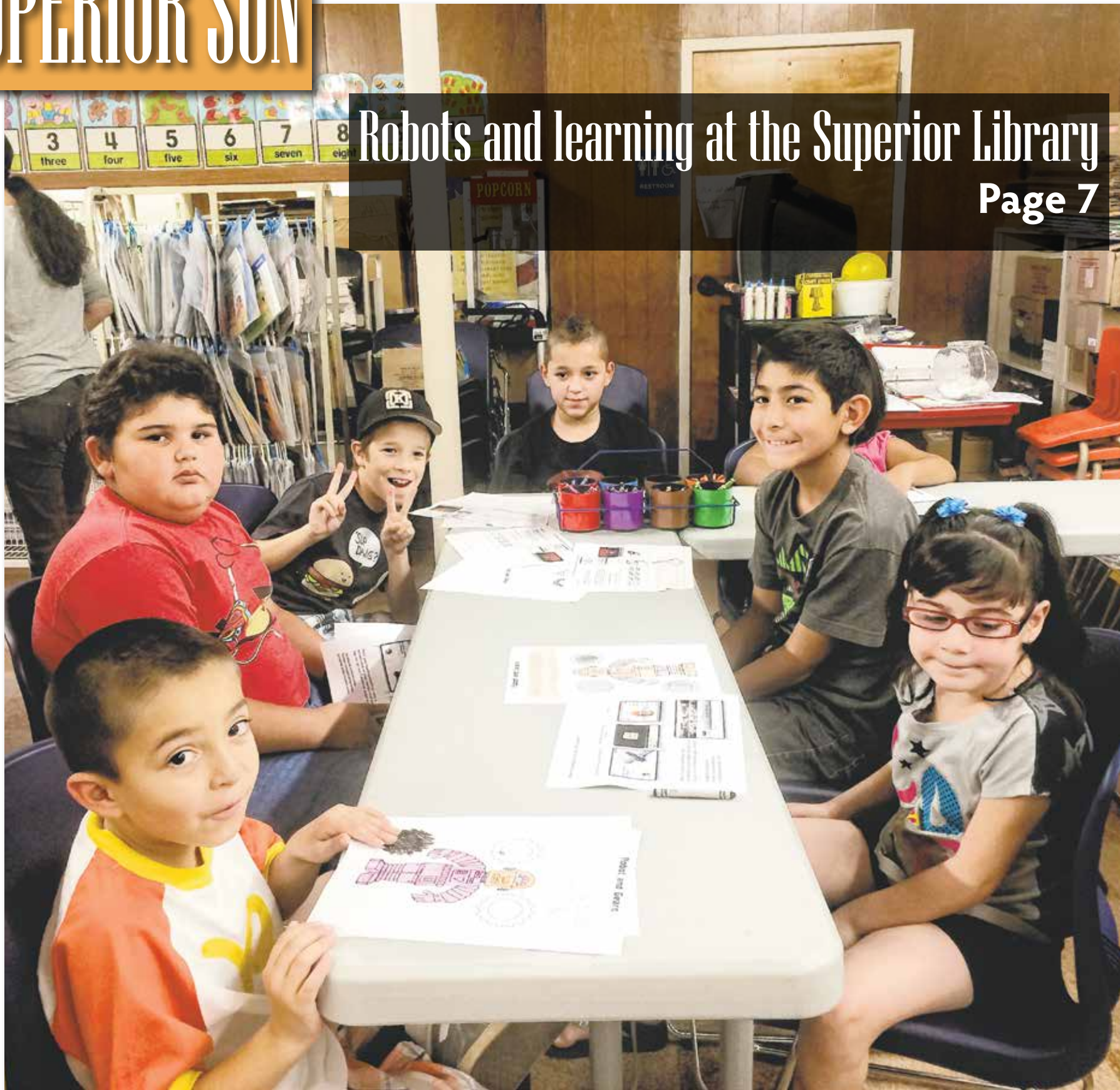
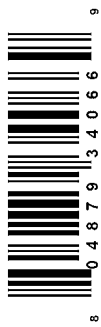

Superior Police releases sex offender notification

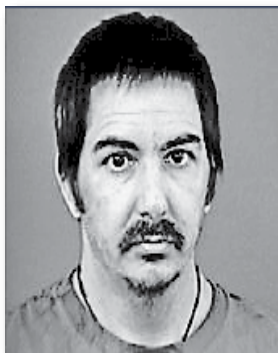
The Superior Police Department has issued a sex offender notification for the Superior area.

