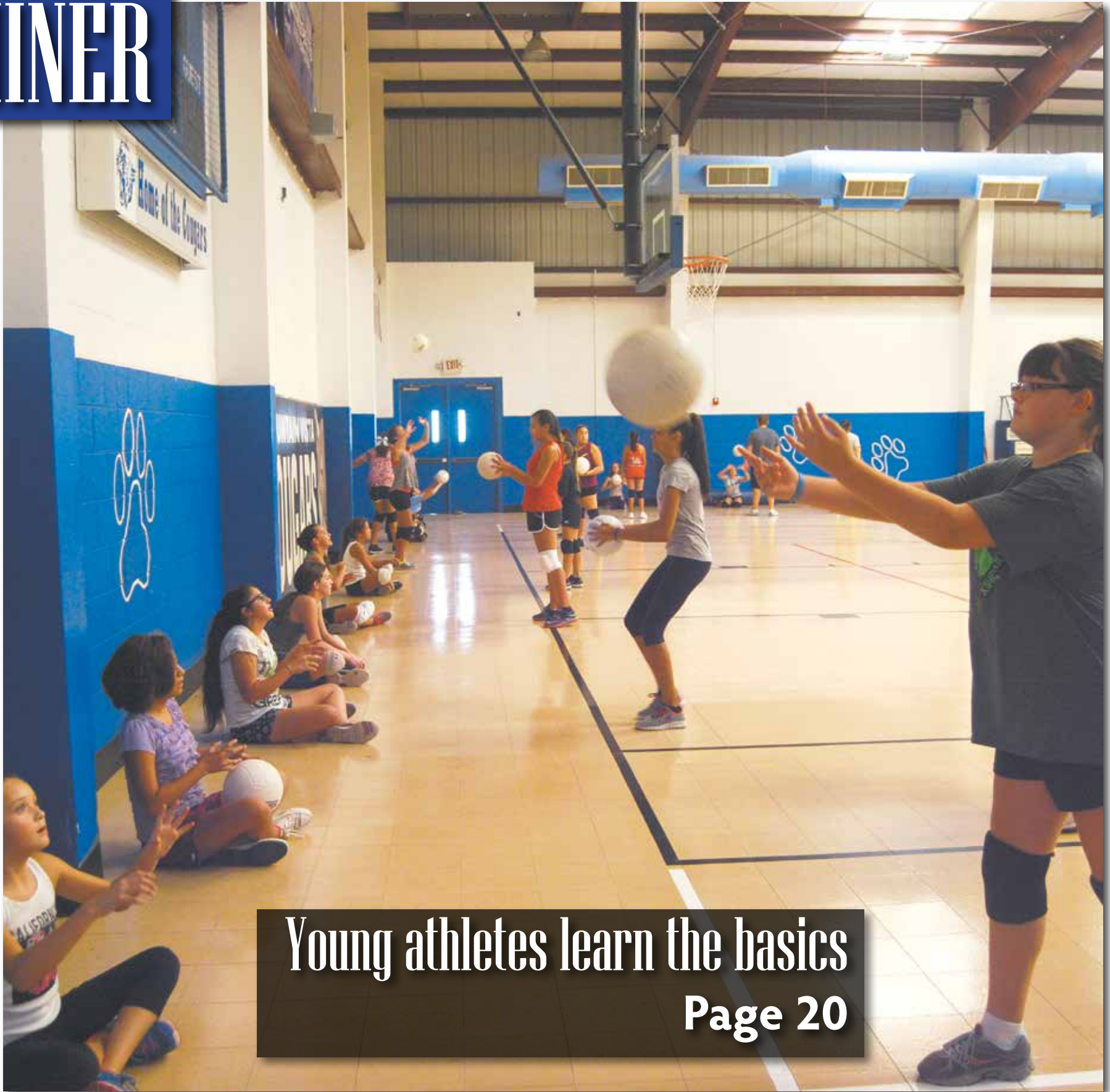
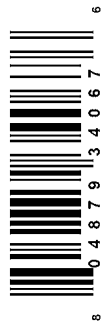

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OBITUARIES

William B. Walsh II

Sergeant Major William B. Walsh II, USMC retired, was deployed on July 21, 2015, to his final duty station.

