Please Mandate Masks in Pinal County

am Artistic Director of The Oracle Piano Society, a nonprofit arts organization serving the unincorporated area of Oracle in Pinal County's Supervisor District 1.

I am writing in strong support of Supervisor Pete Rios' initiative to mandate face masks.

As the father of a medically fragile child, my family has spent enough time in the hospital to recognize the realworld impact of infectious diseases.

COVID-19 is no joke and, according to science, the only known way to prevent its spread is to socially distance and wear a mask.

Preventing the spread of COVID-19 will shorten its lifespan and will protect our vulnerable population.

Knowing this, it is astounding to me that anyone would

resist wearing a mask or advocate against mask wearing.

The population most at risk, our greatest generation, made countless sacrifices during World War II. In addition to putting their lives on the line to defend our freedom, citizens engaged in many domestic sacrifices including rationing, volunteerism, and investing in the

Wearing a mask to protect that generation is the very least we can do.

I have enacted measures within my organization to protect the health and well-being of our vulnerable loved

We will hold outdoor drive-in concerts until it is safe to convene indoors, we will conduct our educational programs online until it is safe to meet in person, and we will require masks at all events.

I am happy to make these accommodations but it should not be up to business managers alone to protect the health and wellbeing of the community.

In a time of national crisis, leadership matters.

I strongly support Supervisor Pete Rios' public initiative to mandate mask wearing and thank him for his leadership on this issue.

The other members of the Board of Supervisors must also take action to protect our vulnerable population and to shorten this pandemic.

You must mandate face masks.



Strike lines down: Will the union go back to work?

After nine months on strike, officials with the United Steelworkers announced that they made an unconditional offer to return to work to ASARCO. This news came after the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) issued a complaint against ASARCO alleging numerous violations of federal labor laws. In a letter to union members, the USW explained that NLRB allegations include failure to bargain in good faith, illegally declaring an impasse in negotiations and unilaterally implementing changes to the working conditions.

The strike lines at Ray and Hayden were removed on Monday morning at 6 a.m. as workers left the picket lines to await word if they would allowed to return to their pre-strike positions.

The Union's decision to end the current Unfair Labor Practices (ULP) strike and by making the unconditional offer to return to work will mean that ASARCO should return the union members to their pre-strike jobs and avoid any further financial penalties for the company. ASARCO has made claims that is has permanently filled the empty positions at all of their locations.

If ASARCO does not return the striking workers to their pre-strike jobs,



What Arizona teachers think about re-opening schools for the 2020-21 school year; Expect More Arizona releases results from statewide survey



Arizona educators have many concerns about getting back to teaching and want to be a part of the decision-making process as schools consider their reopening plans. This, according to results from a survey of Arizona educators released by Expect More Arizona.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has created unprecedented challenges for schools all over the world and Arizona has been no exception," said Christine Thompson, president and CEO of Expect More Arizona. "Spring closures reminded our community that educators are some of the most dedicated and necessary professionals out there."

According to the survey, 79 percent plan to return to the classroom with 18 percent still undecided. Only one quarter of respondents indicated that the pandemic influenced their decision.

But concern about the virus remains. Half are concerned or very concerned about their safety and health when they return to their classrooms in July or August. By far, teachers' biggest concerns about returning to school are the health and safety of staff (67%) and students (62%). Other key areas of concern include student mental health (37%) and helping students catch up (35%).

Nearly 10,800 classroom teachers voluntarily completed the survey. While a majority of respondents were from Maricopa County (59%) every county was represented in the survey.

As of May 31, the majority of Arizona teachers had yet to be included in school planning conversations, with 56 percent sharing they had not been included and 22 percent who had not yet been included, but who expected to be in the future.

"While no one knows what the next few weeks, months or even year will hold, it is essential that schools and other education decision-makers include student, parent and teacher voices in the process," Thompson added. "The large number of participants in our survey speaks volumes about educators' desire to be heard."

Three in four respondents want to see rules requiring teachers and students to stay home if they are sick. Additionally, strict sanitation procedures and access to cleaning products in the classroom should be a priority for school districts, along with clear protocols and procedures for staff, parents, and students.