Robert L. Dewey, 45, has indicated he will be living in the 100 block of S. Richard Ave., Superior. Dewey is a Caucasian with brown eyes and black hair. He is 5 feet, 11 inches tall and weighs 155 pounds. He has been classified as a Level Three sex offender.

The Superior Police Department is releasing the above information pursuant to A.R.S. 13-3825, the Community Notification on Sex Offender Law. Notification must be made when certain sex offenders are released from the Arizona State Prison, accepted under an interstate compact or released from the county jail back into the community. Offenders are categorized into three levels: Level One (low risk to the community), Level Two

(intermediate risk to the community), and Level Three (high risk to the community).

The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense, which allows for community notification. He is not wanted by the Superior Police Department at this time.

This notification is not intended to increase fear; rather it is our belief that an informed community is a safer community. The Superior Police Department has no legal authority to direct where a sex offender may or may not live. Unless court ordered restrictions exist, this offender is constitutionally free to live

wherever he chooses. Citizen abuse of this information to threaten, intimidate, or harass sex offenders will not be tolerated. Sex offenders have always lived in our communities; but because of Megan's Law, law enforcement is now able to share this information with you.

Police caution that any use of this information to threaten, intimidate, harass or create an act against another person will result in prosecution.

Superior Police Report

According to state law, police may arrest suspected offenders by two methods. The suspect may be physically taken into the department and booked into jail, or the arresting officer may write a citation and release the suspect to appear in court later. All suspects are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law. Only criminal citations are listed. All damage amounts are estimates.

Items are given to The Superior Sun by the Superior Police Department and reflect information available at the time the report is compiled.

Superior Schools: What Not To Wear – The Student Edition

Superior - Are you ready for the start of school? Is your wardrobe? Remember, students, that what might be fun and frolicsome for summer time wear is not always appropriate for school.

Here's a list of what not to wear while attending classes, or otherwise being on campus, to help you plan your school wardrobe:

Young ladies, please save the

spaghetti straps, thin strapped tank tops, cutaway tops and vests, low cut tops, crop tops, halter tops, off the shoulder or cut out shoulder tops, sleeveless tops and rompers, open back or cut tops, short skirts and short shirts for after school. Of course, this applies to dresses, as well. If any young gentlemen are getting ideas, be advised that, while ladies are addressed herein,

none of the aforementioned items are considered appropriate for anyone on campus.

Also inappropriate for school wear are pajamas, ripped clothing, saggy pants, trench coats, undershirts worn in place of overshirts, wide arm tank tops, hats or head coverings that have not received prior approval from an administrator, body armor, and spiked

or chained clothing or jewelry.

Finally, there will be no clothing or jewelry with inappropriate messages or pictures allowed. For the purposes of school wear, inappropriate messages or images include, but are not necessarily limited to, swear words, depictions of nudity, references to drugs, violence or gangs. When in doubt, ask an administrator first.

Pertussis confirmed in Gila County

Gila County has reported a confirmed case of pertussis, also known as whooping cough, in the Payson area.

Pertussis is a contagious disease spread from person to person by coughing or sneezing while in close contact with others. It is most contagious during the cold-like stage to three weeks after it begins. Pertussis is treated with antibiotics and people may return to normal activities after five days of treatment and are fever-free.

Pertussis is called whooping cough, because, in older infants and preschool children, coughing is often followed by a whooping sound. Other symptoms to look for are mild cold-like signs and symptoms, accompanied by little or no fever; coughing that worsens within one to two weeks and becomes intermittent, and may be followed by vomiting; and, increased production of mucus.

The Gila County Office of Health is advising its residents to stay vigilant.

For maximum protection against pertussis, children need five Diphtheria Tetanus and acellular Pertussis or DTaP shots. The first three shots are given to infants at 2, 4 and 6 months of age, which protects most infants but the effects of which tend to fade as they become toddler. Preteens will also need a TDaP, which is a pertussis booster. It is also recommended that pregnant women should receive it during the third trimester.

