:10 p.m. Attendees will have an opportunity to meet with members of the study team for informal discussion on the study recommendations and view crash map data from the study.

The same information will be presented at each meeting.

# Distracted Driving

**T**hese days we all lead active, busy lives. We go places in our cars and seem to spend hours on end behind the wheel going from place to place multi-tasking while we drive. That multi-tasking can turn us into a distracted driver. Distracted drivers, we've all seen them on the roads, haven't we?

So, just what makes a person a distracted driver? Texting? YES! Talking on your cell phone, especially when holding it in your hand while driving? YES! Tuning in your favorite radio station? YES! Eating or drinking, putting on makeup or even

shaving while driving, driving while tired and sleepy? YES! YES! and YES!

Face it, everyone who drives has been a distracted driver at some point and will be again.

According to the National Safety Council, more than 40,000 people were killed in motor vehicle fatalities in 2018. From cell phones to dashboard infotainment systems to evolving voice command features, all pose a threat to our safety. Just one second of your attention is all it takes to change a life forever. It has been proven that drivers who are talking on their phone,

hand-held or hands-free, miss seeing up to 50 percent of what is going on around them such as other drivers, pedestrians, motorcycles and, bicycles. If you take your eyes off the road for just five seconds while traveling at 55 MPH you will travel the length of a football field during those five seconds. It's like you are driving blind!

Many people think that all the new safety technology built into vehicles these days will make your car even safer. While this may be true to some degree, it has been proven that this technology can divert a

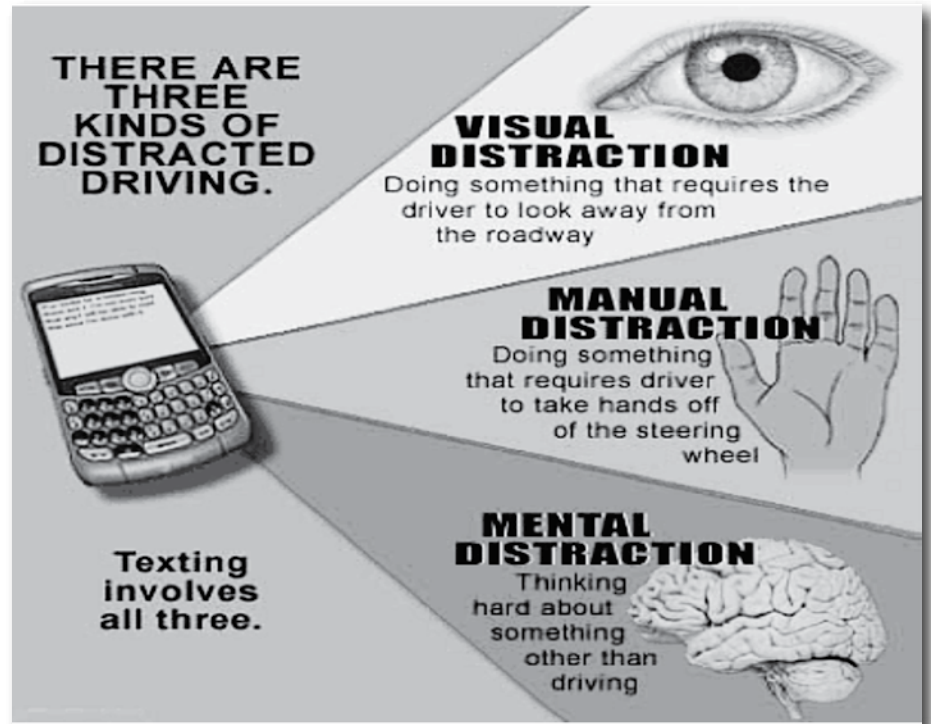

driver's attention causing them to become a distracted driver. The National Safety Council goes on to say that 80 percent of drivers mistakenly believe that hands-free devices are safer than hand-held and 53 percent of drivers believe that hands-free features must be safe if they are built into a vehicle. The fact is that hands-free features can increase mental distraction. They are about convenience NOT SAFETY! The following common tasks should NEVER be done while driving: talking on the phone, checking email, posting on social media, ordering takeout food.

Next time you get into your vehicle to go somewhere whether it is just around the corner to get some milk or for a cross-country trip, the National Safety Council advises you to avoid the dash to the

dashboard. Turn off your cell phone, make sure you've had enough sleep, NEVER drive while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

# FCC robocall ruling offers hope; in the meantime, just hang up on dodgy callers; report shows 5 million seniors lose \$27.4 a year to phone scammers

Seniors may get robocall relief if a new Federal Communications Commission [FCC] ruling prompts phone companies to implement technologies that automatically block them. Dan Weber, an advocate for older Americans, says the ruling is a step in the right direction.

The president of the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC] reports that “while it is still early days, it appears the major phone service providers are ready to cooperate. It was good news when Verizon was quick to ‘welcome’ the ruling.”

Verizon issued a statement hours after the FCC announced its decision. In it, the company stated that it is “putting robocallers on notice. We’ve got their number and we’re taking big steps to stop them from doing what they’re doing.”

Meanwhile, Apple has announced a new software update will be available in the fall that can automatically block unwanted spam callers.

Weber says, however, that he is taking a wait and see attitude regarding these latest efforts to rein in phone scammers. “It’s a lucrative crime and the perpetrators are tech savvy enough to find new ways to prey on the elderly.”