Bill was born and raised in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He joined the Marine Corps in 1972 and served in numerous locations worldwide during his 28 plus years of active duty service. He was stationed in Jacksonville, FL; Yuma, AZ; El Toro, CA; Camp Pendleton, CA; Amarillo, TX; Barstow, CA; Iwakuni, Japan; Baharan; Camp Fugi, Japan; Yechon, Korea; Okinawa, Japan; and finally retired out of Yuma, AZ. He served in Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

Sergeant Major Walsh was a lifetime member of the FFW and DAV organizations, the NRA, and the Marine Corps Association. He was also a member of Living Word Chapel in Oracle, AZ.

Upon retiring from the Marine Corps, Sergeant Major Walsh became the senior military instruction for the MCJROTC program at Ray High School in Kearny, AZ. After one year at Ray High School, he felt obligated to give back to the United States after of the horrific 9-11 attacks. Bill was one of the early architects of TSA and played an instrumental role in building TSA Tucson. He was in the very first Mobile Screening Force in March, 2002, rolling out TSA on the east coast. He became one of Tucson International Airport's first Managers where he

started checked baggage from the ground floor, opening in the cold early morning hours of Jan. 1, 2003. Bill was later the Training Manager, Deputy AFSD of Screening, and senior security manager before retiring in 2014.

Despite fighting two different cancers, (GIST in 1995 and malignant melanoma in 2005) he earned his Doctorate of Education degree in 2009. In 2013, the GIST metastasized and was diagnosed as terminal.

He was preceded in death by his father, William B. Walsh, mother, Mina A. Walsh; brothers, Bryan Walsh and Bruce Walsh; and nephews, Brady Walsh, Bryan (Bo) Walsh.

Sergeant Major Walsh is survived by his wife, Bonnielee; sons, Ronnie (Kim) of Idaho, William, III (Noelia) of central California, and Samuel (Penelope) of Arizona; and daughter, Diana (Derick) of southern California. He was a proud grandpa to seven grandchildren.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The real truth about Oak Flat

It was with great interest that my son—who just graduated from Arizona State University – showed me a recent story regarding the controversy around Oak Flat, near the small mining town of Superior, Arizona. As a San Carlos tribal member and Apache historian, I was surprised by some of the misinformation that was contained within the op-ed. My book, “The History of the San Carlos Apache,” which was published by the San Carlos Apache Historic and Cultural Preservation Office in 1997 offers a much different perspective than Ms. Millet. There has not been a long history of ceremonial or cultural activities such as Sunrise or Holy Ground ceremonies taking place at Oak Flat.

From my personal perspective, the thought of having such a ceremony at Oak Flat, far from the support of relatives, clan members and friends in the San Carlos tribal area is almost unthinkable. My uncle, who lived in Superior, would regularly attend most tribal ceremonies. He would travel to the San Carlos Apache reservation or the White Mountain Apache reservation. I, myself, attended my first tribal Sunrise ceremony at Cibecue, Arizona in the White Mountains – the idea of having a sunrise ceremony at Oak Flat was never considered. Such an event requires the support of family, relatives and friends plus the input of the medicine man or spiritual person who performs the complex ceremony. He has much to say about the site and choosing the right place is important because the dance often becomes a community event. Evidently the person who wrote the op-ed didn't have much knowledge on what the ceremony involves in commitment, logistics and preparation.