If a person has been exposed to

pertussis by a household member, or other close contact, they may be given a preventative course of antibiotics to prevent them from getting sick.

If you suspect that you may have pertussis, have been exposed, or, have any questions, please contact your primary care physician.

Forum guests take tour of Resolution reclamation sites

Resolution Copper has begun its summer forum series for 2014. The first forum included a tour of the areas that the company has reclaimed since 2005.

The tour began at the Magma Club where guests learned the basics of mine safety and took a quiz to allow them to enter the mine property. Following the quiz and introductions the guests boarded a tour bus for an hour long tour of the Resolution Copper Mine property off of Magma. This part of the property is known as the west plant.

The tour of the west plant included a stop at the 500 yard where everyone had an opportunity to view the property from the overlook and learn about the clean up of the old Magma hospital now known as the Verde Building. One of the items pointed out was that when Resolution Copper remodeled the hospital into their offices they took every effort to preserve the building and reconstructed it to be a green building. Each door and window was custom made to fit the building in order to

keep the nostalgic integrity. During this stop on the tour many locals shared stories of the old hospital and how the area looked prior to massive cleanup by Resolution Copper.

The bus then took guests to see the Never Sweat Tunnel, the waste water treatment plant, which is where the mill used to be, and guests were also able to drive close to the rail yard and smelter.

"To date, the company has spent thirty million dollars to reclaim the legacy issues left by Magma," said Casey McKeon the environmental manager for Resolution Copper.

The smelter was also a topic of discussion during the forum. McKeon explained that the company is evaluating its smelter to ensure that it not a safety hazard for those around the smelter. There is some concern that high winds or rough weather have knocked bricks off the top of the iconic structure. During the meeting it was announced that there will be a community discussion on the smelter.

Returning to the Magma Club, guests were able to learn more about the permits involved in operating the mine and conducting the

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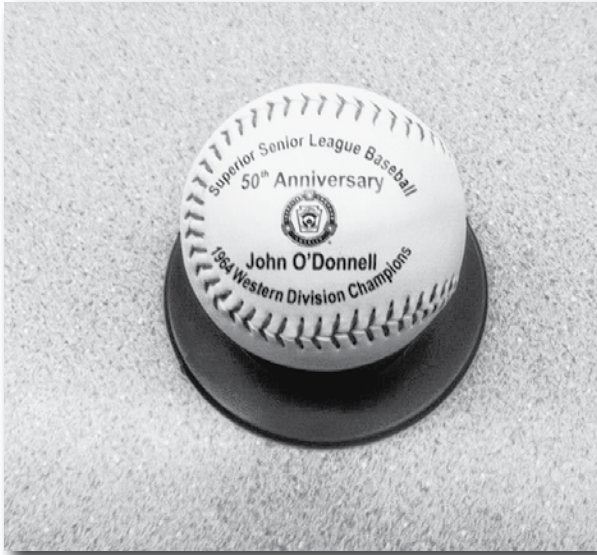

Superior Little League recognizes All Stars past and present

The Superior Little League started the 2014 season with new energy and a fresh set of goals to accomplish. The season started with a new score board and several improvements to the concession stand.

The League also celebrated

two major milestones. One was the 75th Anniversary of the International Little League Baseball Association the second was the 50th Anniversary of the Superior Senior League All Stars who represented the Superior, the state of Arizona and the western regional division at the Little League International Tournament in 1964.

These were all reasons to celebrate at the end of the season ceremonies in June. While everyone was there in anticipation of the announcement of the 2014 All Star Teams, all of the players each received a medal for their sportsmanship and participation in the League. This year the annual ceremony was not only about the present players and all stars, there was a time of recognition for the 1964 Superior Senior League All Star Team. The team is celebrating its 50th anniversary of their All Star victories.

The 1964 All Star Team from Superior was the first team in Arizona to play in the Senior League All Start International Tournament.

To get to that point, the team first had to defeat San Manuel and Casa Grande in the district tournament. Then they headed to Phoenix to defeat Rose Lane, Arizona and Silver City, New Mexico. Those victories earned them a trip to Downy, California where they beat three other state championship teams.

Following their victories in Downey, they traveled to Roseville, California to defeat Hayward, California for the Western Region Championship. In that title, they represented nine states and British Columbia, Canada.