"Now is the time to rally behind schools to support our teachers and students," said Thompson. "The costs associated with COVID-19 will be substantial, and at a time when budgets are already tight. We must ensure school needs are met so they can continue the vital work of closing achievement gaps and preparing the next generation of leaders, professionals, entrepreneurs and more."

The survey was conducted by Expect More Arizona in partnership with the Arizona State Board of Education. Data was compiled and analyzed by Arizona State University's Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College and Decision Center for Educational Excellence, led by Kristi Glassmeyer, Jeanne M. Powers, and Joe O'Reilly. Other groups assisted in sharing the survey with teachers, including the Arizona Department of Education, Arizona Charter Schools Association, Arizona Education Association, Arizona School Administrators, Arizona K-12 Center, Arizona Education Foundation, Tucson Values Teachers and many more.

Bobby Apodaca honored for his years of service

A recent study by the University of Maryland's Do Good Institute showed that volunteerism is on the decline in America. If true, that makes Bobby Apodaca an old-school specimen. Apodaca, current Chief of Pinal Rural Fire & Medical District, has been a part of the volunteer fire service all his life. It's been a point of family pride.

The Winkelman native's father, a bricklayer in the furnace at an ASARCO mine, was also the Chief of the Winkelman Volunteer Fire Department. Bobby likewise served with the Winkelman department for a total of 21 years; for 13 of those years he was chief himself. His uncle, his brother and both of his sisters were also members of the department.

In addition to his frontline service to the Winkelman VFD, Bobby Apodaca became increasingly active in service to volunteer firefighting on a statewide, even national level.

"Back in the day," he says, "my dad was a big supporter of the Associated Firefighters of Arizona." Founded in 1964, the organization, which aims to "support, coordinate, develop, promote and implement the volunteer fire departments through Arizona," became the Volunteer Fire Fighters of Arizona (VFFA) in 2005, and Apodaca at one point served as its president.

Other firefightingrelated organizations with which Apodaca has been active over the years, in one capacity or another, include the volunteer sector of the Arizona Fire Chiefs Association and the Arizona Fire Service Institute. He was also a delegate to the Congressional Fire Service Institute (CFSI), the organization devoted to advising Congress with regard to the nation's fire and emergency services.

in 2003, Bobby Apodaca had one of the more memorable and glamorous experiences of his long fire service career. He and his brother Patrick were selected, out of thousands of entrants, to travel to Baltimore, Maryland and tour the set of the film Ladder 49, starring John Travolta and Joaquin Phoenix. The brothers visited the locations. toured the Gorsuch Street station, and worked as extras (although. unfortunately, their scene ended up on the cutting room floor).

In recent years, Apodaca, who works days as an interactive TV technician at the Aravaipa Campus of Central Arizona College, has returned to a more hands-on role with a new department. In 2015 he joined Pinal Rural Fire District as a Deputy Chief; since 2017 he's been the Fire Chief.

Operating out of two small repurposed

automotive garages on the edge of the town of Mammoth, Pinal Rural holds vigil over the beautiful, lonely strip of Arizona State Route 77 stretching between Mammoth and Dudleyville, and a few other sparselypopulated desert areas outside of Mammoth proper.

Calls are few, Apodaca admits, and unpredictable.

"You'll go a couple of weeks with no calls, but you could get five in a day," he said.

This showed itself to be true in late May, when after weeks with almost no calls, Pinal Rural was called to three brushfires and one medical call in the same day. In that isolated region, prompt fire response is not guaranteed, so in conjunction with the Pinal Rural Fire Board, Bobby Apodaca and crew provide an important service to the area's

taxpayers.

The department's equipment and vehicles are mostly hand-me-downs donated from around the state, and the staff are volunteers, some from the community, others aspiring paid firefighters looking for precious experience and training. Apodaca, of course, has plenty of experience to share.

Asked if he has a most memorable experience as a firefighter, Bobby Apodaca recalls an odd episode from the mid-'90s, his early days with Winkelman VFD.

"One of my first calls, we responded to a lumberyard fire. We were standing in Winkelman, in a parking lot, but the fire was in Hayden," he said.