In 1970 the Magma Copper Company built a mine shaft on Oak Flat that you can see from the passing highway. At that time no member of the San Carlos Apache Tribe said anything about it being a sacred site. I know because I was living in Superior at the time. Some tribal people from San Carlos even talked about getting employment with the mine. There were no protests, no publicity of any kind. Why not? If this area was sacred, wouldn't

opposition arise many years before today? There was never any statement made by tribal members or tribal leadership. It wasn't until recent years that the site of Oak Flat was called sacred in any kind of way. All one has to do is examine the records to see if the word sacred was ever used for the site.

However, the real truth about speaking out with a different opinion on Oak Flat that is contrary to the tribal government's stance is fear. People working for the tribe will often say (to me and others) that if they

go against what the tribal council supports they will be fired. Does it not bother anyone that rarely do we hear a voice of someone on the street who doesn't support tribal government's view on Oak Flat? If people have a different opinion on a subject they should not have to be called traitors or be accused of being against their own people.

Before making any kind of judgment on a subject of importance all the facts should be studied and examined to the utmost for the good of all concerned.

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Resilient Forests, Resilient Communities

Arizonaans are all too familiar with the consequences of unhealthy and poorly managed forests. Wildfires not only lead to devastating economic losses, they can take a tragic human toll. Our state recently marked the two-year anniversary of the Yarnell Hill fire, when we lost 19 firefighters in a horrific wildfire.

It's clear that forest health should be a priority in Arizona. But it also needs to be a priority in Congress.

I cosponsored the Resilient Federal Forests Act of 2015 because it takes a common-sense approach to forest management. And I'm pleased to announce that it passed the House on July 9 with bipartisan support. It is now headed to the Senate for consideration, and I urge our two Arizona senators to fight for its

passage.

This bill does several things that promote healthier forests in Arizona and across the country. Among the most important is it streamlines the regulatory process, which increases efficiency for the U.S. Forest Service as it deals with environmental reviews, timber harvesting and forest management. The bill also promotes collaboration with the private sector and expands tribal participation in the restoration of federal forest lands.

By promoting healthier forests, ultimately

this legislation protects the folks who live and work in communities around national forests. We have a lot of those communities here in Arizona.

District One includes 12 Native American tribes, so I'm especially glad this bill expands tribal participation in forest restoration. Our legislation received a strong statement of support from the Intertribal Timber Council.

Forest management is an issue that crosses party lines and crosses state

Area needs Resolution Copper

While the opposition to the Land Exchange has a right to express its opinion about the Resolution Mining project, it would seem that readers and reporters would want to take a look at both sides. When the opposition group first began their argument several years ago against the land exchange it was because they were losing the Oak Flat camp site that they enjoyed for so many years. It's a beautiful place but totally unimproved, and from what I heard, was seldom used. There are several such sites in the area and Resolution has offered to exchange beautiful land in order to obtain the Oak Flat property. After that the big issue of concern was that the project was going to use all of our water. When that was proven incorrect, they went on to other things and scare tactics like the Apache Leap Mountain was going to crumble and fall into the Town of Superior! Eventually the group was able to team up with some of the San Carlos Apache Tribal Leaders and form a larger coalition against the project.

With all due respect to the San Carlos Leaders, we have been told by other members of the Tribe that Oak Flat was NEVER sacred, the first dance was held there in 2012 and it has no religious or cultural significance to the tribe. The land was designated as "recreational use" by the US Government in the 50s and never designated as sacred or historical.

There is a huge ore body in our area and I believe natural resources are here for humans to use in a wise and responsible manner. I doubt that any

person associated with the opposition lives without copper in their lives. Let's see ... computers, cell phones, automobiles. We have many laws in the United States that prevent destruction to the environment and mines can no longer walk away and leave huge piles of tailings and other debris.

The bottom line is that this area desperately needs jobs, economic improvement and a future. The project will create several thousand jobs and put billions of dollars into the economy. The unemployment rate on the San Carlos reservation is somewhere in the neighborhood of 70 percent and Resolution Copper is committed to hire some of the people of the tribe, as well as local and regional people.