That summer, the Senior League of Superior, Arizona traveled to Kentucky to play in the Senior League All Star Tournament. It was a summer most of them would never forget, and it is a big part of Superior history to this day.

The 2014 Little League board invited the team back to the closing ceremonies and presented them with a commemorative baseball. Only a few members were able to return for the ceremony, but this important milestone was

not forgotten.

Members of the 1964 Superior Senior League team were: Pat Alcala, John O'Donnell, Roy Lopez, Manuel Silvas, Joey Vindiola, Nolbert Casillas, Ray Ramirez Jr., George Redondo, Don Ketron, Joe Thomas, Frank Campos, Mike Santa Cruz, Billy Joe Walker and coaches, Chapo Campos, Joe Vindiola, and Manuel Sanchez.

The 2014 Superior All Stars teams are currently in tournament mode. The 11 and 12 year old girls softball team was eliminated from its tournament last week after three games. The 9 and 10 year old girls softball teams began tournament play this week, at press time there was no status on the team. The rest of the League All Stars teams will begin play after the Fourth of July holiday weekend.

The month of July is the perfect time to add a new bird to your "life list".

The Common Ground Dove, which has seldom been reported in recent times, has been making Boyce Thompson Arboretum its home. A territorial, vocal male is in residence. The distinctive call, a softly repeated "hoooOOip, hoooOOip" can be heard throughout the morning around the Picnic Area parking lot, near the Smith building and points between. There may also be a nesting pair.

Hooded Orioles, Yellow Warblers, Summer Tanagers and other colorful migrant summertime birds are visiting. An iridescent male Varied Bunting has been photographed in the Demonstration Garden, near the woodland stream. Last week, on the guided bird walk, it was seen with a bright male Blue Grosbeak just yards away. Yes, it's the perfect time to hone your skills at field identification based on plumage, behavior and birdcalls.

Mark your calendar for guided bird walks, including a special Friday, July 4 holiday outing guided by Nathan Williams. On Sunday, July 6 a bird walk will be guided by Anne Leight. The following Sunday, July 13, the bird walk will be guided by photographer Cindy Marple. All bird walks, as well as most weekend events, are included with daily admission of \$10.

reclamation projects. Currently there are 20 active permits on site and there could be up to 50 depending on the project. McKeon shared with the group that each of these permits have financial assurances that will allow the state to clean up the project should a mining company ever up and leave.

These forums will be conducted throughout the summer. The next forum is scheduled for July 31, from 6-8 p.m. at the Magma Club. The forum topic will be on Resolution Copper Health and Safety programs. This forum will be held at the Magma Club.

The West Plant Site is located adjacent to the northern edge of the Town of Superior in Township 1S, Range 12E, Sections 35 and 35, and in Township 2S, Range 12E, Sections 3 and 4. The East Plant Site is located within the same geographical area to the east, south of Highway 60.

Physical characteristics:
Type of mine: Existing hardrock shaft mine.

Size of operation: Previous operations have disturbed 445 acres in the East and West Plant Site areas. Re-disturbance of 78 acres in the West Plant Site and 25 acres in the East Plant Site are covered under this permit.
Surface disturbances covered by this plan include borrow pits, stockpiles of cover material, pads, disposal areas and rock faces.

Proposed reclamation timeframe:
Reclamation will be completed within approximately 24 to 30 months of cessation of mining.

Proposed Post mining land use:
The proposed post mining land use includes future exploration, industrial park, grazing and wildlife habitat.

Reclamation Measures:
• Disturbed areas will be re-contoured to promote drainage, reduce erosion, and improve stability.
• Slopes will be graded to 3H:1V slopes or flatter.

• Equipment, structures and appurtenances will be removed, with the exception of historic structures.

• Roads not required for maintenance, security, monitoring or future post-mining land use will be removed.

• Fencing, gates, and signage will be maintained for access control.

• Active revegetation will be used to stabilize soil and limit infiltration. Surfaces will be ripped and/or harrowed prior to hydroseeding.

• Stormwater management will utilize detention ponds for the control of runoff rates.

• Additional closure requirements under Arizona Aquifer Protection Permits and Arizona Pollutant Discharge Elimination System are in place, and are not duplicated in these reclamation activities. Remediation of historical mining areas is occurring under the Voluntary Remediation Program.