He cites an article on the FCC ruling published by

Politico, which noted that: “experts warn that callers slinging bogus tax bills and insurance schemes might still find a way to get through. Calls originating from overseas could present a technical challenge. And the measures are voluntary: phone companies won’t be required to take advantage of the call-blocking systems that the FCC is encouraging and could charge consumers fees for using them.”

Tech journalist and privacy advocate Paul Bischoff recently prepared an elder fraud analysis of phone scams targeting seniors for the technology research firm, CompariTech. The Bischoff report provides an eye-opening state-by-state assessment of elder fraud. He told AMAC that the FCC ruling to stop unwanted robocalls “is a step in the right direction but ultimately might not have the desired impact for consumers.”

The report revealed that seniors are primary targets for fraudsters accounting for 38% of scams and that there are an estimated 5 million cases of elder fraud annually resulting in \$27.4 billion in losses.

“We are hopeful that the new focus on protecting the elderly from phone scammers will have a positive effect going forward. In the meantime, just hang up if a caller starts asking for personal information or makes threats. Don’t take their word for it if they say they are calling on official business. No official will ever ask for you to reveal account numbers, Social Security numbers, Medicare IDs over the phone.”

# Closure of Neary Avenue - Park Expansions

During their July regularly scheduled Council Meeting, the Superior Town Council approved the request to make

Neary Ave a cul-de-sac and expand the Besich Park to add a permanent stage and amphitheater. The council approval

included a provision for Staff to allow for some design modifications to meet concerns of the neighbors.

I have met and spoken personally with most of the residents in the 100 block of Neary, and the Town is attempting to balance their requests. Not all of the residents are in agreement. The council has authorized me to move the project forward with modifications, and I am attempting to do so in a way that meet all concerns and ensures that the project is structurally sound. This takes some time and research, but we are nearly done. The current design calls for three-foot-wide columns spaced six feet apart. Sliding barn doors would be rolled out to fill the gaps when bands play. This will address some of the residents concerns for their view-shed and the noise concerns of the other residents. When a set of plans are complete, I will share them on our Facebook page.

This project is funded through a Community Development Block Grant. This is a 100 percent grant with no match that the Town receives once every three years. For the last few cycles, the CDBG funding has been used to make needed repairs to the wastewater treatment plant. In years prior to that CDBG project, funds have been used to remodel the Magma Club and to create the skate park. This cycle, the Town Council sought to select a project that would improve the quality of life of its citizens, the Besich Park improvements and a playground by the pool were selected through the public

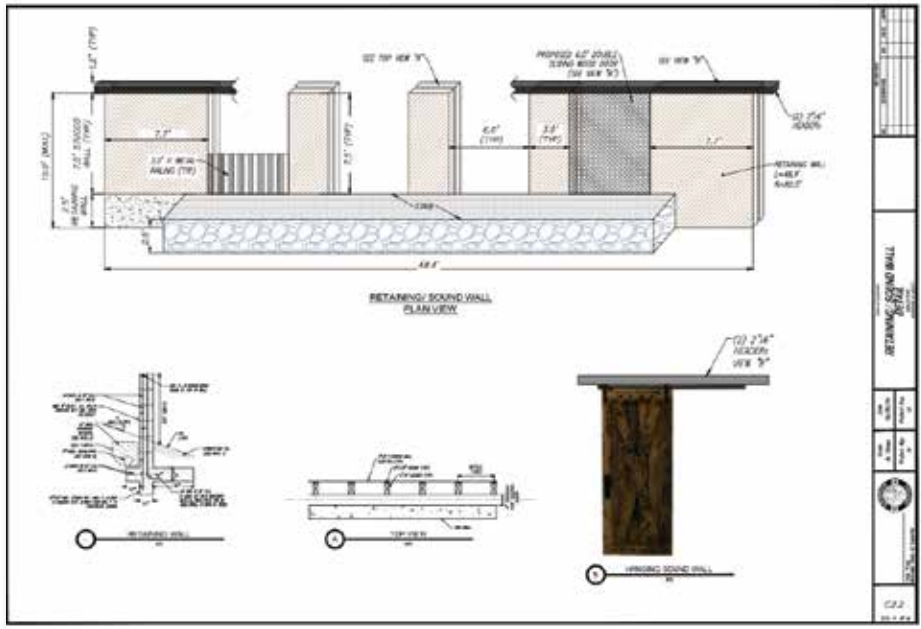
hearings and planning process that took over a year. This funding also allowed for the development of a Parks and Recreation plan that will continue to guide the Town into the future. These funds can only be used for the selected projects and cannot be used on other project.

The Town is definitely concerned that we be as transparent as possible. It is obvious that we can do better with our public engagement. A "knock and talk" approach was used to reach the residents, and most of the residents were reached through this process, but some were not reached until after their neighbors notified them. We will improve our outreach in future projects, including door hangers and mailers for the effected residents.

To reach this point, the Town has held six public hearings on the proposed park project, beginning in March of 2017. Each hearing was posted at the post office, senior center, town hall, the Superior Sun and the web. In addition, we formed a committee of interested citizens to prepare a plan for the Besich Park, and their design was sent to P&Z and Council for public hearings. In addition, the Mayor gave several updates on the project in the Superior Sun. We can still improve our outreach, however, possibly by adding updates to the sewer bills and more extensive neighborhood notifications.

The Town appreciates everyone's patience as we work to improve our community.