Sooner or later this massive amount of copper will be mined. I would much rather see a responsible company like Resolution take on that task than an unknown company that may have no commitment to the Town and Region and no desire to hire locally. Without even starting the mining process Resolution has given hundreds of thousands of dollars to our schools, Town improvements, tourism promotion and local non-profit organizations. There is no guarantee the next company will do this. In a recent independent survey, by Arizona State University, 84 percent of the people in our Region are in favor of this project. Eighty-four percent of the people can't be wrong!

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Rattlesnake assault in Oracle: suspect tried to get rattlesnake to bite victim

Pinal County Sheriff's Deputies say an Oracle man used a rattlesnake in an assault. The deputies were called to a residence in the 1100 block of N. Justice Dr., Oracle, on Thursday, July 23, 2015 at approximately 9:30 p.m. after 9-1-1 dispatchers received a report of shots fired.

According to Tim Gaffney, Public Information Officer for the Sheriff's Office, when deputies arrived on scene, they learned from a witness that Nathaniel Buck Harrison, 38, Oracle, came over to the residence uninvited and fired a bullet from a handgun inside of the home.

Deputies attempted to get Harrison to come out of the residence but he refused, Gaffney said. They set up a perimeter around the residence and eventually Harrison came out and was taken into custody.

Harrison refused to answer any questions.

"The victim (age 53) who was inside of the residence with Harrison when deputies responded, said Harrison came over to his residence and came inside without his permission or knowledge," Sheriff Paul Babeu told the San Manuel

Miner in a press release. "Harrison (allegedly) accused the victim of being a 'rat' and sending his friend to prison. Harrison found a board inside of the residence and hit the victim in the head with it so hard, the board broke in half. Harrison told the victim he was going to 'kill' him as he attempted to get a rattlesnake, which he brought with him, to bite the victim, but the snake wouldn't bite. Harrison made the victim kneel down on the floor and he then fired a 45 caliber bullet out of a handgun into a speaker box on the floor which was located near the victim's foot."

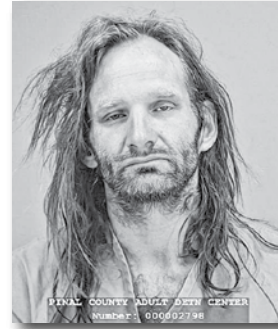
A short time later, according to the victim, both he and Harrison heard the sound of sirens coming and knew deputies were on their way. Harrison attempted to hide the pistol under a couch located in the kitchen.

Harrison was booked into the Pinal County Jail for endangerment, aggravated assault, criminal trespassing, disorderly conduct with a weapon, possession of a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony offense, unlawful discharge of a firearm

and threatening and intimidating. According to the Sheriff's Office, Harrison already has an extensive criminal history.

"Harrison is currently being held on a \$50,000 bond. The victim in this case told deputies he is terrified that if Harrison is released from custody he will in fact kill him," the sheriff added. "This is the first case I have heard where a victim attempted to use a venomous snake to kill or injure his victim. The snake was found by

deputies inside of the residence and after it was caught it was released back into the wild."

Oak Flats no longer under consideration for historic nomination

A few weeks ago the Copper Area News reported that the Tonto National Forest with the San Carlos Apache Tribe submitted an application to the Keeper of the Record at the National Register of Historic Places to nominate "Chi' chil Bildagoteel" most commonly known as Oak Flats as a historically significant site. This nomination process began in December 2014 and after a final public comment period which ended on July 16, 2015, the Keeper of the Record has determined that the nomination will be sent back to the Forest Service.

The Keeper of the Record has returned this application back to the Forest Service due to technical and substantive reasons. The exact reasons have not been

disclosed by the Keeper. Congressional Representatives Paul Gosar DDS and Ann Kirkpatrick sent a joint letter to the Forest Service Chief and the Regional Forester asking them to withdraw the nomination. The Congressional representative cited several reasons to withdraw the nomination. Letters opposing the nomination were also sent by Pinal County Supervisor Pete Rios and local residents of Superior and San Carlos. Those letters were also reviewed by the Keeper of the Record.

The first point addressed by Representatives Gosar and Kirkpatrick in their joint letter was Geographic Accuracy. At this time the name Chi'Chil Bildagoteel does not appear on any maps maintained by the Tonto National Forest, the US Geological Service or even Google Maps - the letter points this

out to the Forest Service officials. The original application to the Keeper of the Record also indicated that Oak Flats was near Kearney, Arizona, which is spelled incorrectly. Kearny is the correct spelling of the name. Gosar and Kirkpatrick pointed out not only the misspelling of the name but also the fact that the communities of Superior and Top of the World were closer to the nomination area. Kearny is more than 20 miles away from Oak Flats as pointed out in the joint letter.

Their letter also addressed compliance with the Administrative Procedures Act which requires that there be adequate notice for the people near the area to comment on the nomination. Those procedures call for the time, place and nature of public rule making proceedings

Budgets and Roadwork

The most recent development on the Town of Mammoth's deficit budget and paying for police coverage is still being negotiated with Sheriff Babeu. The Town can afford to pay approximately \$250 thousand per year for a 5 year agreement. The Sheriff is requesting \$350 thousand per year for 24 hour, 7 days per week deputy sheriff coverage.

The Sheriff may lower his amount to \$320 thousand, but is concerned that at a much lower amount, he would not be

able to provide around-the-clock coverage for the Town of Mammoth and would have to pull officers from surrounding communities to provide additional coverage for Mammoth. As negotiations continue, my hope is that the Mayor and Sheriff can reach some agreement that will provide the residents of Mammoth adequate law enforcement coverage or that the Mayor can attract additional police officers for the town's police department with the available town funds. On a second issue, the Board of

Supervisors will be voting in August on a 5-year transportation plan that includes paving Veterans Memorial Highway from San Manuel to Redington Road. The second phase would include chip sealing 8 miles of Redington Rd. (minus the washes) to the Pima County line. Some of my friends in the environmental community are strongly opposing one or both of these projects. and reference to the legal authority under which the rule is proposed.

Gosar and Kirkpatrick also acknowledge that "many of our constituents have different views on the Oak Flat Campground area." Both expressed that the members of the public with views on either side of this question should have a full and fair opportunity to contribute

their perspective and understand the scope of the listing.

Those opposing the Resolution Copper have repeatedly said that the passage of the Southeast Arizona Land Exchange and Conservation act was approved without any transparency. The nomination of Oak Flats as a historical and culturally significant site

was requested by the San Carlos Apache Tribe, without using commonly known names or locations.

Opposition groups including members of the San Carlos Apache Tribe, the Arizona Mining Reform Coalition and the Superior-based Retired Miners and Concerned citizens continue to oppose the land exchange and the

mining project. They are expected to host a protest in Washington, D.C. on the Capital Lawn on July 22, which closes out their cross country caravan protesting the project. The group has received support from Arizona Representatives Raul Grijalva and Ruben Gallego along with other members of Congress.

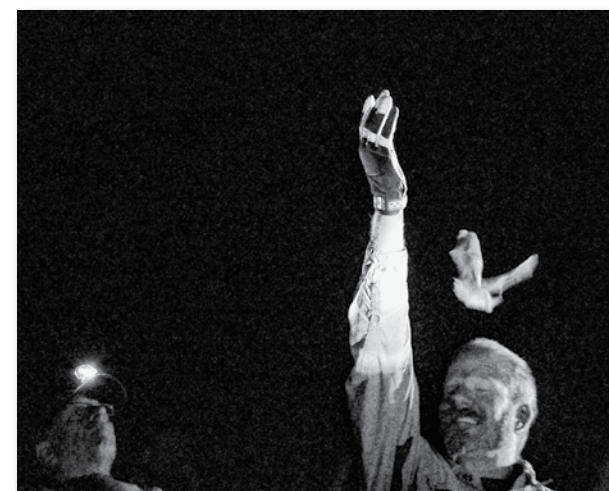

Hummingbird feeder owners asked to watch for bats; nectar drinking bats being studied throughout Southern Arizona

Arizona Game and Fish Department (AGFD), U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and local researchers are seeking volunteers from throughout southern Arizona to monitor use of their home hummingbird feeders by nectar-feeding bats.

Those willing to participate in the project, conducted in partnership with the Town of Marana, should contact Adjunct Professor Ted Fleming of the University of Arizona at ted@sonaura.net. Volunteers will be asked for their name and address, cross streets only if preferred; zip code; and the general dates bats were noticed using hummingbird feeders, and will be provided with the monitoring protocol. Photos of bats feeding are also being sought.

“If your hummingbird feeders mysteriously drained during the night last summer, the midnight raiders may have been bats,” said AGFD Regional Supervisor Raul Vega. “Most of Arizona’s 28 bat species eat insects, but two species drink nectar and eat pollen from plants such as the saguaro and agaves. These bats are becoming common visitors to southern Arizona hummingbird feeders in late summer and early fall.”

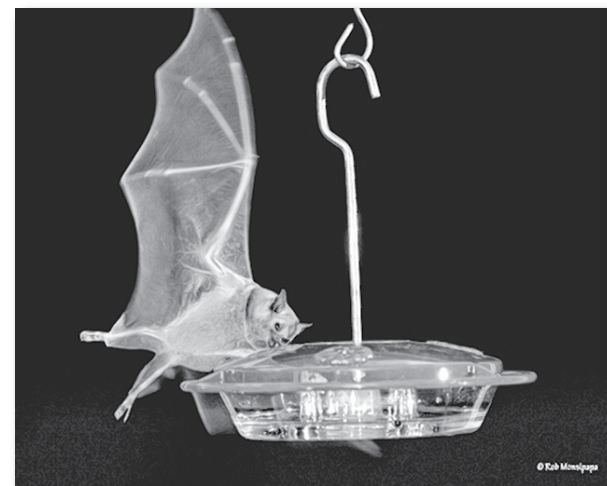
In southern Arizona, there are two bat species that consume nectar: the lesser long-nosed bat, which is listed

as federally endangered; and the Mexican long-tongued bat, an Arizona species of concern. These gentle, beneficial pollinators live in caves and mines. During summer nights, they travel in search of food, and over time, have found their way to hummingbird feeders in southern Arizona. The bats are migratory and return to Mexico in the fall.

The use of hummingbird feeders by bats has been documented in southern Arizona for many years. In 2006, large numbers of bats were detected foraging on hummingbird feeders in the urban areas surrounding the Tucson basin. Bats visiting the feeders is now being detected more widely in southern Arizona, and volunteers are currently monitoring them as far north as Dove Mountain near Pinal County and as far south as Nogales in Santa Cruz County.

Habitat conservation planning by the City of Tucson and the Town of Marana has spearheaded these efforts to evaluate potential effects to these bat species in the Tucson basin. borders. It affects not only our forests but our local economies and the people who live in our communities. That's also why the Four Forest Restoration Initiative (4FRI), the nation's largest forest-thinning project, needs to kick into higher gear. As envisioned, 4FRI will not only allow for thinning overgrown Arizona forests, it will revive the timber industry by opening a sawmill and creating good local jobs.

This spring, the U.S. Forest Service announced that 4FRI's initial environmental impact statement had been completed. This milestone agreement came after more than five years of collaboration between the Forest Service, local governments, conservationists,

environmentalists, private industry and other stakeholders.

At the time, I wrote that Arizona was overdue for action on 4FRI. Since then, my staff has met with forestry officials in Arizona, and my office is launching a series of conference calls for stakeholders to review 4FRI's progress and obstacles.

As the representative of a district that includes the Coconino, Kaibab, Apache-Sitgreaves, and Tonto national forests, it's my top priority to ensure 4FRI moves forward.
